Fiscal 2010 Operating Budget

Not surprisingly, I have received a few letters in advance of the Feb. 11 budget meeting. Most letters share the common theme of maintaining affordability and generally question the need for the proposed increase.

As noted in my letter, the grounds maintenance budget is being held to a very slight increase, despite pressure from higher fuel costs and pressure on

One item I did not discuss in my letter to residents is the impact of the newly adopted Marion County ordinance governing application of nitrogen-based fertilizers. The purpose of this ordinance is to implement changes in residential and

- commercial landscape practices that will: Reduce potential future pollution going into water bodies;
 - Reduce surface applications that may leach nitrogen and other compounds into the groundwater, thereby polluting the groundwater aquifer.

This ordinance also affects how retail vendors may store their fertilizer for sale to individual homeowners.

There was also discussion of restricting retail sales of high-nitrogen containing fertilizers. The State of Florida is considering companion legislation in the upcoming session. Once the State adopts regulations, the County's ordinance cannot be less stringent than the State's standards. Nothing restricts Marion County from being more stringent.

The short version is that fast release fertilizers will be phased out. Although slow-release fertilizers have been in use in the community for some time, the quantity of nitrogen in the mix and the number of applications will be reduced to two applications instead of three. The management company will monitor problem areas for consideration of additional treatments.

The operational overhead component of the budget is a very low 3.2% of the total budget. Operational overhead is that



Is It Legal? Gerald Colen

What I am trying to accomplish is to lecture on two separate series: one is my legal series and the other is my history series. All lectures will be in the Circle Square Cultural Center. Please sign up through Master the Possibilities.

Q. How does the homebuyer's credit work?

A. There are, basically, two types of credits. There's a first time homebuyer's credit and it is a credit off your income tax of up to 10% of the purchase price of the home but not to exceed \$8,000. Examples: Home purchase price is \$70,000; you get a \$7,000 credit. Home purchase

price is \$80,000 or more but not exceeding \$800,000, you get an \$8,000 credit.

Then, there's a repeat homebuyer's credit. If you have owned a home as your residence for five consecutive years out of the last eight years, you can get a credit off your income tax of 10% of the purchase price of the new home but not to exceed \$6,500. There are income limits: \$125,000 for a single person and up to \$225,000 for a married couple. You have to close on the sale by June 30, 2010.

There are reduced credits for persons above those amounts. A credit is a dollar for dollar reduction of your income tax liability. So, if you owe, say \$10,000 in tax and you are entitled to the repeat homebuyer's credit of \$6,500, then you would only owe \$3,500. The credit can be taken on your 2009 or your 2010 I.R.S. return.

Also, if you don't pay income tax or if your income tax is less than the credit, you will get a check back from the I.R.S. You have to file a specific I.R.S. form (Form 5405) and must submit your closing statement (HUD-1) with the form and you do this at the time you file your income tax return. If you live in the home as your residence for at least three years from the date of the closing, you do not have to pay back the credit. If you live in it for less than three years, you may have to repay it. So, keep that in mind.

The credit does not apply to investment properties. There are several other issues and restrictions involved but what I've just given you is what I consider to be

the "guts" of credit.

Q. I was at a seminar where the financial advisor said that annuities do not have income tax liability so that if I buy one I won't have any income tax to pay. So he said I could buy one and if I never used it, there would be no income tax obligation. What do you have to say to that?

A. If you buy an annuity, every bit of value in the annuity that is over and above what you actually paid when you purchased it, is income and is taxable as such by the I.R.S. The payment of income tax on that income is deferred for so long as you—the person who bought the annuity-do not withdraw any income.

Please note that I said that income was deferred, not forgiven and certainly not forgotten by the I.R.S. If you withdraw money from the annuity, then you will owe income tax on that portion of what you withdraw which is interest-that is, which is not part of the original principal you put in at the time you purchased the annuity. (You will get a 1099 at the end of the year that breaks down what you withdrew into principal and into interest

United Way of Marion County is offering free income tax preparation through a variety of VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) locations. Marion County residents are encouraged to get 100 percent of their return back. Please call 732-9696 to make an appointment. The Internal Revenue Service trains all volunteers providing tax assistance.

Residents will need to bring the following information with them:

- Last year's Federal Income Tax Return (2008 income tax return)
- Social Security cards for all taxpayers and dependents
- · Correct birthdates for all names that appear on the return
- · All "important tax documents" (W-2s, 1099s, 1098 for mortgage interest, property taxes)
- Picture ID including spouse's, if married and filing joint returns

- For education credits, bring 1098T or 1098E and the amount paid for qualified expenses
- · For dependent care credit, child care provider's name, address,
- SSN/EIN and amount you paid
 Voided check and saving account number for direct deposit of your refund (this is optional, but gets your cash to you fast.)

If married and filing a joint return, both spouses must come to the VITA site. Volunteers will not prepare Schedule C, Schedule D (complex), Schedule E, request for Social Security Numbers, Employee Business Expenses, Moving Expenses, Nondeductible IRA, or Minor Investment Income.

Rules Reminder

We have had an increase in complaints regarding underage children, single-family use and pets. As a reminder, below, you will find excerpts from rules and regulations regarding these three areas. You may find a complete copy of the First or Second Amended and Restated Rules and Regulations of your community on the web at www.ontopoftheworldinfo.com.

- 55 AND OLDER COMMUNITY: No child under the age of seventeen (17) years shall be allowed to reside in any Residential Unit in the Community. An Owner who owns and occupies his or her own Residential Unit may permit one (1) minor only to reside in the Residential Unit with him or her, but only if the minor is at least seventeen (17) years of age and a member of that Owner's family...
- SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL USE: Each Residential Unit shall be used for the purpose of singlefamily residence only, and for no other purpose whatsoever.
- PETS: While outside residential units, all animals must be kept on a leash or other restraint and must be accompanied at all times by the owner or custodian. Animal feces must be picked up immediately and disposed of properly by the owner or custodian of the animal. It is the responsibility of the owner or custodian to pick up immediately no matter the location—your own lawn, the neighbor's lawn, the common area or a vacant lot. If feces are left, it makes for very unpleasant conditions for other residents and the maintenance crews.



Keeping It Green Phillip B. Hisey

Did you remember to cut back on the frequency of watering the landscape with the onset of the cooler winter weather? Even though current restrictions allow once per week watering, depending upon the community you live in, your grass and plants may not need to be watered as frequently.

Many factors should be taken into account before reducing the run times. How long have you lived at the location? Is it a new home or has it been there for longer than one year? If your landscape is older than one year, reducing run times gradually in small increments is the best way to reduce run times. Small increments will keep you from creating a severe problem if you don't add enough water. If you do too much at once, waiting on the next run day could cost you your landscape.

Research conducted by the University of Florida indicates that during the shorter, cooler days of winter, grass and plants are growing slowly or not at all. During this time, their need for water is greatly reduced from the long, hot days of summer. Many people never change their automatic sprinkler system to compensate for this change in water needs, and water is needlessly wasted.

Established landscape plants and grass can easily go up to two weeks without rain or supplemental watering during winter. In fact, an irrigation system automatically running weekly and additional water provided by rain may actually result in excess soil moisture in the winter, leading to poor health from rotted root systems, and other problems like fungus.

Speaking of fungus, be ready this spring for fungus to be an issue. We saw a flare up just before the cold weather came on and springtime will surely provide the adequate climatic conditions to give us a fungus problem.

The best time to prune the Crape Myrtle is late winter-early spring. This provides the new growth required for summer bloom. The plant is also dormant at this time making it easier to shape. There are many studies to suggest the proper pruning method for Crape Myrtles but the studies do not show conclusive evidence that one way is better or worse than the other. The method I propose for residents to follow is the "pencil pruning" Method. Basically, you remove all branches smaller than a pencil.

Don't forget to cover up your backflow preventers on the irrigation system when freezing temperatures are in the forecast. Using a heavy blanket should be sufficient but if you want, On Top of the World sells a back flow preventer cover at Customer Service. This bag runs about \$60 plus tax and would be a great investment for your irrigation system. Happy Valentine's Day!



portion of any business operation necessary to keep the doors open (so to speak). Compared to other homeowner associations operating in Florida, this is remarkably low.

Winter Weather and Shrubbery

December was wet and dreary, but not so much that my peach tree set flowers had actually started to fruit. Need I point out that January was one of those riproaring cold winter months that we see every 20 years or so. It's all part of the cycle of weather. At least the cold knocks down the pest populations.

So, what to do about shocked and droopy plants in your landscape beds? The original plantings installed in your neighborhood at the time of construction were selected for their cold and drought hardiness. Sudden and severe cold weather may cause some plants to brown and leaves to curl.

Do not rip out plants affected by the cold. They will surprise you with their recovery. Neither should they be pruned back until mid-April. There may be several more periods of cold and possible frost

Pruning at this point will spur plant growth that is vulnerable to the cold.

Rather, wait until mid-April to consider any pruning of owner added plantings. Central Florida generally experiences one cold snap with light frost between March 15 and Easter so be forewarned.

Safety Tip

If you are using a space heater, make sure it is well away from any combustible object. Avoid overloading an electrical outlet with appliances, extension cords and especially a space heater. Overloading any electrical outlet can be a sure prescription for a fire.

February is a good time to clean out your dryer vent pipe. Lint can become clogged in the vent pipe, reducing dryer efficiency (so that's why it takes an hour to dry a 20 minute load!). Even more to the point, collected lint can become a fire hazard!

Cleaning is not complicated. Moving the dryer may be the hardest part. Disconnect the vent hose from the dryer and the wall vent. Use a vacuum cleaner to suction the vent hose, or you may choose to replace it entirely. Use the vacuum to suction the wall vent as well. If you've never done this before, the vent pipe may need a top down cleaning.




Windsor now has 32 homes. Two more homes were occupied recently with residents from Maryland and Indiana.

On behalf of all of us living in Windsor, we send good wishes to all in On Top of the World for a healthy 2010 and a happy Valentine's Day.





The Carmelites first arrived in Ireland in 1271 and today there is a community of 17 in the monastery attached to the Whitefriar Street Church. While there is some dispute, the story involves a famous 19th century Carmelite attached to the church, Fr. John Spratt.

Fr. Spratt visited Rome in 1835, and largely on the strength of his powers as a preacher; Pope Gregory XVI decided to make his church a gift of St. Valentine's body. The remains of Valentine were duly transferred to the church in 1836, and since that date, have been venerated there especially on All Saint's Day with a special mass.

As you might imagine, a large number of couples come to the church on St. Valentine's Day. With that let me wish you all a Beanchtai Na Fhele Vailintin (or hap-

py St. Valentine's Day). Try the pronunciation (slowly): Bah-Och-Thee Na Fai-leh Val-in-theen. Isn't Irish easy when you take it slow?

The name Ryan comes from the Irish name O'Riain -- a contraction of the older Irish form O'Mulriain, which is now virtually extinct. Ryan is also an extremely popular first name, especially in Britain and the U.S.

The Ryan family motto is "Malo More Quam Foedan," which translates to "I would rather die than be disgraced."





- Make sure your dog is neutered, has all his shots and is in good health. Never bring a sick dog to a dog park!
- Don't substitute your time at the park for the daily walk. To drain some energy, all dogs should have a walk of at least 35 minutes. Also, never take an over-excited dog to the park.
- Be aware of your dog at all times, and be responsible for his behavior. Do not let your dog become

aggressive or spoil the fun of others there.

- Make sure you clean up after your dog (and this is an important rule to follow whether you are inside or outside of the park, during or after hours, and in general wherever you may be with your not).
- ever you may be with your pet).
 Train your dog. A calm-submissive dog will not attract another dog's aggression but an excited dog, a weak or timid dog or an aggressive dog can lead to trouble.
- Know your dog! A dog that has poor social skills, is overly fearful or aggressive, or a dog who is not under your calm-assertive leadership, needs a more controlled way to be introduced to the company of other dogs. Try "play dates" with one or two other dog own-







Shaping Up: There's a lot you can do in 30 days

Yes, you can make noticeable, satisfying improvements in your physique in as little as a month. But it's important to understand what kinds of changes are possible (and which goals may not be realistic within that time frame).

Here are six guidelines for achieving results in four weeks:

- 1. Lose weight gradually no more than one or two pounds a week. It may not seem like much at first, but you could be eight pounds lighter after a month.
- Lift weights! Regular strength training plays a huge role in weight loss. It builds lean muscle mass, which increases metabolism (i.e., you burn more calories). Always lift and lower weights in a slow and controlled fashion. Avoid swinging your body and using momentum to complete repetitions. Try a counting method, such as one-two-three up and onetwo-three down while lifting and lowering to help keep a safe pace. If you want to see results quickly, make sure you're doing both cardiovascular and strength training.
- 3. Give up the "spot reducing" myth. You cannot lose body fat primarily from your stomach, thighs or other trouble spot. Our bodies lose fat proportionately.
- 4. Know a "body fat" problem from a "muscle tone" problem. If you want highly defined muscles, you won't be able to see them as long as there's a layer of fat hiding them. If you're carrying excess pounds, you need to lose weight while toning your muscles through strength training.
- Cool downs are important. A cooldown is a slow return toward a normal resting heart rate after

exercise. Always cool down immediately following cardiovascular activity. A cool down should last between five-10 minutes and will help prevent dizziness, fainting and muscle soreness. Continue to cool down until your heart rate reaches 100 beats per minute or less.

6. It is essential to rest after a strength-training workout – to increase progress and for injury prevention. During this recovery period, muscles rebuild themselves and develop higher levels of strength. An adequate time to rest each muscle group is 48-72 hours between workouts.

Think of your life as a book, with yourself as the main character. Everyone and everything else is secondary. You, and only you, can write your life story the way you want it to play out. Start creating your award-winning novel about - you! Make this your year to create the life and body you want to see in your mirror. You can do anything you set your mind to. As Nike says, "Just do it!"

To get started, take the stairs instead of the elevator or escalator; park at the far end of the parking lot; while watching TV do push-ups and sit ups during the commercials.

The time to be your best is now! Each one of us has the strength and power to achieve our dreams through hard work and determination.

Fitness Center Hygiene

When contemplating your gym visits during cold and flu season, try paraphrasing Shakespeare, "To work out or not to work out?" That is the question.

The New Year brings renewed interest in staying in shape and recommitting to old goals. With that in mind, trying to stay germ free in the fitness center can be a challenge.

The following six tips should help keep you away from the nasty germs that lurk in the recesses of any gym, from workout mats and weight machines to door handles and free weights.

Did you know that we average 160 people a day at the Health & Recreation Fitness Center? The fitness center is a closed, indoor environment where people can work up a sweat. Since germs can spread through the exchange of bodily fluids (such as sweat), you can see how this can become an environment for sharing illness.

With cold and flu season nipping at our collective sanity, we need to make sure we are observing good hygiene. We go to the fitness center in pursuit of better health, so let's all try to do our part to follow these tips:

- 1. If you're not feeling well, going to the fitness center is not a great idea. There is an increased risk that you could spread your germs and get others sick.
- 2. Personal hygiene is very important. Remember that we sometimes have over 200 residents a day come through the fitness center! At peak times, this means that there are lots of people very close together. Please keep our environment a pleasant one by wearing clean and appropriate attire.

- 5. Although we have a diligent team of fitness attendants who keep our fitness center very clean, we also provide disinfecting gym wipes so that you can wipe away any lurking germs before you use the equipment.
- 6. Wear flip-flops in the shower and locker rooms. There are skin ailments that can be contracted by walking barefoot.



The Power of Possibility

Someone recently forwarded an article to me with this phrase in the title: "the power of possibility." I just knew this was going to be good!

For those of you have heard me speak, or have been a part of our fitness programs, it will come as no surprise that I have a firm belief in the power of self efficacy.

Self efficacy is a person's belief in oneself; to organize and execute the necessary actions to meet challenges and succeed in a particular situation. These beliefs are determinants of how people think, behave and feel. This article does a wonderful job of illustrating the "power of possibility."

It is based on a new book entitled, Counterclockwise: Mindful Health and the Power of Possibility, written by Ellen J. Langer, PhD, a Harvard psychologist. Langer conducted a study where she was able to prove that the state of your mind influences the state of your wellness.

In her study, she created an environment where everyone lived very mindfully. She was able to demonstrate that by taking charge of your health you can empower yourself to a state of heightened wellness. Langer set up a situation where she immersed a group of older men into a very specific environment. The two key

factors of this environment were:

1. They were immersed in a time period (late 1950s) when they were all fit and capable. She used cultural references and virtually "turned back time."

2. They were all treated as if they were healthy and capable despite the fact that many of them were physically challenged.

The results from this study were amazing, to say the least. By the end of the stay, some men were walking without their canes and some were able to engage in physical activities they hadn't done in years.

Langer goes on to explain that living "mindfully" keeps us present and aware... alive! When we are mindful, we are aware of new things, we learn, create and live

happier healthier lives (possibly even longer lives!). Unfortunately, we tend to slip into a state of "mindlessness," which is sort of like autopilot, when this happens we miss out on new experiences, and new growth.

When this article hits the press, we will be in the middle of our "Biggest Loser" weight loss program here at Health & Recreation. This has proven to be very popular and many past participants have had great success in reaching their weight loss goals.

I can already tell you that the winner of this competition will be the person who understands and embraces this concept of self-efficacy. Everyone in this program shares a goal of weigh loss. In order to meet that goal there are necessary lifestyle changes that must take place. The

participants, who believe that they can identify challenges and create an action plan to succeed, will succeed.

Whatever your personal wellness plan might be, you hold the most powerful tool to achieve success...the power of belief.



Wickford Village

WORLD NEWS WRITER

Traveling around Rhode Island, we decided to take a look at a historic village on the western shore of Narragansett Bay. My wife, Bev, and I were told that this little historic village contains the most early-American buildings and homes in such a small area and are all within a short walking distance. We are heading for Wickford

One has to remember that the State of Rhode Island is very small, only measuring some 48 miles from north to south and 37 miles from east to west. It does not take a great period of time to reach any destination or attraction within this ocean state. There were a few places Bev and I wanted to visit before entering Wickford Village as we approached our destination from the south on Route 1A.

Our first stop was the home and birthplace of a famous American 18th century artist. I don't think there is a citizen in this country that has not had hundreds, if not thousands, of copies of one of his most famous paintings. One could say we are all art collectors. The painting was a head and shoulder portrait of George Washington and that portrait is displayed on the U.S. one-dollar bill.

The artist was Gilbert Stuart who was born in this house in 1755 located in Saunderstown, which is now a museum. His father operated the first water powered snuff mill in the colonies at this house. The museum also contains a gristmill, which contains two original granite stones, which were once used to produce the cornmeal for the famous Rhode Island Johnny Cakes. The Johnny Cakes are like a pancake only very flat and eaten with maple syrup spread on top.

Stuart gained a reputation for being an excellent portrait artist. Besides the famous Washington portrait, Stuart also painted official portraits of presidents (Adams, Jefferson, Madison and Monroe). He painted over 1,000 during his career including many war heroes and prominent people.

The Gilbert Stuart Home and Birth-

place Museum is open April through October Thursdays through Mondays from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. There is an admission

Also in the village of Saunderstown, is the Casey Farm. This farm was one of the Colonial plantations that encompassed southern Rhode Island and eastern Connecticut; this farm dates back to around 1725 and is still used as a farm today. If you like farms and farm animals then this is a nice historic site to visit.

Arriving in historic Wickford Village, the first place we headed for was a parking lot next to the harbor. The village was located originally on an island but since then, has become part of mainland Rhode Island.

Parking is a premium, as I believe, everyone touring around this state had the same idea of visiting Wickford Village on the same day. We strolled towards Main Street passing many old looking shop buildings heading for Main Street where all the old homes are located.

Every house on this street is an antique. I felt like I was back in colonial days except for the type of clothes we were wearing and the occasional modern day automobile. Every home or building had a plaque attached next to the front door stating the age of the home and who the original occupants were. With camera in hand, there was no doubt that any local could tell we were tourists.

One of the newest buildings in the village was constructed in 1845 and is the Old Narragansett Bank. During its heyday, it was part residence and part bank.

I did notice that all these buildings have been renovated at some time or other. We stopped and talked to one homeowner who explained the renovations that were needed to repair and make his home livable. Looking at his house you could see the outer walls bending and twisting in different directions. This house plaque stated it was built in 1735. It was very obvious that the walls being level and plumb were done by eye; not by a level.

Historic Wickford was the original town center of North Kingstown. Wickford was established in 1663. The oldest surviving building in the village is the Old Narragansett Church, which is a must visit while touring this area as it was one of four original churches in Rhode Island. The church was built in 1707 and moved to its present location in the village in 1800. The church has quite a few histori-

cal original fixtures within, and the building has been structurally unaltered.

The parish received, from Queen Anne in 1708, the church's altar silver. The church also has a rare English chamber organ that was built between the 1680s and 1690s; making it the oldest church organ in North America. The church is open to visitors on weekends in July and August and has special services the public may attend during the year.

Next to the church is the graveyard with some interesting inscriptions to read on the headstones. The church is located on Church Street, which runs off Main Street. Standing in front of St. Paul's Church on Main Street is a good view of the Narragansett Church looking through beautiful gardens.

Another old structure that caught our eye was the Wickford House, which was constructed in 1740 and is one of the oldest surviving dwellings in the village.

Some reports state that portions of this house date back to at least 1712. The house was originally a well-known inn and hostel but like most of the homes on Main Street, they are now private residences.

Almost all the homes and structures located on or off Main Street seemed to have been constructed between the early 1700s to the mid-1800s. Visitors will have fun reading all the plaques attached to the houses while walking the tree-shaded

Not far to the north of Wickford Village on U.S. Route 1 was Smith Castle, which is reportedly America's oldest surviving plantation house. It is located on the original site of Roger Williams' trading post established in 1637. Williams was the founder of what we know today as Rhode Island.

Sections of this structure were rebuilt after a fire in 1678 as the result of reprisals during the time King Philip's War became a thriving 18th century slave-holding plantation. There is a mass grave near the castle where 40 colonial solders are

Tours of Smith Castle are available with colonial dressed guides explaining the history of this old house and the times it was used. Later it became a prosperous dairy farm but declined in 1948. It was rescued by a historical society who maintains the castle today.

There is a fee to tour the inside of the house but touring the gardens and grounds is free. If a tour of the castle is of interest, I would check ahead for hours of operation as it is open different times each month. Smith Castle is listed on the National Register of Historic Buildings and is a National Historic Landmark Ar-

You will really enjoy visiting this area of Rhode Island, there is so much history to see and view. Not far from Wickford is Quonset Point. This used to be a Naval Air Station and home for many aircraft squadrons and two aircraft carriers. Next-door was the famous Davisville Naval Base, which was home to the Atlantic

Fleet Construction Battalions (Seabees). To reach the Wickford Village area, take exit 5 off Interstate 95 taking Route 102 east to Wickford Village. To reach the Stuart Home or Smith's Castle, take U.S. Route 1 from Wickford in either direction depending which one you want to visit and signs will direct you to these historic






A Lady With Talent to Spare

When talent, creativity and love of art triangulate, the end result often results in a product that defines the artist's freedom of expression. Lee Ann Oliver's work with clay demonstrates that expression.

Lee Ann started seriously working with clay a few years back when she was developing land and running a construction crew. Here's how she describes it, "I found that creating and painting clay sculptures to be amazingly relaxing after a stress-filled day in the field. I would come home and roll out some clay or pick up a paintbrush and instantly feel my body go tranquil."

Lee Ann passes on that "tranquility" at Master the Possibilities, teaching the art of molding clay into whatever design strikes the student's fancy. Once molded and fired, the piece is then painted, once again, to the student's imagination.

Anyone touring Lee Ann's studio at Master the Possibilities would bet that the finished pieces are the work of professional artists. But to learn that all of the works on display have been created by 55+ amateurs, the tourist is taken with

a new sense of awe. Lee Ann herself is often daunted at the amazing latent talent in our community.

Prior to moving to On Top of the World, Lee Ann Oliver started and ran the Pelican Preserve art program in Cape Coral, Fla., and before that she taught ceramic art, and eventually ran the Art Center in Hilton Head, S.C. There she also started the ceramic arts program for children ages five to eight, as well as for high school students who were looking to expand their artistic experience.

"Watching some of those children create a piece of art from scratch, with minds uninhibited by old habits was a living experience for me. It proves the old adage that a teacher truly does learn from the student."

Lee Ann's talent for creating ceramic art was self-taught, although when she started getting serious she did take a few classes. Learning technique rather then the how-to of ceramic art, gave her greater freedom of expression. She now shares that technique with her students at Master the Possibilities.

This fish factory is located near the city of Honnah, which is the largest native Tlingit Indian settlement in Alaska. All those employed at the fish factory are native Indians.

One of the most sought after excursions other than Bear and whale watching is the Zip Rider. It takes 45 minutes by bus to reach the start of this ride, and is some 1300 feet high on a mountaintop overlooking the entire area. The Rider is 5,330 feet in length taking 90 seconds to reach the end. It is a 1,300-foot drop and the rider obtains speeds up to 60 mph. I didn't participate in this ride, as I didn't bring enough underwear in case anything happened.

Our next location on the cruise was the Hubbard Glacier. As the ship approached the bay, I could barely see the giant ice flow because of fog. As we approached closer, you could see the gigantic mass as it made its way to the sea. This glacier is part of the National Park Service. Getting closer, I could make out another cruise ship at the base making this ship a tiny object against an enormous giant.

Hubbard Glacier is the largest tidewater glacier on the North American continent. It travels 76 miles from its beginning and as it reaches the sea it is 6-miles wide reaching heights of 300 to 400 feet above sea level and believe it or not, the glacier is 300 feet from sea level to the

We then cruised along to the old Russian capital of Sitka, Alaska. This city sitting on an island is the largest city by square mileage of all the cities in the United States. It still has a lot of Russian influence and a large Russian church sits right in the middle of town. This is a very beautiful town and the weather is very mild due to the currents from Japan.

After six days of visiting ports and different locations, a day at sea was welcomed as the ship headed south through the inside passage towards Victoria, British Columbia. We had an excursion scheduled for a brief city tour heading for the Butterfly Museum and then on to Butchart Gardens. The gardens are rated by some as being the best in the world and I would have to agree.

The butterfly museum was great, smaller than the one at the University of

Butchart Gardens was awesome. What beautiful flowering plants and shrubs. I couldn't believe the size of some of the plants that are grown locally. They put those around here to shame.

We had another day at sea before arriving for a two-day stay in San Francisco where we would relax by gazing out over the water looking for signs of whales. We saw many whales blowing but very few actually jumping out of the water.

Reaching San Francisco, well let me put it this way, it was foggy entering the harbor and passing under the Golden Gate. The sun eventually greeted us as we ventured to Fisherman's Wharf, touring the city on a double-decker bus, visiting the local bakery made famous for its sour dough bread, and of course no stop in this California city would be complete without visiting Pier 39.

We also took a boat ride around the

harbor. We went out to the Golden Gate completed our 15-day adventure to the Bridge and then to Alcatraz where we had a bird's eye view of the old federal penitentiary. Alcatraz is now a National Park and was last used as a federal prison in 1963. Its nickname is "The Rock."

We departed San Francisco to our final cruise destination of San Diego where our cruise ended and a flight back to Florida



On individual events, this will give all of our members a chance to compete with other members of comparable skills and abilities to hopefully increase their golfing experience. On team events, the teams will still be made up of members of the four flights. If you have a gold member on your team, they will play from the gold tees just as in an individual event.

For an MGA member to be eligible to play in the gold flight, they must have a handicap index that will translate to a course handicap of 25 or above. No one will be required to play in the gold flight, no matter if their course handicap is 30. This will be a completely volunteer flight.

However, once you sign up for the gold flight you will be required to remain in that flight for the duration of that year. At the beginning of the next year, we will have another sign up period. In that way, new players can opt in and older players can opt out and go back to C flight.





Arbor Club Tennis Jorge Privat

With the holidays gone, this year is already moving right along. I think that we were fortunate that during the coldest days, the sun was shining and the wind was calm, so playing was actually enjoy-

Hopefully by now, we are back to our normal activities and most of you can participate in the club tournament. Remember that the underlying purpose in all the activities, including club tournaments and inter-club meets, is simply to have fun and to develop new and lasting relationships. It's been my experience that through tennis you always meet nice and friendly people.

Please remember that even though some of you started with tennis at a later age, you can always improve your skills with the right attitude and a little instruction. In this issue, I will give you some

simple bits of advice that can enable you to play better if you follow them.

Tennis Tip Of The Month: Doubles Play

THE SERVE: Concentrate on your toss. Place the ball where you can easily hit it. Practice your serve at least to where you don't give many free points away by double faulting. (This is one stroke you can practice alone).

As you progress, you can add power, direction and spins to make the return more difficult for your opponent. Change the pace of your serve. A faster or slower ball than your normal serve can throw off your opponents.

The Return of Serve: Start out by hitting your return cross-court. This is the bread-and-butter return in doubles. Usually, the ball crosses the net at its lower point, and when you hit diagonally, you have more court to work with.

Avoid the person at the net; his job is to put easy balls away. Try the lob. This is a great way to mix up your returns. You will usually lob over the net person's head. This gives you and your partner an opportunity to take over the net posi-

Practice your volleys as much as you can, because taking the net position is paramount to playing doubles; chip and

At the higher levels, the team at the net usually wins the point. So, trying to get to the net should be one of your objectives. If one of your opponents hits a weak second serve, focus on hitting a deep cross-court return and follow the ball to the net.

A more surprising move is if you poach when your partner hits a good return (a deep and low cross court). All

too often players think of poaching only when their partners are serving. Let your partner know of your intentions, so he can be ready to cover your side when you cross over.

Play back as a team. You might do this if you and your partner have great ground strokes but your volleys are weak. Another situation is when your opponents have great ground strokes or volleys, making you and your partner target practice when you are at the net, particularly when receiving the first serve. You may also do this as a ploy when things are not going

so well in a match. THE PASSING SHOT: You need steady nerves and a variety of shots to beat an opponent who has ventured to the net. When someone is at the net trying to rob you of time, it's hard not to feel rushed and flustered. Instead of focusing on the ball, you get consumed by the player in front of you. You need to prepare early, pick a target, stick with it and complete your swing.

At the beginner levels, force your opponent to volley. At lower levels of play, the panic factor is elevated. But, if you analyze the situation, you should not feel much pressure. In all likelihood, your opponent is not a proficient player, so there is little reason to fear his presence at the

Concentrate on watching the ball hit the strings and completing your stroke. If you make solid contact, your opponent is going to struggle with the volley.

Make use of the defensive lob. When you know you don't have a clear pass, this is where the defensive lob comes into play. It can move your opponent back off the net and give you more time to get back into the point. The lob can change the momentum of a point and put you in



Players Welcome.

Use combinations. Try hitting your returns at your opponent's feet, which can produce a weaker shot from your opponent. Be smart with your directional choices. When your opponent comes to the net, you have a split second to make a choice.

Be decisive. This means picking up a spot to hit your passing shot, either down the line, cross-court or a lob. Go where you have more room to execute your passing shot. Keep your passing shots low. The higher your ball the easier for your opponent to create sharp angles and





They are flying in an undeveloped area at On Top of the World near Bob's home in Williamsburg.

I can just imagine what it was like in the old days mining for gold and silver in the heights of the San Juan Mountains located in the Southwestern section of Colorado. These old prospectors were not panning for the earth's riches but rather they were digging into the mountains hoping to find their fortunes.

It all started back in the late 1800s when prospectors discovered wealth on Red Mountain, a mountain that is located between Ouray and Silverton, Colo. Ouray is named after a famous Ute Indian chief.

It was in the 1880s when mining for silver exploded on Red Mountain when rich mines were established such as Yankee Girl, Robinson, Guston and National Belle Mines.

In 1882, a toll road was constructed

along the same route as the Million Dollar Highway (Route 550). In 1888, the Silverton Railroad from Silverton appeared over the Red Mountain Pass and for several years, railroad this was the most profitable railroad, mile for mile in the United States. It was servicing many, many mines taking the mine's ore to Silverton where it was later transferred to Durango and the Rio Grande Railroad.

When the silver-rich ore at the Yankee Girl and other mines on Red Mountain, a town established on the mountain, but after some



the town vanished. All that remains of the town today are a few outbuildings and a grassy area where it was once situated.

The Silverton/Durango Railroad, which is still used today, was completed in 1882 hauling passengers and freight. From the railroad's beginning, it was promoted as a scenic route for passenger service. It was primarily constructed to haul mine ores, both gold and silver, from the San Juan Mountains. It is estimated that over \$300 million in metals were transported on this route.

All goods, and I mean everything, for the towns and the mines had to be hauled in. The elevation of Silverton is over 9,300 feet and the growing season here in the San Juan Mountains is approximately 14 days. Consequently, there is not one acre in San Juan County that is suitable for agriculture. Silverton is the county seat.

Silverton is a fantastic place to visit. The miners would visit this community only to lose or spend their hard earnings in local saloons or brothels. Some of the mines are clearly visible today for the travelers traveling Route 550 (Million Dollar Highway) with all its twists and turns. There is a turnout to park and gaze at Red Mountain. There standing in front of you is the Yankee Girl Mine and the remnants of other mines that made their riches on Red Mountain's slopes.

> At the horseshoe curve before entering the turnout is Idarado the mine complex, which ceased operations in November 1978. mine employed 500 employees and was a major producer of lead, copper, zinc, gold and silver. The tunnels from this mine extend some five-miles under 13,000foot mountains appearing near Telluride. Driving from the mine to this ski resort is approximately 60 miles by road. This



Anything But Bland

Bruschetta Quattro Stagioni or Four Ways

When you think of bruschetta what comes to mind? Probably a facsimile of this: a dish prepared with grilled bread then topped with ripe juicy plum tomatoes that are diced evenly, then laced with garlic, fresh basil and finished with a fruity extra virgin olive oil, salt and pepper. Occasionally you will have it with some mozzarella or Parmesan cheese on top, perhaps melted. This has become almost the brand of bruschetta but is it really bruschetta?

Traditionally in Italy, bruschetta is very simply grilled bread, olive oil and garlic. It is prepared by removing the garlic bulb from the exterior skin and placing the skin in a container with extra virgin olive oil. When you are interested in making bruschetta, just brush some of the garlic infused olive oil onto the bread then lightly grill it. I like to use French baguettes, but any bread will work. Just slice the bread

and brush or soak the bread and grill each side on low heat so as not to burn it but to toast it. There you have it: bruschetta.

This is perfect on its own but if you must, you can shave some Reggiano Parmigianno or Pecorino Romano cheese on top and serve it as a starter with some dry red wine, like Chianti, a Tuscan red table wine, a dry cabernet sauvignon or a tempranillo would also be perfect.

If you need to add other toppings, here are some suggestions. Since tomatoes have suffered from the recent freeze, there will be some quality issues and prices should skyrocket.

Here are some alternatives to top grilled bread: roasted red peppers with garlic and olive oil. Char the skin of the red pepper on the burner of the stove on high and turn it as the skin turns black. Then place the pepper in a bowl and cover with plastic wrap. Peel off the skin and break it up roughly then add some sliced garlic and olive oil season with kosher salt and black pepper.

Also, I like to make a wild mushroom mix: shitake, crimini, oyster, porcini (if you can get them) and many more varieties of mushrooms that create an earthy flavor to this bruschetta. You can slice them or just keep them whole. Roast them in the oven at 350 F until tender with some olive oil, or sauté them in butter and finish them with some thyme. If you want to go wild, you can add some soft goat cheese to make a bruschetta that is to die for.

Another way is to take any combination of fresh baby spinach, arugula, broccoli raab and rough chop it, then sauté it in chopped garlic and olive oil and maybe a squeeze of lemon juice and then some salt and pepper. You can add a little grated Parmesan cheese for extra flavor. It's so simple but very good.

Now if you want to have fun, you can make a quattro stagione or four seasons of bruschettas and have a wine party.



The first meeting of 2010 for the Pennsylvania Club was held Jan. 13. Seeing our fellow members after the holidays was a definite pleasure.


Our speaker was Betty Vandellen from

Citizens Emergency Response Team

Recently when asked by a resident, "What is CERT?" I thought it would be an appropriate time for me, in my new leadership capacity, to consider the answer to this question and share the information with all the residents.

In 1985, the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) concept was developed and implemented by the City of Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD). They recognized that citizens would very likely be on their own during the early stages of a catastrophic disaster.

In 1994, The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) decided that this concept should be available to all communities nationwide. In cooperation with the LAFD, they expanded the CERT materials to make them applicable to all hazards.

CERT training is designed to prepare the volunteers to help themselves, their family and their neighbors in the event of a disaster.

Studies of behavior following disasters have shown that teams working together perform more effectively if there has been prior planning for disaster response

prior planning for disaster response.

The On Top of the World CERT was

started in 2001 through the efforts of Norman Scott, a long time volunteer of the Division of Emergency Management and a resident. He also participates in the training programs.

The first few classes, in the early years, had only a few volunteers. In fact, Norman and his wife Caroline were one of the first volunteers and went on to provide the leadership for On Top of the World CERT.

Currently, we have over 40 certified volunteers in CERT who are prepared to be the first responders in our community whenever there is a disaster.

The eight-week training covers basic skills including disaster preparedness, fire safety, assessment and treating of life-threatening conditions, light search and rescue, disaster psychology and terrorism. Upon completion of the training, the Marion County Sheriff's Office, Division of Emergency Management, certifies volunteers.

Training in disaster response is not a one-time event. CERT volunteers meet every month during the year for educational programs and additional training. During the year, disaster drills are conducted to maintain the basic skills necessary for effective response in the face of a disaster.

Persons interested in learning more about CERT should plan to attend one of the monthly meetings or contact me at 854-8718. The next CERT meeting is on Tuesday, Feb. 9 at 9 a.m. in the Arbor Conference Center.



Orchid Club Linda Rose

This has been an exceptionally cold winter in Florida; those of us with orchids are having difficulty keeping them happy and healthy this winter! Typically they are remarkably sturdy plants, but even those with enclosed lanais are being challenged by the constant cold, as most species can handle weather at 50 degrees for several hours at a time, but it's been below freezing so much of the month of January, we have to wonder how this will all turn out.

Speaking for myself, with an enclosed lanai, which is mostly all glass, I've opted to put my favorites in our insulated garage rather than attempting running an electric space heater constantly. The lanai

tends to stay about 10 degrees warmer than the outside temperature; the garage hasn't gone below 50 degrees without added heat.

Fortunately, our garage has space for a golf cart with a double window; I believe our golf cart could qualify for an Easter parade right now; the roof is loaded with blooming Vandas in baskets as well as others hanging from it! Cattleyas are on the workbench; some orchids are perched on wings of my husband's airplanes! For additional light, we leave the fluorescent lights on during the day; which I've found works well for regular plant life.

I have left several Dendrobiums in the lanai, covering them at night with sheets. Phalaenopis do well indoors year round, so mine are in the bathtub for now!

We want to thank Pete Wood for his impressive presentation on the Art of Bonsai; it's culture versus the culture of orchids for our January meeting. After all the cold weather, we had much to discuss!

World **Traveler Bill Shampine**

Many On Top of the World residents have enjoyed a cruise to the Panama Canal. The canal is one of the world's greatest engineering feats, particularly considering that it was completed in 1914. In researching for this article, I discovered that the origin of the canal had a checkered past, so I thought I would (to paraphrase Paul Harvey) tell you "The rest of the story about the politics behind cre-

ation of the Panama Canal." Construction of a canal was first suggested to Charles V, the King of Spain, in 1524 as a mechanism to get the riches of South America back to Spain more quickly. A survey of the isthmus was ordered and a working plan prepared in 1529! Subsequent political unrest throughout Europe, however, caused the plan to languish until it finally was abandoned.

Although a railway was built across the isthmus in 1855, an all-water route between the oceans was considered the best way to go, particularly in 1869 after completion of the Suez Canal. The French formed a Canal Syndicate, purchased huge tracks of land in Panama, and hired Ferdinand de Lesseps to begin construction in January 1880 on a sea-level canal (one without locks) through what was then Columbia's province of Panama. Poor engineering practices, inadequate construction equipment, and unrelenting health issues (primarily malaria and yellow fever) caused the project to collapse

Aware of the interest of the United States in building a canal, Philippe Bunau-Varilla, Chief of the French Canal Syndicate (whose land had no value without a canal) hired William Cromwell, a U.S. lawyer, in 1898 to lobby the U.S. Congress to build a canal across Panama and not

across Nicaragua, another location being considered. In 1902, Nicaragua issued a 10-cent stamp erroneously depicting a fuming volcano known as Momotombo. In fact, however, this volcano was dormant and located more than 100 miles from the proposed Nicaraguan canal path. Nevertheless, Mr. Cromwell planted a story in the newspapers reporting that the volcano had erupted and caused a series of massive seismic shocks--all untrue. He then sent copies of the article and a leaflet with the 10-cent stamp on it to all U.S. Senators as witness to the volcanic activity in Nicaragua making it an undesirable location for a canal. Three days later, the senators voted to build a canal through Panama, and Mr. Cromwell received \$800,000 for his efforts (a lot of money in 1902).

On Jan. 22, 1903, a treaty was signed by the U.S. and Columbia granting a 99year lease from Columbia for the land proposed for the canal. The U.S. ratified the treaty, but the Columbian government did not.

Then Philippe Bunau-Varilla told President Theodore Roosevelt of a potential revolt for independence by the Panamanians and suggested that the U.S. should provide them with support. President Roosevelt agreed and sent warships to block the sea-lanes, thus preventing Columbian troops from getting to Panama to put down the revolt.

Not willing to go to war with the United States, Columbia finally gave up, and Panama achieved its independence in November 1903. Philippe Bunau-Varilla subsequently was appointed Panama's ambassador to the United States. He was able to develop and sign another treaty with the U.S. granting rights to the United States to build and indefinitely administer the Panama Canal.

Unfortunately, Ambassador Bunau-Varilla was still a French citizen and not authorized to sign treaties on behalf of Panama without Panamanian review, which never happened. Since it never was approved by Panama officially, this treaty became a very contentious diplomatic issue between the two countries for decades. The issue finally was resolved with the signing of the Torrijos-Carter treaties in 1977, which returned the former Canal Zone territories to Panama.

I think it also is interesting to note that under President Warren Harding, the United States paid Columbia \$25,000,000 in 1921, seven years after completion of the canal, for redress of President Roosevelt's role in the creation of Panama.

Next month, I will tell you about the canal and its construction. It truly is a masterful engineering feat.

The Opera Appreciation Class met for its second session on Jan. 7 to study Don Pasquale by Gaetano Donizetti. It was performed by a very young cast with the exception of Claudio Desderi who sang Don Pasquale. All enjoyed the performance. We had several new members attend who had been unable to make it for our opening performance of Turandot.

Verdi's The Masked Ball (Un Ballo in Maschera) is the subject of our third class on Feb. 4. Giuseppe Verdi was born in Le Roncale, Italy on Oct. 10, 1813. He had some musical training in the town of Busseto where the citizens collected a fund to send him to study at the Milano Conservatory. However, he was considered too old for the Conservatory and he studied privately with Vincenzo Farigna. In 1836, he completed his first opera, Oberto, which was staged very successfully the next year at La Scala.

After a failure with a comedy, Verdi's next opera, Nabucco, was a major success in 1842. In the next nine years, he composed 12 operas including Ernani, Macbeth and Luisa Miller. After these successful operas, Verdi composed Rigoletto, La Traviata, Il Trovatore and Aida, which are some of the mainstays of the reper-

Aida, which is one of the five most performed operas at the Met today was commissioned by the Khedive of Egypt to celebrate the opening of the Suez Canal in 1871. Our opera, The Masked Ball, was also composed during this peak period of Verdi's creativity.

After 15 years of semi-retirement. Verdi composed the opera Otello, after being fascinated by the libretto of Boito that was based on Shakespeare's play. The opera premiered in 1877 when Verdi was 73 years of age. Some time later Boito got him activated again when he showed him a libretto based on another play by Shakespeare. Falstaff is the opera, and it

was produced at La Scala in 1893 when Verdi was just short of 80.

The plot of The Masked Ball involves the conspiracy against the life of Gustavus III of Sweden who in 1792 was assassinated. Our cast is led by the late and great Luciano Pavarotti as the king. Aprile Milo sings the role of Amelia who is the wife of Renato and in love with the king. Leo Nucci is Renato the one time friend of Gustavus who joins the conspirators because he mistakenly thinks his wife and the king are having an affair. Florence Quivar sings the role of Ulrica who is the fortune-teller who predicts the death of Gustavus by the next man to shake his hand. It happens that Renato comes on the scene and shakes hands with Gustavus who thinks it is very unlikely that his friend will do him harm.

I look forward to seeing a full turnout of opera lovers for the presentation and discussion of The Masked Ball on Feb. 4. We will meet at the Arbor Conference Center, Suites B and C at 1 p.m.

Mac/PC Tip of the Month Sherry Surdam

How many of you leave your Macs on 24 hours a day? If you're like me, you don't. But did you realize that your Mac performs several maintenance tasks, such as deleting caches, for you automatically? Apple designed their software to perform these tasks when your Mac is on but idle. Of course, if you turn it off the tasks never get done!

Enter a piece of software called OnyX. OnyX is a multifunction utility by Titanium Software for Mac OS X (both PowerPC and Intel). With it, you can run the various maintenance tasks, which would normally run at night or other time during which your Mac is idle. Apple knows not everyone leaves their computers on 24 hours a day and provides this utility program, free, on the Apple website at http://www. apple.com/downloads/macosx/system_ disk_utilities/onyx.html. Native Plant Group Ron Broman

I'm still alive, at the time of this writing that is. I'm not only alive but blooming. Perhaps that doesn't seem strange, but considering we've just had a long spell of the coldest weather since the '70s it's at least worthy of note.

My blooms are bright blue-violet, with five petals. Rough, dark green, deeply serrated, triangular leaves should help identify who I am. Another clue is that one of my names is the same as a large city in Florida.

I belong to a large family of about 75 genera and more than 3,000 species mostly shrubs. However, the teak, a tree prized for the beauty of its wood, is perhaps the family's most famous and valuable tree species.

My preferred habitat is coastal, but

will do well in pine flatwoods or hammocks and disturbed sites in central to south Florida. But I'm in trouble. Due to what I would call runaway development, I can be found very rarely and only in a few remaining wild communities. I am considered an endangered species. It's only because some folks really care enough to collect my seeds and raise my progeny in native plant nurseries or at home that I am here at all.

Now the clincher should be that another family member, lemon verbena, (lippia citriodora), is cultivated as a source of oils used in perfumes.

So have you guessed my identity? I'm not surprised if you haven't. Many of the source books seem to have left out most references to me, which makes me feel rather woebegone (and not of the lake

I do actually exist, however. If you would like to see one of my appearances, perhaps still in living color after all of this cold weather, just visit the On Top of the World Native Plant Garden, next to the sign, to the right of the Arbor Conference

Ok, I'll tell you my name, or rather my names: Tampa Verbena or Tampa Vervain are probably the most common. Some sources use Tampa Mock Vervain. In more scientific language, I'm known as Glandularia tampensis.

Now you know, and I hope you'll visit me in the garden and perhaps plant me in yours. You can combine your visit with attendance of our Feb. 10 meeting in Suite H starting at 1 p.m. "Proper tree planting and pruning" is the topic along with the Plant of the Month.

Nature Around Us Doris Mauricio

As I am writing, we are completing the worst hard freezes that I have experienced in my 15 years in North Central Florida. The lawns in many open areas have turned brown and our plants have turned into withered messes. When the temperature dips into the 20s, tropical plants, including citrus trees, will perish if not adequately protected. The longer the freeze lasts, the worse the damage.

Semi-tropical plants that freeze to the ground will start to re-grow in a couple of months. Keep your plants watered during these cold spells so they do not become dehydrated. Deep watering prior to a freeze will help prevent dehydration and damage.

It is very important that you resist the temptation to prune, as this will trigger new tender growth. We can still freeze right into the middle of March. You will be wise to wait until March to clean up the mess that Jack Frost left.

Some chores to take your mind off pruning:

- Weed. There are always plenty of weeds to pull.
- Clean your birdbath, bird feeders

and water features. Clean your pots and containers. Use a scrub brush with a mild bleach solution and let them dry in the sun.

Amend your soil with leaves and compost.

Clean and sharpen your tools. Think about what new stuff you will be growing in your nice, clean pots. Think about growing vertical gardens: maybe a trellis in a pot, maybe a flowering vine by your entry way, and most of all, dream, dream, dream. It is good for us.

Mark your calendar for March 13 and 14. Those are the dates for the Spring Festival. This is an annual event sponsored by Marion County Master Gardeners presenting perennials, annuals, trees, roses, etc., from surrounding Florida nurseries, Marion County Rose Society, Marion Bonsai Society, etc. Food will be available and youth groups to help carry your purchases to your cars. This will be a great opportunity for you to replace some of the plants you lost in this year's great freeze.
