Insurance Update

Now that the Florida Legislature has completed its recent session, we begin to see just what kind of sausage got made! Some of the laws have an important affect on homeowner associations and seniors in particular.

With respect to purchasing insurance coverage as part of a pool, the legislature removed that 2007 provision from the law in the 2008 session. This year, they extended pooling by one year; pooling of interests offered some reasonable moderation into property insurance limits and costs. It allowed for a Wind Risk Study to be conducted by an association to determine an acceptable level of risk based on the probability of damage from a 250-year storm event. This brought the maximum probable loss down to a manageable number. The solution for On Top of the World was to take advantage of the provision allowing for a Wind Risk Study. This brought our probable loss down to around \$16 million dollars from a major storm event.

When your insured value is over \$300 million, coverage capacity in the market requires the Association to consider Citizen's Insurance. Florida's catastrophic loss fund continues in a terrible mess. Accordingly, your board is staying well away from Citizen's Insurance and more to traditional carriers.

The good news is that windstorm and casualty rates have stabilized somewhat over prior years. This may be in large part due to the economic pressure many carriers are feeling. This fiscal year, the board is purchasing coverage limits of \$25 million, a limit in excess of the level indicated by the 2008 Wind Risk Study.

A Wind Study will become an annual expense for the association and the board is negotiating to have the Study cost included as a part of the annual service provided by the association's insurance

The exclusion from coverage in named storms amounts to 5% of the building value, with an aggregate loss retention

To Protect and Serve

How many times have we driven past the Sheriff's station down the road on 200 (with the bronze statue of Canine Officer Brian Litz and his dog, Justice) and wondered, "What goes on in there

First, some background information. There are 15 Marion County district Sheriff's stations like the one on SR 200. Our station, however, is responsible for the largest population (43,000+), the most square miles (88-from York, Fla. to the Citrus County line), and handles 8-10% of all Marion County calls.

Keeping the peace are Capt. Jim Burton, Sgt. Grady Grimes and Det. Ed Mobley, second-generation law enforcement officers who work with more than 400 volunteers and a number of boots-on-theground deputies. Each of these officers, along with receptionist Glenda Houk, has more than 20 years' experience in law en-

forcement. So now, "What do they do in there?" The station gets between 40 and 50 walkins every day. The first person a visitor sees is Glenda Houk. With 20 years in the Sheriff's Department, she is knowledgeable enough to either resolve problems on the spot, or determine whether they should be referred to a deputy or senior officer.

Keeping track of crime patterns and service calls enables Capt. Burton and his team to anticipate potential trouble spots and nip 'em in the bud.

Along with resolving issues within their district jurisdiction, the team stays in contact with several On Top of the World senior staff, such as Lynette Vermillion, and Ken and Robert Colen.

With the Sheriff's emphasis on community service, they regularly patrol our community and suggest ways on how we can continue to live more securely.

Capt. Burton, Sgt. Grimes and Det. Mobley are dedicated to educating us on the do's and don'ts of staying safe. And while we here in On Top of the World

see little or no crime, it's important that we do keep a few things in mind. For example: don't send money to that guy in Nigeria, or the one who wants to send you \$10,000 if only you'll give him all your banking and personal information. How about paying that contractor upfront?

"Most important," says Capt. Burton, "if anything looks suspicious, no matter how trivial, call it in. Better safe than sorry." Towards that end, Capt. Burton or one of his team will occasionally address On Top of the World residents to offer tips on how to safely enjoy our lifestyle without concern for the "bogey" man. Is It Legal? Gerald Colen

Q. My mother remarried several years ago. Prior to her remarriage, she used money that she got when my father died

to buy an apartment. At the time she bought the apartment and in order to avoid probate at her death, she put the title in my and my sister's names but she has a life estate.

Now, she wants to give her husband a life estate in the property. The problem with that is that her husband is five years younger than she is and is in good condition while mom is not well.

My sister and I believe that our father wanted to make sure that mom was taken care of during her lifetime, but he also wanted to make sure that we inherit the bulk of what mom has because he was the sole breadwinner. Do you have any sug-

A. I think that many folks would sympathize with you and your sister's situation. The one thing I don't know, of course, is how your mother feels, since, after all, she is not asking me for advice only you are. It would seem to me that since your mother merely has a life estate, she couldn't do anything without the consent of you and your sister.

So, from a legal viewpoint, if you don't want your mother to give a life estate to her husband, then just don't sign any deed and you've prevented it.

From a practical point of view, I would sit down with your mother and her husband and openly discuss the situation to see if some compromise cannot be worked through.

Q. There are all kinds of "top 10" lists out there and I would like you to give us a "top 10" list of legal guidelines.

A. The Ten Commandments seem to provide us with substantial legal and, I might add, ethical, guidance.

Q. I just discovered that my husband of 30 years was married twice before we got married and he never got divorced from either one of them. What are my rights in the event that he dies before I

A. I assume you want to know what your rights are in the event you decide that you won't murder him. These are somewhat complex issues and I should really not try to answer them in this col-

I can tell you that if both of his previous "spouses" are deceased, then you are his lawfully married wife. If one or both of

reside. It'd be wise to see a domestic relations attorney right away.

'Take my advice...you won't let me use it anyhow!'

Q. What are the requirements for making a gift to my children? I know I can give them up to \$10,000 a year. What if I want to give them more than that?

A. The gift tax exclusion has not been \$10,000 in a few years. At present, the annual exclusion, which is the amount that can be "gifted" without having to file an IRS Form 709 (the gift tax return) is \$13,000 to any person. If a gift is made that is in excess of \$13,000 to one individual, it is necessary to file the gift tax

Gifts to qualified religious or charitable institutions are not subject to the gift tax requirements. Gift tax returns should be filed by April 15.







Golf Cart Awareness

Drivers, as you exit the main gate, you should not yield to golf carts or pedestrians. I know everyone wants to be courteous to their neighbor; however, please keep in mind that there are two lanes of traffic, and if you are in the right lane, the car exiting the community in the left lane may not be able to see the cart or pedestrian, and therefore, may not know

For the safety of all, please drive the

speed limit through the gate and continue without yielding.

Carts and pedestrians, please be very cautious when crossing any street and follow all traffic rules of the road by stopping at each stop sign, looking both ways, and making sure it is clear to cross.

Pool Safety

A new study by the Water Quality and Health Council found that nearly one in five adults admits to urinating in a swimming pool instead of using the toilet. It notes that health officials insist that swimming in and even swallowing urine-contaminated water isn't harmful to someone's health. (Let's be safe in On Top of the World; please get out of the pool and use the restroom.)

It goes on to state that swimmers need to be more concerned about swallowing pool or lake water because of the risk of internal parasites.

If you are sick, especially with diarrhea, you should stay away from the pool until you are symptom free.

Showering before you enter the pool will help rinse off any bacteria and get a clean body in the pool, which is best all around.

Infants and toddlers who are still in diapers must wear either a "swim diaper" or plastic pants with elastic around the waist and legs. Diapers are not permitted in the pool.

Power Outages

Thankfully, we are starting to receive afternoon showers and with these showers come the potential for power outages. I have mentioned this in my column before but I want to make sure that everyone is aware of the potential dilemma regarding power outages and irrigation clocks. Please keep in mind that when we have power outages it is a good idea to check your irrigation clock to make sure that it is still on the correct setting. Many times a power surge or outage may cause the clock to revert to its original settings. If the settings are not checked, you may be watering too much or not enough.

Mowing

With the rains we are beginning to see, the community is turning a beautiful green and we are seeing many colorful plants blooming. With this beauty comes the peak mowing season. You will hear the mowers coming by more often, and we appreciate your understanding and patience as we deal with the growing season and afternoon rains with earlier days and weekend work periodically.

Heat Exhaustion and Heat Stroke

During the summer, remember to take steps to guard against heat exhaustion and heat stroke. Think prevention and always drink plenty of non-alcoholic fluids before, during and after any activity in hot, sunny weather. If you feel overheated, go indoors or a cool shaded area. If you are a walker, jogger or gardener, it is best to avoid being outdoors at the hottest part of the day participating in these type activities.

To find out more information, on the web Google search "heat exhaustion" or "heat stroke." Heat stroke is an emergency that requires immediate recognition and prompt treatment.

And, don't forget your pets. Dogs do not tolerate high temperatures as well as humans. They depend upon rapid breathing to exchange warm air for cool air. When air temperature is close to body temperature, cooling by rapid breathing does not happen as expected per the Doctor Dog Web site.

In summer, it is especially important that you do not leave your dog in the car. The heat buildup is very rapid and intense and can be fatal for your animal.

Hurricane Preparedness

The 2009 Hurricane season officially began June 1 and runs through the end of November.

With forecasters saying there is a 70% chance of having nine to 14 named storms, now is the time to prepare.

We recommend having plenty of water and canned or prepackaged food on hand to supply several days, a portable radio with fresh batteries, candles, first-aid kit, prescriptions and a full tank of gas in vour car.

It is important to know evacuation routes and shelters. West Port High School is the nearest emergency shelter, and if you have pets, you need to make other arrangements for them, as some shelters do not allow pets.

Don't forget about things like oxygen, medicines and batteries for flashlights and radios. Have a traditional phone on hand in case of power outages and also keep emergency numbers and important documents handy.



What's Really **Behind That Tempting CD Rate?**

JUNE 19, 2009: The FDIC has received ny typically writes a separate check to the inquiries and complaints about certain companies advertising above-market interest rates for FDIC-insured Certificates of Deposit (CDs). Some of these ads display the FDIC logo or state "FDIC Insured." Many of these companies are not FDIC-insured banks. Rather, they are insurance or financial service companies that sell non-insured financial products. The small print in the ads may state that the company is not an FDIC-insured financial institution.

The advertised CDs generally offer above-market interest rates for only a short term, require a minimum amount, and insist that the customer visit a company office. The advertisement's goal is to attract consumers for the company's non-deposit products or services. If a customer asks to purchase the advertised CD, the company will direct the customer to a computer terminal in the company's office to purchase a CD from an FDIC-insured financial institution that accepts Internet deposits. The CD will be offered at a rate lower than advertised. The compa-

financial institution for the difference between the bank's rate and the advertised rate for the term of the CD. Both checks are mailed to the bank, and the bank then issues the CD for the increased amount, but at the bank's lower interest rate.

Things to consider:

- · Consumers should carefully consider whether non-insured products are appropriate for their personal financial situation.
- · Consumers should understand the terms of any CD they purchase.
- · Consumers can research deposit interest rates at Web sites, such as http:// www.bankrate.com.
- · Consumers can verify whether identified financial institutions are FDICinsured at http://www2.fdic.gov/idasp/ main_bankfind.asp.
- Consumers can find information about FDIC deposit insurance coverage at http://www.fdic.gov/deposit/deposits/ index.html.

limit of \$250,000, per storm event. On an un-named storm event, the loss exclusion is \$100,000, retained by the association. Once a loss limit is met, the insurance coverage takes effect. As a practical matter, a loss of \$250,000 would require an assessment to all owners.

This would amount to approximately \$70/household to make up the loss. So far as I can tell, that level of possible assessment is not worth losing sleep over! By retaining more of the risk, the association is able to realize a savings in the cost of coverage.

For all other casualty loss (fire, flood, earthquake, etc.), the deductible is \$10,000 per event. This last point really underscores why each owner must keep current on their property coverage, including loss assessment coverage (HO6) of at least \$2,000.

As of this writing, the rainfall in June has trickled in. Once again, the time-released fertilizer applied in March waited for significant moisture before activat-

Drought Not Ended

Despite receiving the rains in May and June, the deficit of water continues. According to the Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD) the rainfall deficit is around 30" for the past

The pronouncement by the Marion County Commission that they will adopt the St. Johns Water Management District guidelines on watering lawns has no affect on the Bay Laurel Center CDD service area and On Top of the World.

The CDD adopted the current watering schedule and frequency restriction (one day/week) as part of a rule making process. In order to change that rule, another public hearing must be noticed and held. The next such meeting will be held in August. The CDD will consider a modification to allow watering two-days per week at that time. I note with more than just a little irony that SWFWMD has published Notice of Rule Adoption on June 15, 2009 to allow watering twice per week.

Regardless of how many days watering may be allowed, the timing restrictions must remain in place for a number of reasons. The most important is that using a staggered watering schedule levels out the flow related hydraulic peaks and valleys in the distribution system. Water conservation has become a way of life in Florida, no doubt about it. Regardless of whether one-inch per week is put out over two days or one day, that is all the lawn needs. To apply more water wastes the resource and results in a needlessly higher water bill.

keeping up with Marion County, there is a fertilizer ordinance in effect. This ordinance mandates such as the amount of nitrogen you can apply to your lawn at each application and the Best Management Practices training of all "for hire" applicators and other things.

If you fertilized in March, July should be your next month for applying fertilizer. If you live in the On Top of the World Central Communities, your fertilization is done by the Parkway Maintenance and Management staff.

All of the fertilizer applicators working for Parkway have been trained in the Best Management Practices set forth in the Fertilizer Ordinance accepted by Marion County. Your fertilization should be completed somewhere around the end of July into early August.

Using a slow-release fertilizer is your best bet when working with the Fertilizer Ordinance. Slow release fertilizers containing at least 50% slow release nitrogen is strongly recommended for optimal results. If you are using a slow release blend that is less than 50%, chances are you will have yellowing nutrient deficient grass by the time you get to your next fertilizer ap-

Although the winter may seem like a distant memory at the moment with the heat we are experiencing, cold temperatures this winter created some issues with homeowners and the back flow preventer for the irrigation system.

I have been doing some digging and found a product that will help with the cold temperatures we see here in Ocala. The product is made by a company called Dekorra Products. It is an insulated pouch that slides over the back flow preventer protecting it from the cold.







The Star Spangled Banner

Little tidbits are tucked away in the dull pages of history. This seems to be

The Star Spangled Banner was not written as a song, but as a poem. So there are verses, which rarely see the light of day and are, indeed, little known by almost all Americans. They are no less inspiring.

We know Francis Scott Key wrote our national anthem during the attack of the British (yes, we were toe to toe with those guys again) on Fort McHenry on Sept. 13, 1814, in the War of 1812.

Key had gone out from Baltimore to the British fleet to try to obtain the release of a friend held prisoner on a British prison ship.

He arrived on the eve of the bombardment of the city by ship's guns and was detained on his own vessel so he couldn't disclose plans of the attack.

He anxiously watched the battle all day and all night from the deck. When morning dawned and showed the stars and stripes still floating over the fort, he was deeply moved and quickly wrote his poem. The words were later set to the tune of an old English drinking song called "Anacreon in Heaven," which was popular in the country at that time.

We all know the first verse - hum it to yourself, then add the rest -

On the shore dimly seen thru the mist of the deep

Where the foe's haughty host in dread silence reposes

What is that which the breeze o'er the towering steep

discloses

Now it catches the gleam of the mornings' first beam

In full glory reflected now shines on the

Tis the Star Spangled Banner, O long may it wave

O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave

O thus be it ever when free men shall

Between their loved homes and the

war's desolation Blessed with victory and peace may the heaven rescued land

Praise the power that hath made and preserved us a nation

Then conquer we must for our cause it is just

And this be our motto in God is our trust And the Star Spangled Banner in triumph shall wave

O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave

Doesn't the background story make sense of that first verse which seems kind of unrelated to anything?

Anyway, it seems little lost gem in our long chain of history and appropriate to our Independence Day now.

If you want another familiar phrase from the poem, look to the lost verse, "In God is our Trust" is stamped on all U.S.

'Shanghaied' at The **Pirates' House**

"Shanghaied," where did this word come from and what does it mean? It's a word that goes back to the sailing days when men sailed the seven seas on wooden ships. That word and its meaning are believed to have been contrived at a tavern located in Savannah, Georgia.

At this tavern, swashbuckling sailors and those who ventured inside this establishment could and often found themselves on a sailing ship heading to vast locations throughout the world. A sailor or strong looking male would often have too much rum, pass out or be knocked out only to find himself on a ship heading for distant locations. It seems that inside this tavern a tunnel was constructed in the rum cellar leading from the drinking establishment to the river front, just

about a block away. A group of On Top of the World adventurers recently stopped at this popular destination, had a delicious meal and looked at the entrance to the cellar where the "supposed" tunnel was located. Also, on a tour of this historic city by a local tour guide, the adventurers were shown where the tunnel entrance was located along the riverbank where once the wood-

en sailing ships would be located. The Pirates' House comprises of a few buildings located together. One of the modern conveniences, it still has that old buildings, still with its original walls, was erected in 1734 and is the oldest house in Georgia. It was utilized as the home for a gardener for the Trustees Garden, an experimental garden created by the original designer of Savannah, General James Edward Oglethorpe and his followers. The story concerning the Trustees Garden is a story within itself but this experimental garden failed and a tavern was estab-

The Old Pirate House opened its doors in 1753 as an inn for seafarers. It didn't take long before pirates and other sailors

utilized this inn as a meeting place swapping sea stories of their adventures from around the world. It is still a meeting place for telling tales and enjoying fantastic food, along with grog.

One of the most famous pirates that frequented this inn was Captain Flint. In fact, this swashbuckler met his demise at this inn and his famous last words to his faithful mate and friend; Billy Bones, as he lay dying in bed just before breathing his last breath was, "Darby, bring aft the

Now, I'm sure all reading this article have read the famous classic written by Robert Louis Stevenson entitled "Treasure Island." In his book, Stevenson mentioned that old Captain Flint, buried the famous treasure on Treasure Island, died in one of the upstairs rooms at this Savannah inn.

In the Captain's room at the tavern, there are many frames hanging on the walls containing pages from an early, rare edition of the book "Treasure Island." It is reported by many that on moonless nights the ghost of Captain Flint still haunts the Pirates' House.

The Pirates' House has that old mystique and atmosphere about the establishment. Even today, after bringing in flavor especially when you look around seeing wooden pegs holding together the hand-hewn ceiling joints. The restaurant still has the original brick walls and pine flooring used to construct the old Herb House and some of the original materials can be seen in the tavern.

The Pirates' House is a must see location to visit while touring old Savannah. The atmosphere is great, the food is great, and you can sit back daydreaming of those who frequented the tavern in the





Why is strength training important? Strength training increases functional fitness, which brings about independence, which ultimately provides a better quality

Strength training improves bone density, diminishes arthritis, pain, improves balance and might even prevent falls. Recent research has shown that strength training increases metabolism, reduces depression, increases transit time through gastro-intestinal tract, decreases risk of diabetes and improves HDL/LDL ratios.

One word that comes up when talking about losing muscle mass is sarcopenia, which is a natural decrease of muscle in aging adults. Even though it is part of the aging process, it doesn't mean you have to be a statistic. To prevent this loss of muscle you must do some form of progressive resistance exercise (PRE); commonly called weight training or strength training. Some studies show that muscle mass peaks at about age 30 and begins to decline at the rate of about 1-2 kilograms

Research shows that older adults who lifted weights were at least as strong as unfit 20-year-olds. The great news is that it is never too late. Studies have shown that people in their 80s can even increase strength. I see residents come into the fitness center who are well into their 80s whose strength and flexibility is amazing. I know that quality of life is improved when your body is strong and you feel good about yourself.

Stop by and see me at Health & Recreation to discuss how you can get started on a training program.

FIT TIP #1: Keep movements slow and under control, proper form is more important than the amount of weight lifted. Train. don't strain.

FIT TIP #2: Vary your workout to avoid boredom. Work out the major muscles of the body before working the smaller muscle groups, when possible increase intensity by only 10%. Do compound movements prior to doing isolated motions

FIT TIP #3: Incorporate stretching daily and try to address all the major muscles and joints of the body.

The Brain and Food Cravings

The munchies lurk in the shadows of your living room. It's an ambush mission. You are an innocent victim watching TV. They hit full force during a potato chip commercial. You never saw it coming. Their main weapon is the urge. Not just a regular urge, but also a focused craving that can be maneuvered at will towards a particular brand of potato chips.

Awareness is the first defense. In martial arts, they teach you to deflect a punch rather than stop it. It takes less energy and uses the motion of the attacker against him. Deflection is a style of defense needed in battle against cravings. You cannot stop them by trying not to think of the munchies.

Like a boulder rolling down a mountain, cravings bounce and bang into other needs, stirring emotions and desires into an avalanche. A tiny craving has become a powerful urge that affects every fiber of our being. Allowing a craving to build anticipation can only lead to disaster. Deflection uses the energy of a craving to form positive thoughts. It is best done quickly before the emotions escalate.

Neurons

Your brain has adapted its neurons to your present lifestyle. For example, many people like to wake up slowly while reading the paper and drinking a coffee. Billions of neurological cells have become adapted to certain amounts of neurotransmitter stimulation, in certain sequence, at certain times.

If a visiting friend interrupts that morning schedule, even if you are not conscious of it, there will be a feeling that something is not right. You may become irritable and edgy throughout the day. The brain has not received its normal doses of neurotransmitters in the normal sequence and rhythms, and they react with stress as though something were wrong.

It has taken years to establish your present addiction to food. Your entire neurological processing is dependent on the pleasure of food for balance. Your neurotransmitters are expecting the next fix. Food is your escape; relief from wor-

ry, entertainment and comfort, and can be more intimate than your best friend. Removing food from its powerful posi-

tion by cutting down food intake causes imbalance. You feel vulnerable and sensitive, similar to the effects of drug withdrawal. The symptoms are physical and emotional: anxiety, irritation, restlessness, headaches, stress and feeling out of balance. You are forcing your brain to change its neurological process, a change that sends shocks throughout the body.

A small calf could walk through an electric cow fence, but that small shock is enough to stop a 1,000-pound bull. Like that electric cattle fence, cravings keep us in place with small shocks. If we only held tight and ignored those shocks, we would realize how powerless they are.

Freedom is only a few shocks away. Let us leave the land of Burger Kings, Dairy Queens and burger shepherds wearing clown suits. It is a land of sickness, disease and death. Green pastures and still waters await us.

care of all the books in the On Top of the World library? There are 22 volunteer librarians in the library and the group averages over 200 hours a month making it easier for you, the reader, to find or locate the book you are looking for.

In case you don't know, there are over 12,000 books in our library just waiting for you, the reader, to stop by and pick up interesting books. No matter what type of book you are interested in, I'm sure that book or one just like it is available in the library located in the Health & Recreation Building. And the best thing about our library is that it is free; no late charges and you don't even have to have a library

All you have to do is pick out the book desired, or many books and after you have read them, bring them back. There is a specials bin located just inside the library door to place returning books. Then the volunteer librarians take over and reshelve the books in their proper place.

Our residents donate all the books and magazines in the library. Books that are no longer used are donated to the public library.

To give you a breakdown on the books sitting on the shelves there are over 3,000 hard covered fiction, mystery and sci-fi books. In soft covers, the number jumps to over 7,000, which include mystery, sci-

Have you ever wondered who takes fi, and, of course, romance. The library has almost 2.000 books by subject and these figures do not include tall books, encyclopedias, books on Florida and those in large print.

Rita Mandl is the head librarian and she mentioned to me that besides the 22 librarians, the library has two ghosts. It seems two gentlemen entered the library early in the day and seeing that the return bin were full they took the books out of the bin and placed them neatly in a cart for re-shelving.

I found out that the library works on a budget that management supplies, mainly for secretarial supplies. When the library needs more space, our woodworking shop constructs new shelves. The library could utilize additional funds, so if there is a club or organization within On Top of the World who would like to make a donation, it would be greatly appreciated.

Rita showed me a list of work for librarians and libraries according to Nancy K. Maxwell, author of "Sacred Stacks" which are as follows: "promote community, uplift society, bestow immortality, preserve and transmit culture, organize chaos, and provide sacred space." Sound familiar? Sounds like our library to me.

Stop by and get some reading material. If you have books lying around the house that you think others might enjoy, drop them off at the library.

Babe, a Kentucky **Derby** Winner

Recently, after watching the Kentucky Derby and that fantastic ride by the jockey giving the biggest odds by zigzagging to the finish line brought to my mind a neighbor of mine. This neighbor used to be a jockey; he is a little man with a huge heart who won one of the greatest horse races before I was even born.

That great race, "The Run for the Roses" took place in May 1936 at the Kentucky Derby. This jockey with his horse vas also a long shot. He also zigzagged to the finish line. His name is Ira "Babe' Hanford. He has the distinction of being the oldest living, winning jockey of the Kentucky Derby.

Babe was only 18 years old when he made his first trip as an apprentice jockey to the Kentucky Derby in 1936. He rode a horse named Bold Venture, a long shot, to victory. Babe had been a jockey for less than one year and his mount, Bold Venture, had never won a stakes race and no apprentice jockey had ever won the Kentucky Derby. Both went to the starting gate at 20-1.

Bold Venture went on to win the Preakness with a different jockey on his back. Bold Venture never got to run for the Triple Crown due to a tendon injury, which ended the horse's career.

As I sat on the Hanford's front porch talking to Babe and his wife, Ginny, I was told the couple has been married for 66 years. Both Babe and Ginny showed me some of their prize photographs when Babe was a winning jockey and when he was invited back to Churchill Downs in

2006 where he was honored at the annual Kentucky Oaks Party and the Honorable Order of Kentucky Colonels. Babe placed his handprints in cement. He added that he felt like a stranger there as he had never returned to the Churchill Downs since winning the Kentucky Derby but he added that he saw some old friends.

He has never missed a major race, including the Derby, as Babe stated, "it was better watching the races on TV. I could see more of the race.'

I was told, but believe me I am no horse person, that Babe was a jockey for a horse trained by Carl. I also found out that Babe rode a three-year old horse in three races by the name of Seabiscuit. Seabiscuit became a champion, as the horse grew

I asked Babe how many races he had entered as a jockey and how many races he had won. "I never kept track of how many races I raced," Babe stated. "I did, however, win several stake races."

Babe began his jockey career in 1935 as an apprentice jockey. He won the Derby riding in races less than one year. Except for four years in 1942 when Uncle Sam needed Babe to serve in the Army. He told me "I never served any time overseas. All my time was spent at an Army Fort in Nebraska." Babe continued his career as a jockey until 1952 when he quit being a jockey. He then became a trainer until his retirement in 1974.

The Dankwardts and the Rouillers were close friends and neighbors for many

years. A short while after Charles Rouiller passed away, his widow, Marion, in recognition of their many years of friendship, gave the flag to Paul. Since then it has proudly hung on his wall, safe-guarded in its glass enclosure with the inscrip-

tion below it reading, "This Flag was carried to the moon by Apollo 11.'

Paul is understandably very proud to be the owner of this memento, but feels that he should be sharing it with the next generation and, toward that end, he'll soon be shipping it off to his son Kevin, a PhD computer scientist in California.

Before bidding farewell,

and in keeping with the Fourth of July celebration, the flag will be on display at Master the Possibilities from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Thursday, July 2 and Friday, July 3. All are welcome to view this historic piece of memorabilia.







Arbor Club Tennis

It was not too long ago that we were enjoying nice cool weather, and now, it feels like an oven out there. The best advice I can give you is to keep yourself properly hydrated. Even before you come to the courts, it is good to have a glass of juice or water, and bring to the courts sufficient fluids, preferably in the form of a sports drink because water alone does not replenish the electrolytes you lose through perspiration.

Also, bring a good towel, sunblock with a SPF30 or higher and a power bar, pretzels, wheat crackers, or a banana.

Anytime you come to play, but particularly in hot weather, it is important to know your limitations, regardless of your competitiveness. If you feel dizziness or cold sweat, any tingling sensation in your extremities or out of breath; you need to stop. Look for a cool place to rest and cool off, and make sure you feel completely well before you start playing again.

When the air temperature is, say 90 F, it is definitely much higher on the courts because of the radiated heat from the surface. So, please, don't take any unnecessary chances. Have fun in a manner that is safe and healthy.

As you already know, we have suspended the inter-community matches until the weather is more suitable, but we will continue the ladder until the end of July, when we will break for approximately six weeks.

The folks at the Health & Recreation courts have sensibly changed the afternoon play to the evening hours when the sun is not so direct and the temperature is more tolerable.

Tennis Tip of the Month: What You Need to Know About Tennis Elbow

There's no "one size fits all" treatment for an injury that affects 50% of the players. Back in the 1970s, there was no clear treatment that would really work for anyone. Thirty years later, the same frustration continues to befuddle players with tennis elbow. Common symptoms include pain around the elbow, which can occur not just on the court, but also during everyday activities like shaking hands or holding a toothbrush.

Sufferers may also have pain in the shoulder and neck because their bodies are trying to compensate for the lack of strength in the elbow. Despite everything from Botox to blood transfusions,

no treatment has won out. Perhaps the biggest complication for the treatment of tennis elbow (lateral epicondylitis) is a misunderstanding of the nature of the injury. It isn't an "itis," or inflammation of the tendons at all, but a breakdown of the tendon itself due to overuse.

It is actually a "heart attack" of the tendon, says Dr. Nirschl, an orthopedist who has treated thousands of tennis-elbow patients. There is a loss of blood supply to the area, and that results in degeneration of the tissue. The distinction between inflammation and tissue degeneration is important because some common treatments for inflammation can be counterproductive for degeneration.

one of those treatments is a cortisone shot. Cortisone shots simply mask the pain, which can cause players to return to the sport too soon. Some specialists report having more success by numbing the painful area and then jabbing it several times with a thin needle to increase blood flow

Whatever the treatment, most experts agree that a combination of time off from tennis and basic strengthening and stretching is crucial to recovery.

If your elbow starts to hurt during or after play, you should stop for a week and apply ice in the evening and heat in the morning for the pain. You can also try wearing a brace just below the elbow on your forearm. If the pain continues for more than two weeks, you should see

Most important, you should address the problem that caused the injury - poor stroke mechanics, weak muscles. Seeking out a pro to help with stroke technique can help, since things like hitting the ball behind your body can overstrain the tendons. You should also examine your racquet, "not too flexible or light, not too heavy or too stiff, but in the midrange." Grip size is also important - you shouldn't have to squeeze too hard to hold it. Off court, you should strengthen not only your arm, but also the shoulder.

Finally, "buyers beware" when seeking treatment options, it also takes time and patience for this to get better.



In a previous column, we examined the method to find the "point of contact," or the spot on the object ball you have to hit with the cue ball to make the shot. Our ongoing discussion on shot making now continues with the emphasis on the cue

What part of the cue ball has to hit the point of contact on the object ball? You line up your cue stick in the center of the cue ball, pointing at the object ball's contact point. You draw back and gently stroke the cue ball; the center of the cue ball hits the exact point of contact on the object ball, and...misses the pocket by a

What happened? You did everything right. Was it the infamous "pool gods" again? Not likely. You forgot to compensate for the radius of the cue ball. I will avoid the technical details for the sake of space in this column but will be glad to explain and demonstrate them in person if you see me in the poolroom.

The bottom line is that the edge (not

the center) of the cue ball has to hit the contact point on the object ball. The easy fix to this common problem is to just aim the center of your cue stick through the center of the cue ball about one-inch behind the contact point on the object ball. This is also known as the "ghost ball" theory and will greatly improve your shot making capability. It will take time, faith and lots of practice to believe you will succeed when you are aiming at nothing but air, but it is a tried and true method.

While you're practicing that, remember to maintain a nice, smooth stroke. Continue the stroke right through the cue ball, don't try to stop the stick after the hit, just let it follow through. In other words, stroke it; don't poke it.

The final thing to remember is to keep your head down and your body perfectly still until the ball goes into the pocket. If you try to stand up too soon you will likely hit the cue ball off center causing it to miss the shot. You need to know that if you keep your head down and follow through on the shot, even if you miss, vou'll look like you know what you're doing. The important thing to remember is that if you look like you know what you're doing you can always blame the "pool

That's all for now, you have a lot of practicing to do. Please don't hesitate to see me if you have any questions, comments or suggestions about anything discussed in these columns. It's not that I'm that good at pool but I do know the theory behind the game. Remember the old adage "those that can, do and those that can't, teach.'



I would like to report that summer bocce is in full swing. The main objective to playing bocce here at On Top of the World is to have fun.

I hope you enjoyed your visit to Cinque Terre last month. While we still are in Italy, let's take the time to visit Venice. Venice, of course, is famous for being built on tideland marshes with saltwater canals meandering throughout the city. Who does not wax romantic when visualizing yourself and a loved one slowly and quietly floating along narrow waterways through "building canyons" in a luxuriously decorated gondola, perhaps sipping a glass of wine while being serenaded softly by a young man bedecked in the traditional striped shirt? Ahhh, the romance of it all!

Oh well, back to reality. Venice is a city in northeast Italy that stretches across 118 small islands in a marshy, saltwater lagoon along the Adriatic Sea. It is believed that people began to move to these marshes in the fifth century AD as a way to help protect themselves from the barbarian invasions occurring at that time.

Its relative safety and strategic location served the Venetians well over the next several centuries as the city merchants became wealthy as primary conduits for trade between the East and the West. Venice became one of the richest and most powerful City States in the world for hundreds of years.

Much of its influence began to wane, however, as sea routes to the Far East were discovered during the 15th century and replaced the traditional overland routes. Today, the population of Venice is about 272,000 inhabitants, with about 62,000 living in the old historic part.

With 150 canals, the city is connected into a cohesive unit by 409 bridges. The

historic center essentially is a car-free zone (so don't take your rental car there). Getting around town is best accomplished by walking or by using a variety of water vehicles—water taxies, vaporettos (water buses), gondolas, and there even is a bus

We all have heard that Venice is sinking, and pictures of people slogging around Venice in their galoshes ("wellies" for the British among us) are common. Venice does get two to three inches of rain a month throughout the year, but the periodic flooding that occurs is the result of very high tides instead of the rain.

While it is true that Venice is sinking, you do not need to fear slipping underwater if you go there. The rate of subsidence is very low. After identifying the cause of the subsidence, which was the pumping of fresh water out of the aquifer underlying the city, the city managers stopped the pumping! This simple solution worked, and the level of subsidence today is limited to about a quarter of an inch per year.

Looking to the future, scientists now are studying a proposal to pump water back into the aquifer, which might even

Venice today, still retains its historic charm and should be high on anyone's list of places to visit. The buildings and artwork in the city all are breathtaking in their beauty. The best time to visit (minimum crowds and best weather) is late March, April, May, October or September.

Some of the most famous sites to see while you are there include St. Mark's Basilica, St. Mark's Square, the Bridge of Sighs and the Ducal Palace.

This object is shaped like a cannonball except that the outside edges are rough.



It was there, I knew, because it was there last year and the year before that. You couldn't miss those nearly foot long leaves that looked like Mr. or Mrs. Gopher Tortoise had sculpted their saw-toothed

Its picture I needed for this article, so to the trail with camera before it was too hot or the picture "washed out." The Longleaf Pine trail took a right bend and there it was; but how do you take a picture of a bare, meter-tall stem with multiple florets at the apex? No problem. Only one bloom was picturesque. The rest were either not yet open or past their prime.

It was still early in the season for Silphium compositum, our beautiful and stately Kidney-leaf Rosinweed. (The books say it flowers from July through September). Who came up with that name? The basal leaves might look like kidneys to

someone but not me. The rosinweed part was easy: break the stem and the sap is indeed rosin-like.

One resource states that Lesser basalleaf Rosinweed, another name, resides in flat woods and sand hills in the southern U.S. We agree as it's here on our sand hill


I wondered about the name Silphium; and discovered a Greek origin meaning "a plant with medicinal properties." (It didn't say which properties). Compositum refers to the almost divided basal leaves. I also questioned why rosin and not resin, and got in almost over my head. Bottom line: the words are essentially interchangeable. One source was quite poetic. "[They] carry their rough foot-long oval leaves six to 12 inches off the ground [and] relish strong sun and average to dry soils."

Plants in the genus Silphium are members of the largest family of plants, the aster or asteraceae family. Our Silphium, Kidney-leaf Rosinweed, (the name is beginning to grow on me), has bright yellow ray flowers and yellow disc flowers with a hint of green underneath.

Bees, butterflies and even birds find Silphium as attractive to them as he/she is to us, albeit for other reasons.

Look for it, about half way through our Longleaf Pine Trail. It's still there.

Our Native Plant group is vacationing for a while, and will convene again with a "bang-up" introduction on Oct. 14. Nature Around Us Doris Mauricio

Hurray, the rains have come and will hopefully continue. Good rains encourage growth of plants, trees and grass. Rainwater contains natural nitrogen that enhances plant growth. Thousands of gallons of water run off the roof and down the storm drains. Rain barrels under the downspouts can capture a large amount of that water. It can be used to irrigate your gardens between rains. Call the Master Gardener office, 671-8400, for information about rain barrels.

A rain garden, in areas where water rushes across the ground, can slow down runoff and acts as a mini water retention area. Information on building a rain garden can be found online by searching for "rain gardens" on the Internet. At the very least, you can check your gutters and make sure that the water is being channeled into your lawn and gardens rather than down your driveway into the storm drains.

Butterflies are everywhere in the month of July. You can encourage butterflies into your garden by planting nectar and host plants. Butterflies like large splashes of color and sunny areas. Good additions to your garden for attracting butterflies include: firebush, pentas, Mexican sunflowers, lantana and buddleja.

The Monarch butterfly depends on milkweed for both nectar and host plant. Most nurseries have this plant in stock. It can also be started from seed. Once established, milkweed should reseed itself and start sprouting each spring. By the middle of May, the milkweed will be available for the Monarch butterflies.

The butterfly that I find the most spectacular is the Giant Swallowtail. They use citrus trees as their host plant. Our state butterfly is the Zebra Long-Wing. Along with Gulf Fritillary, they prefer passion vines – mainly the native ones called Maynon

If you wish to encourage butterflies to come to your home, you can build a butterfly garden. A garden filled with nectar plants will have a lot of butterflies passing through. If you want them to put up residence in your garden, you will need some host plants.

A great book to help you establish a well-balanced butterfly garden is "Your Florida Guide to Butterfly Gardening" by Janet C. Daniels. It contains excellent sections on host and larval plants plus a butterfly identification guide. After you build it, be sure to place a bench nearby so you can sit and watch them play.

Birders' Beat Jane Callender

Have you seen any crows lately? Silly question. They seem to be everywhere. There is no need to take a class on bird identification or "birding by ear" when it comes to the American Crow.

Everyone is familiar with its appearance as well as its less than melodious voice. However, some of you might be surprised to learn that we actually have two kinds of crows here, the American Crow and the Fish Crow.

Distinguishing between them by appearance alone is very difficult, even for the most experienced birders. Fish Crows are a bit smaller, but you would almost need to see them sitting side by side to be sure. A smaller female American Crow might not be much larger than a male Fish Crow.

There are also some slight differences in the size of beak and feet, and maybe some differences in posture, but those are very difficult to observe. The Fish Crow fluffs up its neck feathers when it is calling. The one sure way to tell the dif-

ference is to listen to them. The Fish Crow has its own unique lan-

guage. Instead of the familiar squawking 'caw, caw, caw" of the American Crow, the Fish Crow says "uh, uh" exactly as if it were saying, "no, no." Birders say, "If you ask a Fish Crow if it is an American Crow, it will answer, "uh, uh."

Fish Crows tend to live up and down the costal areas of the East as far north as Rhode Island and around the Gulf Coast into Texas. They have followed rivers and streams inland to expand their range. They are adept at catching little crustaceans in the sand but being crows, they will eat whatever they can. They seem to prefer wetlands and eat many insects and

Since the breeding season of the American Crow is about a month earlier than the Fish Crow, interbreeding is rare and the two species remain distinct.

So, when you are out walking and hear some crows calling, instead of getting annoved, try to listen for that unique double noted "uh, uh" sound. I heard it just this morning as one flew overhead during my walk. Tuning into the sounds of nature enriches your world.

jam, salt and pepper to the reserved drippings in skillet.

- 4 tablespoons flour 4 tablespoons sugar
- 2 1/2 tablespoons cocoa
- 3 tablespoons milk
- 3 tablespoons oil
- 3 tablespoons chocolate chips (optional) A small splash of Vanilla extract

1 large coffee mug (microwave safe)

My friend mixes everything in the microwave safe mug where she cooks the cake. I prefer to mix everything in a medium bowl and then pour it into a good

size microwave safe mug. Start either way, add dry ingredients to mug (or bowl) and mix well. Add the egg and mix thoroughly. Pour in the milk and oil and mix well. Add the chocolate chips (I didn't put any in) and also the vanilla extract and mix again. Fill your mug and put it in the microwave and heat at 1000 watts. The cake will rise over the top of the mug, but don't be alarmed. Allow to cool a little and tip out onto a plate. What





A Seasonal Harvest

A wide array of fruits and vegetables are available all year round in this global

market, however understanding what is in season is better for the environment and promotes the local farmer. Acknowledging the natural season for eating helps to promote better health and makes the food taste better. Here are some seasonal dishes that were created especially for "Cooking for One and Two," a class offered as part of the culinary series at Master the Possibilities.

The first recipe combines smoked salmon, fresh seasonal vegetables, pasta, cream and a touch of fresh mozzarella cheese. Use only the freshest vegetables available. This dish goes just as well with diced zucchini, squash, eggplant and colorful peppers.

Fettuccine Affumicato e Primavera

Serves 2

10 oz cooked fettuccine pasta 6 oz heavy cream

3 oz smoked salmon torn into pieces

2 tablespoons chopped chives 3 oz fresh mozzarella cut into small

10 snow peas

/2 small red pepper julienne cut 4 pencil asparagus bias cut

1/2 tablespoon butter

cubes

Sea salt and fresh black pepper to taste Precook pasta in boiling water until pasta is cooked aldente (firm to the bite). Next, pour the pasta into a colander and blanch the pasta in an ice bath until cool. Set pasta aside.

Heat a large sauté pan or medium pot over medium heat. Add the butter and melt it. Then add the vegetables and cook until they are coated with the butter. Pour in the heavy cream and allow it to come to a boil. Next, add the chives and salmon turning down the heat to medium low. Then add the chives and mozzarella cheese. Finally, add the pasta and stir the dish with a wooden spoon or plastic tongues. Season to taste and serve immediately.

I added this family recipe after we picked nearly 30 pounds of blueberries; I made several cobblers and blueberry jelly. This is an easy recipe that goes great with

some fresh whipped cream or vanilla ice cream. Serve the cobbler warm for best

Mamma's Fruit Cobbler

2 cups peaches or blueberries or both

1-3/4 cups sugar

3/4 cup salted butter


3/4 cup flour 2 teaspoon baking powder

pinch of salt 3/4 cup whole milk

Heat oven to 350 F and melt 1/2 cup of the butter in an 8-inch glass casserole

In a sauce pan combine 3/4 cup sugar, 1/4 cup butter and the fruit in a sauce pan and allow the fruit to be coated with the melted sugar and dissolved butter and set aside.

In a mixing bowl, combine the flour, baking powder and salt. Then whisk in the milk forming a batter. Pour the batter atop the melted butter in the casserole dish then pour the fruit into the casserole dish and bake for 1 hour.







Model Railroaders

You may be wondering, "Who still plays with trains?" The answer to that question is, "A lot of your neighbors do." Our fascination with trains can often be traced to memories of riding trains as youngsters, or remembering our dads setting up electric trains to run around the Christmas tree every year.

We do a lot more than "play with trains." To be a model railroader, you have to be part carpenter, electrician, civil planner, landscaper, historian, etc. in order to have a realistic model railroad. Our model railroad is a miniature, yet realistic, world.

Some famous people have had a fascination with trains. Walt Disney was one, for example. He was in his mid-40s before he got his first electric model train set. He was so excited about it that he wrote his sister all about it, telling her it had "a whistle and real smoke comes out of the smokestack."


He eventually built his own miniature steam train railroad in his backyard, and he gave Disney employees and the neighborhood kids rides on it. He named the locomotive the "Lilly Belle" after his wife so she would not get mad at him for spending too much time in the backyard with the trains.

It should be no surprise that when Walt created Disneyland (and later the Magic Kingdom in Disney World), one of the first things he put in it was the Disneyland (Disney World) Railroad. He went from having an electric train, to a miniature train in his backyard, to a full size train on each coast.

Another famous person with a fascination with trains is J.K. Rowling of Harry Potter fame. She traces her love of trains to the fact that in 1964 her mother and father met on a train. Later, in 1990, she was riding on a train going from Manchester to London when she got the idea of a young boy attending a school of wizardry. Based on this, it is no surprise that each school year in the Harry Potter stories start with the Hogwart's Express leaving from King's Cross station from Platform 9 ¾.


A recent notation is that our club is now recognized as an SSC, Special Services Club, of which there are only four in the immediate area.

Community Patrol

Gary Rodoff opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance. Lennie Rodoff then gave the treasurer's report and advised our membership that we had access to a number of bowling pins that could be repainted and sold to raise money for the Marion County Sheriff's Foundation. She also advised that we had someone willing to teach our members how to paint these and asked for volunteers.

Sgt. Grady Grimes addressed our group and spoke about the speeding on SW 90th Street. He also requested that our members continue to patrol the commons area, as this is a deterrent to crime.

Joe Berger was introduced and spoke about his new position with the Sheriff's department. He was selected by Major Blair to supervise the ICE agents assigned to the Cold Case Unit. He spoke about the first homicide case that was solved and indicated that there are several others that are very close to being solved.

Joe introduced Major Chris Blair, who is the Bureau Chief of the Marion County Sheriff's Office Detective Bureau. Joe mentioned that Major Blair is a working leader who works long hours with his people

and leads by example. He stated that Major Blair is an instructor for firearms at Center Florida Community College.

Major Blair distributed a handout to our members, which included the Detective Bureau Organization Chart outlining the command structure, and the assigned units under his command. He explained what types of cases a Major Crime Detective investigates and that the Sheriff's Office has one of the highest clearance rates

He included bar graphs of the overall case assignments, homicides and robberies. Major Blair stated that the robbery graph showed a rise in robberies during certain months of the year, and that he was creating a special task force to combat robberies and to reduce the overall yearly average for 2009.

He told us about the new DNA Screening Lab that assists in reducing turnaround time on DNA evidence collected from crime scenes, allowing the Detectives to resolve their cases much quicker and remove the bad guys from the streets of Marion County.

He spoke about a new program called NIBIN where the Sheriff's office personnel were trained to fire all firearms that are placed into evidence to collect the casings that will be sent to FDLE Crime Lab in Jacksonville for comparison. This program will reduce turnaround time in getting results on determining if the weapon was involved in a crime.

Major Blair closed his talk with a quote "Life is great, don't let circumstances and society fool you into believing it's not.' He then invited members of the Community Patrol to visit the Sheriff's Office for a tour of the facilities.

In September, we will nost an ice cream social and a special performance by The New Pretenders. Proceeds from this event

will be donated to the Foundation. As always, our meetings are held on the 4th Monday of the month in ACC suites B and C. Anyone interested in the patrol may call Gary Rodoff at 291-7508 for more information.




