It was a very rewarding evening.


Now the New York-New Jersey Club will look forward to the spring and summer when we remain active to bring entertainment to our year-round residents.

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Fire safety reminders and preparation tips for extended stays away from your condo

Considering a recent kitchen fire in Building 60, it is worthwhile to review basic home safety practices.

Kitchen Safety 101

Never walk away from a stovetop frying pan while you are cooking. Simple enough, right? Some of the worst fires this community has had were related to that exactly, including this latest one.

There was the "lamb roast rocket" fire many years ago when a gentleman walked away from a frying pan while frying lamb chops.

Then the oil caught fire.

Rather than smothering the flames with baking soda, using a fire extinguisher, the pan lid or a fire blanket he threw water on it!

The flames exploded through the third floor ceiling - like a rocket (hence the name).

The fire was so hot, it warped three bar joists.

Aside from the damage in the apartment, the repair to the roof structure was costly and time consuming.

The gentleman was unable to resume occupancy of his home for 24 months.

Moral of the story: Never leave an active frying pan (or pot) unattended while cooking.

Second moral: Have an HO-6 form of insurance with Loss of Use Coverage, so you have funds to find alternative housing while the condo is under repair.

For those residents with approved dryers in their condo, April is a good time to clean out your dryer vent pipe. Lint can become clogged in the vent pipe, reducing dry-

er efficiency (that's why it takes an hour or more to dry a 20-minute load!). Even more to the point, collected lint can become a fire hazard!

If, by chance, you have a "bootleg" washer/dryer installed in your home, now is a great time to have it inspected by a licensed professional electrician and appliance specialist to make sure the installation conforms to building code standards.

Once this inspection is certified to the Association, your record will be updated.

It is worth noting, all resale units with washer/dryers must first have such an inspection prior to a resale purchase transaction approved by the Association.

Many dryer vents traverse a long distance to the roof. This type of installation falls under the heading of a "limited common element serving a single unit." As such, it is the owners obligation to maintain this compo-

nent. If you've never done this before, the vent pipe may need a top-down cleaning.

If you engage an independent contractor for this work, they will require Association permission to access the roof top vent. They will need to demonstrate proper licensing and insurance, as well as demonstrate the ability to meet OSHA requirements to work safely on a roof.

Travel Season

Spring is right around the corner in northern climates, but it's been here in Clearwater for a good two months already. We know that many of you will be heading back to visit family or to your summer homes.

As you read on in this article, you'll begin to get an idea of the extensive work your Association has planned through the summer and into the fall. We schedule as much as we can in this time period so we are impacting the lowest number of residents.

With the summer travel season right around the corner, we know many residents take extended trips around the country. Experience teaches that added steps need to be taken before going on that extended trip in order to avoid possible disasters in your condo when you are gone. Below is a short checklist of things to do.

If the air conditioning system is not properly maintained by an owner, mold and mildew may result and become a serious problem for the owner. Improperly vented dryers may also be a source of both heat and moisture in your home. Water leaks in the home may also be a source of moisture. If you suspect a water leak, contact the Com-

munity Service Office immediately! A fast response on leaks can prevent further damage and save you unnecessary expense.

Mold growth is secondary to the presence of high humidity levels or saturation by water. Mold is evidenced by the appearance of a black, sooty substance on furniture or walls. If you suspect you have mold, it is best to contact the Community Service Office and arrange for a visual inspection. There is no charge for this service.

Please remember that the proper maintenance or repair of your HVAC unit, water heater and drain pan, and ice maker line (if any) is always the owner's responsibility.

Rarely does mold or mildew present a health problem. Usually the main complaint is an odor and the unsightly nature of the matter. I mention this because the home repair industry is rife with scare tactics and scams, causing homeowners to spend thousands of dollars on matters that are generally easily resolved.

I recently heard from a gentleman who believes that placing pans of cat litter around the apartment will absorb moisture (humidity) from the atmosphere. Clay based cat litter is good for absorbing liquids, but that is about it.

Silica-based cat litter may have some capacity to absorb humidity to a limited degree, but based on everything I've read, it needs to be changed every two weeks. Your best bet is to still set the AC at 78 F and have the apartment checked weekly during your absence.

Use common sense and have a great summer!



THINGS TO DO BEFORE LEAVING ON AN EXTENDED TRIP

- Leave your contact number with at least two trusted neighbors or friends.
- Update the Association with emergency contact information.
- Have the interior of the condo checked at least once a week by a trusted neighbor or friend or arrange for an inspection service.
- Check in regularly with the trusted neighbor or friend while you are gone.
- Arrange for a water meter turn off if you are going away for an extended term.
- Turn off the electric to the hot water heater.
- Make sure the air conditioner is properly serviced by a professional before departing. This includes a drain line flush. Drain line flushing should be done at least twice a year to prevent condensate flooding your home and anyone living beneath you. Air filters require monthly attention and can be changed by the owner.
- Leave the thermostat between 78-80. This helps regulate humidity in the home and prevent the occurrence of mold or mildew.
- If you plan on being gone for several months, you may wish to consult with an air conditioning professional about adding a humidistat to ensure optimal humidity levels in the home.
- Make sure your home owner's insurance policy is current and covers both damage from wind, water and mold. In most cases this is now an added rider on the policy.

Did you know there are 3 ways to turn your water on or off?

Must be present for water to be turned on.

Go under the service tab to fill out a request.

After hours service is available 6-9 pm, Monday through Friday, 11:30-9 pm Saturdays and 7:30-11:30 a.m. Sundays, by calling 799-1115. There is a \$35 fee for all after hours services.

Service Policy

Residents must provide a date and time for service. A minimum 2-hour service window exists. You must be present in all circumstances for your water to be turned on. No exceptions. Payments are checks only.

Paving season - you or a neighbor

It's hard to believe it's that time of year again when our winter residents prepare to head north for the summer season.

To give you peace of mind, the "Summerize" checklist has been included in this edition on page 3 to help you prepare your homes for the hot summer months when you are away.

While there is no guarantee that your condo won't experience water intrusion in your absence, taking the time to review and implement the items on the checklist may help prevent many concerns.

Dealing with water intrusion and the possibility of mold growth, which is secondary to water damage, is burdensome and costly and troublesome to do when you're not local. I cannot stress enough the importance of having a reliable friend or neighbor inspect your unit on a regular basis (no less than once a week). Ask them to visually inspect all of the rooms and all sources for water intrusion, for example, under sinks, toilets, HVAC units, hot water heater pan and windows.

Every condo has the potential for multiple sources of water leaks and intrusion. This includes improperly maintained air conditioning units. Make sure to have your air conditioning unit serviced before you leave for an extended period. We recommend all residents have their air conditioner serviced every six months.

"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" after all.

A poorly fitted replacement window may be another source of water intrusion.

And, if you are like me, you never think about your water heater. Water heaters are another cause of water leaks. The tank is not immune from mineral accumulation, corrosion and rust. If your water heater is more than 10 years old, it probably needs replacement.

If you plan to leave your vehicle in your parking space for the summer, make sure you leave an extra set of keys with a neighbor in the event your vehicle would need to be moved to accommodate work crews. This information should be passed along to the Community Service Office or the Association. You can also place a note in the dashboard advising of the key holder.

The management company has an-

other aggressive paving schedule this spring and it is critical that all vehicles are removed from parking lots during this process.

Did You Know

Face it. Kindness is contagious, but in a good way, because it fosters happiness in you and in others. Try it some-

time, I bet you'll feel good afterwards.

Parking is a challenge. Some residents have more than one vehicle and some park that second vehicle in areas where parking is not permitted, such as designated visitor parking spaces or at other buildings.

This continues to be an issue.

It is important to note that numbered parking spaces are assigned exclusively to residents. Visitor parking is for visitors and is on a first-come, first-served basis and is not intended for indefinite use by one party.

Visitor parking is for short stay visitors and not residents.

If you have a second vehicle, utilize your numbered spaces, and/or on-street parking, where available.

Street parking is available on any streets not marked with "No Parking" signage. In a cul-de-sac, should it be marked as a designated fire lane, parking would not be permitted.

Parking is not permitted in designated bike or fire lanes. Vehicles parked in designated bike or fire lanes should be reported by calling the Community Service Office line at 727-683-6981. Vehicles that are reported will be tagged to be towed away if not moved immediately.

As a reminder, all parking space changes must be requested in writing to the Association through the Community Service Office. Include a sketch/drawing of your current space and that of the new space you would like to be assigned. If the proposed space is assigned to another resident, they will need to also provide, in writing, their agreement with the parking space change.

Should you change your parking space without Association approval, that space will be returned to its original numbered marking or "V" designation without notification.

Upcoming Community Projects

Painting/Waterproofing

"April showers bring May flowers" is a popular and true saying for our neighbors in the northern states and Canada, however, April in Florida means below average rainfall and is the perfect weather for many larger scale projects.

One of these projects is painting. The property's painting contractor most

recently completed a recoating of the Sunset Point Road entrance archway. Also included were the OTOW globe, and the east and west Belcher attendant entrance buildings.

Now they will be turning their efforts to painting projects on the east side of property with the rear facades of buildings 9 and 10 scheduled as well as the front facades of buildings 2 and 4.

The contractor also will be squeezing in some specialty element coating projects on the east side, however, start dates for those are not completely defined as of this update.

As always, notices will be posted in advance of the commencement of work. Please keep in mind that the painting contractor will be operating in close proximity to parking areas and front/rear porches which may require the temporary displacement of vehicles or property. Thank you for your continued cooperation and keep in mind that unexpected inclement weather can affect start and completion dates.

Construction, Roofing and Large Scope Projects

With springtime also comes the arrival of asphalt improvement and parking lot maintenance projects at On Top of the World.

A licensed contractor will be applying sealcoating products to various parking areas around the community in order to renew the surface conditions, combat against UV exposure, and extend the useful life of the surface as we move along in time.

The work is estimated to begin in April, pending assignment of the work by your board and availability of the contractor. Once the start dates have been set for this work, residents should be prepared to relocate cars as needed.

RAVE messages, bulletin boards postings, and windshield reminders are the most effective means of communication in situations like this, so please keep an eye out for any updates.

Any parking areas being serviced during this maintenance cycle will be cordoned off for a minimum of 48 hours after the work has taken place in order to allow the product time to cure correctly.

Please remember that this curing time is crucial before it is driven upon and will also allow the contractor the opportunity to re-stripe the lot without obstructions as well as minimize tire scuffing.

We politely ask that residents observe the closures and wait until a Management Company representative has removed all the barricades at their parking lot before venturing onto the parking surface.

Alternative parking is available on roadways and in visitor spots at surrounding buildings for those residents displaced.

Keep in mind that Management Company employees will be working in close proximity to the roadways during this work. For safety's sake, we ask that residents slow down, pay close attention to any direction given by flagmen and, as always, obey posted speed limits.

The worker's safety depends on your cooperation.

The roofing contractor should be transitioning to the reroofing project at building 74 sometime in early April, pending favorable weather is in place.

This project will be different than all of the others due to the original design of the roofline bollard element and how it ties into the roofing system. For this reason, the roofing contractor will be removing all of the cementitious bollards permanently from the structure to allow for the installation. This portion of the project will begin prior to the standard tear-off of old and installation of a new roofing membrane.

Because this nature of work will require heavy equipment and disposal dumpsters, the parking lots will be closed off temporarily twice during this re-roof process. This will affect both sides of the building twice.

As start dates become more defined, it will be communicated to unit owners. This will most likely come in the form of electronic communications and bulletins.

As always, thank you for your attention and cooperation.

Aluminum railing improvements continue to take place on the east side of property. Late April or early May should see the vendor wrapping up the project at building 18A and moving on to building 8.

These improvements involve the removal of all existing components and the complete installation of railing elements with new code compliant systems in stairwells and in the second and third floor balcony walkways as required.

Residents should be aware of active work zones as the project is underway. Please avoid work areas, watch your step and help us make safety a number one priority.

Your continued cooperation is appreciated!

As a reminder, there remains quite a few hurricane restoration projects that will be starting sometime in the spring, pending association approval and assignment of contracts. Residents should keep their eyes on building bulletin boards for updates which will be passed along as they become available.

Recurring Reminders for All Community Residents

The Management Company continues its ongoing enforcement efforts to remove unapproved items placed in buildings common areas. This includes, but is not limited to, plants (live or artificial), door mats, personal items, non-exterior rated furniture, rusted chairs/tables or in disrepair, tchotchkes, etcetera, as these items are not permitted to occupy common spaces.

As has been referenced in the newspaper, on the community TV channel, and the bulletins posted in all building center core lobbies, these items will be removed and disposed of without further notice.

These ongoing efforts help keep the areas safe for first responders as well as maintain an aesthetically pleasing community for all to reside in. We ask that residents help keep the community's common areas in compliance by report-

ing violations of this nature to the Management Company.

We appreciate the community's cooperation and support in reporting any violations of this nature so the Management Company can investigate and correct if necessary.

Inspection Services Division

With warmer weather, also comes more opportunities to barbecue.

With safety in mind, inspection efforts will be focused on the tagging and removal of portable barbecue grills, be it propane, charcoal or electric, which are not permitted in any building common areas as they pose a fire risk to the structure and residents.

Only grills meeting the approved Clearwater Fire Department standard are permitted on the patio of first floor units. If you're a first-floor unit owner and not sure if your grill complies, please stop by the Community Service Office to request a visit from our friendly Inspections Services staff.

After-Hours Emergency Information

The On Top of the World emergency after-hours phone number is 727-799-1115. Please call this number, after hours, in the event of an emergency, such as a water intrusion into your condo.

For all other inquiries regarding general issues or questions that are not service-related, you will need to come in person to the Community Service Office.

OTOW Alerts

Signing up for OTOW-ALERTS (powered by RAVE) is incredibly easy. Simply go to www.otowclearwaterinfo.com and from the home page scroll down to the bottom of the page and the "Sign Up Now" box will be located to the left of the screen.

Click to enroll.

You can also sign up from the "Stay Informed" tab located at the top of the home page. This is without obligation or cost to you. Your email and cell phone numbers are secure, never shared, and never solicited.

Alternatively, you may visit the Community Service Office to apply. OTOW-ALERTS provides advance warning of severe weather events as well as other matters of critical concern to the residents of OTOW Clearwater Condominium Community.

It is not hyperbole to say an advanced warning may save lives!

As a reminder, when signing up for community and emergency alerts, be sure to enter your building number.

Community Service Office Information

The Community Service Office (CSO) hours of operation are Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The office closes for lunch from noon to 12:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, unless otherwise posted.

If your call goes to voice mail, it is because the staff is working with someone else. Please be patient. Calls and voicemails will be responded to during normal business hours.

Once the requested service matter is identified, a service order will be generated and submitted to the appropriate department to address the matter. The goal of the CSO is to make an initial assessment of the request and to determine if it is an emergency or non-emergency. Once the matter is assessed, a plan to resolve will be made and work scheduled.

Generally, all non-emergency service requests are assessed and addressed in the order in which they are received.

From time to time, it may become necessary for us to contact you with questions or clarification of your request. It is not necessary to report service requests more than once. If you have any questions regarding your request, and until the Community Service Office reopens, please call the Service Request Line at 727-683-6981.

As a reminder, window and door repair or replacement is exclusive to the condo and is the owner's responsibility. The Association's responsibility is to the structure and common elements.

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
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More than 475 residents participate in online community survey

The On Top of the World Board of Administration has been busy since four new board members were elected at the end of January.

A number of new projects have been started and key negotiations and studies have continued - all to ensure the success and sustainability of the OTOW community.

Normally, we hear from approximately 25 residents during regular monthly board meetings. In an effort to receive input from a broader and more diverse representation of the community, the board provided an opportunity for association members to participate in an online survey which closed on March 24. This information will be used by the board to stay cognizant of present concerns and to help determine future priorities.

More than 475 residents completed the online survey which took place on the Box Office website. There was no



preregistering and no providing personal information.

Thank you for sharing your thoughts.

The responses are listed below:

Many residents wrote comments and we're still working through those and will report on them at a later date.

Updates

Work continues with Summit

Broadband to improve our service with special attention to those buildings with frequent issues in multiple units.

Parkway Management is working with Summit to schedule those specific buildings for wiring and equipment replacement and residents will be notified when repairs are set to begin.

If you're not available when a Summit representative comes to rewire your unit, you can schedule an appointment. We also continue to move forward with having an independent audit of the wiring system.

We've been notified there will be a delay in starting a creek repair project along World Parkway Boulevard East by the golf course due to scheduling issues. We'll keep you notified of any updates.

Discussion and negotiations continue regarding future management and maintenance agreements, but no con-

tract has been signed at the time of this article.

We are continuing with the current contract with Parkway Maintenance and Management.

As many of you know, we will soon vote on whether to waive the mandated capital reserves. You will receive your proxy vote in the mail soon and all voting must be completed by June (fill in date). Please complete it and return it to the Community Service Office, by mail, or by voting online as soon as possible.

We need a majority of the owners to vote to waive the reserves or the state will require us to have them, resulting in a significant increase in our monthly fees.

Please vote.

Our goal is to have 2550 owners vote to waive the reserve. Your vote counts!



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After your Amazon package arrives, be wary of any additional emails, texts and videos with an Amazon tag

The Office of the Florida Attorney General held a 2.5-3 hour seminar on cybercrimes on Jan. 15 at the On Top of the World Cultural Center in Ocala.

About 500 folks signed up and I thought the information provided was critically important as we fight our way through all the crimes for which seniors are targeted these days.

If you think about it, we are at war with cybercrimes. The enemies intend to steal our money, steal our dignity and steal all we built for ourselves over our lifetimes.

Our enemies know we are vulnerable. They prey on our vulnerability. And even I, who claim to know so much, am, in truth, just as vulnerable as anyone else.


At least I know it, and because of that, I do not trust any unsolicited contact by phone call, text, email or by someone just knocking on my door and offering some free inspection for my roof or for any part of my house at all.

A couple of weeks ago, I got a package from Amazon. I ordered it, so no problem there. However, shortly thereafter, I received a text message with an attached video to be opened. The text message said, "a video from your Amazon driver." I deleted it without opening it.

I don't have an Amazon driver. You don't either.

If Amazon wants to reach out to us, they have verifiable ways to do it and having a driver send me a video message for me to click on, isn't one of them.

Don't trust any unsolicited method of trying to contact you.



Q. From where do you get the questions/answers for your column?

A. I get them in a few ways. My clients ask questions that (with their permission) I want my readers to see. Sometimes, I get questions sent by email.

I am a member of the National Academy of Elder Law Attorneys, and the Academy of Florida Elder Law Attorneys. Questions arise on those lists that are important.

Sometimes an attorney will ask me a question and I want to discuss it. I use the Q and A format because it works best for me.

I should add that the questions that some folks think are silly are, indeed, actual questions presented to me by my clients or by folks who just ask me.

I edit questions to remove vulgarities and sometimes to correct grammar. After I put in a question, I throw away any means of

knowing who sent it.

Q. Why do I need title insurance when I buy a property from someone I know?

A. Because the someone you know might not know about a lien or judgment or forgery that might be a stain or encumbrance on the property.

(Honest disclosure: I have an ownership interest in a title insurance agency.)

Q. My significant other and I live together. Other than for religious purposes why should seniors get married?

A. Legal comments only: There might not be any reason, but to answer your question: Possible social security benefits if the wealthier spouse dies first, possible health insurance reasons, possible VA spousal benefits, possible spousal rights to make medical decisions for the spouse, possible other spousal property rights, possible spousal pension benefits, spousal inheritance rights, possible spousal estate planning benefits, possible spousal homestead benefits.

Q. Five years ago, I married a woman in (a foreign Hispanic-speaking country). I was 63 and she was much younger. We lived in that country and then we had a fight. Four months later, I gave her some money then

left her and moved to Florida. I've had no contact with her since I left. Since it was more than seven years ago, I assume, indeed, I'm no longer married and I can marry someone else now.

A. Well, I assume that you are, indeed, married, and therefore, marrying someone else without terminating the prior marriage will, indeed create, um, shall I say, a problem, indeed.

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
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


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 Hey Doc, why am I feeling so tired and feeling unhappy all the time?

"Tiredness" and "feeling unhappy" are leading symptoms of clinical major depression. Two hundred On Top of the World newspapers may not seem like a big deal, but when you think about it, only 12 are created each year.

The April 2025 edition of OTOW News is Editor Doug Kates' 200th newspaper for this community.

You would have to go back to the October 2008 edition to read the first newspaper Doug produced.

"I started on Sept. 11 so most of the stories were already in," Doug said. "With help from Assistant Editor Dave Hart, together we created my first newspaper here."

Members of the Press Association thanked Doug during the club's annual pizza party on March 6. President Tom Butcher, Vice President Donna Gagnon and Secretary Joanne Cordes presented Doug with a crystal globe to mark the milestone.

Then Roy Lemnus presented Doug with a T-Shirt which stated "OTOW 200th Edition."

A couple hours later, OTOW News Publisher Kenneth Colen presented Doug with another crystal globe - this one marking the "incredible milestone" of reaching 200 newspapers.

A private celebration took place on March 25 - the day the 200th edition was finished and sent to the printer. It was official.

A lot has taken place over the last 17 years.

"Dave and I were putting the finishing touches on my first newspaper when I saw there were no photos on the front page," Doug recalled. "I told Dave we had to have at least one picture on the front page, so I got in my car and began searching for someone decorating early for Halloween - since we were working on the October 2008 newspaper. The good news is, I found someone putting a pumpkin on their patio. The bad news was, I got lost and didn't know how to get back to the newsroom."

Each year, about 80 volunteer reporters contribute to OTOW News. Over the past 17 years that number comes out to roughly 1,000 different writers. Every single resident who has written a story has done so as a volunteer.

For the first 12 years, Doug and Dave

were a great team. The last five years, Doug has had to depend solely on his volunteer staff to help make deadline each month.

The efforts have not gone unnoticed. The Tampa Bay Times did a feature story on this publication in September 2022. The story included the amazing effort to not only produce a newspaper each month, but also have it delivered by Parkway Maintenance to all 91 buildings. On delivery day, residents know their beloved newspaper is waiting for them in the core.

It really is a team effort.

The newspaper, itself, has now been published for 57 years. It was the vision of Sidney Colen, who was actually the publisher when Doug started working at OTOW.

Doug has also had the privilege of working with great Press Association boards. Tom Butcher is the current president, Donna Gagnon is the vice president and Joanne Cordes is the secretary.

Doug has only worked with two board presidents. Yvonne Courtney was board president for 14 years.

The Press Association pizza party was a

great success. Thirty staffers attended, even though the event was moved indoors.

Up next for the staff is the annual Appreciation Dinner at Philippe Park on Thursday, April 3 at 4:30 p.m. at Shelter 7. This event is for anyone on staff who has contributed to at least three newspapers and attended at least three meetings in the past 12 months.

Dinner will be catered by Clearwater Family Restaurant. This is the one time all year when the Association says thank you to the most dedicated newspaper volunteers.

Fixers make platform for OTOW-TV

OTOW-TV channel 901 has taken a step forward to produce better monthly board meeting broadcasts.

With help from the Fixers Club, a brand new TV platform was built in our own wood shop. The new platform, 10 inches higher than the previous platform, will now capture video over everyone's head in the audience. Board members should be easier to view.

"I asked the Fixers Club if they could produce something to exact specifications," said OTOW-TV's Doug Kates. "I needed something safe, something 10 inches higher than before, and something I could roll in and out of the Auditorium and set up by myself."

Fixers members hit it right on the nose. Contributing were Jose Miranda and Duane Anderson..

All the wood was purchased locally, and cut and assembled in the East Activity Center wood shop. The overall platform comes in two pieces, but once in the Auditorium will be hooked together into one platform.

Club members also built a transport dolly so the platform could be wheeled in and out of the Auditorium.

Originally, the Fixers Club was going to pick up the tab and donate the platform to OTOW-TV, but the On Top of the World newspaper picked up the bill instead.

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
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Countdown begins to 30th parade

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



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Guidelines for Riding the Shuttle Bus

1. You MUST have a valid Activity Card and present it to the driver upon entering the bus. The SCA bus service is exclusively for use by Association-approved residents and tenants only. If you do not have a valid Activity Card, you may not ride the shuttle bus.
2. Reservations are REQUIRED – please call 727-799-3417 Option 7 no later than 1:00 pm the day prior to your planned trip. Monday's trip deadline is 1:00 pm Friday. Please be present in the core of your building at your scheduled pick up time.
3. Shopping time is 1.0 hours for grocery stores and 2.0 hours for Countryside Mall. Those going to Sunset Point 19 Plaza will have approximately 90 minutes to shop. Shopping time begins when you are dropped off at the destination.
4. Although appreciated, the driver is prohibited from accepting gifts or tips.
5. The driver may not assist you with entering or exiting the bus or with your packages. Please do not ask him to do so.
6. The start time listed is when the shuttle bus departs the Community Service Office. The pick-up schedule will rotate weekly between low and high buildings, meaning one week pick-up will start with the lower-numbered buildings, the following week it will start with the higher-numbered buildings.
7. Seats are not assigned. They are first come – first served.
8. Seat belts must be fastened during bus movement and must remain fastened until the bus comes to a complete stop.
9. Eating, drinking, smoking, vaping, fighting, distracting the driver, or any other unacceptable actions at the discretion of the driver are strictly prohibited on the bus. Violation of the above may result in your bus privileges being revoked.
10. All route changes are at the discretion of Management.

Nana has wowed us with her awakening story, shared spiritual insights and led us in deep meditations in past presentations.


She has been a messenger of the Spirit Realms for 25 years as a visionary, channel and spiritual teacher. She sees the golden soul shining inside every human.

Nikola teaches about the numerical, geometrical and vibrational essence of our consciousness and how we can tune in like



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
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Democratic Club members learn how far the Clearwater area has evolved

Were you, perhaps, dissuaded from writing at some point and always regretted stopping?

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

One guest went home a little richer. Evelyn Tiamson won the 50/50 raffle.



information will come in a group email later.


Next up, Carl announced he is giving up his position as president. He asked for someone to step up, but we have no takers yet. All other officers of the club were nominated for their positions again and approved.

Art Guild brings in an expert for pencil drawing class



three members reacted positively to the session. In fact, we were expecting a full class for our second session on March 18.




Rolando Rodriguez, center, with On Top of the World Art Guild students in his new, and first, pencil drawing class.


With walls echoing its musical heritage, the hotel earned a place in history by serving as the county's first radio station from 1925-1927.

A dozen tips for each day - one is exercise

Whole food, plant-based nutrition - pretty self explanatory, right?

Not according to Dr. Michael Greger.

Dr. Greger believes not all plant foods are created equal.

During our monthly meeting in March, our Plant-Based Living Group discussed the benefits of eating 12 foods Dr. Greger advises us to include in our daily diets. These 12 foods have special nutrients not found in abundance elsewhere.

We downloaded Dr. Greger's "Daily Dozen" at nutritionfacts.org. You can do it, too. On the nutritionfacts.org website scroll down to "Apps." Download "the daily dozen digest." The list includes: Beans, berries, other fruit, leafy vegetables, non-leafy vegetables, cruciferous vegetables (broccoli, cauliflower, brussel sprouts), flaxseed, nuts, herbs and spices, whole grains, water and exercise.

Dr. Greger suggests three daily servings of beans. To satisfy the suggested requirement, we can select from many types of beans, as well as hummus, bean sprouts, miso, edamame, tempeh and tofu. We learned how to make hummus with different variations.

In honor of St. Patrick's Day, Plant-Based Living Club attendees enjoyed top of the morning kombucha, which was my own recipe and is flavored with grapes, spirulina, and ginger.

Spirulina, a dried blue-green algae, is another nutrient dense food source providing



many health benefits. Spirulina is what gives the top of the morning kombucha its bright green color.

Many members of our group are now propagating scobys, the fermentation culture needed to brew kombucha, which is one way to keep fermented foods in our daily diet.

On Field 2, it was defense and smarts that marked both sides.


Neither team scored more than a run in any inning, but Blue won primarily due to three double plays with Tara Gunning as the pivot.






Bohemia residents step up when the need for donations was more than ever before


In 1967, 15 mixed religious affiliations and ethnic groups saw the need to help our area which was growing rapidly.

With rapid growth comes additional concerns, and the need for food, jobs and shelter. These issues can cause emotional problems.

The original group joined together to form what was then called, Religious Community Services, frequently referred to as RCS.

As our region grew even larger, RCS expanded, too. The leaders of the original organizations reached further out to other organizations, both religious and secular, and they responded. It was for this reason they rebranded, to what we know today as Hope Villages of America.

HOPE reaches out to the homeless, those in domestic violence situations, jobless individuals and maintain a food bank to assist the hungry.



There are no age restrictions or income levels that are turned away.

The Housing Stability Services branch assists with safe, affordable housing. They help the homeless to return to self-sufficiency and provide life skills to meet success and

much more.

The Abuse Service branch provides a hotline for those who need immediate help. They provided safe shelters to more than 300 women and children this past year.

Help is not limited to just women and children, but provided to men who are also engaged in domestic violence.

HOPE trucks are seen throughout the area collecting food from their bins found in strategic locations.

The greatest challenge was after our double hurricanes when the food bank began running low. But HOPE rose to the occasion and succeeded.

Hunger does not affect everyone, but everyone can help those who are hungry. It is simple. Dropping off a few non-perishable food items in a bin can make a difference.

Ten years ago, residents in the Bohemia building began collecting food items at every function they hosted. At the end of our first

year, we had collected 500 pounds and were so proud.

Over the years we have challenged ourselves to beat the previous year's record. This past year we recognized the great need due to the storms. We added a couple of extra collection dates to help out.

At the end of the year we collected 1,280 pounds of food.

We have set the bar high for next season. That is going to be a tough number to beat.

HOPE's greatest need is volunteers to help at the food bank on Druid Road here in Clearwater. The director of program services is an On Top of the World resident.

There is an old cliché, help your neighbors.

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
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Neighbors chip in to help with renovation



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Try cooking up something with a Greek influence this weekend



Greek cuisine has been recorded in images and texts that date back to ancient times.

Influences from Greek cuisine spread to ancient Rome and then throughout Europe and beyond.

Ancient Greek cuisine is characterized by its frugality and was founded on the Mediterranean triad. It is known for wheat, olive oil and wine. Meat is rarely eaten. Fish is more common.

This trend in the Greek diet continued in Cyprus and changed only fairly recently when meat became more available.

Wine and olive oil have always been a central part of Greek cuisine, and the spread of grapes and olive trees in the Mediterranean add further to the influence.

Today, Greek cuisine uses vegetables, fish, pork, poultry, veal, beef, lamb, rabbit, goat and seafood. Other important ingredients include pasta, cheeses, herbs, lemon juice and olives.

Bread made of wheat is everywhere. Other grains, notably barley, are also used, especially for paximathia.

Common dessert ingredients include nuts, honey, fruit, sesame seeds and filo pastries.

Greek cuisine uses some flavorings more often than others, such as oregano, mint, garlic, onion, dill, cumin and bay leaves. Other common herbs and spices include basil, thyme and fennel seed.

Parsley is also used as a garnish on some dishes.

Many Greek recipes, especially in the northern parts of the country, use "sweet" spices in combination with meat. For example: cinnamon, allspice and cloves.

The climate and terrain favors the breeding of goats and sheep over cattle, and so beef dishes are uncommon.

Fish dishes are common in coastal regions and on the islands.

A great variety of cheese types are used in Greek cuisine, including Feta, Kasseri, Kefalotyri and Graviera.

Dining out is common in Greece. The tavern (café) and estiatorio restaurant are widespread, serving home cooking at affordable prices to both locals and tourists.

Common street foods include souvlaki, gyros, various pitas and roasted corn.



Strawberry Cake

Ingredients

Nonstick cooking spray
2 eggs
1 cup 1 tablespoon sugar
1/2 cup reduced-fat Greek yogurt
1/4 cup melted butter, cooled slightly
1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/4 teaspoon kosher salt
1 pound strawberries, hulled, sliced
Honey whipped cream

Directions

- Preheat the oven to 375 degrees. Spray a 9-inch springform pan with nonstick cooking spray; line the bottom with parchment paper
- Combine the eggs and 1 cup of sugar in a medium bowl and beat on high speed with a handheld mixer until thick, pale and doubled in size, about 4 minutes. Add the yogurt, melted butter and vanilla until a toothpick inserts clean then beat for another minute. Add the flour, baking powder, and salt; mix until combined, 30 seconds. Pour half of
- Bake until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.
- To make honey whipped cream, beat 1 cup heavy cream until soft peaks, then beat in honey to taste (about 2 tablespoons).

the batter into the prepared pan and spread evenly to the edges. Sprinkle the sliced berries on top. Pour the remaining batter over the berries; spread evenly once again. Top decoratively with the strawberry halves and sprinkle with the remaining 1 tablespoon sugar.

Pork Souvlaki with Honeyed Apricots

Ingredients

2 shallots minced
2 cloves garlic, minced
2 tablespoons chopped fresh oregano
1 jalapeno pepper, seeded and minced
juice of 1 lemon
1/2 cup extra-virgin olive oil
2 pounds pork tenderloin, trimmed and cut into 1 1/2 to 2 inch chunks

Apricot Ingredients

Juice of 3 limes
3/4 cup dry white wine
1/4 cup honey
1 shallot, minced
12 plump dried apricots
1 tablespoon chopped fresh mint
1 tablespoon pine nuts, toasted
Greek yogurt, for serving

Directions

- Prepare the souvlaki: Combine the shallot, garlic, oregano, jalapeno, lemon juice and olive oil in a large resealable plastic bag. Add the pork, turn to coat, and refrigerate overnight.
- Soak 12 to 16 wooden skewers in water for at least 20 to 30 minutes. Meanwhile, make the honeyed apricots: Bring the lime juice, wine, honey and shallots to a simmer in

a small saucepan over medium heat. Add the apricots and cook until the mixture is syrupy, about 12 minutes.

Preheat a grill or grill pan to medium. Remove the pork from the marinade and thread 2 pieces on to each skewer. Grill until cooked through, 3 to 5 minutes per side.

Fold the mint and pine nuts into the apricot mixture. Serve the souvlaki with a drop of yogurt and apricot mixture.

Lamb Shanks

Ingredients

1 gallon water
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup salt
4 lamb shanks
Salt and freshly ground black pepper
Granulated garlic to taste
2 ounces virgin olive oil
1 96 oz can crushed tomatoes
2 carrots, chopped
3 celery stalks, chopped
1 large yellow onion, chopped
1 bulb fresh fennel, chopped
1 cup red wine 1 cup orange juice
1/2 cup freshly chopped Italian parsley

Directions

- Brine: place the water, sugar, and salt into a large container. Add the lamb shanks and soak for 24 hours.
- Preheat oven to 350 degrees
- Remove the shanks from the brine and pat dry. Season with salt, pepper, and garlic to taste.
- Coat shanks with flour and sauté in 2 to 3 ounces of olive oil in a medium sauté pan over medium-high heat until golden brown, about 5 minutes each side.
- Place the shanks in a roasting pan with the crushed tomatoes.
- In same sauté pan that the shanks were seared in, sauté the carrots, celery stalks, onion, fresh fennel and garlic until tender, about 5 minutes over medium-high heat. Remove from the heat and add to the roasting pan.
- Deglaze sauté pan with 1 cup red wine and orange juice. Reduce by half and add to

roasting pan.

Add 1/2 cup fresh Italian parsley and fresh oregano to roasting pan. Cover and roast in the oven for 2 hours or until tender. After 1 hour turn shanks and cover for remaining time, making sure shanks are covered in the gravy.

Garnish with fresh oregano sprigs and parsley.

Ways to replace expensive eggs



We are all dealing with the high price of eggs these days. Prices are due mostly to fears of bird flu. As a result, many farmers have had to slaughter their entire flocks, resulting in egg prices sky-rocketing to record levels.

The high prices will persist for a while. It can take six months to a year to raise a productive laying hen.

This column offers ideas for replacing eggs in baked dishes and creative ideas for a twist on the "egg" sandwich. Let's rise to the challenge like creative chefs.

Substitutes for Egg Sandwiches

Fage Plain 5 percent

Greek yogurt is naturally high in protein. A 3/4 cup of the Fage brand contains 15 grams of protein. But the full-fat variety (5 percent) delivers something skim versions can't provide - the satisfying creaminess you love from eggs. Serve as a side with strawberries for breakfast. You'll love it on a warm spring morning.

Sabra Classic Hummus

Now, this is a clever idea for my creative chefs. A half cup has 8 grams of protein, which isn't to be dismissed. But when you spread it on a whole-grain wrap with a ton of vegetables - red peppers, spring mix, cucumbers, carrots, pickled red onions - you have a sandwich that carries all the creaminess of egg salad.

Canned Garbanzo Beans

Chickpeas have 12 grams of protein per cup. Drain them, but save that liquid. Mash the chickpeas and spread on toast. Season with a drizzle of olive oil for an easy breakfast.

When you buy them in the can, save the liquid, which can be used as an egg replacer in baking recipes. Oh yeah! Three tablespoons equals one egg.

Just Egg Folded, Plant-Based Egg

These are four square sheets that cook up in a toaster oven, air fryer, or hot pan.

Slide a serving onto a breakfast sandwich and you've just added six grams of protein. They're made from mung beans, with spices added. You can buy them for \$9 at Wal-Mart.

Eggs Substitutes for Baked Products

Eggs are used in baked products for a variety of reasons: To cause a bread to rise (leaven), to moisten muffins or to thicken pancakes. Here are substitutes you can use in lieu of eggs. The finished product won't be exactly the same as real eggs. The texture may be a bit different, but overall, you should expect the flavor to remain intact.

For baking recipes that use eggs as a binder or for moisture in a cake, a substitute like applesauce can do the trick.

One quarter cup of unsweetened plain applesauce equals one egg.

Or use 1/4 cup of mashed banana to equal one egg. This will not add flavor, but it will add sweetness and moisture.

If the eggs act as a leavener, try 1 tablespoon of apple cider vinegar plus 1 teaspoon of baking soda. This equals one egg.

Using yogurt in place of eggs is ideal for baked goods where there's another leavening agent at work. It'll help with binding and moisture in denser baked goods like quick breads. One quarter cup of yogurt equals one egg.

Chia Seed Honey Oat Bread

Whole Flax Seeds / Chia Seeds

Vegans know all about "flax egg." But for all of you who are unfamiliar, you can turn these seeds into a binder for baking in the same way you'd use an actual egg. Two tablespoons of flax have three grams of protein, so try your flax egg in pancakes topped with peanut butter for even more protein.

To Make A Flax Egg

Step 1: Place one cup of whole flaxseed into a small high-speed food processor or a very clean coffee grinder.

Step 2: Grind flaxseed on high until it turns into fine flaxseed meal, which is typically about 30-40 seconds depending on the food processor.

Chia Seeds can also be used for cakes or breads. They add nutrition and function as thickening or leavening. This bread recipe is a slightly dense bread with a light nutty flavor. The bread is good for a sandwich or toast.

Chia Seed Honey Oat Bread Ingredients

- 1 1/2 cups old-fashioned rolled oats
- 1 1/4 cup warm water (about 110°F)
- 1/4 cup chia seeds
- 2 tablespoons honey
- 1 tablespoon active dry yeast
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

Instructions

1. Combine oats and warm water. Cover with damp towel and soak for about 30 minutes.
2. In small bowl, hand-stir chia seeds, honey, yeast, and 1/2 cup warm water. Let sit for 5-10 minutes until it becomes frothy. This indicates yeast is active.
3. With dough hook, thoroughly mix chia seed mix, baking powder, cinnamon, oil and salt into oats. Then, gradually add in flour and mix until a soft dough forms.
4. Knead dough on floured surface for about 5-7 minutes until smooth and elastic.
5. Place the dough in a greased bowl in a warm place, covered with damp cloth. Let it rise for about one hour or until doubled in size.
6. Preheat your oven to 375 degrees farenheit (190°C). Once the dough has risen, shape it into a loaf and place in a greased 9x5-inch loaf pan. Let it rise again for about 30 minutes.
7. Bake for 30-35 minutes. Cool in the pan for 10 minutes before transferring to a wire rack. Butter top of loaf.





My first question for Charlie was why snow skiing?

He replied, "Growing up in Arlington, Va., on the outskirts of Washington, DC, downhill skiing was not a very popular sport in my neighborhood. My late brother, John, went to southern Pennsylvania a few times and told me it was fun. So, I went to the public library and checked out a book by World and Olympic Champion Jean-Claude Killy. He stated, "I've skied twice this winter.

It's what neighbors do.


It's what On Top of the World is all about.

A recent core party was held with 19 residents enjoying food and dessert. We enjoyed talking with our neighbors and everybody is happy that the Florida winter has left us.


Long time resident, Ed Ule, has moved on. Ed was a veteran and a very friendly man who enjoyed talking to his neighbors.




