Practical Preventative Home Maintenance

From June through October your air conditioning systems will be running full tilt. These systems don't operate by themselves without proper care and maintenance. Please visit otowinfo.com/homeowner-maintenance, click on maintenance videos and watch "A/C Maintenance" for a helpful short video on practical things you can do to service your air conditioning system to keep it functioning efficiently. These include changing the filters monthly and pouring vinegar into the main condensate pan to keep the main drain flowing without obstruction. Check the outflow outside near the compressor. If you don't see the cleaning solution coming out, the drain line is blocked and needs immediate attention.

At least once a year, have your air conditioning serviced by a professional. They will clean the coils in the air handler (in home) and the compressor (outside), as well as clean electrical connections, and make sure the motors are operating properly.

Enhanced Internet Service

Digital Communications Media (DCM) and Bridgenet recently upgraded the CMTS (the device that routes all Internet traffic) to a new Cisco cBR8 unit. The rapid expansion of homes and the booming number of Internet dependent devices residents are using had overwhelmed the existing unit's capacity. This new cBR8 increased downstream channels from 8 to 16, and increased bandwidth from 300 Mbps to 600 Mbps literally overnight. Very shortly, they will be able to deliver up to 1Ghz of service to customers. This new device assures substantial capacity for the future.

Most residents should see an improved level of service immediately. If your level of service is greater than 10 Mbps, some older modems may need to be swapped out to optimize download speeds. There is a roll-out plan that will take place in the coming weeks to facilitate the conversion of equipment and systems for our existing customers who may require a modem swap.

As with any new equipment swap-out, the distribution network will require some rebalancing to assure optimum delivery. This involves rebalancing the optical transmitters (lasers), adjusting signal levels at the nodes in the field, and a general system sweep to make sure there is no external or internal signal leakage that may cause disruption.

Bottom line is that DCM heard you and invested in substantial new infrastructure to meet the growing demand in this community.

Circle Square Commons

The large retail space is now being constructed as a one-stop physician practice to expand the office of VIP Primary Care, currently occupying Suite 15. We look forward to this being completed in late June.

Additionally, new storage space is being constructed in the parking lot area. This additional space will serve as operational support for The Town Square. No joking, we are still waiting for the one (yes one and only) plan's reviewer at the Marion County Building Department to okay a minor plan change. Once that gets resolved, we can quickly finish what we started.

at 10:30 a.m. Managing Editor Jim Ross, will discuss a topic that's making a lot of headlines these days - fake news. We all want to be there for this one.

The last presentation, "Digital Media - First on the Scene," on Monday, July 10, will also be in Live Oak Hall, at 10:30 a.m. Joe Byrnes and Susan Smiley-Height will give us an inside look at how media reporting has changed with the advent of digital media and high-speed reporting. The newspaper's online team works to get a story to us almost as fast as it breaks and then maintains a vigil on that story should further events unfold. It is a nail biting, robust operation that ensures we receive the latest news on our smartphones, tablets, Facebook, Twitter, etc.

The journalism series is a first at Master the Possibilities and we are fortunate to have actual journalists as presenters. After each class, they will all be available to take our questions. It is all very exciting and timely.

Is It Legal?

In addition to scam alerts and question and answer columns, we will include from time-to-time "dos and don'ts" and discussing certain topics/issues in detail.

DO make sure your anti-virus program and firewall are completely up-to-date. For assistance, join the Computer Club or check the Master the Possibilities catalog for related classes.

DON'T mention when you are going on vacation or leaving your home for any extended period of time on any social network (such

as Twitter or Facebook). Share your trip after you return home.

DON'T click on any links that are e-mailed to you (even from friends and family).

DO hang up the phone if you receive a call from someone claiming to be from the Internal Revenue Service, US Marshals Service or from some other governmental agency. You might be told that you didn't pay your taxes or that you missed jury duty or you broke some law and you must pay a penalty/fine immediately or the caller will send someone to your home to arrest you. Just hang up!

We get a lot of questions about wills. Let's talk about them. Your will should specify what you want done with the assets you hold in your name alone at the time of your

demise. To be clear, I mean only those assets that are solely in your name alone, and not assets that you might have in your and your spouse's or children's names. Nor do I mean those assets, which are set up in a payable on death mode at your bank or brokerage firm. So, it's only in your name alone with no beneficiary listed on the account or accounts that your will controls.

We usually prefer a will over a trust because wills are just as effective and much less costly than a trust. Also, if you set up your accounts correctly, so that on your passing, what's in the account goes directly to your beneficiary, we feel you probably don't need to consider the more costly trust method of estate planning.

Sometimes, I am asked about changing a will after it's been signed. Yes, you can change it. A will can be changed as often as you like. I try to suggest to my clients that after you've made one or two changes, you should simply re-do the will rather than make further changes.

By the way, the term for amending a will is codicil. If you do a codicil to a will, then when you pass, it's necessary that both the will and also

any codicil be filed in the probate court with the will. So if you sign a will and then you want to change something in it by using a codicil, just keep in mind that the original will and codicil both become available to all persons named in either or both documents.

Sometimes we see wills that have been properly prepared but then handwritten changes have been made. You ought not to do that because those changes are more than likely not valid and depending on the amount of the handwritten changes, they might even invalidate the will.

Once again, we are half way through another year. Summer is right around the corner and we are at the point when we all need to start preparing for the upcoming hurricane season, if we haven't already taken steps to do so. Mr. Colen's column this month has some great tips for preparing before, during and after a hurricane. We are also including a storm guide with all home delivered issues of the World News this month. Please take time to review and prepare.

Father's Day is Sunday, June 18, and on Wednesday, June 21, we officially kick off summer with the longest day of the year. We hope to see plenty of rain to get us through our hottest months and keep the watering to a minimum. And speaking of keeping watering to a minimum, the St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWMD) formally issued a water shortage warning to all 18 counties within its water management district. Since May 19, 2009, Marion County has followed the SJRWMD guidelines per an inter-local agreement between water management districts and Marion County. The primary purpose for a Phase I water shortage is to alert the public that watering restrictions could be forthcoming. Be sure to read Phillip Hisey's column this month regarding the drought we have been experiencing and what the water shortage warning means for our community.

Power Outages

With summer comes much needed rain (we hope!) and the occasional power outage. Please keep in mind that, when we have power outages, it is a good idea to check your irrigation clock to ensure that it is still on the correct setting. Many times a power surge or outage may cause the clock to revert to its original settings. If the settings are not checked, you may be watering too much or not enough. Either outcome will have unpleasant economic consequences for you!

Dogs in Vehicles

I know I touch on this subject every summer but I continue to do so because we have so many new residents who are experiencing their first summer in Florida. With that being said, I'd like to remind all dog owners never to leave their animal(s) in closed up vehicles even with the windows cracked. Even though it may not feel very warm to you, temperatures rise very quickly in closed up vehicles, and it only takes a matter of minutes for your animal to get distressed and even perish. Five minutes can turn into 10, and it may be too late when you return to your car. I can't say it enough, please do not leave your animals in vehicles unattended.

Years ago a resident advised that the Marion County Sheriff's Office (MCSO) and the Ocala Police Department (OPD) will send out a deputy or an officer if you encounter this type of situation and cannot locate the owner of the vehicle. The MCSO can be reached at (352) 732-9111 and OPD at (352) 369-7000.

Repaints in Candler Hills and Indigo East

Reminder for all Candler Hills and Indigo East residents, it may be time for a repaint of your home. Although it depends on the technology of the paint used, we recommend that homes be painted about seven years after the original closing date. If you decide it's time to repaint your home, please remember that any changes to the exte-

rior of the home must be approved by the Architectural Review Board (ARB). You will need to submit a modification request to Customer Service and receive approval before you may proceed with the repaint unless you are planning to use the exact same colors.

Painting is much more than a cosmetic matter on the home. Paint functions as the first line of defense against moisture intrusion into the home. A quality paint that meets the builder's product specification is designed to not only resist water intrusion by wind, but also allows a minute amount of moisture to escape from the home's interior. Failing to maintain a proper exterior barrier on the surface of any home puts the owner at risk for interior problems in the future.

Proper preparation of the home's surfaces prior to applying the paint may be more important than the fresh coat of paint itself. Make sure the painter spends time upfront making the needed repairs to the surfaces that house-nibbling pests may have caused. It is also important that they scrape off any peeling paint and use top caulking materials and techniques to seal and protect your home before the new coat of paint is applied.

Visitors and Guests

Just a reminder, if you have a guest visiting, please make sure they know your name and address. Our gate attendants are instructed to turn away visitors who cannot identify whom they are visiting and where they are going. This practice protects all of us.

We hope your visiting family members and guests enjoy their time at On Top of the World this summer, and we ask that you make sure each guest understands and observes the community rules during their stay. Please be cognizant of your neighbors and the close proximity of homes. If your guests are arriving by RV, please make reservations at Customer Service prior to their arrival so that we may reserve a guest parking space at the RV park and have a guest pass ready for them at the gate if they are arriving during non-business

hours. Visitor spaces used over 72 hours do require a fee.

When your grandchildren visit we want them to have fun and make great memories while here. Taking them to the Recreation Center, Candler Hills or Indigo East pools (depending on the community you live in) can be loads of fun. As any swimming instructor will tell you, water can be extremely dangerous. So, please, please keep the philosophy of "safety first" and make sure that young children are watched at all times around the pool.

A resident must accompany all guests, and children must have adult supervision. Children 15 years and under may swim from noon to dusk during the week and with no time restrictions on the weekends at the pools listed in the paragraph above. Happy and safe swimming to you and your family.

Keep Your Pet(s) Safe

When you're not home, the safety of your pet(s) might depend on friends, neighbors or even strangers.

Pet alert decals on your home's windows and doors are a way to communicate to emergency personnel that pets are inside your home. This can prove to be important, because scared pets may hide and be left behind if nobody knows to search for them.

Wallet pet emergency cards saying you have a pet(s) home alone serve a similar purpose. In the event that you are injured while away from home, emergency personnel know you have pets in need. And if you're incapacitated, having designated someone as a contact will ensure your pet is taken care of.

Finally, have a pet emergency card with you and on your refrigerator at all times containing life-saving contacts - emergency veterinary clinics and poison control. This helps take the stress out of a potentially stressful situation.

walking paths, koi fishpond, water falls, outdoors dining and entertainment.



Landscape Update

April and May were very dry. Additionally, we are in the fire season. The Water Management District has imposed watering restrictions on all properties in Marion County. As if that isn't enough, the weather forecast for June appears to be con-

tinued dry weather.

The usual pattern is that the county is placed under restricted watering, and then and only then, does it begin to rain on a regular basis.

Aside from the drought conditions, June is a great month for growing a small garden and planting shrubs. That said, please remember that landscape modifications, just like any modification of the structure, must receive prior approval from the Owners' Association.

I am mentioning this in my column in the hopes that we can all avoid unnecessary consequences of flaunting the Rules and Regulations of your Association. The application process is very simple. Just stop by Customer Service to complete a modification request form. You will be asked to provide a detailed description of the work requested, a drawing of the affected area showing dimensions, the name of the contractor performing the work and proof of your contractor's insurance. A representative of the Association will inspect the area and the owner will be advised of approval, approval with modification, or denial.

Storm Preparedness

June is the start of the hurricane season and the time to start thinking seriously about dealing with the risk and inconveniences that may be encountered during and immediately after a storm. Your Association makes every effort to prepare for storm events by securing potential hazards, protecting buildings and Association-related assets, and making sure we have an updated recovery plan. Key personnel are on-call before and after a storm. Water and wastewater personnel are moved on-site to make sure that essential utility services are protected and the chance of interruption is minimized. Tarps (in limited supply) are kept on hand to secure homes in the event of roof damage.

Despite all of our efforts, much of your own safety and comfort depends entirely on you. To that end, I am reprinting key points to help you prepare for a storm event:

- Designate a "post-disaster contact" (relative/friend who lives outside the danger zone). Make sure each family

member has been given this person's address and phone number, and agrees to contact him/her following the storm.

- Keep on hand at least one week's supply of bottled water and nonperishable food items. You should also have available a manual can/bottle opener, a flashlight, and a battery operated radio or television (with an extra set of batteries for each). Make sure these items are readily accessible, so that you can quickly pack and evacuate.
- Maintain an up-to-date inventory of everything in your home. Taking photos and/or making videotapes of these items may help support the value you place on them. Also, consider storing valuable items at a secure location away from the house.
- Remove furniture from porches or patio and secure hoses and lawn ornaments so that these objects do not become dangerous or lethal projectiles during a storm.
- Stock up on items you may need to protect your home or to prevent it from being further damaged after the storm has passed. These items may include, but are not limited to tarps or plastic, hammers, nails and plywood.
- Make sure your family is trained on how to turn off damaged utilities.
- At least once per year, review your insurance coverage to make sure it is adequate and up-to-date.
- Don't forget about your pet. Some evacuation centers do not allow pets. Making arrangements before a storm reduces the anxiety for both you and your pet.

When a hurricane threatens, immediately take these steps:

- Refill prescriptions.
- Make sure your car has a full tank of gas as power outages may force gas stations to remain closed for several days following a hurricane.
- Store important documents and other valuable items in waterproof bags.
- Bring inside any loose items found around the home. Firmly tie down loose items that cannot be brought indoors.
- Protect or shutter windows.
- Have enough cash on hand to last at least a full week. Banks and ATMs may be closed for several days following the storm.

During a hurricane:

- Stay tuned to a battery-operated radio or television for weather bulletins and important information.
- Follow the orders of local authorities.
- Stay indoors in an interior room without windows (even if you have evacuated, inland locations may still be at risk). If conditions worsen, take shelter in a closet or bathroom and use mattresses to protect yourself.
- Don't assume the hurricane is over when the wind subsides. The calm may be the eye of the storm, and the worse part may still be on the way.

If the electricity goes out:

- Use a flashlight - not a candle or match. You do not want to take the risk of igniting gas from a broken line.
- Open your refrigerator only when absolutely necessary. This will help keep food fresh for as long as possible. After the hurricane has passed:
- Don't venture outside until local authorities have issued an "all-clear."
- Continue to check the radio or TV for post hurricane updates.
- If you have evacuated, don't return until authorities reopen your area. Remember, you may need proof of residency to return.
- Use a flashlight to look at damage. Allow only those people who have been trained, to turn off damaged utilities (e.g. gas) and disconnect damaged appliances.
- Beware of downed power lines and other debris.
- Wear sturdy shoes and clothing to protect yourself. People are oftentimes hurt more frequently after the hurricane than during it.
- Use only bottled water. Unless otherwise advised, assume tap water is contaminated and sewer lines are out of order.
- If electrical power was lost during the hurricane, be extremely careful before consuming food taken from your refrigerator. When in doubt, throw it out.
- Use the phone only for emergencies.
- Conserve water! Do not wash driveways of debris. If the power is out and you still have water pressure, it is only because the water plant is running on auxiliary power and with a limited supply of fuel.

Proper insurance coverage can help reduce the financial burden you may suffer as a result of a hurricane. Here are some additional tips that will make the claims process easier for you and your claims adjuster:

- Don't alter the condition of the damaged property. Take whatever steps are necessary to protect your property from further damage.
- Contact your insurance agent as soon as possible. Provide your agent or insurance carrier all information pertaining to your claim.
- Make a list of damaged or destroyed property. Your adjuster will be able to work more quickly if he or she has a written list to work from. Photos of damaged property may also be useful.
- Keep records and receipts for all expenses you incur. Supplies purchased to protect damaged property, or the costs incurred while staying at a hotel while your home is being repaired, may be recoverable.
- Try to be patient. Once you report your claim, your claims adjuster will respond as quickly as possible. Delays may be likely, as hurricanes often uproot signs and deposit debris on highways, severely impeding traffic.

It's Training Day!

Indoor cycling became a very popular type of group fitness in the early 1990s, and these specialty classes are still going strong. This interval style workout is a highly effective way to burn calories and train the cardiovascular system. There are several things that make cycling so unique and appealing.

Cycling is low impact, therefore it reduces stress on joints without compromising the intensity of the workout. In addition each participant controls their resistance and has the ability to modify the "ride" to accommodate their own fitness level. Here are five cycle tips for novice riders and newcomers. If you haven't ever tried this workout before, slide onto the saddle and give it a "spin."

1. Arrive on time, and if you are new arrive early! It's very important that you have time to adjust your bike and allow yourself a proper warm up. For newcomers, adjusting the bike will take some time and you'll need some guidance from the instructor. Arrive early, introduce yourself and let the instructor know that you need some assis-

2. Adjust the bike properly. There are three adjustments for indoor cycles: (1) the seat height (2) the fore and aft position of the seat and (3) the handlebar height. Each is critical for establishing good cycle posture and technique. Proper setup will ensure that your workout is safe and effective. Cycle instructors are trained to assist you with adjusting the bike; don't be shy about asking for assistance.
3. Maintain good cycling posture. Be cautious not to hunch over and round your back. This typically happens when fatigue sets in. Stay mindful of activating and bracing core muscles throughout the ride. This will provide stability for your back throughout the ride in all cycle positions.
4. Bring water and grab a towel. Indoor cycling can be a very challenging workout (although it doesn't have to be) and you will need to towel off and rehydrate.
5. Use proper resistance. Indoor cycles have resistance knobs that can be adjusted to simulate different road profiles; i.e. riding on a flat road or climbing a hill. Although the instructor will provide guidance on how much resistance to use for each challenge, ultimately

you determine what resistance to apply. There should always be a little bit of resistance throughout the pedal stroke, even on a light challenge or recovery. The goal is to keep the muscles involved at all times, rather than letting momentum take over and influencing too much velocity. You don't want to cycle with too much or too little resistance. A good rule of thumb is to keep the RPM (rotations per minute, which are displayed on the cycle's computer) above 60 and below 120.

Riders join us on Saturday, June 3 for a special class: Cycle Training Day! Coaches will highlight the different training zones and cycle

techniques to foster endurance and power. Come prepared for high-energy intervals, some friendly competition and lots of fun.



Community Patrol

Patrol member, Jim Miller arranged a tour of the water treatment plant on SW 90th Street for our monthly meeting. Utility Operations Manager Bryan Schmalz was our guide for the tour. He is employed by Bay Laurel Center Community Development District the company that takes care of all our water systems. Bryan demonstrated a knowledgeable understanding of his work environment. He also demonstrated enthusiasm and real pride in his work at the treatment

plant.

In his tenure, he has seen the plant increase in size. In the 1980s, the facility was constructed to treat 250,000 gallons of wastewater per day. In 1987 they expanded the treatment by 500,000 gallons per day (GPD) totaling 750,000 GPD. Since we now have 12,500 residents and the plant also handles the wastewater from Stone Creek, the plant has increased in size to handle 1,250,000 gallons of wastewater.

This facility treats wastewater by means of a fairly complex system, of which I cannot explain in detail. All those lift stations you see around the community help pump the raw sewage to the treatment plant where it is processed.

The waste is broken down by microscopic bacteria and eventually purified with chlorine. This water is then used to irrigate the common areas in the community and the golf courses.


Bryan showed the members, with pride, how the wastewater enters the plant until the liquid and solids leave, and then departs the plant as very clear water. He also talked about the kind of debris that come in to the plant with the water such as, candy bar wrappers, baby wipes, tampons, used needles and syringes and even wallpaper. Of course all these solids have to be removed from the wastewater.

Every resident would benefit from a tour of this wastewater treatment plant to understand

what happens to the waste that goes down their household drains and what it takes to recycle this water for use in irrigation. In addition, touring our water storage system facilities is also an informative opportunity to understand what a wonderful water system we have in our community.

The next regular meeting of the patrol will be Monday, June 26.

two drills, one of which was a Marion County drill. We also had practice sessions on both triage and head-to-toe assessment. Behavioral studies following a disaster have shown that teams working together perform more effectively if there has been prior planning for disaster response.

Certified CERT members have a better understanding of potential

threats to their home and community during a disaster and can take the right steps to lessen the effects of these hazards on themselves and their neighbors in the community.

CERT training classes have been filling very rapidly due to an increase in CERT interest throughout the county, so it is not too early to apply for the next training class. To fill out an application go to mari-



Keeping It Green

If you didn't know it, we are in a drought. On Tuesday, May 9, the St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWMD) formally issued a water shortage warning to all 18 counties within the water management district. Since May 19, 2009, Marion County has followed the SJRWMD guidelines per an inter-local agreement between water management districts and Marion County.

The hydrologic reports indicate that flows were extremely low due to lack of rainfall. April was said to be the driest April since 1896; and the first four months of 2017 have been the driest in a century. The last time this extreme drought was logged was 1907 where 2.12 inches of rainfall was recorded from January to April. We are currently 11 inches lower than expected totals.

So, what can we expect? We can expect the water management districts to reduce allowed irrigation days to once per week. Also expect to see dry, crispy grass, and plants showing signs of stress and wilt. Those who do not follow restrictions will be easily noticeable as their lawns will look the best and remain green while the masses trudge through the drought conditions. It is our responsibility to conserve our natural resources as best as possible during conditions such as these.

What is the water management plan for On Top of the World's com-

mon area landscapes and the golf courses? The common areas are checked monthly to ensure leaks are repaired and excessive usage is curbed to a minimum. We monitor our monthly usages just like you as homeowners do and when we see spikes in the usage we investigate and make repairs. We do our best to catch all leaks but we also appreciate when our residents report when they see something is amiss. Please contact customer service if you spot a leak or broken irrigation head.

The golf courses run under a separate permit through the Southwest Florida Water Management District. Andy Jorgenson and his staff do an excellent job of monitoring water use, making repairs and following strict guidelines for Best Management Practices (BMPs). Common area and golf course water use is highly scrutinized by the management staff; and water conservation is always something On Top of the World strives to achieve.

How do homeowners achieve maintaining a beautiful landscape during the hot, dry months? First is to understand the type of grass you have in your yard. My phone rings off the hook this time of year with Sustainable Landscape Management customers and residents with concerns of their yards and dry spots. Zoysia will turn brown and go dormant and is the first to show signs of stress. This is normal; the grass is not dying as it appears but instead is going "under ground." The grass has an extensive system of rhizomes and roots that are water-storing chambers that allow the grass roots to survive on until normal soil moisture conditions

and rainfall returns. Zoysia is slow to recover so there may be some weaker areas but with proper maintenance, fertility, water and time it will recover.


St. Augustine on the other hand does not have this built in drought security system. When St. Augustine turns brown and the stolons die, the grass is dead and the area will need to recover. Good news; St. Augustine recovers very quickly and new stolons emerge and fill spots rather quickly. For both turf varieties, some areas may need to be treated for weeds, as bare spots tend to fill with weeds in between the turf grasses.

Irrigation usage was covered last month but it bears repeating for those who missed my column. For starters, are you applying one-half to three-quarter inches at each application? All too often we see many residents backing down runtimes on irrigation zones to levels that are not adequately applying wa-

ter to the turf. As per last month's column, run times will vary for irrigation system equipment, but on average a spray zone will need to irrigate for 20 minutes. Rotors should water for 45 minutes. The drip irrigation should water for 30 minutes to one hour based on how established the material is and MP rotators should water 90 minutes.

Maintaining your lawn's turf at a taller height will allow the grass to develop a stronger root system. Sharp mower blades will also help with drought stress by producing cleaner, less ragged cuts. Clean cuts cause less plant stress and water loss. Lastly, don't mow the grass if the lawn is stressed.

Work with your neighbors and friends and if you are unsure how to program your controller in order to comply with the mandatory water restrictions, please contact customer service for a list of approved vendors who can assist you.







Genealogy Society

On Monday, April 17, Ron Niebo gave a very informative educational presentation, "Ellis Island, a Gateway City."

Ellis Island was the first federal immigration station. It opened on Jan. 1, 1892 and processed approximately 16.9 million immigrants (70 percent of all immigrants during this period) until it was closed on Nov. 12, 1954.

Before Ellis Island was opened, immigrant ships would arrive in Portland, Maine; Boston, Mass.; Castle Garden (Battery Park), N.Y.; Baltimore, Md.; Savannah, Ga.; Miami, Fla.; New Orleans, La.; and San Francisco, Calif. The processing of immigrants and the laws governing this procedure were controlled by the individual states. Once Ellis Island opened, the other ports came under the control of the U.S. Immigration Service.

When the federal government acquired Ellis Island in 1890, it was only a 3.3-acre island. Fire destroyed the original buildings in June 1897 and all immigration records from 1855-1897. After the buildings were rebuilt, the island was expanded to 27.5 acres using incoming ships' ballast and the

construction debris from building the New York City subway tunnels.

Prior to disembarking for the island, all ships and passengers were quarantined and inspected for contagious diseases, while confirming each vessel's manifest and the immigrants completing an alien registration card. Once on the island, extensive interrogations and medical inspections were repeated. Questions asked: Why were they immigrating to the U.S.? Work skills? Marital status? Family/friends in U.S.? Religious and political connections? Literacy? Did they have at least \$30 on them? If not, they were held in detention until a charitable organization or friends or family gave them the money. Only two percent were repatriated (deported) and sent back. Rank did have its privileges. Those holding a first or second-class ticket received only a cursory inspection and were processed within an hour.

The island itself was a self-contained facility with a registration hall, processing hall, hospital, medical treatment, isolation wards, psychopathic ward, kitchens, laundry, dormitories, baggage storage, dining facilities for 1,000, power plant, morgue, church, detention center and staff offices.

The most talked about myth about Ellis Island is that inspectors changed (Americanized) the names of some of the immigrants. That is not a fact. Officials used the ship

manifests provided by the steamship companies. Many last names were altered by steamship personnel due to the disparity between English and other languages in the pronunciation of certain letters.

The Genealogical Society will not hold a board meeting nor a business meeting on Monday, June 12. We will hold an educational presentation at 10 a.m. on Monday, June 19. It will be an interest focus group workshop. Members will break up

into groups to discuss how to find records on their ancestors from a particular country or group of countries.

- 1/2 to 3/4 cup fresh chopped cilantro
- 1/2 cup chopped white onion
- 3 cloves of garlic, minced
- 1 whole jalapeño, quartered and sliced thin (include seeds for extra heat)
- 1/2-teaspoon cumin
- 1-teaspoon garlic powder
- 1-teaspoon sugar
- 1/4-teaspoon sea salt
- Juice of half a lime

Using a 12-cup food processor or blender, place all ingredients in food processor and pulse until it meets the consistency you prefer.

Refrigerate in a sealed container for at least one hour before serving. Serve with salty tortilla chips.





World Traveler

Located on the northwest coast of Scotland, Skye, or the Isle of Skye, is the largest and northernmost island in the Inner Hebrides. It is 50 miles long, and has an area of 640 square miles, which is about 40 percent of the size of Marion County. The population is about 10,000 people; fewer than at On Top of the World. Portree, with a population of about 2,300, is the largest city on Skye.

Archaeological sites suggest people were living on Skye as early as 7,000 B.C. The Norse Vikings conquered the land in the ninth century, and ruled over it until 1266. Powerful clans then took over. Clan MacLeod and Clan Macdonald were the first clans in power, followed later by the Clan Mackinnons and Clan MacNeacail. The ancestral home of Clan MacLeod, Dunvegan Castle, was built in the late 13th century and has been continuously occupied by the MacLeod family

ever since it was built. It is open to the public, and is a popular tourist attraction.

Skye is very mountainous, with 20 Munros (a Scottish term for mountains over 3,000 feet). Some of these mountains come right to the sea, producing precipitous sea cliffs. Loch Dunvegan, for example, is ringed by sea cliffs reaching as many as 967 feet in height. The breath-taking scenery, composed of very rugged landscapes, picturesque fishing villages, and medieval castles make Skye a photographer's paradise.

The main industries are tourism, agriculture, fishing, and forestry. Most of the farming, however, is restricted to very small farms. There is one distillery (after all, you are in Scotland), which produces a single malt whisky, and a blender company that produces three different whisky blends.

Skye has a relatively stable climate that is mild, wet, and windy. The record high temperature is only 80.1 degrees and the record low is 20.3 degrees. The monthly average high and low temperatures are 51.6 and 43.2 degrees respectively. So, if you do go for a visit, take a jacket! The average precipitation for the island is 53.1 inches, about the same as Ocala, but there is considerable variation through-

out the island. The rainfall in Florida varies quite a bit by month, with the highest occurring during the summer hurricane season. In Skye, however, the rainfall is much more uniform. So, when you take a jacket for warmth, make sure it is waterproof as well.

When you visit Skye, you step away from the hustle and bustle of modern society and back into a rural, slow-paced life that focuses on nature. The most popular activities for tourists include hiking,

biking, sea kayaking, and a variety of boat trips in the many bays and inlets along the coast. One of the popular hikes is to an area known as the Fairy Pools, an easy walk to a natural waterfall located near the village of Glen Brittle. If you don't mind seriously cold water, you even can swim in the pool. Other popular hikes include walking in the Quiraing, to the Neist Point lighthouse, and walking to an unusual rock formation known as the "Old Man of Storr."

Golf Tip of the Month

You're facing a tricky six-footer and you can't seem to pull the trigger. You're frozen which makes executing a smooth stroke nearly impossible. If this sounds familiar then I want you to try this routine when putting:

1. Address the ball.
2. Look at your target.
3. Look back at the ball.
4. Pull the trigger.

The less your mind wonders the better the chance for a smooth stroke. Keep this routine in mind next time you have that downhill six footer to win the match.



Tennis

As promised, four additional tennis courts were built and ready to play. On behalf of all the players and guests who attended the official opening of the new courts, I wish to thank management for the great catered lunch. This was a celebration worthy of remembering.

Among other things, we are planning on gathering as many people as we can to go to the new USTA tennis facility, which opened up in February. We may even be able to play there as well.

On another subject, warmer weather is upon us and you should be mindful of the necessity to be well hydrated before, during and after play. I will talk about this in my next column. For now I will give

you some good general advice to improve your game.

Tennis Tip of the Month

Getting to the ball, getting away from the ball in balance and ready to hit is the key for every player. "Float like a butterfly ... sting like a bee," Muhammad Ali's popular line was not referring to tennis, but the similarities are there.

Good footwork is the precondition for everything else in tennis. If you cannot get to the ball, your fantastic strokes won't help you at all. Good balance is necessary when you hit a tennis ball, just as when you hit a golf ball.

Have you ever miss-hit a ball, shanking it on the throat of the racquet? Of course you have. One of the reasons this happens is because you are not set comfortably at the point of contact. Your skills improve when you make contact on balance, feet on the ground, front knee slightly bent with your head motionless. Your footwork helps you reach this balanced position.

Whether you are an up and coming competitive junior or a recreational doubles senior, you must understand footwork and put it into practice. Here are some clues that will help you improve your footwork and move up the ladder.

1. Don't wait around flat-footed between shots, all good players use the bounce step to keep poised and spring into action. The message gets from your head to your feet faster if you get up on the balls of your feet, flex your knees a little, and bounce rhythmically between shots, or, at least, move your heels up and down alternately.
2. Do not walk but shuffle step to the ball. Many small steps are preferable to a couple of long steps; unless the ball is far. Good footwork means taking a number of shuffle steps to the ball so you can easily make an adjustment and be on balance.

3. Stride into the ball. Many players make the mistake of moving only sideways or parallel to the baseline to play the ball. Move back to move forward. Shuffle step back so you have room to take a good stride into the ball. Collapse your front knee before you hit the ball. Shuffle ... step ... hit.
4. After making the shot, slide-step back to your playing position. If you cross your feet or turn your back as you return to the center of the court, your opponent may hit the ball behind you. To keep that from occurring, move back with your shoulders and feet parallel to the net. If however you find yourself out of the court after hitting the ball, then forget about sliding, put one foot in front of the other and run!

Wishing you nothing but "good moves." See you around the courts!



Our spring season of play concluded with our final matches on Tuesday, May 30. The final results will appear in the July edition of the World News.

The 2016/2017 season brought a resurgence in interest for horseshoe play here at On Top of the World. Attendance has steadily grown each Tuesday morning and we were averaging over 20 players prior to having our snowbirds depart.

Our horseshoe facility consists of nine pits, so we are able to accommodate up to 36 players at a time, which means we have plenty of room for more players. The best recruiting tool we have is "word of mouth." If each of our regular players can convince one additional person to join us, we'll be at maximum capacity in no time and we would then be in the position of establishing a second date and time for play, opening up space for 36 more players.

With our community growing as it is, it's not beyond the realm of possibility that we could add a second day. The advantage to having two dates is that everyone would have a choice of times to play. Folks who can't play on Tuesdays at 9 a.m. might find the second date more desirable.

With the conclusion of play on May 30, we are now in our summer break. During the months of June, July and August, maintenance work will be done at the horseshoe complex as well as the replacement of some of the equipment we use. New shoes will be purchased, additional rakes and brooms for maintaining the pits during play will be acquired and new sand will be installed in all the pits. Some concrete work will be done on pits one through four and the wood liners for all pits will be replaced.

When play resumes in September, we'll be looking at a practically new facility. It should also be noted that these renovations should not interfere with the Cornhole Club's use of these facilities during this project.

Thanks to all our players for making the 2016/2017 horseshoe league a big success. We offer our congratulations to those lucky enough (and good enough) to take home podium finishes. You provide the inspiration to the rest of us to up our game for the fall, when our favorite game resumes on Sept. 5.

Bingo



Model Railroaders

Consider freight trains. Okay. Some of us think of freight trains as a burden as we sit in the car and wait for the passing train at a crossing. It just never seems to end. As a child it helped to pass the time by counting how many freight cars were on the train. Sometimes, to the dismay of our parents, the count would reach over 100. And, couldn't it please go a little bit faster? Another counting game as we waited was to keep track (pun intended) of how many different kinds of freight cars were included in the train.

Some of us understand the economic benefits of trains, as they are the most cost-effective means of transporting goods throughout the United States. Although the trucking industry is able to deliver the merchandise to a customer faster, three engines on a train pulling 100 cars replaces 100 trucks hauling the same load.

Every car on a train is there for a specific purpose. Each car has an origin, contents and destination, even if a car is empty and is being repositioned. It came from somewhere and is going somewhere.

When a freight train arrives in a major distribution yard, the cars must be evaluated and arranged for their next destination. Most of the cars will remain together and will become part of a consist continuing to another area of the country.

Many of the cars, usually either at the front or rear of the train will be "cut-off" by yard switcher engines and placed on a departure track that will be going in a different direction. Some of the cars have arrived at their destination and will be further divided into local delivery to businesses, stored, or destined for required maintenance. Again the yard switchers or light "road" engines will perform these tasks.

Therefore, a properly designed distribution yard must be able to perform all of these duties in the most efficient manner for monetary cost and time. "Through yard tracks" have an entry and an exit at each end and each will hold the cars continuing on to a specific destination including local delivery. "Stub yard tracks" only have an entry and

are for storing the cars for some future use. The engineers who design the yards must make them easy to use for the train engineers who use the yards.

The Model Railroaders are currently redesigning their yard area to incorporate the balanced use of both through tracks and stub tracks. Special thanks to John Hoth for the previous design, and Paul Lewandowski for the new design.

The Model Railroaders always welcomes visitors. The layout is located in a room with entry from the Recreation Center Fitness Center. Club members work and run trains on the layout on Tuesdays and Fridays, from 2 to 4 p.m.

Our monthly meeting will be held at 9 a.m. on Wednesday, June 7 at the Arbor Conference Center, Suite A.

Local State Parks

Are you looking for something to do this summer to entertain friends and/or family visiting from out of town? Florida has some of the best state parks at your disposal with minimal entrance fees. There are three parks within a short drive from On Top of the World.

The closest state park to our community is Silver Springs State Park. This park is a combination of two parks with three entrances. The main entrance is located on State Road 40 at 5656 East Silver Springs Boulevard, Silver Springs, Fla. The camping and museum entrance is located on State Road 35 at 1425 NE 58th Avenue, Ocala, Fla. The equestrian entrance is located approximately 1.3 miles east of the main entrance on State Road 40.

The first park with entrance on State Road 40 was privately owned and called Silver Springs Nature Theme Park dating back to the 1870s. The State of Florida bought the property and combined this park with the adjacent park (formerly known as Silver River State Park) creating the park, as we know it today.

The park, on State Road 40, is most famous for the glass bottom boat rides down the Silver River. The park and the surrounding areas are home to a colony of non-native rhesus macaques (monkeys), which were introduced to the park in 1938.

Activities at the park include bicycling, canoeing, kayaking, camping and wildlife viewing. The camping entrance of the park is home to

a pioneer cracker village as well as the Silver River Museum and Environmental Education Center. The center is operated by the Marion County School District in cooperation with the park and is open to the public on weekends and holidays.

Ellie Schiller Homosassa Springs Wildlife State Park, located at 4150 South Suncoast Boulevard (US 19), Homosassa, Fla., has been a tourist attraction since the early 1900s. The park, before becoming a state park, was a privately owned attraction where animal actors were housed and trained for television shows and movies. One of the most popular animals was "Buck," a stand-in for Gentle Ben in the famous TV series. Another was a hippopotamus by the name of Lucifer, Lu for short, who starred in John Wayne's movie "Hatari" along with additional movies over the past 40 years. Lu still resides at the park.

Another famous attraction at this park is the fish bowl where visitors can descend into an underwater floating observatory viewing both fresh and salt-water fish within the spring along with manatees during the colder months. Just about all animals and birds native to Florida are displayed.

The third park is the world famous Weeki Wachee State Park, located at 6131 Commercial Way, Weeki Wachee, Fla., where many television shows and movies were filmed.

The mermaids of the park have delighted visitors since 1947. Today, visitors can still witness the

magic of the mermaids, watch an animal show, take a river boat cruise, and canoe or kayak on the Weeki Wachee River. Buccaneer Bay offers a fun-filled flume ride for thrill seekers of all ages. The

538-acre park features a first magnitude spring and a 400-seat submerged theater for watching the live mermaid show.

English Shire Tour

A horse is a horse, of course. Some folks may disagree with that statement since there are so many different horse breeds. In April, a group of residents toured the New England Shire Centre, which is one of the largest English Shire farms in the world. Recreation Center Coordinator Maggie Richards escorted the group.

Some of you are asking yourself what is an English Shire? An English Shire is a type of draught horse that is one of the biggest and gentlest in the world. There are approximately 4,000 Shires in the world. This large horse can weigh anywhere between 2,000 to 2,400 pounds with a record horse weighing in at 3,300 pounds.

The Shire horse is extremely strong and can pull large amounts of weight. It is still used today for hauling brewery wagons. The Shire is also used in forestry and timber extraction as their hooves are far less damaging in sensitive areas. Both the Shire and the Clydesdale are similar in size and usage, both having feathered legs. The Shire comes from England while the Clydesdale comes from Scotland. The latter being more famous because of its notoriety as a promotional tool with a famous brewery.

The horses bred at the New England Shire Centre are from pure English Shire bloodlines. The farm currently keeps around 45 English Shires ranging from stallions, geldings, mares and foals.

Arriving at the farm, the residents entered a large barn to view the English Shires in their stalls. The group was then ushered to a wagon being pulled by a tractor for a tour of the farm's pasturelands and horses.

Those pastured horses have been down this road before witnessing spectators traversing across their home. The horses descend alongside the wagon running knowing that the wagon's occupants would provide juicy carrots, which they did. At the conclusion of the ride, these gentle giants would lay their head on some of the residents' shoulders, just like a dog would do

to its master.

One resident on the trip, Ruthann Briggs, has been terribly afraid of horses; never getting up close or touching a horse. However, after this trip, this lady saw how gentle the Shire can be and became less fearful. "It was the trip of my life," Ruthann stated.

One horse allowed her to pat the animal. She did not feed the horse a carrot, "because the horse was too big," Ruthann stated. One of the horses came up behind Ruthann and laid its head on her shoulder. She stated, "I was scared to death and those members of the group who witnessed this told me the expression on my face was worth the price of the trip. I wasn't scared or nothing!"

The farm has three donkeys in the same pastures as the Shires. The donkeys chase away coyotes looking for a free meal.


We will be planning for our next

Posing Your Family Portraits

ShutterBugs recently enjoyed Harry Boyajian's photography demonstration, which drew on years of experience in wedding, portrait, commercial and fashion photography.

We appreciated his time and expertise; we learned so much! Here are a few tips from our class to create your very own family portraits.

For a portrait of one or two people, turn your camera vertically. Since you want to try to fill the frame, as you add more people, you'll then turn your camera to the normal horizontal position. 70mm is a good focal length to start.

Letter W grouping.

In John Bauer's "Having Too Much Fun" portrait, our subjects are arranged in an "M" shape with two people standing and three people sitting.

In John Bauer's next portrait, "Letter W Grouping," you see three people standing and two sitting.

Using one of these arrangements, you can add additional family members. Smaller children can stand at the ends or in the center, depending on relationships.

In Harry Boyajian's large group example, you see a basic seated/standing grouping. Family members can be arranged according to height, but consider keeping family units together when possible. Children can be seated on the floor, or standing between chairs.

Don't crop too tightly when taking your image. If you do, you might rule out options for different sizes when printing.

When someone is heavy, turn them partially sideways. Put someone in front of them covering one side, then crop the frame tightly down their other side.

If someone is wearing white or another bright color, place them in the center, as it will bring the viewer's eye to the center of the image.

Review their poses: Are all jewelry, shirts/blouses arranged properly? Are hands visibly attached to their owner's body? Tilt heads toward the center. For individuals with a double chin, photograph from slightly above their eye level. When they look up, their double chin will "disappear."

We hope that Harry will lead us again with another class he has in mind ... "So You Want to Be a Real Photographer." We'd do it on location just like a real photography shoot, utilizing the environment and natural light as well as fill flash.




