**Thanks for Saying**

It's been great to get so many positive notes and comments from residents about the Patriotic Celebration on Fourth of July. This was another large event as we estimate that over 4,000 people attended or cycled through. This was down a little from last year, most likely due to the threatening weather and construction going on at Circle Square Cultural Center. It was a lovely evening and the brief rain cooled things down, but not the crowd's enthusiasm. The summer weather always makes for "interesting" planning as the operations team worked to make sure that everyone was as safe as possible in the heat and when the storm rolled in.

This was our eighth year of hosting this event, and I'm proud to say that the fireworks went off on time, without a hitch. This year's display was more spectacular than last (it gets better every year!). We appreciate hearing all of the positive comments that you share with us. We are already in the planning stages for year nine!

Speaking of being proud, I am very proud of our company's team who puts on this event, plus so many other events throughout the year. Employees from many departments come together to work as a team and make sure that you are not only entertained and wowed by the festivities, but kept safe as well. I sincerely appreciate all of them, as they make everything seem so easy.

**Insurance Update**

The fact that we are nearing the peak of the storm season is a strong reminder to all residents to check in with your insurance agent and make sure the insurance coverage on your home and contents is adequate. If you feel "lucky" and go without insurance or believe you can self-insure, you should reconsider because the cost of repair or reconstruction (especially from fire) may well put you into debt.

In the On Top of the World (Central) Owners Association, residential structures as originally conveyed are insured under a master policy in the name of the Association. The event deductible remains at \$10,000 per occurrence for any event including wind/hail related damage. Named storm deductible remains at three percent of the loss. Named storm events are subject to a minimum (community wide) deductible of \$250,000 for any one occurrence such as a named storm. With respect to flood, earthquake, and flood resulting from a named storm, all loss, damage, and/or expense arising out of any one occurrence shall be adjusted as one loss, and from an amount of each such adjusted loss there is a \$100,000 deductible.

The Associations do have coverage in the event of damage to buildings from sinkholes. This coverage has a \$10,000 deductible. It is worth noting that sinkhole activity may occur in several storm water retention ponds. This is not remarkable given the volume of water received and the concentrated weight imposed on the ponds in a very short period of time. The repair of such damage is a common expense of the Association and is not an insurable event inasmuch as no structures were involved. Fortunately, repairs and recovery are very straightforward.

Contents coverage may vary greatly depending on what it is you wish to insure. As a basic point though, you need adequate limits to cover furnishings, personal items, floor coverings, appliances, fenestration (windows and doors) and cabinetry. Direct your agent to write an HO6 rider that provides

Master the Possibilities has an exciting lineup of visiting speakers scheduled for the fall term! We are pleased to announce that in collaboration with the Kennedy Space Center, there will be an opportunity for students to learn about the "Future of NASA" (National Aeronautics and Space Administration) from 3 to 4:30 p.m., on Wednesday, Sept. 5, in Cypress Hall. This event is free and open to the public.

Gregory (Greg) R. Clements will be leading the discussion. He serves as the chief of the strategic implementation office, in the Exploration Research and Technology

Programs Directorate at the John F. Kennedy Space Center (KSC) in Florida. He is responsible for strategic planning and analysis; developing formulation plans to address research and technology gaps, technical challenges, and the needs of KSC-resident spaceflight programs; resolving inter-organizational strategic issues; and serving as an advisor and mentor for leadership and organizational development.

Greg has had a long career with NASA, starting work at Kennedy Space Center in 1985, and serving in various technical and leadership capacities focused upon telemetry

processing, real-time command and control for human spaceflight, test engineering, electronics manufacturing, technology development, project formulation and management, and strategic planning in support of NASA strategic goals.

NASA has recently released an update to their strategic plan that embodies a shift in national space policy to a U.S.-led, integrated set of activities with private sector partners for a human return to the moon, followed by missions to Mars and beyond.

In this engaging session, participants will learn about current accomplishments and forward work being undertaken by NASA to expand human knowledge through scientific discoveries and to extend human presence deeper into space and to the moon for sustainable long-term exploration. In addition, national challenges and economic growth will be addressed, as well as how the organization will optimize ongoing capabilities and operations.

Registration for the fall term begins on Friday, Aug. 10, and is available online 24/7 at [masterthepossibilities.org](http://masterthepossibilities.org). **Is It Legal?**

**SCAM ALERT #1:** Fraudsters and scammers can easily program their spam, scam and phishing calls to make them appear they are from your own area code and can even make some of the phone numbers the same as yours or as similar to yours. Your best practice therefore is never to answer a phone call unless your caller ID shows the caller is on your contact list or unless the number is one where you called it first. And yes, I do know it's easy

for me to say and it's not always so easy for you to let the phone ring and wait to see if there's a message left on your answering system. But in today's world you must try your best.

If you do answer the call and it starts off as a sales pitch or as someone wanting to discuss that \$250,000 loan for which you've already been approved (without ever applying in the first place) you must hang up at once. Then be very proud of yourself for doing it.

**SCAM ALERT #2:** Do not for a moment think that your personal hospital records or physician's records or even Medicare records are safe from hackers. It's quite possible that hackers can obtain sufficient information about a recent illness to be able to contact you as though they are from some agency that has some form of health-related service to offer you. Here's a best practice tip: If someone calls and asks if you are Mr. or Mrs. so and so, your response should be: "Who are you?" When you get the answer, you must ask, "Why are you calling?" (Note, do not give out your name until you are satisfied that the call is something you want to take.) If the caller persists in trying to get your name before provid-

ing you with any information, hang up.

**Q.** Which is more important for me to have: a will, a trust or a durable power of attorney?

**A.** Wrong question - based on what you wrote to me, you should be asking what role do these three documents play in your specific estate plan? What is the benefit of them to you? Do you need all or only some of them?

**Q.** How long should it take to probate someone's estate?

**A.** Great question. However, it's a very difficult one to answer without having a lot of information about the specific probate proceeding. We like to say to our clients that the typical probate matter might take between four and a half to six months. Nevertheless, there could be many perfectly valid reasons why it takes longer than that. Some, but certainly not all the reasons the probate of an estate might drag on are: a will contest, objections filed to claims made by some creditors, one or more of the beneficiaries cannot be located, or being located, they are negligent in returning signed documents that are required by the probate court. Of course, if a federal estate tax re-

turn must be filed with the I.R.S., there would almost assuredly be a time lag before the I.R.S., gives an estate clearance.

**Q.** My granddaughter passed away. Prior to her passing, she received an inheritance of an interest in a family farm (in a northeastern state) from her great aunt. My son and daughter-in-law's attorney said that the title to the farm needs to be cleared by means of the probate of my granddaughter's estate. How can a child have an estate?

**A.** I am so sorry to learn of this and I can only hope that the little girl's family finds peace. The answer to your question is that, yes, indeed, a minor child can have a probate estate and that child's estate must go through whatever estate administration is required by the laws of the state of her residence.

**Q.** My daughter is married to two different men at this time. She says it's legal in her home state. She also told me that she wants me to leave my estate to her and to her two husbands. Can I leave my estate only to her so that only she will inherit it or must I include her two husbands?

**A.** Whew! Well, first, being married to two persons at the same time is not legal in any state of the United States, and yes, that includes Utah. It's called bigamy. And yes, I am aware that it goes on anyway - it's usually called "sister-wives," although in your daughter's situation I suppose it's "brother-husbands." Either way it's not legal. So, you can leave your estate only to your daughter. However, what she does with it would be up to her I suppose.

for loss assessment coverage in the event of a special assessment from the Association to cover unforeseen shortfalls in losses. It is never a bad idea to see if that "loss assessment coverage" component can be increased.

There may be a possibility that

your carrier will offer a product called "extended protection" that, in effect, offers another layer to loss assessment coverage. It was pointed out to me by a local insurance agent that the carrier may require a letter from the Association stating that there are "no losses, unreported losses, and ongoing repairs" currently pending. We have drafted such a generic letter and posted it to otowinfo.com (click on Associations, On Top of the World Central, then arrow down until you come to "Association No Loss Let-

ter"). You may print this letter and provide it to your local agent.

**Be Mindful and Safe**

Summer is a great time to get out and visit family and travel around. Whether you go a great distance or stay local, please be mindful and aware of your surroundings at all times. The greatest protector of your personal safety is you.

August is also the ramp-up to the busiest part of the storm season. If you are planning a trip, please make sure you have storm-proofed your home by removing anything on or

around the exterior of your home that could become an object of destruction during a high wind event. This, of course, includes clamshell awnings (there are a few), umbrellas, lawn furnishings together with chairs and potted plants to name just a small sampling of the hazards that are easy to overlook (we may see them every day and these items just "blend in").

Remember, that school resumes in mid-August in most counties throughout Florida. Be especially careful when driving near school zones. Have a safe summer!

Please excuse our dust as we remodel. The temporary Customer Service entrance is at Suite 300.

**Lawn and Irrigation Maintenance**

We are right in the middle of the hottest and wettest time of the year. The good news is that we are receiving rainfall as I mentioned above. Residents with independent irrigation controllers should monitor their irrigation systems more closely to help save water (and money).

Remember one-half to three-quarters of an inch of irrigation twice per week is all that is needed to sustain the turf. With the summer rains, residents may be able to curb their irrigation usage by not irrigating full cycles during weeks that we see these rainfall amounts. Rain sensors should be checked to see that they are operating properly and also to keep you from overwatering. Fungus and other diseases thrive in humid, muggy conditions so keeping excess water from forming on your lawn is critical in controlling these pests.

August is a good time to check the battery in your irrigation controller. Some of the newer controllers have a lithium battery with an expected 10-year life; however, some of the earlier controllers have a nine-volt battery, which needs to be changed periodically. We recommend if your controller has a nine-volt battery that you change it out, as this is important because the battery sustains the clock memory in the event of a power failure. The Hunter Pro C and Rain Bird ESP controllers do not need a nine-volt battery.

Each summer we have controllers that are affected by the sum-

mer lightning storms, so we advise all residents to check their controllers after each storm to make sure the programming is set as it should be. Lightning storms can surge power into the controllers affecting the program scheduling, thus causing the controller to malfunction, which may prevent the system from operating correctly.

Over fertilization is another driving force with fungi and pests. If you are thinking of fertilizing your yard, check first with customer service and the management company to avoid over application of nitrates. Remember, the Association does have a fertilization program in place for On Top of the World Central homes.

Chinch bugs are opportunistic insects that will seek out stressed or dying St. Augustine turf, so it is important that the irrigation system is operating properly. Monthly irrigation checks need to be done to ensure the lawn is receiving proper coverage throughout and that there are no broken lines or heads.

**Power Outages**

If a power outage occurs, please do not call the Marion County Sheriff's Office or visit customer service. This will just prolong the length of the outage. Your power company must be called to restore the power and repair the streetlight that may be out or burning all day.

If you are in Duke Energy territory, please call their outage line at (800) 228-8485. For other needs, their customer service number is (800) 700-8744. If you are a SECO customer, please call their outage line at (800) 732-6141. For other needs, their customer service number is (352) 237-4107 or (352) 489-4390.

**Gutters**

Owner-installed gutters need to be regularly maintained by the homeowner. The gutter is the trough fixed under or along the eaves for draining rainwater from a roof. Gutters that become full of debris can cause water to back up under the shingles and rot out the decking, fascia board, and truss tails. If the gutters become too full of debris, they may pull away from and fall off of the fascia.

Proper gutter maintenance has a direct impact upon the overall appearance of the home. We

ask that you please take a look at your gutters and perform proper maintenance to prevent damage as described. Any damage repair or replacement would be the homeowners' responsibility.

**Scam Phone Calls**

Calls answered are met with a recording, "This is Duke Energy [& then the instructions for Spanish, to push 5], your electric bill is overdue and is scheduled to be turned off unless you pay the overdue amount of \$[random number on each call]. Please press [random number] to submit payment."

This is a scam and anyone receiving these types of calls should hang up immediately. Contact Duke Energy at (800) 700-8744 to report the call. The 'real' status of a customer's electric can also be verified at this time - customer should have their account number handy.

**Reminders**

If mail is put in your box that does not belong to you, please put it in the outgoing box at one of the postal stations. If delivered to your home, simply put the item in your mailbox with a note that it was delivered to the incorrect address and put the flag up so USPS will pick it up.

We have received several com-

plaints on the following: speeding throughout the community and going the wrong way on a one-way street. Please do not go the wrong way on the one-way street in Americana Village. It may be easier and shorter but it is illegal and potentially dangerous. We ask that you obey the speed limit on the speed limit signs posted throughout the community. The Marion County Sheriff's Office patrols our streets and will make a traffic stop within the community.

### Keeping It Green

First off, I'd like to say thank you for all of the congratulatory remarks made about the honor bestowed on me for the award for Agriculturalist of the Year with the Florida Association of County Agricultural Agents. The award is honoring and humbling but I am equally thankful for the opportunity provided to me here at On Top of the World.

So many of us are encouraged to be civically engaged within our own area of expertise. Our development practices and standards as well as our commitment to quality of life for our residents speak volumes to the mission of On Top of the World Communities.

Hydrawise continues to shine as a water-conserving superstar in the irrigation industry. We are using this new, app-based irrigation timer on all new homes built since February 2017 and those of you who have it are reaping the rewards everyday it rains. The watering triggers are by far the best thing since sliced bread. Each home comes preset with triggers we have found to be the best for this area. If you haven't explored the clock through the app, there is a great

deal of knowledge to gain just by opening the app and seeing all of the features and benefits.

To start with, the application allows users to run irrigation, monitor usage and receive usage alerts all from your smartphone. Even users not using smartphones have access through their personal computer or tablet. The app gives you real time data as to the clock's rain sensor, updated forecast for weather and flow usage (if equipped with the flow meter).

Within the app you will also find the watering triggers section. This is where the savings really take place. Through these watering triggers we have seen a 25-percent reduction in water use when comparing to Solar Sync.

The watering triggers are based on a few settings but the major ones are expected rainfall percentage from the local weather station at the nearest airport, how much rainfall is collected in the past 24 hours and how much rain is collected over the past seven days. The clocks are set to shut the system off at 80 percent chance of rain.

Some may ask, why 80 percent? From our experience here in Florida, chances of rain 80 percent or higher tend to lend themselves to be the best probability for rain occurring in the area. At 80 percent, the chance of rain is pretty accurate.

Residents with Hydrawise also

have the ability to upgrade on their own to an "Enthusiast Plan" and install their own personal weather station to link to their controller.

The amount of rainfall collected in the past 24 hours is the next watering trigger. How many times have you personally experienced or seen irrigation running the day after a rainstorm? Conventional rain sensors, while necessary and required by Florida law, are not the greatest in conservation. The watering trigger keeps the system off when total accumulated rainfall meets the set threshold set in the system. We have preset this watering trigger to 0.7 inches of rainfall. "Why," you ask? The University of Florida, Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences recommends 0.5 inches to 0.75 inches of water at each application.

The last watering trigger that I will speak of is the accumulated rainfall over the past seven days. Many times we see rainfall events over the course of a couple days that have clearly produced enough rainfall to adequately water our lawns for that week or possibly longer. But, with that, many times our irrigation systems equipped with an inefficient rain sensor are preset to run at the next cycle and the system runs just like it is supposed to.

The present watering trigger tabulates the total rainfall over the past seven days and shuts the system down based on having enough

water meeting the watering trigger. We preset this watering trigger at 1.5 inches of rainfall.

There is a great deal to learn and more coming with Hydrawise. The app-based system has cloud-based storage updates which are streamed in so the system is kept current. With Wi-Fi outages, the system will still run in a "stand alone" mode and, once Wi-Fi comes back, the system links itself back up. With power outages the same applies, once power is back on, the system will link back to the Wi-Fi and your programming in the "cloud" is still there.

What are your plans for these final days of summer? August and September can be odd times, and people may get the doldrums. The Marion County Sheriff's Office (MCSO) would like all county citizens to enroll in alertmarion.com. This system will provide alerts to your phone via call or text and/or to your email account. Alerts give critical information concerning a missing child or senior, impending storm warnings, accidents in your zip code and traffic issues in the area.

Another initiative of MCSO is the File of Life. This envelope has a magnetic strip and should be placed on your refrigerator where first responders can easily access it. Inside this envelope is your medical information including your medications, doctor's name, emergency contacts, medical conditions and allergies.

CERT members have given talks to two clubs so far this year: Active Singles in April and Community Patrol in July. We enjoy getting out into the community to let residents know about our mission, our training, and how we can help in the event of a widespread emergency.

We also bring along information on AlertMarion and the File of Life. You can get this information at the CERT table on Thursday, Sept. 20 during the Club Fair.

This year we also had four CERT members at the Walk for Parkinson in Shalom Park to render assistance, if needed.

CERT relies heavily on the Marion County Emergency Radio Team (MERT) to help us communicate with the Emergency Operation Center, teams in the field and between teams. During a disaster, MERT members assist with radio integration for hospitals, shelters and CERT teams, as well as from

the Marion County Sheriff's Mobile Command Center.

Help us help you! If you would like to become a member of our CERT and/or MERT teams, please contact Beverly Case at the Emergency Operation Center at (352) 369-8103 to receive an application.

Our next training class will be held in October, but please feel free to attend our CERT meetings, which are held the second Tuesday of each month. Patrol**

Members of the Community Patrol took a field trip to Firehouse Station 21 on Monday, June 18. Lieutenants S. Ramage and D. Cooper hosted us with Driver Engineer T. Muder plus two firefighters (C. Doyle and Linde) who took the time to present a very comprehensive picture of the day in the life of Fire

Station 21 to our members.

There are nine to 10 firefighters in attendance all day. They have seven paramedics. They average 20 calls a day or 6,000 per year. 80 percent of the calls are for medical emergencies. All of the firefighters have advance life support training.

Engineer Muder explained the ladder truck. This is a huge 78-foot long truck of which there are only three in the county. The ladder company does the search and rescues at fires and the ventilation; whereas the engine truck provides the hoses for putting out the fire. The ladder truck also carries three paramedics. This truck can provide patient care until an ambulance arrives. Firefighter Doyle explained the fire-rescue truck, which is a smaller truck than you may see in the community with the ambulance. They go out on all medical calls and structure fires.

The firefighters answered many questions from the group and offered these tips:

- Blinking porch lights are recommended because it makes it easier, at night, to find the correct house in an emergency. Unfortunately, the Lions Club no longer provides that service but local retailers have them for purchase.
- Change the batteries in smoke detectors twice a year. A firefighter will be glad

to come out, upon request, to do that for anyone who needs help with that.

- Outdated prescription drugs for disposal are not accepted. Check with the Marion County Sheriff's Office for their drug take back days.
- Old fire extinguishers need to be disposed of at recycling centers. Once a month, tap the bottom of the extinguisher to move the chemical to the top of the canister.
- The fire hydrants in our community are open and drained once a year.
- When an emergency vehicle approaches, drivers are encouraged to move to the right lane. The firefighters prefer to drive in the left lane.

Because of the equipment and training of our Marion County Fire Department the Public Protection Classification (PPC) rating is three, which is a good rating and good for our homeowner insurance.

Our next regularly scheduled monthly meeting will be Monday, Sept. 24. The Community Patrol will have a picnic meeting in August.



Paloma and Gary just sat there, astounded that the person across the table would say that. But it takes all kinds, they learned. Gary finally mustered up the courage to respond, "Gee, I am sorry you feel that way, but most people here feel not having a lake is a good thing. Lakes bring a lot of bugs, and alligators make their way to them as well." The person across the table who made the statement gave them a mild sneer, and then dropped the subject.

This is how members of the Circle of Friends program, deals with the many new folks who are considering buying a home in On Top Of The World. I asked Gary and Paloma Cor, who live in Indigo East, how they got involved with the Program. Gary said, "When we moved in well over a year ago, we were so thrilled with the condition of our

new home, and how nice everyone was, that I just wanted to go down to the office and shake some hands, which I did. A few weeks later I got a call asking if we would like to participate in the Circle of Friends program. Of course, we said yes."

"The program is a volunteer program in which On Top of the World staff chooses residents to meet with new guests who are here to contemplate buying a home," Paloma told me. "And the cool thing is the members get no training or coaxing ... we simply meet with the prospective residents and tell them of our observations. Nobody tells us what to say to these folks," she added. "If we don't know the answer, we very politely tell the guest that the next person they meet (usually a member of the new homes sales division at On Top of the World), can get the answer for them."

Gary and Paloma were from North Carolina. Gary just retired, and Paloma was the head of a non-profit. They were interested in a place in Tennessee, and actually took a trip out there. But they soon learned that a car was necessary to get around, and that the population was transient as it had time-share residents living there as well, with lots of kids coming and going. Not what they were looking for. So

three distinct volcanic cones, Shira, Mawenzi, and Kibo. Uhuru Peak is on the crater rim of Kibo, the only one of the three volcanoes that might erupt again.

Visiting Kilimanjaro National Park is a very popular venue. In addition to amazing views, many people also go there in order to climb to the summit. The ascent takes five to nine days using one of the seven official trekking routes. Contrary to the many technical

challenges typically associated with mountain climbing, the ascent up Kilimanjaro is relatively easy, however, it is not without its dangers. The most common problem is acute mountain sickness (AMS) that is caused by the high altitude. Studies have shown that more than 70 percent of the climbers will suffer from AMS. Park statistics document that a little less than half of all climbers reach the summit. By the way, beware of outfitters who advertise 95-plus percent success rates relative to reaching the summit. Believe it or not, but some of them actually fib a bit in order to attract business!

Depending upon which of the seven trekking routes you choose, the distance to the summit ranges from 23 to 56 miles. The most popular route is 40 miles long. People of all ages make the climb. Last year, Keats Boyd, at seven years old, became the youngest boy to reach the summit. A couple months ago, Montannah Kenny, also seven, became the youngest girl to reach the summit. At the other end of the age ladder, Fred Distelhorst, 88, and Angela Vorobeva, 86, are the oldest man and woman to climb to the summit. See, there is hope for all of us!

More impressive than the age range, however, is the accomplishment of Kristina Schoou Madsen of Denmark, a lady who reached the summit in six hours 52 minutes. Going her one better was a Swiss gentleman named Karl Egloff. Karl ran to the summit in just four hours 56 minutes, and then ran back down, completing the round trip in six hours 42 minutes! I'm not sure which route he took, but remember the shortest route is 23 miles - each way.

So, get motivated and start upping your level of exercise. You will feel better and you will thank yourself for a job well done.

A common question around here is "where are you from?" You might think you can tell we're Texans by our twang or drawl. Some of us have lost our accent because we had to leave Texas long ago. There are, however, some telltale clues that you might be talking to a Texan. I know I'm a prime example of some of these because my non-Texan friends and family have pointed them out - many times accompanied by laughter. We generally talk slow (and sometimes loud), so you should be able to pick up on some

of these. Texans have a tendency to emphasize the first syllables of words. For example we might say, "UMBrella" rather than "um-BRELL-a" or "IN-surance" rather than "in-SUR-ance" or "HO-tel" instead of "Ho-TEL." In classic Texas speech, there are a good number of letters you don't need. You can get rid of 'em. There's a case in point right there. Dispense with the "th" in them. Just say "em." We eliminate all the Gs on the -ing endings. So if you're wantin' to tell if you're talkin' to a Texan you won't hear those Gs. Texans like to use metaphors. Why describe things plainly when you can describe them using a mix of animals, nature and funny objects? For instance, the saying "all hat and no cattle" is a nicer way to

say that someone is all talk. We have favorite phrases such as "If it was a snake it would've bit ya" for an item hidden in plain sight. Another favorite is "This ain't my first rodeo" meaning I've been around a while or I have experience. We also make up words or change the meaning of words. For instance "tump" is a verb, which refers to something being overturned; kind of a combination of tipped and dumped. "Quit horsing around or you'll tump over your milk." "Fixing" doesn't mean repairing, it means preparing. So you are "fixin' to" go to the store. (Don't forget about the dropped Gs.) Incidentally, the "fixin'" could also refer to food. "I'm gonna order a burger with all the fixin's." Then there is the linguistic faux pas that always gets a hoot from

my non-Texan kin-folks - "might could." For us it's a better way of saying "might be able," as in "We might could go to the dance on Friday night." This is just a small sampling of clues you can use to spot a Texan. If you're a Texan reading this and saying to yourself "that don't apply to me" don't have a conniption. (For you non-Texans, that's a fit, or getting all worked up over something.) I know some of these clues don't necessarily apply to all of us. After all we're from a really big state with many different regions. But I bet whatever part of the state you're from you'll have your own unique "Texanisms." You'll be able to tell by the look on the faces of the non-Texans around you!



**Genealogy Society**

Peter Parisi

Ron Niebo provided the following summation of his presentation "Family History: Essential Basics (Part 1)" from Monday, June 18.

Ron's presentation reviewed genealogy fundamentals, support forms, and free sources of key information used to describe a family history. A future presentation will review genealogy software and support tools that are either free or fee-based (Part 2).

You determine how detailed your family history will be, what information it will contain and how

far back in time it will go. Will your family history be just names and key dates associated with your direct ancestry or will you include siblings, grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins, places and facts about their lives and why they immigrated to America?

Ron suggested you start by reviewing the "magic seven of genealogy:" you (one), your parents (two), and your grandparents (four). These are people you probably knew and that knowledge will help form a solid base for your family history. Focus on one person at a time and document your findings.

He stressed being consistent and uniform when documenting your research, with special emphasis on where you found it. The fundamental guidelines established for gene-

alogy concern how names, dates, places, and citations (documentation) are reported.

Start by asking your relatives questions and studying documents available in your family, such as birth, marriage, and death certificates, journals, diaries, letters, legal records, scrapbooks, remembrance cards, bibles, photo albums, travel memorabilia and personal articles. Review records available at state and federal archives and libraries, city and industry directories, religious organizations, courthouses, military service and pension records, cemetery transcriptions, land purchase and survey records, and newspapers.

Ron included a number of references to free online sources of genealogical information and also several sites where free genealogy training can be found. These links are listed on our home page under "Web Links."

Ron reminded beginner genealogists, don't:

1. Blindly accept family myths - validate.
2. Accept that your family name was always spelled as currently spelled.

3. Make conclusions without sufficient evidence.
4. Copy other family trees unless you researched and validated them.

On Monday, Aug. 13, we will have a membership meeting at 9:30 a.m. in the Hobby Building. This will be an opportunity for members to exchange new insights on genealogy issues, problems, or discoveries they have learned; and to share, and hopefully resolve, some of their "brick wall" questions.

On Monday, Aug 20 at 10 a.m., members will meet at the Family History Center in Lecanto, Fla., operated by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, to review their genealogy research capabilities and software.

Following the visit, attendees may then visit the genealogy resources at the Lakes Regional Library in Citrus County located in Inverness, Fla.

**Native Plant Group**

Volunteer: To give one's self in service or to something outside of one's self (partly my own definition).

Last month it was individuals in the Native Plant Group; this month it's actually a plant that volunteers.

Gardens are interesting creations. Some, like English gardens, are rather formal, planned, as we are wont to say, to the nth degree. Others are more open and "wild."

Our Garden of Weedin' is planned to be wild; better, it's planned to show off plants native to this part of Florida, in a contrived but approximately appropriate natural community.

Well, what do you do when you get a volunteer? Here comes a plant that arrives from who knows where and plops itself into your garden.

I know what we do. We observe it; get out the books and try very hard to figure out, by its overall form, its leaf structure, flower,

fruit, distinguishing marks and distribution, what it is. We even give a thought or two as to how it got there. In this case, since it's an oak, and oaks have acorns and squirrels love to hide (and eat) acorns, this volunteer oak is growing next to a pine tree frequented by lots of squirrels - you get the picture.

But what kind of oak? The leaves of this oak are larger than those of live oak. They're almost an elongated diamond, but the tip is squashed a bit and not pointed. Looking through the photographs of oak leaves in Gil Nelson's book, "The Trees of Florida," we spot one that looks promising, water oak, medium sized tree, leaves two to four inches long, one to two inches wide and "sometimes three lobed but more commonly spatulate."

What is spatulate? (Even spell check is confused). Look it up. I do. Shaped like a spatula. Okay.

You can see by the picture that the leaves do kind of resemble a spatula, a kitchen utensil used to turn or stir things.

The rest of the description fits, and it's growing near a low area where rainwater collects. That's it! Water oak, *Quercus nigra*, has vol-

unteered to be a part of our Garden of Weedin'. Welcome!

It's really nice when a plant adapted to a place finds such a habitat in which to volunteer to grow. It will add another piece to the fabric of a healthy ecosystem. To us, this is reason enough to continue to emphasize the use of native plants.





I have finally understood its importance and started doing it, and it has really helped me, and several others I have coached. This is actually exceedingly common among most pool players; we "know" what we should be doing, but for a variety of reasons we just don't do it.

I have finally concluded that it may be the single biggest reason why most players miss. It's amazingly simple really: we just don't take enough time aiming!

If the professionals get down and take 30 seconds or more aiming, with six or seven warm-up strokes, who are we - us mere mortals - to shoot in eight seconds with two warm-up strokes? The obvious answer is we can't, as even professionals can't shoot accurately that fast.

This is a simple tip, but it takes mental focus to execute. Don't just aim to "about" where the pocket is; concentrate and really dial it in. Do you want to improve your game by 10 percent almost instantly? Sounds too good to be true? It's not. Just take your time.

## Handmade Flyer

Hello from the R/C Flyers! We hope that the summer is entertaining and fulfilling for you. In my previous columns, I have invited our residents to try flying a model for fun. But that is only part of the fascinating hobby that is model aviation. Those of us who have been in the hobby for decades probably had to build our first (and subsequent) model from a kit before we could even think of flying it. Today's ready-to-fly models are better than ever, but there is a great sense of pride that goes along with creating the object with your own

efforts. Some of us continue that tradition of craftsmanship.

For an example, I have just completed a project that took 25 months to complete, much longer than a typical project. I started with a set of plans created by a well known modeler and had them reduced to 75 percent size so I could transport the finished model in my SUV. Since there were no ready-made parts available, I had to cut out all parts from stock materials. I had to plan the construction sequence so that I could get all of the parts together without conflicts.

And I had to create a surface finish to resemble the real airplane.

The result is highly satisfying. Nowhere else is a model like the one I created with my own efforts. My friends and I are now in the process of working out the "bugs" that are typical of most, if not all, new models. Hopefully, you will be able to see my creation boring holes in the air above the flying field often this season. Look for the silver-aluminum P-38 Lightning WWII fighter.

Those who enjoy building things have a place in our hobby. If this is something that interests you there is a lot of support in the club. Come out to the flying field and check out what we are doing. It might be just what you need for a fulfilling hobby.

Changes are coming! Modernized rules that impact golf equipment, balls in play and areas of the course are scheduled to take effect Jan. 1, 2019.

Many of the new USGA rules are intended to speed up play. "Ready golf" will be encouraged, including a recommended 40-second maximum time limit to hit each shot.

Here are some of the most notable changes that will impact golfers at On Top of the World.

- You will no longer have to remove the flagstick on the green. Currently, if you hit the flagstick while putting

from the green, you incur a one-stroke penalty.

- When dropping a ball for relief, you'll do it from knee height instead of shoulder height.
- The time for a ball search (before the ball is declared lost) will be reduced to three minutes from the current five minutes.





**Tips for the Toes**

Fitness footwear plays an important role in your workouts. Your primary activity should determine the type of athletic shoe you need. If you do aerobics, you need a shoe that provides cushioning and support along with lateral stability. If you do equal amounts of cardio and strength and occasionally try other activities, you probably need a good cross trainer. It is very important to take care of your feet. Foot pain is not normal or inevitable with the aging process.

**FIT TIP #1:** Replace your exercise shoes regularly. As a rule of thumb, if you walk approximately 30 minutes a day or three to four hours a week (or exercise equivalent), you should replace your shoes every six months. If you walk more than that, you may need to replace them sooner.

**FIT TIP #2:** It is a good idea to have two pairs of shoes. The primary reason athletic footwear breaks down is because the material becomes wet with sweat and (1) the user continues to wear the shoes for a duration of time after the workout or (2) the shoes are worn a second time before completely drying out. Changing your shoes after your workout and alternating pairs will help them last longer.

**FIT TIP #3:** When trying shoes on, make sure the shoe provides at least one thumb's width of space from the longest toe to the end of the toe box. Then get up and walk, jump or run in them (whatever your workout routine consists of) to see how they feel under workout conditions.

#1776 diesel-electric locomotive pulling seven passenger-style cars. The train was full of the nation's most important documents including a letter from Christopher Columbus; the Mayflower Compact; the Declaration of Independence; the Bill of Rights; an original copy of the Constitution; the Emancipation Proclamation; the Gettysburg Address; the Iwo Jima flag; the German and Japanese surrender documents; and the original Magna Carta from 1215.

The documents were guarded by 29 U.S. Marines stationed full-time on the train. The Marines also served as military honor guards and as interpretive guides.

The Freedom Train's first public display was in Philadelphia on Sept. 17, 1947. It traveled 37,160 miles

from September 1947 to January 1949 and was the first train to visit all 48 states. The tour ended in Washington, DC on Jan. 22, 1949. It used 52 different railroads and stopped in 326 cities. More than 3.5 million people viewed its displays. The train stopped in my hometown of Oil City, Penn. on Sept. 20, 1948. I didn't get to view the train as I wasn't even born yet!

**Walking Speed as a Predictor of Health**

Many health care professionals now use walking speed as a health indicator. Thanks to an increase in recent studies on gait speed, we now know that someone's walking pace says a lot about the state of their health. It is becoming more common for doctors to incorporate gait speed as a vital sign for older adult health assessments. Studies indicate that slow walking speed is associated with a heightened risk for frailty, dependence and chronic disease, while the ability to walk briskly has been linked to better health. These study outcomes certainly present a good argument for picking up the pace!

The ability to walk quickly is linked to higher functional status in older adults. Functional status refers to the level of independence and the capacity to perform ADLs (activities of daily living), such as house chores, bathing, dressing, driving and using public transportation. Gait speed is regarded as a clinical marker of functional status in older adults. The reason that gait speed is such a good health predictor is that walking quickly requires a substantial amount of energy. Walking requires energy to move, control balance, as well as placing demands on the cardio-respiratory, nervous and musculoskeletal systems. Because the body requires all of these systems for survival, think of your walking speed as a measure of your vitality!

Walking quickly is not only a good health predictor it is also a great form of exercise! But just how fast should you be walking to reap the benefits? Here is what researchers have found:

- Speeds less than or equal to 1.3 MPH suggest poor health and functional status
- A speed of 1.8 MPH is the median walking pace for older adults (65 and older)
- Speeds greater than or equal to 2.2 MPH suggest healthier aging
- Speeds greater than or equal to 2.7 MPH indicate higher life expectancy

You can use the treadmills at any of the On Top of the World fitness centers to measure your walking speed. The best way to increase your walking pace is a two-part process: (1) keep your leg muscles strong with regular strength training and (2) walk outdoors or on a tread-

**Virginia City, Montana.**

**Virginia City**

Two prospectors from Bannack heading eastward towards the Yellowstone River, in what is today Wyoming, were forced to return after seeing a Crow Indian party. The pair had recently discovered gold near in a creek called Alder Creek. The duo could not keep their site a secret and after resupplying their needs, they returned to their gold bearing site with many others in Bannack who followed.

A mining district was established formulating rules about individual gold claims. The miners and prospectors decided to name

their community "Varina" after the first and only First Lady of the Confederate States of America during the Civil War. The community was situated in Union territory and was founded by men loyal to the Confederate. Registering the name Varina, a Connecticut judge objected to their choice and recorded the town as Virginia City. The town was the first organized township in Montana.

Virginia City became a boomtown within weeks with thousands of those seeking fortunes. The community was in a lawless region of the Idaho Territory with the exception of a miners court. With a large volume of wealth, travel in and out of the area was extremely treacherous with serious criminal activities. The only law in the region was the elected sheriff in Bannack who turned out to be the ringleader of the road agent gang. A vigilante group ended the criminal activity.

The Montana Territory was established out of the existing Idaho Territory by an Act of Congress and signed into law by President Abraham Lincoln in 1864. Virginia City was the first capital. The territorial legislature moved from Bannack to Virginia City in February 1865. The city remained the capital until 1875 when it moved to Helena, Montana. The first newspaper in Montana was published in Virginia City as well as establishing Montana's first public school.

In the 1940s, a couple started buying the town of Virginia City providing the necessary maintenance into failing and decaying buildings. The ghost town of Virginia City started attracting tourism in 1950 with many of the historic buildings being restored. Approximately 300 structures in Virginia City, nearly half, were constructed prior to 1900.

The historic district of Virginia City along with its close neighbor, Nevada City also a gold mining community, is currently operated by the Montana Historic Commission. Virginia City is the top tourist attraction in Montana.

There are 76 historic buildings and locations in Virginia City including three blacksmith shops, an assay office, a saloon and a bank. There are also 48 historical buildings and locations in Nevada City, one and one half miles down the road from Virginia City.

A popular ride touring parts of Virginia City and Nevada City, Montana is on the narrow gauge Gulch Short Line Railroad transporting passengers by rail to the nearby ghost town of Nevada City. In Nevada City, one can look at the only remaining dredge, one of many dredges used to extract gold from Alder Creek.

Virginia City and Nevada City are truly a living history museum of the old west.

# Old Grist Mill

There is an old fashion gristmill from 1876 in northeast Georgia. It utilizes water as a source of power but not with the traditional water wheel but with a water turbine. It powers the mill's grinding stones in the same fashion as the water wheel.

This mill utilizes water traversing down a 100-foot wooded raceway to turn the turbine. Water wheels were used for hundreds of years providing power but the migration from water wheels to turbines started back in the Industrial Revolution. Basically, a turbine utilizes the swirl of the water to turn equipment and uses a smaller space where the energy created spins a rotor.

The Nora Mill Granary is still an operational gristmill using the Chattahoochee River that runs in the foothills of the North Georgia mountains as its power source producing all kinds of corn- and wheat-based products.

Customers looking for the fresh ground makings for grits, corn meal, flours, pancake and waffle mixes, biscuit and bread mixes, pioneer's porridge and many other ground products flock to the mill to purchase their milled grains. The mill also sells all kinds of homemade jams and jellies, candles, along with cast iron cookware and other equipment.

"The mill's grinding operations are limited to weekends when more customers enter the mill," said one of the mill's family members. Everywhere you look family members are weighing and bagging grains as well as waiting on customers. A back door is open so visitors to the mill can step outside on a constructed walkway and platform to view the river and the dam that supplies the water to the turbine. Just below the dam, visitors on the platform can purchase fish meal to feed the largest rainbow trout ever seen. Of course thoughts run through one's head about the trout that measure up to three feet in length until a sign stating there is "no fishing" erases all pleasant thoughts.

The original builder of the mill was a gold prospector coming to this area near Helen, Ga. to make it rich. Unlike others who came for the same purpose, this prospector liked the area making the Sautee-Nacoochee Valley his permanent home. In 1902 a man, who later became governor of Georgia from 1927 until 1931, purchased the mill naming it the "Nora Mill" in memory of his sister Nora. The present miller leased the mill in 1980 and has managed and operated it ever since. There are presently four generations of the family working at the mill.

The mill is located on the main road leading into Helen, Ga., known as the Alpine Village of Georgia and home to the longest running Oktoberfest in the United States drawing crowds from all over the country and overseas.

Not long ago a man named Alexandre Renoir was painting in his California studio when he received a call from Nashville Arts Magazine for an interview. His surname is by no means a coincidence. Pierre Auguste Renoir is his great-grandfather. The very famous French Impressionist was his inspiration as well.

Alexandre's recent show at the Hendersonville, Tenn. Monthaven Arts and Cultural Center showcased his penchant for the palette knife, which he uses to create texture in his oil works. "My great-grandfather believed palette knives were only good for cleaning palettes," Renoir says. "But I think he would have approved of the textures I create with the knife."

He paints in a style that is rooted

in Impressionism, an approach that emphasizes sense and feeling over exact representation. Light and color are everything in his works and topographical details are hardly noticed at all. Working on four different paintings simultaneously, he'll work on one for a while, and then move on to the next. In all it takes Alexandre about four days to create one complete painting.

By the time he was born in 1974, most members of the Renoir family had long since abandoned the visual arts, turning to theater and film. Luckily his brother encouraged him to display his paintings, and his work was accepted by a publisher in 2004. His art is now represented by Park West Gallery, and he continues a fabulous family tradition!

Thinking about a new camera? Don't know where to start? Here are three broad categories of cameras for sale now:

**Point and Shoot**

Point and shoot are compact in size, lightweight, automatic, and the least expensive. However, it takes less sharp photos, lacks an ability to zoom in, and you can miss a shot waiting for the automatic focus when you push the shutter button.

**Digital Single Lens Reflex (dSLR)**

dSLR cameras are what many consider "professional." They're the biggest and heaviest, have interchangeable lenses and are the most expensive. Still, you get what you pay for: automatic or fully manual settings, an image stabilizer to minimize camera shake, and the sharpest images (barring user-

error).

**Bridge Camera**

And then, middle-of-the-road, you find a marriage of these two, called a bridge camera. Here, you can find a good camera for \$200 and up that's fairly compact, can have a high-powered zoom, and many other features that the big boys use. The one my friend bought even has the ability to connect to WiFi.

Once you determine the category you're interested in, ask around, and browse internet sites like CNET or Amazon for reviews. Consumer Reports offered a camera review in their June issue.

**Antiques & Collectibles Club**



After eating at Carmichael's Family Restaurant, my wife - who loved the orange rolls - asked if I could duplicate them. Here's my take on their famous recipe - you're gonna love them!

**Carmichael's Famous Orange Rolls**

1 small jar of Smucker's orange marmalade  
1 package Pillsbury crescent rolls  
Remove lid from orange marmalade and heat in the microwave - not hot. Be careful!

Place eight cupcake liners in a standard cupcake baking sheet. Put two tablespoons of the warm marmalade into each cupcake liner.

Add one rolled crescent roll (roll from the wide end) to each cavity on top of the orange marmalade.

Bake as directed on crescent roll package (8 to 10 minutes). Add a few more minutes if not slightly brown on top. Serve warm.

The Favorite Recipes Dinner Club suspended our regular monthly dinners from June through September. This is because many members head north or travel during the summer months. As such I would like to provide answers about our club that some residents have asked me.

The purpose of the club is for couple members to meet new people who enjoy cooking and entertaining people in their home. The club also provides the ability for members to enjoy eating dinners at different member's homes.

The club is not a gourmet dinner club. The idea is for members to prepare their favorite recipes. If a club member happens to have a favorite recipe that is gourmet type meal, they are always welcome to do so. However, those hosting another meal shouldn't feel the need to "outdo" past meals. Almost everyone has a favorite recipe!

Here is one I recently made. For maximum flavor, this recipe doesn't just roast the chicken thighs, it crisps the skin then braises the pieces in a super tasty mix of marinated artichokes, olives, sherry garlic lemon and thyme.

**Braised Chicken Thighs with Marinated Artichokes**

8 skin-on, bone-in chicken thighs  
Sea salt and pepper  
1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil

12 ounces of marinated artichoke hearts, plus ¼ cup brine from the jar  
1 cup of Manzanilla Spanish olives stuffed with minced pimiento  
1 head of garlic, halved crosswise  
1 lemon sliced thin  
6 thyme sprigs  
1 cup chicken stock or low sodium broth  
½ cup of semi-dry sherry

Preheat the oven to 375°F. Season the chicken with salt and pepper. In a large cast-iron skillet or black steel pan heat the oil. Add half of the chickens skin side down and top the pieces (not the pan with a pot lid) and cook over moderate heat until browned and crisp, 5 to 7 minutes. Transfer skin side up to a large baking dish. Repeat with the remaining chicken. Scatter the artichokes hearts, olives, garlic, lemon slices and thyme in the baking dish.

Pour off the fat from the skillet. Add the artichokes brine, stock and sherry and bring to a boil. Stir in one teaspoon of salt then pour the mixture around the chicken. Cover tightly with foil and braise in the oven for one hour, until the chicken is very tender.

Uncover and increase the oven temperature to 400°F. Roast the chicken for 15 minutes longer, until the skin is crisp. Discard the thyme. Transfer to plates and serve.


