

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Very important all residents vote for the budget prior to Annual Meeting on June 6

Please note, the June 6 Annual Meeting has been scheduled a littler earlier than usual.

The Board received an update on both the Threshold Phase I inspections and the limited number of Phase II inquiries. They also heard from the Community Manager on the progress of the Structural Integrity Reserve Study (SIRS)

The goal of the Threshold inspections is to determine if there are any structural deficiencies among our condominium buildings that need to be investigated further (Phase II). Bottom line is that very few buildings will require a Phase II inspection. As to the SIRS study, that looks at the useful life of stipulated components and then establishes a dollar amount for reserves. This requirement must be completed within the fiscal 2024-25 budget cycle.

The most important matter before On Top of the World Condo Association is that unless you vote to waive reserves this fiscal year, \$70.11 will be added to your monthly community service fee beginning July 1.

It's your choice.

You will need to vote in this important matter.

If you did not receive the very important budget mailing, please reach out to the Community Service Office before June 4. I mention this because the United States Postal Service is racking up a very bad record for delivering the mail. We don't know why, but we do know that people who live here full time have previously not received their budget packages.

Fortunately, the budget package is

What happens if the Board fails to adopt a budget?

I will caution you that if the Board were to reject this budget in its entirety, that action would put the Association in default of its obligations to Summit Broadband.

Two things would likely then happen: (1) the Association would then be sued by Summit Broadband for a breach of the contract, thus likely costing the Association thousands of dollars in litigation expense, and (2) the likely termination of services by Summit.

The only alternative in that event would be Spectrum a la carte service and their very high video and internet fees, as well as their problematic service.

Insurance

At the May 22, 2024, Board Meeting, the topic of Property and Casualty Insurance (P&C) was discussed.

A representative from Marsh, LLC., gave an update on the state of the global and national insurance market. The timing of the budget adoption and the start of hurricane season has always created a wrinkle in when property insurance must be bound by the Association. Once the "magic" date of June 1 passes, all bets are off as to (1) the availability of market capacity and (2) the pricing of said capacity.

Remember, insurance carriers are risk adverse. So while May 30 is just a date, having insurance in place before that date is an absolute must.

To that end, the Management Company asked the Board to adopt a resolution authorizing the chairman or the

vice chairman to sign an insurance contract binding coverage before May 30 based on the good faith estimate of the insurance broker, Marsh, LLC.

Should the Board fail to adopt reasonable coverage, some very real horrible things start to happen. Notably, almost all real estate transactions would cease. No lender will allow a purchase transaction to proceed without first having a current Statement of Coverage from the Association.

This would create very avoidable trouble for current and future residents.

Additionally, residents who have mortgages will have trouble with their current lenders, which require Master Property and Casualty Insurance. They may find themselves in a technical default by the lender.

Long story short, this Association (or any association) should never let itself fall into this horrible trap.

PREPARE TODAY FOR A HURRICANE

Don't wait for a bad storm to be hours away.

Don't think, "It will never hit here."

Your Pre-Storm Checklist

- 1. Map out an evacuation route and choose a final, fortified destination well-inland. Tell family and friends where you intend to be during a storm. You should have one post-disaster contact one person who is out of the danger zone, who you can contact and who will share your information with other loved ones. You may be short on power so consider limiting your contacts to one person.
- 2. If you stay behind, keep the following in stock: 1 week supply of bottled water and non-perishable foods, refill prescriptions, bottle opener, flashlight and battery operated radio. Do you know where these items are stored? Don't go searching for them as a storm is closing in. Keep tape and cardboard handy should a leak develop.
- 3. Create an inventory of your home. Use photos and videos in case some day you need to replace your items or determine the value of items lost. Special items should be stored away from your home in a safe place. Store important documents in sealable, water proof containers.
- 4. Bring in porch items and anything outside that could become a projectile.
- 5. Fill vehicle with gas. Don't wait until the mad rush starts.
- 6. Don't assume a storm is over. Stay indoors. Please use a flashlight and not candles. Keep refrigerator closed as much as possible.
- 7. Get cash. Money machines could be out for weeks.
- 8. Review your insurance policy once a year to make sure you are covered for a major storm. If you need to file a claim, do so immediately after a storm. Make a list of damaged items. Keep receipts. Be patient.
- 9. The OTOW activity centers are not storm shelters. They will not be open during a storm. If you live on an upper floor or may need assistance after a storm, plan ahead. There are nearby evacuation shelters.

10. OTOW will provide weather updates if possible using RAVE, OTOW-TV 901 and the Box Office (otowboxoffice.com).

WHEN A STORM HAS PASSED

- A. If you evacuated, do not return home until authorities give you the OK.
- B. Do not go outside. Do not begin cleanup on your own. Let OTOW management personnel remove limbs, wires and all damage.
- C. Do not drive into a flooded road. Turn around don't drown.
- C. Traffic lights may be out. Stop at all intersections where a traffic light is not working. Treat each intersection as a four-way stop.
- D. Do not use sink water until authorities give the OK. Do not eat spoiled food.
- E. Do not wear flipflops outside. Wear sturdy shoes.

Don't Feed Alligators

Your Management Company wants to remind residents to beware of the dangers of feeding alligators.

This seems like a no-brainer, but you'd be surprised.

Dogs of all sizes are a favorite alligator snack. According to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) Human Alligator Incidents Fact Sheet, "Alligators are opportunistic feeders and will eat animals that are readily available to them. They prefer to go after prey they can overpower easily."

Stay well back from the shoreline. If you think you can outrun one, you can't.

Opportunity is the primary factor that causes an alligator to pursue prey. Most alligators are naturally afraid of humans, but may lose that fear when people feed them. Feeding alligators teaches them to associate people with food.

"For that reason, it is illegal to feed wild alligators."

Alligators seldom bite people for reasons other than food. May and June are alligator mating season so female alligators may protect their nests by hissing and opening their mouths to frighten intruders.

Alligator bites are most likely to occur in or around water. Bites on humans have occurred in a variety of water bodies, many of which are small and not regularly used by alligators.

If you encounter an alligator that is believed to pose a threat to people, pets, or property, call the FWC's Nuisance Alligator Hotline, toll-free at 1-866-FWCGATOR (1-866-392-4286).

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission Statewide Nuisance Alligator Program (SNAP) uses contracted nuisance alligator trappers throughout the state to remove alligators 4 feet in length or greater that are believed to pose a threat.

State law prohibits killing, harassing, or possessing alligators except under permit.

Never remove an alligator from its natural habitat or accept one as a pet. It is illegal and dangerous to do so. Handling even small alligators can result in injury.

If an alligator bites you, the best thing to do is fight back, providing as much noise and resistance as possible. Hitting or kicking the alligator, or poking it in its eyes, may cause it to release its grip.

When alligators seize prey they cannot easily overpower, they will often let go and retreat.

Seek immediate medical attention if an alligator bites you as they often result in serious infection.

Maintenance and Service Requests

To ensure the most efficient processing of your maintenance or service request, please submit any requests online at: otowclearwaterinfo.com. Click the "Service-Department" tab followed by the "Request Form" tab.

If you are unable to access the online system, please call the Community Service Office (CSO) at 727-683-6981 and we will return your call as quickly as we can during normal business hours.

Submitting your request yourself is the only way to ensure that your request has been received. Please do not rely on neighbors or

friends to submit requests on your behalf.

Additionally, should you see something that needs to be repaired, please report it and don't assume that someone else has reported it. Once your request is received, a service order will be generated and forwarded to the appropriate department for resolution.

Please keep in mind that non-emergency service requests are typically addressed in the order they are received.

In some instances, we may need to contact you for additional information or clarification regarding your request. To ensure a smooth process, please provide accurate contact information and respond promptly to any inquiries. Submitting multiple requests for the same issue is unnecessary and may slow down our response time.

For any questions about your request, please call our Service Request Line at 727-683-6981 until the Community Service Office reopens.

If you are experiencing a lifethreatening emergency, dial 911 immediately.

In the event of a power outage, please contact Duke Energy directly at 800-228-8485

As a reminder, window and door repair or replacement is the responsibility of the condo owner, while the Association is responsible for maintaining the structure and common elements.

After Hours Emergency Information

The OTOW emergency after-hours phone number is 727-799-1115. Please call this number, after hours, in the event of an emergency, such as a water intrusion into your condo. For all other inquiries regarding general issues or questions that are not service-related, you will need to come in person to the Community Service Office.

OTOW Alerts

Signing up for OTOW-ALERTS (powered by RAVE) is incredibly easy. Simply go to www.otowclearwaterinfo.com and from the home page scroll down to the bottom of the page and the "Sign Up Now" box will be located to the left of the screen. Click to enroll. You can also sign up from the "Stay Informed" tab located at the top of the home page. This is without obligation or cost to you. Your email and cell phone numbers are secure, never shared, and never solicited.

Alternatively, you may visit the Community Service Office to apply. OTOW-ALERTS provides advance warning of severe weather events as well as other matters of critical concern to the residents of OTOW Clearwater Condominium Community. It is not hyperbole to say an advanced warning may save lives!

As a reminder, when signing up for

community and emergency alerts, be sure to enter your building number.

Community Service Office Information

The Community Service Office (CSO) hours of operation are Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. The office closes for lunch from noon to 12:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, unless otherwise posted. If your call goes to voice mail, it is because the staff is working with someone else. Please be patient.

Calls and voicemails will be responded to during normal business hours. Once the requested service matter is identified, a service order will be generated and submitted to the appropriate department to address the matter. The goal of the CSO is to make an initial assessment of the request and to determine if it is an emergency or non-emergency. Once the matter is assessed, a plan to resolve will be made and work scheduled.

Generally, all non-emergency service requests are assessed and addressed in the order in which they are received.

From time to time, it may become necessary for us to contact you with questions or clarification of your request. It is not necessary to report service requests more than once.

If you have any questions regarding your request, and until the Community Service Office reopens, please call the Service Request Line at 727-683-6981.

What to do when

Did you know that if you find yourself in a situation where you feel threatened you should contact 911 or if the situation is not an emergency, you can contact the Pinellas County Sheriff's Office non-emergency number at 727-582-6200.

When speaking with the responding deputy, be prepared to provide them with specific details of statements made and make them aware that you fear for your personal safety. If you are dissatisfied with how the deputy handles your concerns, you can contact the non-emergency number provided above and request to speak with a supervisor for further clarification. They can do their due diligence and find out why the call was handled in a particular manner.

Remember, there are factors that go into deciding to arrest someone. Each situation is unique and whether a threat is considered credible depends on various factors. A vague or ambiguous statement might not necessarily be considered a credible threat unless it can be backed by actions or other evidence to suggest that there is real intent to do harm.

Upcoming Projects Painting/Waterproofing

The painting contractor will continue working on the east side of property in June with the front façade of Buildings 48 and 5 being recoated next.

As always, please keep in mind that the painting contractor will be operating in close proximity to parking areas and front/rear porches which may require the temporary displacement of vehicles or personal property on porches/patios. Thank you for your cooperation in advance and keep in mind that inclement weather can affect start and completion dates.

Just a reminder for residents in Buildings 85 and 87 that the fire alarm and elevator recall improvements for those structures are anticipated to begin in late May/early June, pending approval from Pinellas County. This work includes State of Florida and local fire code requirements whenever elevator equipment is upgraded to the latest components.

Walkway coating improvement projects have concluded for the fiscal year and will resume again in the fall once Florida's rainy season draws to a close. As of this article, only five buildings remain on the schedule and at that point the entire property will have been completed. Immediately afterwards, the Management Company will transition into a maintenance phase for the property. We want to say thank you to the community for its support and patience while this work was underway!

Construction, Roofing and Large Scope projects

As this work update is reaching your hands, asphalt maintenance projects for the community's condominium buildings should be close to wrapping up.

This year's improvement work encompassed the sealcoating and restriping of 10 building parking areas which will increase the longevity of the asphalt and provide a renewed surface for parking.

We appreciate the community's cooperation in making these projects a success by relocating their vehicles and allowing ample time for the contractor to finish their work safely and unimpeded.

Double-yellow lines on World Parkway Boulevard, Netherlands Drive, and Americus Boulevard will also be refreshed with a thermoplastic application which will yield better visibility for the community's residents and visitors alike.

The spring tree removal and replant cycle that began in April should be close to

completion, too. Parkway's tree division also handles the grinding of the stumps where removals had to occur.

As in years past, many of the trees removed provided shade, habitat and scenic charm for the community for many decades. Pinellas County did not require the planting of saplings with this year's removals, however the Management Company has plans to install new trees nonetheless in its commitment to being green-conscientious and understanding that much of the property's beauty lies in its stately trees.

Rest assured that the new saplings being set to ground will do the same for generations of On Top of the World residents in the future.

Recurring Reminders for All Community Residents

The Management Company continues its efforts with enforcement of community standards by removing all unapproved items placed in building common areas. This includes, but is not limited to, plants (live or artificial), personal items, non-exterior-rated furniture, rusted chairs/tables or in disrepair, tchotchkes, etcetera, as these items are not permitted to occupy common spaces.

As has been referenced in the newspaper, on the community TV channel, and the bulletins posted in all building center core lobbies, these items will be removed and disposed of without further notice.

These ongoing efforts help keep the areas safe for first responders as well as maintain an aesthetically pleasing community for all to reside in. We ask that residents help keep the community's common areas in compliance by reporting violations of this nature to the Management Company. We appreciate the community's cooperation and support in reporting any violations of this nature so the Management Company can investigate and correct if necessary.

Inspection Services Division

The Inspection Services Team, in conjunction with the Parkway Construction Department, will continue prepping buildings scheduled for new paint coatings in the current improvement cycle. This has been an ongoing endeavor throughout the community over the last few years and encompasses the removal of all association unapproved plant hangar brackets, holiday lighting hooks that are affixed into the masonry block, hose reels, and other wall and ceiling penetrations.

In keeping with association rules, these items will be removed without notice. Resi-

dents are kindly asked to seek association approval before affixing anything to the common element in the future. Thank you for your cooperation.

Inspection Services representatives will also be reaching out to residents of buildings that are scheduled for new paint and waterproofing coatings during the current improvement cycle. The purpose of their contact will be to advise residents that the painting vendor will be color matching all external doors to the majority building color as is required by the condominium association rules. This color matching applies to first floor unit doors on the rear façade of the building while all front façade doors will be color matched to the majority wall color or repainted white as currently installed. This will usually require no action by the unit owner other than to allow access to the entire door surface for the coating to be applied.

If for some reason you are not at home when this work takes place, you may contact the Community Service Office and schedule a follow-up visit by the coating's vendor. We appreciate your cooperation in making this project a success across the community.

First floor unit owners will continue receiving notification from the Inspection Services Department as the Management Company works towards the removal of all unapproved decorative stones throughout the community. The stones are not only an unapproved item for use in landscaping, but have the propensity to damage association and personal property alike. The Management Company asks that if you receive a notification requiring action on your part, please remove the stone at the earliest convenience

The removal of plantings located above and around the potable water meters that service the individual units is also ongoing. The Management Company is asking that all residents comply and not replant the areas. Plants or other items found in these areas will be removed without notice and disposed of as they hinder the proper maintenance of these meters in the future.

Please keep in mind that the condominium association requires a modification request for any landscape alterations. Often, decorative rocks or landscaping is installed without the advance approval of the association, and the removal and disposal of these items becomes the responsibility of the violator. Please, always apply for approval before you install.

Inspection efforts continue to be fo-

cused on the tagging and removal of portable barbeque grills, including propane, charcoal, or electric, defined as violating life-safety and fire codes in any building common areas or kindled in proximity to the structure as they pose a fire risk to the building and residents. Only grills meeting the approved Clearwater Fire Department standard are permitted on the patios of first floor units. If you're a first-floor unit owner and not sure if your grill is in compliance, please stop by the Community Service Office to request a visit from our friendly Inspections Services staff. We're always happy to educate or assist the community as possible.

You've received a notification from Inspection Services, now what?

Inspections Services handles those matters that pertain to modification requests to the common elements and individual units as well as performing inspections of common areas within each building including, but not limited to, common areas, storage rooms, walkways, balconies, patios, laundry, and trash rooms. Long story short, they work to ensure that community standards are kept in compliance with the On Top of the World Condominium Association, Inc. Third Amended and Restated Rules.

Should you receive notification from them, it is important that you act quickly to make any repairs or remove any items by the date requested. Failing to do so could result in damage to common elements, Association owned property, your unit, or a neighboring unit. Most often, the request may come to you due to a safety concern, such as uneven pavers.

However, should you have questions or are unsure what to do next, you can visit the Community Service Office and ask to speak to a representative from that department. They are the best sources of information in helping you understand what your notification means and what you need to do next.

Running short on time and can't stop in, you can contact the Customer Service Line at 727-683-6981 and leave a detailed message along with your contact information. Speaking with a representative will help you get the most up-to-date and accurate information as possible and according to your specific situation.



Taking the oath of office are, left to right, Donna Gagnon, Thomas Butcher and Joanne Cordes.





What you need to know in time for Flag Day on June 14



By Tony Santarsieri

June 14 is a special day for America. It's Flag Day and our flag represents our freedom and democracy.

On June 14, 1777, our American flag was adopted by resolution of the Second Continental Congress.

Old Glory, Stars and Stripes, Star Spangled Banner or Colors, refer to the same flag we pledge allegiance to or lower in times of

Congress adopted the United States flag code about the proper way to display the American flag and or place it at half staff/ mast. The word staff is used when flown on land, mast when on a ship. Your local American Legion or Veterans of Foreign War (VFW) have more information on this topic.

Did you know you can send out to the observant eye, three different messages using the American flag?

When flying high and proud - all is well, Half staff represents sorrow.

Upside down is a distress signal.

I know this because while I was in the Navy, I was responsible for sending and receiving visual signals to other ships via Morse code, semaphore or raising flags. Each flag represented a letter of the alphabet to be decoded. We'd raise those flags. Execution of the code was when we quickly brought them down. If the code was for all ships to turn left, all would turn left at the same time.

When placing the flag at half staff it is lowered all the way down, briskly raised to the top and then lowered slowly because you are now honoring the person you are lowering it for.

Three questions come to mind about this topic: when did the tradition of lowering a flag start, where on the pole is half staff and how large should the flag be?

In researching the origins, the tradition of flying the flag at half-mast began in the

the flag is lowered to make room for an invisible flag. When a British ship lost its captain, the crew lowered their flag in his honor. They lowered it just enough to show there was an invisible flag above it.

The size of the flag - according to some businesses that make flags and install the staff, recommend that the flag's longest

17th century. According to some sources, length be 1/4 of the staff's height. With a out flag, bring it to the American Legion or staff that is 20 feet tall, flag size should be VFW for proper disposal. I'm told they are 5 feet wide.

 2. Reservations are REQUIRED please call 727-799-3417 Option 7 no later than
- 1:00 pm the day prior to your planned trip. Monday's trip deadline is 1:00 pm Friday. Please be present in the core of your building at your scheduled pick up time.

 3. Shopping time is 1.0 hours for grocery stores and 2.0 hours for Countryside Mall. Those
- going to Sunset Point 19 Plaza will have approximately 90 minutes to shop. Shopping time begins when you are dropped off at the destination.

 4. Although appreciated, the driver is prohibited from accepting gifts or tips.
- The driver may not assist you with entering or exiting the bus or with your packages.Please do not ask him to do so.
- 6. The start time listed is when the shuttle bus departs the Community Service Office. The pick-up schedule will rotate weekly between low and high buildings, meaning one week pick-up will start with the lower-numbered buildings, the following week it will start with the higher-numbered buildings.
- 7. Seats are not assigned. They are first come first served.
- 8. Seat belts must be fastened during bus movement and must remain fastened until the bus comes to a complete stop.
- Eating, drinking, smoking, vaping, fighting, distracting the driver, or any other
 unacceptable actions at the discretion of the driver are strictly prohibited on the bus.
 Violation of the above may result in your bus privileges being revoked.

Jerry Colen and Rachel Wagoner stop by to teach us about trusts and wills

Attorney Rachel Wagoner says everyone 18 and older should have a will. However, trusts are not for everyone.

So how do you know if you need a trust? What is the risk if you do not have a will?

Well, if you were in the East Activity Center Auditorium on April 25, you would have heard Rachel and Attorney Jerry Colen talk about wills and trusts. Both are columnists in this newspaper and the lecture was free.

"You should always have a last will and testament," Rachel said.

A will specifically dictates who receives your benefits and lists all the assets in your possession. When you pass on, you need this document to make sure your assets go exactly where you want them to go.

attorney if you are considering a living

trust. They are not for everyone, but tate or deeds. your attorney will help you decide.

A living trust can avoid state probate if you are unable to speak or act on your own behalf. You can pick the person in charge of your trust. You select your beneficiaries. A trust can protect you from creditors.

Most important, a trust can provide Jerry said you need to talk to your easy access to your benefits, which could include money in a bank, real es-

Jerry and Rachel emphasized everyone has different needs. Attending this lecture or reading this article doesn't accomplish anything. You really need to see an attorney to find out what's right

If someone passes away in your condo, there is no rule you have to sell

I need your help.

I am asking you to spread the word about "Over-55" communities and how ownership of dwellings (units or apartments) in over-55 communities, such as On Top of the World, are affected by that law.

I will primarily use the word "dwelling' from now on in this column. This is for both OTOW in Clearwater and OTOW in Ocala.

A few months ago, a client read me a portion of a Facebook post dealing with ownership of dwellings in OTOW, which, as everyone knows, is an over-55 community (i.e. senior community).

It seems that someone posted something on a Facebook page, devoted to OTOW, that said when an owner at OTOW passes on, if the survivor, or someone who inherits, is under 55, he/she has two years in which to sell the dwelling.

Please do not believe everything you see or read on a Facebook page! Golly!


First and foremost, the over-55 rule stems from a 1995 Federal law named the Housing For Older Persons Act.

It is not a rule created by or for OTOW. It is a federal law to make housing available for, well, for "older persons."

This applies to OTOW because it is a senior community, but it's not only an On Top of the World rule. It applies to senior communities, such as HOAs, condominiums, and co-ops throughout the entire United States.

It's a federal law, folks.

1. In an over-55 community, federal law states that in order to maintain the senior



community status, at least 80 percent of the dwellings in that community must be occupied by at least one person who is 55 years of age or older. Notice that the word is "occupied," not owned.

2. If a dwelling were occupied by a husband and wife and one was 55 or older and the other was younger than 55, there is no occupancy issue and no ownership issue, and both can reside in and occupy the dwelling.

3. Again, the issue in an over-55 community has to do with who occupies a dwelling, not who owns it. Anyone, regardless of age can own at OTOW. Whether he/she can occupy it depends on (a) if the person is 55 or older, or (b) if the person is a surviving spouse, or (c) if the person inherited the dwelling from someone who previously occupied it, or owned it, or owned and occupied it.

surviving spouse (even though he or she is younger than 55) can continue to live in the dwelling and occupy the dwelling for so long as he/she wants. Or it can be sold. Or it can be leased. Or it can be bequeathed by will or trust to whomever the surviving person

There is no time limit on how long the under-55 person has before he or she must sell the unit. He or she never has to sell it.

By golly! From where do such rumors

5. If a person owns a dwelling or owns and occupies it, he/she can bequeath it to anyone. The person to whom the dwelling was bequeathed can move in and can own it or occupy it regardless of his or her age, assuming that person is not a minor.

Example: A 65-year-old woman is married to a 45-year-old man and they both own and occupy a dwelling at OTOW. If the 65-year-old passes on, the survivor can stay right there in the dwelling. He can keep it. He can sell it. He can lease it. He can leave it in his will to whomever he chooses. There is no requirement to sell it.

There is nothing difficult about that.

6. OTOW is rigid in making sure the 80/20 percent rule is maintained. So, how do they do that and still permit someone under 55 to inherit and also occupy a dwelling?

At OTOW, they basically reserve that 20 percent for folks who inherit directly from an owner and, of course, for surviving spouses who might be under age 55.

Example: Someone who is 50 years of

4. If the person 55 or older dies, the age, who seeks to buy a unit at OTOW, will be refused the right to occupy, until reaching 55. However, if that same person inherited from the owner, he/she can indeed occupy the dwelling.

> Ownership is not the issue, because federal law requires occupancy to maintain the over-55 status.

8. Summary: OTOW is an over-55 community, as prescribed by federal law. There is no requirement at OTOW that a dwelling must be sold within two years of the passing of someone over or under 55.

White lines in front of traffic lights are not decorations - they have a purpose

Ever wonder what the solid white line at an intersection means?

Known as a limit line, it is a wide white line that shows drivers where to stop before an intersection or crosswalk.


If there is no limit line, stop before entering the crosswalk. If there is no crosswalk, stop before entering the intersection.

Most important, many intersections have camera sensors that tell a traffic light when cars are waiting in line. If you do not drive up to the white line, there is a chance the camera will not tell the traffic light you are waiting.

Want to get everyone mad behind you? Don't drive up to the limit line. The light might not change and horns will start honking.

The first car to the intersection must hit the limit line to facilitate communication with the traffic lights.

Please be sure to hit the mark if you are the first car so that you and those behind you can proceed on your journey in a timely manner.



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

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Activity & Access Card Renewals

On Top of the World Clearwater residents may renew their Activity and Access Cards for the 2024-2025 fiscal year beginning Monday, June 3. The Community Service Office (CSO) is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. (closed from noon to 12:30 p.m. for lunch). The CSO will also be open Saturday, June 22 from 8 a.m. to noon for anyone who cannot visit during regular business hours.

ACTIVITY CARDS

You must bring a valid, government-issued photo ID, a recent piece of mail showing your name and OTOW address, and your most recently issued Activity Card. There is no fee for renewals, however, if your Activity Card has expired (all fiscal years have been punched at the bottom), a new Activity Card is required and the fee is \$3. If you have never received an Activity Card, the fee is \$3. If you have lost, damaged, or misplaced an issued Activity Card, the fee is \$25 for a replacement.

Baby Boomers get out and bowl at nearby Maple Lanes in Clearwater at 10 a.m. on Mondays.


We get there by 9:50 and gather as a group near the front desk to check in and pay so we can get the right amount of lanes with no confusion.



On June 11, the High Vibe Tribe will introduce a pair of talented young men who have created a company focused on a genre of music called Echo-chill.



As one way of sharing information, the club holds a question & answer session for members on the last Saturday of every month. Anyone can ask any question and other club members do their best to answer those questions.

The session might be called "everything you always wanted to know about technology, but were afraid to ask." These are some of the questions members asked during a recent Q&A session:

Q: What free antivirus program can I get for my computer?

Answer: Windows 10 and Windows 11 have an antivirus program built in. Typical users don't need another one.

"The Windows anti-virus program is a robust app," said Computer Club President Lisa Pompeo. "I've used it for years without any problems."

Q: What is an mp3 file? What do I do with it? How do I open it?

Answer: mp3 files are music or other audio files. They're useful because they're small in computer-byte size and can be copied from computers to other devices, such as cell phones or tablets. Windows opens them automatically when you double click on them. Tablets and phones also open them easily when you tap on them.

The club's Q&A sessions consist of more than club leaders answering questions. Members also share useful information.

A club member recently shared this experience: He said he ordered an item online. Later he received a text that said the shipping

company needed to update his address. The company would supposedly charge him 26 cents for the address change and they needed a credit card for that charge. Of course the member immediately recognized that this was a scam and did not give the scammer his credit card number.




We have seen amazing sand sculptures and real mermaids.



Eating healthy is one thing cooking healthy is another thing

The Plant-Based Living Club opened its May meeting with a presentation on pressure

We learned about manual and automatic pressure cookers. Special note was made of safe usage and safety features. The advantages of using a pressure cooker was pointed

Pressure cookers can cook in about half the time cooking in a pot would take. This saves some energy cost with less cooking time. It also reduces how much heat is generated into an apartment that the air conditioner must then run to remove.

Cooking something like beans can take an hour or more, but a pressure cooker can do it in half that time.

Manual cookers must be watched and adjusted to maintain steam. The automated cookers keep the heat stable by doing the needed heat adjustments. The cook only has to set it up and let it run itself.

Special note: Cookers can only do half the stated capacity. For example, a 3 quart pressure cooker can only do about 1 ½ quarts of food. The rest of the space is for





cost. These clinics have been valuable for skills necessary to play the game and are essential to learning and improving.







If you want to learn more about tapas, you go right to the source - Spain



My wife, Cheryl, and I took a trans Atlantic cruise from Tampa to Barcelona, Spain

I know I wrote about tapas in September of 2023, but I had to do an update based on experience with tapas in Spain.

A little history about tapas.

The word "tapas" is derived from the Spanish verb tapar, "to cover," a cognate of the English "top."

Tapas is an appetizer or snack in Spanish cuisine. Tapas can be combined to make a full meal. It can be served cold (mixed olives and cheese) or hot (with chopitos,) which are battered, fried baby squid, or patatas bravas.

In some bars and restaurants in Spain and across the globe, tapas have evolved into a very sophisticated cuisine. In some Central American countries, such snacks are called

The original tapas were thin slices of bread, or meat, which sherry drinkers in Andalusian taverns used to cover their glasses between sips. This was a practical measure meant to prevent fruit flies from hovering over the sweet sherry.

The meat used to cover the sherry was normally ham or chorizo, which are both very salty and activate thirst. Because of this, bartenders and restaurant owners created a variety of snacks to serve with sherry, thus increasing their alcohol sales.

The tapas eventually became as important as the sherry.

In pre-19th century, Spain tapas were served by posadas, albergues or bodegas, offering meals and rooms for travellers. Since few innkeepers could write and few travelers could read, inns offered their guests a sample of the dishes available, or "tapa" (the word for pot cover in Spanish).

Tapas have evolved through Spanish history by incorporating new ingredients and influences.

Most of the Iberian peninsula was invaded by the Romans, who introduced more extensive cultivation of the olive and irrigation methods following their invasion of Spanish 212 BC.

brought the introduction of tomatoes, sweet and chili peppers, maze (corn), and potatoes, which were readily accepted and easily grown in Spain's microclimates.

It has also been claimed that tapas originated in the south of Spain during the time of the Spanish Inquisition as a means of publicly identifying Jews who had converted to Christianity. Since tapas often consists of part ham or other non-kosher foods, offer-The discovery of the New World ing tapas dishes could determine who aban-

doned their Jewish faith. Thus, tapas was a tool of the Spanish Inquisition.

cover or lid, in Spain it has also become a term for this style of food. The origin of this new meaning is uncertain but there are

1. The tapas tradition may have begun when King Alfonso X of Castile (1221-1284) recovered from an illness by drinking wine with small dishes between meals. After

regaining his health, the king ordered that taverns would not be allowed to serve wine Though the primary meaning of tapa is to customers unless it was accompanied by a small snack or tapas.

2. Another popular and more modern explanation says King Alfonso stopped by a famous tavern in Cadiz (an Andalusian city) where he ordered a glass of wine. The waiter covered the glass with a slice of cured ham before offering it to the king, in order to protect the wine from flies.

Anchovies Marinated in Vinegar

Ingredients

10 ounces can anchovies in olive oil

1 cup white wine vinegar

2 cloves garlic chopped

1/2 cup extra-virgin olive oil Kosher salt to taste

2 sprigs fresh parsley

Directions

- 1. Lay anchovies flat, covering bottom of a glass dish.
- 2. Cover in oil and vinegar until all anchovies are submerged.
- 3. Finley chop garlic and sprinkle over anchovies, then pour olive oil on them.
- 4. Seal tightly with plastic and place in refrigerator for 2 to 3 hours.
- 5. Season to taste with salt and top with fleshly cut parsley.

Serve with slices of rustic bread and Spanish olives.

Chick-Peas and Spinach Tapas

Ingredients

10 ounces fresh spinach or 1 10-ounce package frozen spinach

19 ounce can (2 cups) chick-peas, drained and rinsed

1 red bell pepper, finely diced

1 to 2 lemons juiced

1/4 to 1/3 cup olive oil Salt and fresh ground black pepper

1 tablespoon snipped fresh chives

Directions

- 1. Cook the fresh spinach in a saucepan with the water clinging to the leaves, stirring until wilted. Drain, squeeze dry and finely chop frozen spinach.
- 2. In a bowl, combine the spinach with the chick peas, pepper chives, lemon juice, oil and pepper. Serve as is or chilled with toasted bread or as a filling for pita pockets.

Shrimp and Chorizo

Ingredients

1 tablespoon, plus 1/4 cup of olive oil

1/2 cup dry sherry

1 pound chorizo, sliced on the diagonal into 1/2 inches slices

1 1/2 cups thinly sliced onion

1 tablespoon minced garlic

1 tablespoon Spanish paprika

2 teaspoons salt

1 1/2 pounds fresh shrimp

3 tablespoons lemon juice

2 tablespoons minced fresh parsley Crusty bread, for serving

Directions

In a large skillet, heat 1 tablespoon of the olive oil and sauté the sliced onion. Cook, stirring occasionally, until they are caramelized around the edges and softened somewhat - 4 to 6 minutes. Add garlic and cook stirring for 1 minute. Add 1/4 cup of the sherry and cook for 1 minute. Add the shrimp, paprika, 1 teaspoon of salt and 1/2 teaspoon black pepper. Cook, stirring occasionally, until pink and cooked through, about 4 to 5 minutes. Add the remaining 1/4 cup of sherry and 1/4 cup olive oil, lemon juice, parsley and remainder of the salt and pepper. Stir to combine and remove from the heat. Serve immediately on small plates with any accumulated cooking juices spooned over the top. Pass the bread at the table.

Orecchiette - an interesting, tiny little pasta

As the days get longer with the hint of summer, here is a pasta salad that is the perfect option to welcome the season with a burst of freshness.

It is low in fat and high in fiber, and is a good source of protein.

Orecchiette pasta and cannellini beans with brussel sprouts (not pictured).

This is a quickly-made dish to offer up a lovely dinner. It is light and refreshing. The flavor comes from the seasoned panko mix and the crispy onion. The nutrition comes from the beans and Brussel sprouts.

Orecchiette (pronounced oh-reck-ee-ET-tay) pasta is a fancy pasta that adds texture and impact to the dish. The act of tasting and savoring a pasta dish stimulates positive memories and emotions.

It is also a plus that this is an economical meal.

My dear chefs, if you prefer, substitute navy beans or pinto beans for cannellini beans. Likewise, you can substitute broccoli for Brussel sprouts. Penne or farfalle pasta can be substituted for orecchiette.

It is rare for this column to mention the brand name of a particular product. The reason Fresh Gourmet® Crispy Onions is recommended is because this product has fried onions that are truly crispy without being greasy. They add a lot to the texture and flavor of the dish in combination with the toasted panko bread crumbs.

The Nutritional Value

Orecchiette pasta is a very delicious and healthy pasta dish. With at least 15 grams of protein per serving, this salad helps you feel

full and energized for longer. Plus, this salad also boasts at least 8 grams of fiber and no more than 400 calories per serving which can help support weight loss if that is your goal.

The pasta is also very filling, so it is typically served as a main course.

Orecchiette is commonly used in pasta salads where it maintains its firmness well.

Orecchiette is a traditionally eggless pasta, making it vegan. Or, if you prefer, turn this dish into a one-pot meal by adding meat. It's a terrific way to use up and stretch any poultry or meat leftover from last night's dinner. Diced chicken is an excellent choice.

The Science

Since pasta is made of wheat flour and water, the dough has the ability to morph into various shapes. Combining the wrong sauce and pasta shape together will result in your dish getting soggy and mushy. The shape of the pasta is integral to its flavor.

When cooked, the shape of pasta will determine how it interacts with the sauce. If it's too small, the pasta will absorb too much of the sauce and become soggy. If it's too large, the pasta will not be able to absorb enough of the sauce and the dish will be dry.

For example, long, thin pasta shapes, such as spaghetti and linguine, are best suited to light, delicate sauces, such as tomato sauce

Different pasta shapes hold different thicknesses of sauce better than others. If the pasta is smooth, the sauce will slide off, so it's important to find a pasta that has some

texture to it.

Orecchiette is pasta the size and shape of tiny saucers and translates to "small ears." Its indented shape cups hold sauces and anything it is cooked with, making it ideal for combining with other ingredients.

As you cook pasta in a small amount of water, the starches slightly thicken. When the cooking water is used in making the sauce, its starchiness produces a wonderful creaminess. This is why a talented chef saves the cooking water from the pasta.

However, this dish is not suitable for leftovers due to loss of sauce. If you have half of the dish uneaten, try reworking the pasta into a soup or make a cold chicken

Orecchiette and Cannellini Beans with Brussel Sprouts

- 2 teaspoons vegetable oil
- ½ cup panko bread crumbs
- 2 teaspoons spicy brown mustard
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- Pinch cayenne pepper
- 8 ounces orecchiette
- 2 roasted chicken breasts, sliced thinly in small bites
- 10 Brussels sprouts
- 1 (15-ounce) can Cannellini bean, undrained
- 1 tablespoon cider vinegar
- ½ teaspoon pepper • 1/3 cup sour cream
- Fresh Gourmet® Crispy Onions

- 1. Mix panko, mustard, salt, garlic cloves and pepper. Place in skillet with oil and, under medium hot, cook, stirring continuously, until brown for about 5 minutes. Transfer to a small bowl to cool.
- 2. Cook pasta al dente using two quarts of water for cooking. Set aside and drain pasta, but save one cup of the cooking water. Return to pan (heat off) and cover to keep warm.
- 3. Trim Brussel sprouts and slice very thinly. Cook in a large covered skillet with 1 tablespoon of water and ½ teaspoon salt for about 4 minutes until sprouts are a bright green. Stir in beans and their liquid plus 1/4 cup of reserved pasta cooking water and vinegar with pepper.
- 4. Add Brussel sprouts and sour cream to pasta and stir. If needed adjust consistency using remaining reserved cooking water.
 - 5. Plate and sprinkle with panko mix. Garnish with Fresh Gourmet® Crispy Onions. Serves four.

As we were leaving, we saw an enormous heard of sea lions and listened to their distinctive bark as we passed.

Along with visiting the famous Iditarod

Sled Dog Race Mile Marker 0 in Seward, we toured the Alaska Sea Life Center which is a sister marine life research center to the Florida Aquarium in Tampa.

After crossing the Gulf of Alaska, we arrived in Sitka, one of our favorite ports! We toured the Raptor Center and Fortress of the Bear, two facilities dedicated to wild-life rehabilitation.

The skies around Sitka were filled with soaring bald eagles - truly an incredible sight.

So, after 3,547 nautical miles, upon returning to Seattle, we realized that this was not just a bucket list trip, it was the journey of a lifetime.

U.S. Events

June is the month with the longest daylight hours of the year in the Northern Hemisphere. The summer solstice marks the official start of astronomical summer and is the longest day of the year. Typically, most of the U.S. sees between 14 and 16 hours of daylight on this day. It occurs when one of Earth's poles is tilted toward the sun at its most extreme angle. The Summer Solstice in the U.S. in 1999 occurred on June 21. The day passed uneventfully in the U.S. without protest. Indeed, all of June seemed lulled into a summer stupor throughout the U.S.

Jonathan James was only 15 years old when he hacked into the systems of NASA and the United States Department of Defense in June 1999. Since he was a juvenile and was charged with two counts of "juvenile delinquency" placed under a six-month home arrest and asked to write apology letters to NASA and the Department of Defense. He was an American hacker (a gray hat ethical hacker) who was the first juvenile incarcerated for cybercrime in the United States. Between Aug. 23, 1999, and Oct. 27, 1999, James committed a series of additional intrusions into various systems and was facing additional federal law suits. He was a South Florida native, living in Pinecrest, Fla.

June 5 – French Open women's tennis: Steffi Graf of Germany wins her 22nd and final Grand Slam title by defeating Martina Hingis 4-6, 7-5, 6-2... This was an exciting, fierce battle in which Steffi won her sixth French singles crown. In total, Graf won 22 Grand Slam singles titles in her career which ended in 1999 ... attaining position among the top women players in the open era. She holds rank with a long continuous run as the world's No. 1 player, second only to Serena Williams. French Open men's tennis: Andre Agassi of the U.S. wins his first and only French Open men's title, beating Andrei Medvedev of Ukraine 1-6, 2-6, 6-4, 6-3, 6-4 in a nerve-wracking win.


With such short notice, it would have been fun just to have a few neighbors show up. To our surprise, 20 residents attended for two hours of food, fun and conversation.

After we ate, Will played a few songs for the group and he was amazing.


Will was actually on a Florida tour performing and promoting his latest album "Ying and Yang" after recently completing a tour in Germany and other European countries.

Every line horizontally and vertically will eventual have all numbers 0-9 without any number repeating. Start with a line with only one missing number and as you begin to fill in missing squares, the other lines will be easier to figure out.







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
