10th Annual Ocala Open

Tying a course record with 10-under-par for the final day of the Ocala Open, shooting 30 on the front nine and 31 on the back nine in the final round of the 54-hole tournament is Dan McCarthy. On the final day, his total score was 61.

McCarthy hails from Syracuse, N.Y. now making his home in West Palm Beach, Fla. McCarthy, making 10 birdies, missed setting the all time course record by paring two holes with missed short putts. He shot a total of 195 for three rounds at the Ocala Open played for the past 10 years at Candler Hills Golf Course during this year's Ocala Open.

McCarthy was also the winner of last year's Ocala Open becoming a two-time winner of the event sharing this prestigious title with Travis Hampshire (2008 and 2013), Ocala's Ted Potter (2010 and 2011), and Rod Perry (2006 and 2007). McCarthy took home a check for \$12,000.

This year's Ocala Open is in its 11th year, but "in reality, this is the 10th Ocala Open with the first event being held in 2005 called 'The PGA Winter Tour,'" according to Rick Hendershot, owner and operator of the Florida Professional Golf Tour. "The present golf tour is the oldest in the U.S. if not the world," stated Hendershot.

The Florida Professional Golf Tour is not the professional tour most are accustomed to. It is a stepping-stone for the younger, less experienced players to move up in the ranks to be able to qualify where the larger money rewards are obtainable in the ever-popular PGA tournaments.

Recapping the three-day Ocala Open, there were a total of 144 players. The first day saw the players battling winds with gusts often reaching over 20 miles per hour. Those players starting in later groups fought the wind the hardest as the day progressed.

McCarthy teed off in the afternoon groups battling the windy conditions finishing five under, tied with six other players in second place, one stroke behind the leaders where two were tied for first place. There were 56 golfers who finished under par.

Day two saw the tournament players teeing off under cloudy skies with the wind again gusting to around 20 miles per hour. Five players tied for the lead after the second round scoring eight under par. McCarthy was one of the five. Eric Cole, last year's second place winner, was one stroke behind the leaders, tied for second with seven other players. At the conclusion of day two, 52 players made the cut. The cut was two strokes under.

The final day, Friday, March 18, began promptly at 8 a.m. with twosomes on number one and number 10 tees. The players started teeing off under cloudy skies with threats of rain hampering the

final day of play. Luckily, rain did not hamper the day.

With about one hour before the final, players teed off on number 18. The sun was shining brightly with a large crowd gathering at the final hole of play waiting for who was going to be the champion of the 2016 Ocala Open.

McCarthy shot a 195 (66-68-61) tying the Candler Hills Golf Course all time record at 10 under par for 18-holes. The second place winner, Jhared Hack from Sanford, Fla. took home \$7,600. Eric Cole tied for 11th place taking home \$1,325 and Ocala's Roger Rowland tied for 28th place taking home \$1,045.50.

Players in this year's tournament came from many locations throughout the U.S. and Canada. "The Ocala Open is the most popular of all the tournaments played on the tour because of the prize money," Hendershot stated. "Some players have participated in this tour many times while for others this tour is their first experience as a professional golfer."

The park is at the corner of SW 90th Street and SW 90th Terrace Road, directly across from the dog park - it is not fenced in and is open to all.

The outdoor park is pretty unique; two people can use most of the training equipment at a time, and several units may be

used by four at a time. So if you have a friend, or want to make a few more, what better way to build strength and your social calendar at the same time?

The fitness stations will address cardio, as well as strength-training. For example, there will be a two-person air walker and a two-person ski cardio unit. You will also see a lat pull-down and vertical press station, and a four-person lower body - strength-training combo. All together, there will be eight workout stations at the

park.

But wait! There's more! Along the SW 99th Street Road walking path, as you approach the Power Park, there will be some additional opportunities for fitness: two-person incline sit-up benches, four-person combo bar for upper body strength and stretching, and some balance beams. The Power Park is set among a copse of oak trees that will provide quite a bit of shade during those "warm" summer months.

On Tuesday and Thursday, April 5 and 7, from 9 to 11 a.m., fitness professionals will be at the Power Park to demonstrate equipment usage and answer any questions you may have. So, get out - work out - feel great!

Is It Legal?

SCAM ALERT: I'm getting a lot of phone calls from various area codes, some I recognize and many I don't. Today, I got one from area code 827. Apparently, it's from an area code that is not assigned to anywhere at all.

Here's my point: If I don't recognize a

phone number or an area code or both, I don't take the call. First and foremost, if it's a legitimate call, the caller will leave a voice message. Second, by not answering it, I give myself the chance to Google the area code to see where it's from. And even then, if I do recognize the area code because it's from an area code where someone I know lives but I don't recognize the actual phone number, I still don't answer it and wait to see if there's any message.

Let me tell you what I would never do: If for some reason, I did answer the phone, once the scammer started talking and I realized that I didn't know who it was or I realized that I was talking to someone who wanted to sell me something or who claimed he or she was my grandchild who was stranded in London or Paris or Bora Bora, I would never engage in a phone conversation with that person. I would just hang up and when he/she called back, I would let the phone ring and not answer it no matter how many times they called back.

And here's a tip: If you answer a phone call and after you say hello, there's no answer for more than there would be if there were someone on the other end of the line; immediately hang up. If, like me, you

still have a landline, make sure that you have caller I.D. and check it before you answer. Oh, and I also got an e-mail from someone with the "I'm stranded story." I didn't respond to that either.

Q. If someone buys an erectile dysfunction (ED) drug from (a Caribbean island port) and it turned out to be fake is there any legal recourse?

A. Probably not. And I would say the same if someone bought any other pharmaceutical from a foreign country or foreign port. ED drugs are safe if your physician who knows your health condition says so and prescribes them. However, it seems to me that the safest thing to do is first get a prescription for it and then buy it from a reputable pharmacy.

Q. I was involved in an automobile accident and wonder what attorneys such as yourself say should be done.

A. One of our attorneys handles personal injury matters. She says that the first thing you have to do is stop! Florida law requires that you stop. Do not leave the scene of the accident until an officer arrives and says it is okay for you to leave, unless, of course, you are injured and are being transported to a hospital in an am-

bulance. Tell the officer your side of the story and don't deliberately leave out anything. Do not discuss the accident with passers-by or with anyone other than the investigating officer. Call your insurance company and provide a description of the accident. If there's been an injury, it's wisest not to give statements to your insurance company until you've discussed the matter with your attorney.

Q. From where do you get the questions for your column?

A. I get them in different ways. I get them from letters, although, now, with e-mail, I don't get them that way very often. I get some from e-mail discussions that I have with clients or with folks who were on our website (colenwagner.com or gcolen.com). They are actually two different websites.

I also get them from meetings I have with clients or potential clients and sometimes, I read about or hear about a matter that I think is significant and I want you to know about it, so I will make up a question that is directly related to what I've read or heard. The truth is that once I draft a question, I throw away any written communication I've had with it. Also, I work up several columns at a time or fairly close together and as a result, I don't really remember from where I got a question.

Q. My daughter-in-law (in her late 50s) has a younger brother who wants to go on a cruise with me (and yes, I know what it's all about). Are there any legal issues?

A. I'm glad you know what it's all about because I surely don't. However, since you do know what it's all about, why are you asking me?

An Internet Spoof? Not So Funny.

Customers of the Bay Laurel Center Community Development District (BLC-CDD or District) should be aware of an Internet-based bill pay network with the business name "DOXO" that has used the name and domain name of the District in their communications to District customers. This may be an attempt to misdirect customers to make utility payments via the DOXO website.

DOXO appears to be a third-party billing service attempting to solicit memberships of unsuspecting customers by disguising themselves as a specific business, in this case the Bay Laurel Center CDD. Such marketing efforts may be both a misrepresentation and an attempt to confuse. Among other things, this misuse may

constitute a trademark infringement of the Bay Laurel Center CDD's legal name and logo.

The attorney for the District has sent a cease and desist letter to DOXO demanding an immediate halt to their communication activity and usage of the Bay Laurel Center CDD name and logo in their marketing efforts. The matter has also been reported to the Florida Attorney General's office.

In the very near future, the District will have its own designated electronic bill pay system. Once that is operational you will have the ability to make your utility payments via a safe and secure URL located on the authorized Bay Laurel Center CDD website. Stay tuned for further details.

The 10th annual Ocala Open at Candler Hills Golf Course was a huge success! Many, many thanks to the volunteers, employees, residents, vendors and sponsors who helped make this year's Ocala Open, our 10th, the best yet. This type of event couldn't be done without this great support.

We had 144 players in the field for the first two days of the Open and 52 when the field was narrowed down on the third and final day of play. We are very thankful for the beautiful weather for all three days of tournament play. Congratulations to Dan McCarthy who won the first place prize of \$12,000 for a second year in a row.

We were able to raise \$63,000 for charity - Hospice of Marion County, Inc., and Interfaith Emergency Services. Both received \$31,500 each and both are such a benefit to our community. We sincerely appreciate the continued support and look forward to doing it all again next year.

Cigarette Butts

We recently experienced a fire outside of The Club at Candler Hills and it was totally preventable. Please do not flick

your ashes or cigarette butts into the landscape or yards. It has been very dry, and it doesn't take much to start a fire. There are cigarette butt disposal containers located all over the community, and we ask that you please dispose of your butts properly.

Water Restrictions Change

Now that we are observing daylight-saving time, watering may return to twice per week. It is recommended that you check your irrigation system for proper coverage, leaks and head adjustment if you are not already doing so monthly. Your irrigation system should be set to water half to three-quarters of an inch each watering application. If you have not checked your rain sensor lately, please take time to make sure it is functioning properly. Not maintaining the irrigation system may have a negative impact on the lawn, and stressed grass attracts weeds, disease and insects. Please refer to otowinfo.com for your specific scheduled days and times.

Indigo East Walking Trail

A reminder that the Indigo East walking trail is for walking traffic only. It is not designed to be driven on by vehicles or golf carts. We appreciate your help in preventing damage to the walking path.

Golf Cart Lanes

A resident recently asked that I remind all regarding use of the roadway and that residents also remind guests as well. Golf cart lanes are multi-purpose lanes for carts, bicycles and pedestrians. We encourage all users to be considerate of others and remind all that the rules of the road apply. The Florida Handbook on who has the right-of-way and safety rules for pedestrians is quoted below:

- Right-of-way: Right-of-way rules tell you who goes first and who must wait in different situations. And while the law only says who must yield (give up) the right-of-way, every driver, motorcyclist, moped rider, bicyclist and pedestrian must do everything possible to avoid a crash.
- Safety Rules for Pedestrians: While walking along a highway, always walk on the shoulder on the left side, facing traffic. Wear light colored clothing or use a flashlight to make you more visible to drivers at night.

Telephone Directory

The new community telephone directory is now available at the Customer Service office and you may be wondering what to do with the old one. Please dispose of it in one of the single stream recycling units located at the waste disposal areas throughout the community. Alterna-

tively, you could place the old directory in your car or golf cart to use as a reference, if necessary.

Animals

This time of year, the weather is beautiful and many of our residents are taking advantage of it and also letting their canine companions enjoy it too. This includes car rides as well as walks through the community. If you are taking your pet with you on a car ride, we urge you to please not leave them in the vehicle, even for very short amounts of time, as it only takes a few minutes for temperatures inside the car to reach unsafe levels. Even though it may not seem like it is very warm yet, vehicles can become very hot, very quickly. Cracking a window is not enough to keep your pet safe.

Please keep in mind though that if you are in a backyard that is not fenced or out walking your dog, it must be on a leash according to the Marion County Leash Ordinance.

We ask that you keep your pet away from neighboring houses and lawns. You must also pick up after your animal whether it is in your yard, the common area, etc. All feces must be picked up and disposed

of properly as there are no locations on property where dogs are allowed that do not require the owner or walker to pick up after the pet. We appreciate your cooperation in complying with not only the rules of the community but the Marion County Leash Ordinance as well.

Coyotes

A resident shared the following advice regarding coyotes: Keep all pets, pet food and their water indoors. Under no circumstances should you leave food for them and safeguard your garbage. Don't spread bird food on the ground as this attracts birds, squirrels, rabbits and field mice. These are all high on the coyote's food menu and provide a food source that will tend to make them less afraid and more aggressive. Never leave your animals outdoors without being on a leash and accompanied by you. If you are caught out and see a coyote, always shout at them should they seem aggressive, and return inside as quickly as possible. Keep your animals close and do not allow them to be far from you on expanded leashes. Following these suggestions will help keep you and your pet safe.

Residents Provide Strong Voter Turnout

The tax measure to increase the sales tax from six to seven percent was lost in 33 of Marion's precincts, but not in the On Top of the World precincts of 4650, 4651, 4652 and 4653. These votes combined to support the tax increase 2,632-1,330, a 66.4 percent for "yes."


On Top of the World votes are what

helped the tax measure pass comfortably. Countywide, the measure won 51,181 "yes" votes, which was 55.01 percent of the total. The tax increase will kick in Jan. 1, 2017 will last for four years, and raise an estimated \$166.2 million. A portion of the money will be spent on building and repairing roads throughout the county.

Catch the Beat!

Let’s face it, when exercise is fun we are more likely to stick with it. In that column, I reported that the United States Postal Service (USPS) would be cutting back rates on certain types of mail in the early spring of 2016. Guess what? That time has come, and according to an article on the USPS website dated Feb. 25, the following changes will take place effective April 10: letter (one ounce) rate from 49 cents to 47 cents; letter (additional ounce) from 22 cents to 21 cents; letter (1 ounce) international rate from \$1.20 to \$1.15; and postcards from 35 cents to 34 cents. There are also commercial rates which will cost less and they can be found on the USPS website. Keep your eyes out for confirmation of this information in the local media.

One of our members, Dennis Niemira whose major focus has always been stamps on Spain and especially the Spanish Civil War era, decided to broaden his interests and find another area to concentrate on. Model Railroaders

The Model Railroaders recently held their first ever railroad operating session. This activity was designed to operate the model railroad in the exact same fashion as CSX or Amtrak would operate in the real world.

The scenario was developed by club member Jim Lynam who also served as the facilitator for the two-hour session. Jack Johnston, Paul Lewandowski, Aaron

Hertz and Charlie Vogel served as the engineers. The engineers' first goal was to locate specific freight cars and move them to a precise track location known as the "spot." This proved to be more difficult than expected since cars that were not required had to be moved out of the way and the desired cars coupled together. The next goal was to move the desired cars to the departure track and join the freight cars that the other three engineers had been assembling. Of course trying to stay out of each other's way was also problematic since there are only a few mainline tracks for use.

Once the selected cars had been assembled, the caboose (cabin car) tied on, and finally the proper locomotive connected,

the consist was ready for heading out on the main line. The two freight trains were joined by a double-header twenty-five car train consisting of oil tankers and coal hoppers en route to Buffalo. The Amtrak Silver Meteor express passenger train forced all of the freights to switch onto passing sidings and wait until the express had rolled on by.

After the freights arrived at their destinations, the engineers began the task of splitting the cars and moving them to sidings for transfer to a local industry, storage, maintenance or another west-bound train. And finally, the locomotives had to be sent for sanding and refueling.

Because of the operating session, the Model Railroaders gained an intense ap-

preciation for all of the problems that a real railroad must overcome to deliver their freight and passengers in the fastest, and more important, safest way possible. The engineers also developed a better understanding and appreciation for the design of the club's layout. Every turnout, every passing track and every siding is crucial to operating a successful railroad!

The Model Railroaders is always looking for new members, and you are welcome to join us. The layout is located in a room with entry from the Recreation Center's fitness center. Members work and run trains on Tuesdays and Fridays, from 2 to 4 p.m. Our next monthly meeting will be held at 9 a.m. on Wednesday, April 6 in Arbor Conference Center, Suite A.



It's the Law

The subject of stop signs has been reported in this column in the past but since it is such an important issue, I felt it necessary to address again. Florida Statutes, Chapter 316.123 vehicle entering stop or yield intersection states:

(1) "The right-of-way at an intersection may be indicated by stop signs or yield signs as authorized ..." In this column, stop signs is the subject being reported as there are many stop signs in our community and very few yield signs (if any).

(2a) "Except when directed to proceed by a police officer or traffic control signal, every driver of a vehicle approaching a stop intersection indicated by a stop sign shall stop at a clearly marked stop line, but if none, before entering the crosswalk on the near side of the intersection or, if none, then at the point nearest the inter-

secting roadway where the driver has a view of approaching traffic on the intersecting roadway before entering the intersection. After having stopped, the driver shall yield the right-of-way to any vehicle which has entered the intersection from another highway or which is approaching so closely on said highway as to constitute an immediate hazard during the time when the driver is moving across or within the intersection."

(2b) "At a four-way stop intersection, the driver of the first vehicle to stop at the intersection shall be the first to proceed. If

two or more vehicles reach the four-way stop intersection at the same time, the driver of the vehicle on the left shall yield the right-of-way to the vehicle on the right ..."

What this all means is that if there is a stop sign the driver must come to a complete stop. This applies to all motor vehicles, golf carts, and man-powered vehicles such as bicycles. The Marion County Sheriff's deputies are often patrolling our streets looking for violators going through stop signs along with exceeding the speed limits.

The speaker for our March meeting was CERT member, Tim Moore. Tim is a former certified security professional who worked in healthcare security. He also has experience in law enforcement and emergency services.

The topic of Tim's talk was "Crisis Behavior." What behavior might we encounter in patients when we are in the community following a disaster? Crisis behavior is an integrated experience and precipitating factors are both internal and external. CERT members have no control over patients' reactions. Patients may experience anxiety, anger or fear, which could depend on the current situation or on past experiences.

First, team members need to ask patients what they can do to help, while observing the patient's personal space.

Be mindful not to increase their anxiety by crowding or approaching too quickly. Members should use their judgment in order to keep the disaster scene safe.

We are always happy to welcome new members to our team, so please consider participating in this service organization and giving back to your community. Our next regular meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, April 12.

**Genealogical
Society**

We would like to welcome our 10 new members who joined our club as a result of the Club Fair in January.

Do you know why you have a surname (family or last name)? Until the 13th century, most people only had a first or given (personal) name. The use of surnames became universal in Europe during the 1400 and 1500s except in Scandinavian countries, which didn't become standardized until about 1900.

European surnames are classified under five categories:

1. Patronymics: forming of a surname from the father's given name or sometimes metronymic, less frequently from the mother's given name
2. Occupational name;
3. Location (toponymic) name;
4. Nickname; or
5. Ornamental name.

Occupational names include Smith, Miller, Farmer, Thatcher, and Eisenhower (iron worker). Location names derive from the name of a country, city, county, village, hamlet, farm, homestead, mountain or a river from which they came. "Monte" in Portuguese means "mountain" and "Gorshi" in Polish means "hill." Some surnames were based on appearance such as "Schwarzkopf" (someone with dark hair) or "Short." Ornamental names include "Morgenstern" (morning star) or "Safire" (sapphire).

In Ireland and Scotland, England Anglicized the Gaelic surnames. The common prefixes to Anglicized surnames were "Fitz," "Mac," or "Mc" meaning "son of"

and "O" meaning "descendant of." In Italian, a common prefix used is "de" or "di" meaning "son of."

Because most people were illiterate in the Middle Ages, the spelling of the surname changed because of the mistakes of public officials, clerks and priests who spelled the name as it sounded. Thus, after 500 years, there are many variants of the original surname. For example, there are over 90 Italian surnames based on the given name "Giovanni."

Today, in most western countries, the surname follows the first name. In some cultures, such as Hungary, Romania, Bavaria, Austria, South India, Japan, Korea, Vietnam and China, the surname is placed first, followed by the given name. In most Spanish speaking countries, the custom is to have two surnames, the first surname denotes the father's family and the second surname denotes the mother's family. Only the father's surname is passed on to the grandchildren. Polish surnames are gender specific. If a wife takes a husband's surname, which ends in -ski, her new surname will end in -ska.

The Genealogical Society will hold a board meeting at 9:30 a.m., followed by a business meeting at 10:15 a.m., on Monday, April 11 in Meeting Room #3 of the Hobby Building. At the business meeting, we discuss what members would like to have for upcoming genealogy presentations. We will hold an educational presentation at 10 a.m. on Monday, April 18, in Suites B and C in the Arbor Conference Center. Margaret Smith will give the presentation.

Our annual dues are only \$10 per person or \$15 per couple. At our February meeting, the members learned how to operate the special GPS system in the patrol car.

March was a busy month with the Sheriff's Town Hall meeting, especially for the residents on Thursday, March 3 to learn about current happenings within the Marion County Sheriff's Office (MCSO).

Many patrol members gathered at the annual MCSO Foundation Volunteer Appreciation Dinner on Thursday, March 10. They enjoyed seeing the many other (potentially 1,500) MCSO volunteers and share in the spaghetti and meat sauce, green beans, rolls and cobbler dinner prepared by the MCSO staff. They also enjoyed the entertainment provided by Jazz Man Steve Robinson.

How about some trivia? What is the difference between a street and an avenue? A street is a basic paved traffic link within an urban area; and an avenue was originally grander, wider and often lined with trees or other flora. But, over time, real estate developers indiscriminately called new roads avenues to make a more grandiose impression.

Where did the term jaywalker come

from? The term derived from "jay," a derisive term for a country bumpkin in the early 1920s. Jaywalker was not very well known, so pro-car forces actively promoted it, producing cards for Boy Scouts to handout warning pedestrians to cross only at street corners.

At a New York safety event, a man dressed like a hayseed was jokingly rear-ended over and over again by a Model T. In the 1922 Detroit safety week parade, the Packard Motor Car Company produced a huge tombstone float - except it blamed the jaywalker and not the driver: "Erected to the Memory of Mr. J. Walker: He Stepped from the Curb Without Looking."

It was a brilliant psychological ploy and the campaign worked. A few years later in 1924, "jaywalker" was so well known it appeared in a dictionary. "One who crosses a street without observing the traffic regulations for pedestrians."

Following the discussion groups, featured speaker Jack Levine spoke of the importance of intergenerational programs that benefit the young, their parents and their grandparents. He called for a change in the language of volunteering, calling it instead "time philanthropy."

Master the Possibilities, Director of Education Margaret Spontak closed out the conference with a thank you to all for attending and to those who made the conference possible, and said it was a call to action to all potential volunteers ... "time philanthropists."

"Looking back on the success of the conference," Ms. Spontak said, "The energy in the room was contagious. We hoped the conference would help participants connect with their purpose and passion. Budweiser Clydesdales

Hundreds upon hundreds of residents of Ocala converged at the Ocala Downtown Square in anticipation of the arrival of three large red semi-trailer trucks that contained the wagon and the famous Budweiser Clydesdales.

The famous hitch arrived for a special showing on Friday, Feb. 26 before visiting the Live Oak International Cup Qualifier and horse show being held at Live Oak Plantation during its 25th anniversary cel-

ebration. This is the third time the eight-horse Budweiser Clydesdales team visited Live Oak.

To the delight of those in attendance, the Clydesdale team drove the hitch around the square twice so everyone had the chance see them and take photos. The team then stopped the Clydesdales so folks could get a better look and ask questions.

The Clydesdales are a huge horse mea-

suring more or less six feet at their shoulders and weighing 2,000 pounds or more. They are known to have a good temperament and be very gentle. They were originally developed in Scotland's River Clyde area being utilized as a workhorse plowing farmers' fields and pulling their wagons. Today, the Clydesdales' most recognized fame and notoriety is pulling the Budweiser beer wagon with an eight-horse team along with a driver at the reigns and a Dalmatian dog at his side.

The trained Dalmatian travels with each team (hitch), which became a tradition in the 1950s. The dog was originally onboard the wagon to protect the team of Clydes-

dales along with the wagon's contents of beer while the driver was inside buildings making deliveries. Today, the Dalmatian sits next to the driver. The wagons, originally manufactured by Studebaker around 1900, were designed to carry beer.

The Clydesdales are housed in a historic brick and stained-glass stable that was constructed in 1885 at the Anheuser-Busch brewery complex in St. Louis, Mo. West of St. Louis is a large farm where 35 mares, stallions and foals are bred with at least 15 foals being produced each year.

The company owns a total of approximately 250 Clydesdales in various locations in the United States and is one of the largest herds of Clydesdales in the world.

There are three Clydesdale teams that tour the world and are housed near the company's facilities in St. Louis, Fort Collins, Colo., and Merrimack, N.H. The teams travel at least 10 months every year. There are 10 horses that travel but only eight are harnessed leaving two as alternates. Handlers provide each team with 24-hour care.

The famous horse team was first introduced on April 7, 1933 to celebrate the repeal of Prohibition. The team carried the first case of post-Prohibition beer from the St. Louis brewery in a ceremonial journey down St. Louis' Pestalozzi Street.

To be a Budweiser Clydesdale, the horse must be a gelding with a strong temperament, a good draft horse appearance and be at least four years old standing at least 18 hands (72 inches) at the withers when fully matured and weigh between 1,800 and 2,300 pounds. Some of the main qualifications are the color of the horse's coat, four white stocking feet and a white spot on the face.

The local Budweiser distributor, Tri-Eagles Sales, sponsored the event at the Ocala Downtown Square and at the Live Oak Plantation. Reportedly, they are the 25th top Budweiser distributor in the United States.





She didn't have to come; but she arrived anyway. RAKs are like that. Preparing, not yet frantically, for a 55-day cruise, Betty and I were tying up loose ends; lots of loose ends. Three weeks and it looked like we hadn't even begun to tick off the list. The monthly meeting of the Marion Big Scrub chapter of the Florida Native Plant Society opened my eyes to many more species than I had imagined. Now it was time to depart; but two species of

blueberries remained. I bought one and Patty the other. It's tomorrow; and a telephone call. "Ron. It's Patty. Did you leave some papers at the meeting when we were bargaining for the plants?" "I don't know. I guess so." "I'll bring them to you. What's your address?" About an hour later she arrives with the papers, sporting jeans, a broad-brimmed hat, flower, bird and butterfly t-shirt, and wearing gloves. "Knew you were gimpy and would need some help to plant the new blueberry; so here I am." Betty retrieved the plant and the shovel. I seized the opportunity to introduce the Garden of Weedin' and Patty to each other as we located what was probably the best spot in the yard - partial sun, acid-

loving community near the pine trees, azaleas and camellias. With Patty "manning" the shovel, gimpy me on my hands and knees pulling roots out of the way, we had the hole dug and the Glaucous blueberry, *Vaccinium darrowii*, in her new home. (She's a low growing, evergreen shrub with white to pink um-shaped flowers. Glaucous refers to the whitish covering on her leaves and fruit, which can be removed by rubbing.) Patty didn't have to come; she didn't have to plant our new native blueberry; but she did both. Random acts of kindness (RAKs) renew our belief that there's real hope! Speaking for the critters, us, and our world: Thanks, Patty! Join us as we grow native ...

Birders' Beat

The Unique Birders are offering a unique trip on Thursday, April 28. We are going on a kayak trip to bird island on Lake Rousseau to observe wading birds nesting on the island. If you're interested in going with us, please contact Margitta Claterbos at mclaterbos@cfl.rr.com by Thursday, April 21. For those who wish to go on this trip but do not have a kayak, please inform Margitta that you will need help getting a kayak. Our guide for this trip will be Sandra Marraffino of Marion County Audubon Society. Sandra began exploring wading birds on Lake Rousseau in 2007. She discovered a large diversity and number of migratory nesting birds on Inglis Island in

Lake Rousseau. In 2010, she was made aware of a large number of wading birds around bird island that were being driven off their nest by helicopters and airboats. Helicopters hover over bird nesting sites locating alligator nests and then airboats come in to collect the alligator eggs. Because of the disturbance this creates for nesting birds, Sandra wrote and submitted a paper to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission (FWC) in 2011. The title of the paper was "The Significance of Lake Rousseau for Wading Birds and Difficulties Encountered During Nesting Season." The tricolored heron in the photo is one type of wading bird that encounters nesting difficulties on bird island. Sandra will lead the Unique Birders to bird island via kayak. Since the FWC has become more aware of the problems on bird island, they made changes to alligator egg collection permits prohibiting egg collection in and near wading bird rookeries. Trips to bird island are important

to observe the current level of any disturbance to nesting wading birds. Please join the Unique Birders for this trip and be sure to get in touch with Margitta at mclaterbos@cfl.rr.com, if you are interested. The Unique Birders will meet

at the large tree in the Recreation Center parking lot at 8:15 a.m. on Thursday, April 28. Please bring a picnic lunch. Newcomers are encouraged to join us and experience the world of birds in Florida.

What's Cookin'

This impressive but easy cake keeps your guests wondering how you put the filling inside! It is versatile, too. Try adding lemon juice and lemon zest instead of vanilla or you can add dry cocoa powder to it and have a moist, chocolate version. Try adding mini chocolate chips to the filling or mix in some peanut butter. The modifications are endless ... let your imagination rule the kitchen!

Tunnel Cake

Batter Ingredients

- 3/4-cup sugar
 - 1/2-cup butter
 - 3 eggs
 - 1/2-pint sour cream (I use non-fat)
 - 1-teaspoon vanilla
 - 2 cups sifted flour
 - 1-teaspoon baking powder
 - 1-teaspoon baking soda
- Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs, sour

cream and vanilla; mix thoroughly.

Sift flour with baking powder and baking soda; gradually add to creamed mixture. Set aside while you prepare the filling.

Filling Ingredients

- 2 8-ounce cream cheese, at room temperature (I use low-fat)
 - 3/4-cup sugar
 - 1 egg yolk
 - 1-teaspoon vanilla
 - 1-teaspoon lemon juice plus the zest of the lemon
- Combine all ingredients and beat until smooth.

Put half of the batter into a greased Bundt pan (I use Pam spray). Then add the filling, top with the other half of the batter. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes or until set and toothpick comes out clean.

Cool in pan about 10 minutes before turning out onto a serving dish.

No frosting is necessary but you can dust with powdered sugar for a more finished look.



World Traveler

The island of Martinique lies in the eastern Caribbean Sea. It is a volcanic island that is about 43 miles long and 19 miles wide. The Arawak Indian tribe occupied the island at least 2,000 years ago, followed by the Carib Indians who migrated there about 1200. The two tribes did not get along, and fought each other for hundreds of years.

Christopher Columbus was the first Westerner to visit the island when he arrived in 1502. It was not until 1632, however, before the French colonized the island and established a western presence.

Unfortunately, French guns and diseases quickly overcame the indigenous Indians.

Even though it was a French colony, Martinique was occupied by the British several times during the late 1700s and early 1800s. The British gave it back to the French at the conclusion of the Napoleonic Wars in 1815. Interestingly, Napoleon Bonaparte's wife, Empress Josephine, was a Creole girl from Martinique. In 1946, the French National Assembly officially transformed Martinique from a colony into an Overseas Department of France. This status makes the island part of the European Union and gives the residents French citizenship, with all the rights and privileges attached therein. Being part of the EU, the Euro is the currency for the island.

Like the other West Indian islands, Martinique enjoyed a huge economic boom in the late 16th and early 17th centuries due to trade in cotton, tobacco, indigo, and sugar cane. Lack of labor, however, resulted in an active trade of black slaves from Africa in the late 17th century. The British eventually abolished the slave trade in 1833. Today, the economic engine is driven by banana exports and tourism.

Mount Pelée, located on north Martinique, is an active volcano. Its latest eruption, in 1902, wiped out the city of Saint-Pierre in only three minutes. All but one of the 28,000 survived. The single exception was a man who was protected by the thick walls of his prison cell.

The northern part of the island contains seven inactive volcanoes. This makes the landform mountainous. Local weather patterns coupled with these mountains cause enough rain to create a verdant rainforest environment. Instead of the traditional white sands, centuries of volcanic ash have produced gray and black sand beaches in the north. The southern part of the island, however, is relatively flat, dryer, and does have white sand beaches. This is where most of the tourist action is located. There you will find many developed beach resorts, fine, French/Creole cuisine, and lots of shopping opportunities. If you are more interested in hiking and nature, however, you need to head north. There you will find mountains, rainforests, indented coastlines and a diverse variety of flora and fauna.

High season for tourism is from December through April, so there will be large crowds and high prices. During July and August, there will be fewer people but it will be hot and humid. The best compromise time to visit seems to be in May and June. There will be fewer people there, and the prices will be significantly reduced. For those who wish to push their luck, particularly in a cruise ship, you always can go in September. Then you will be challenging potential hurricanes and tropical storms.

Overall, Martinique is a lovely place to visit with a wide variety of activities available to occupy your time.



Is Your Workout Still Working?

I've taken notice that several residents who use the fitness center regularly do the same routine over and over, week after week, month after month. Initially, most people feel stronger and notice physical changes in their bodies when they begin a new exercise routine, however as time passes they become complacent and wonder why they no longer are getting the results they were getting before. The solution might be as simple as changing your workout routine providing the body with a new challenge.

Think of your exercise sessions as placing different types of stresses on the body. Power walking is a good example. When you walk with purpose or power, the heart rate elevates and the body has to adjust to the stresses placed on it. Over time, the heart becomes stronger and more efficient making each stride seem easier and easier. That's when you might notice a plateau in your fitness journey. In about four to eight weeks you may want to start considering a change from power walking to something else affording your heart a new challenge and keeping it proficient.

Here are some ideas to follow when changing your workouts:

- **INCLUDE INTERVALS:** Typically our workouts are challenging and exciting at the beginning stages but then after doing them for a

while they can become routine and boring. Boredom is a common factor when workout routines become repetitive and no changes have occurred. To add variety, consider adding intervals of increased energy expenditure to your regular workout. For example, when walking on a treadmill, increase your walking speed or increase the incline for a short interval (30 seconds up to two minutes) then return to your regular routine. Repeat this several times during your workout. This will provide a new challenge for your muscles, heart and lungs. It's imperative to maintain good posture, form and technique when executing your

intervals. In order to increase the intensity and maintain good quality of movement try to achieve the following with regard to posture; align the shoulders, hips and knees on an imaginary vertical axis. This will keep your muscles engaged giving you the results you desire.

- **USE A HEART RATE MONITOR:** Heart rate monitors are a great tool for training; they keep you motivated and accountable. Your target heart rate is based on your age; once you determine your target heart rate range the monitor will alert you to staying within that target range (if you are not sure what your target heart rate range is come see me and I will show you). Heart rate monitors also provide a sense of accomplishment and bolster self-confidence.
- **CONSIDER PROFESSIONAL SUPPORT:** If you are bored, lack

motivation and are not getting the results you want, you may want to consider hiring a personal trainer. Trainers provide individual attention assessing your physical condition and generating an exercise prescription specific to your needs and goals. Trainers help to keep you motivated and accountable while assuring that your exercise is safe and effective.

FIT TIP 1: Don't expect immediate results, on average it takes four to six weeks to see physical changes from your workouts.

FIT TIP 2: Try to work out at the same time every day establishing a routine; you'll be more likely to stick with it.

FIT TIP 3: Invest in a pedometer and choose one that is enclosed, and the buttons are not exposed. These types of pedometers are more accurate. Aim for 8000 to 10,000 steps a day.



the muscles and joints. In addition to improved balance, the strength and flexibility gained from regular Tai Chi practice will make it easier to recover from a stumble.

- **PAIN MANAGEMENT:** Tai Chi has been proven in many studies to help manage the pain and stiff-

ness associated with osteoarthritis. The low impact movement will not overly stress knees or ankles. The weight-bearing joint activation (when movements are performed standing) signals the body to send synovial fluid into the joint, which acts as a lubricant.

- **BETTER SLEEP:** Tai Chi participants have been found to have improved sleep quality and length. A study out of UCLA reported that the sleep improvements are similar to those gained through drugs and/or behavioral therapy.

Horseshoe Club

We'll continue this month with more of the history of horseshoe pitching that we began in the March column.

As we have already discussed, horseshoes evolved from a game called Quoits, which itself had evolved from the Grecian game of discus throwing. The general rules governing the game of Quoits were established in 1869 in England where the aristocracy played the game. The English peasants copied the game but played it with horse or mule shoes rather than the much more expensive discs used in Quoits.

Both games made their way to North America and were being played during the Revolutionary War. US soldiers played the horseshoe version, which caused the Duke of Wellington to later remark that "the war was won by the pitchers of horse hardware." During the Civil War, Union soldiers played the game using mule shoes.

After these wars, soldiers took the game back home with them, setting up horseshoe courts in communities throughout the US and Canada. It is believed that the first horseshoe club was established in Pennsylvania in 1899. The first "world championship" for horseshoes was held in Bronson, Kansas in 1909 and was won by Frank Jackson.

In that first tournament, the stakes were placed 38 feet apart and extended only two inches tall. Ringers counted five points, leaners three points and close shoes one point. The games were played

to 21 points. We'll continue our history of horseshoes next month and explain how the rules evolved into what they are today.

Opera

In March, we had some new members for our Opera Appreciation Class who enjoyed Verdi's "Aida." We have three more classes this year. Our next opera is "The Marriage of Figaro" on Thursday, April 7.

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart composed this opera in six weeks in 1785. It is based on the play of the same name by Beaumarchais, which for political reasons had been banned from being performed. Librettist Lorenzo da Ponte succeeded in receiving permission from the emperor to base an opera on the forbidden play if anything that might offend an average the-

atergoer was excluded.

Wolfgang Mozart was born on Jan. 27, 1756, to Leopold Mozart who was the Kapellmeister at the court of the Archbishop of Salzburg. The elder Mozart was a good violinist and composer of many works. He knew he was no genius but he saw that his son was, and he proceeded to mold him into the boy he would like to have been.

By the age of four, Wolfgang was obviously a musical prodigy and could do things that most adults could not duplicate. His ear was so sensitive that he could tell a violin was tuned an eighth of a note too low. On one occasion, a second violinist did not show for a performance of several quartets that his father had scheduled at their home. Wolfgang sat in as the second violinist with no difficulty even though he had never seen the music.

Leopold Mozart did not have to be told that his son was extraordinary. When

young Wolfgang was six years old, he took him on a tour that reached the palace of the Elector of Bavaria in Munich. The news reached Vienna, which led to a performance by the youngster before the Empress Maria Theresa. He played a harpsichord concerto by Wagenseil with the composer turning the pages at the request of the miracle boy.

By the age of 11, four of his violin sonatas had been published in Paris. Leopold took his son to London to play at the Court of King George III whose royal Kapellmeister was Johann Christian Bach, son of Johann Sebastian Bach. At that time, the son was more famous.

Wolfgang wrote 45 symphonies and 27 piano concertos. We, however, are concerned with his 20 operas. Many scholars feel that "Lorenzo da Ponte," "Figaro," "Don Giovanni" and "Cosi fan tutte" are his best works.

"The Marriage of Figaro" was composed in 1786 and had its premiere on May 1. The theater was packed, and many of the arias were repeated so that the length of the production was almost double the three hours it should have taken. It was a great success even though Salieri tried to create a fuss but to no avail. He did succeed in getting the run limited to only nine performances.

The performance we are going to enjoy is from the 2006 Salzburg Festival with a superb cast. Ildebrando D'Arcangelo sings Figaro and Anna Netrebko sings his bride-to-be. Both are young and very believable in their roles. Nikolaus Harnoncourt conducts the Vienna Philharmonic.

I look forward to seeing everyone at 1 p.m. in Meeting Room #3 in the Hobby Building on Thursday, April 7.

The song was nominated for the Academy Award for Best Song in 1994 and reached number 11 in the United Kingdom and number 18 in the United States. It is featured frequently in the Disney attraction theme parks and parades.

Our featured chorus member this month is Jeremy Trout, our pianist. Jeremy originated from Ashland, Kentucky. He received his bachelor's degree from

the University of Phoenix and has worked in software information systems in various places, such as CSX, Merrill Lynch and most recently AT&T and Jackson Hewitt. Jeremy moved to Florida in 1990 and moved to Ocala in 2003 from Jacksonville. Jeremy not only plays the piano well but also is a great tenor as he has sung in church choirs and currently in the Big Sun Barbershop Chorus. Jeremy is a dedicated accompanist for our chorus and comes each Tuesday with his young son Daniel who turns the pages for him. We are pleased to have Jeremy as part of our chorus.

ShutterBugs Photography

In March, we went to HITS Post Time Farm for our field trip. Without the crowds, we watched the riders practicing and were able to walk through the stables and catch people bathing their equine and mucking stables. Great photo opportunities. Next month, we'll travel to Leu Gardens in Orlando.

Photo Tips: Adapted from "The Importance of Constructive Feedback in Photography" by Fauzi Anuar.

Most of us have received critiques of our work at some point of our life; the most subjective feedback is that directed at works of art and photography is no exception.

Many people are picking up photography as a hobby, resulting in the creation of photography-related forums with the purpose of sharing. And one of the popular subjects of these groups is critique, where a photographer posts his best shot and

hopes to get constructive, helpful criticism in order to learn from more experienced photographers.

The most important aspect about giving constructive feedback is to put it forth as your own point of view. Photography is so subjective that an image can gather equal amounts of likes and dislikes. Every one of us perceives beauty in our own way. The image-maker perceives beauty differently from the one critiquing the work.

We are all learning all the time and want to improve. So the main thing is not to belittle anyone.

If we don't have the eyes now to critique and comment on our current work, what better way than to ask those who have been there, done that. Caution: when you put your work out there, be prepared and open minded to receive comments and criticism from those who have not been there, done that. You can get ideas from even those who are new to the art of photography.

We should start off our critiques with preambles, such as "in my opinion ..." telling that whatever is going to be said is purely your own opinion, not personal. Choose nice words; courteous critiquing is to separate our good comments and

suggestions. Put across the good points first, then give your suggestions. Say your suggestions separately, so that the image-maker can keep all the positive comments and then learn from the critique. Do it with tact and humility.

Someone once said that we don't live long enough to be anything but amateurs. So when putting across what you think, say it like you know it, but make it sound like you know nothing.

The ShutterBugs meet every Tuesday at 3 p.m. in the Arbor Conference Center, Suites B and C except the second Tuesday of the month when we have a field trip. The third Tuesday we have show and tell (critiquing).
