#### Safety Check-Up

January is a great time for a safety check-up. The holidays are over, the family and guests are back wherever they came from, and it is just you and your home (finally!). Ask yourself a simple question: What do I do if ...?

Ask yourself, do I enjoy walking or biking in the community in the evening or early morning hours? If the answer is yes, do you wear reflective clothing, carry a flashlight for signaling oncoming traffic, or have proper red/white lights on your bicycle? I enjoy walking in the community in the cooler weather, and I am the first to admit that sometimes I forget to take precautions. Note to self: practice what I preach!

Another lifesaving question to ask is, "If I were to have a kitchen fire, do I have a fire extinguisher handy and could I use it? If I had a water leak into my unit, would I know what to do or who to call?'

If I am getting out of the tub or shower, is my bathmat absorbent and nonskid? Do I have a properly installed grab rail in my tub or shower?

Have I overloaded any extension cord with too many plug-in items? This is much more common than you think!

Do you have a first aid kit in the home? How old is it? Do you maintain an up-to-date emergency contact list? Do you remember where it is? When was the last time you checked it? Do you keep a clearly legible list of current emergency contacts, your primary physician, and any medications you are taking in a clearly identified vial in the refrigerator? You will also want to post a reminder on the refrigerator door that vital information is stored there. This can be a lifeor-death difference to you should emergency responders be needed.

#### **Recycling — A Primer**

We've all been there. An empty can sits on the counter and we're not sure if it's tin, steel or aluminum. Maybe it's even paper but looks like tin. Where does it go – trash or recycle bin?

In the above example, the can should get tossed in the recycle bin — all four are acceptable materials for recycling. Now, what if you just finished a large smoothie and had no idea whether it was any of the above. Do you recycle or trasn? when in doubt, say the experts, opt for the trash bin. Often, too often, drinks and take-out meals are served in Styrofoam-type containers. The word "never" comes to mind, as in never does Styrofoam go into a recycling bin.

Picture this, you're on the way home from the cleaners and you stop at Publix. Your milk, orange juice and can of tuna fish are put in a plastic bag. And then, since it's lunchtime, and you stop for pizza (pepperoni, naturally).

Once home, you take your clothes out of the plastic cover and off the wire hanger. You put the container of milk and juice in the fridge, and the can of tuna in the pantry. You then sit down, pop a can of beer and enjoy the pepperoni pizza.

Eventually, every container you bought will go into either a trash or recycle bin. What goes where — your guess?

Here are the good-guess answers: The plastic clothes cover, and the wire hanger do not go to recycling; the tuna fish can, milk, and juice container go into the recycle bin, as well as the box that your pizza came in. The can of beer - after being well drained - of course, gets recycled. The plastic Publix bags do not — best to return them to Publix. And if by chance, you finished reading "War and Peace" over your beer and pizza, do not toss Tolstoy into the recycle bin books, hard or softcover, are not recyclable.

It was also stressed by the experts at Waste Management and Premier, that all items should be free of food prior to going into recycle bins. "Food just really mucks up the machinery."

Surprisingly, aerosol cans are recyclable once they've been emptied, and the cover removed. The key word is "empty.'

Then there is something that the re-

cycling folks call "tangibles." These can be anything that will wrap around other items to be recycled, such as hoses, hangers, strings of Christmas lights, and electrical wire. These, and like items, can be extremely intrusive, and will often shut down the processing equipment and be untangled by hand. We were told that, "Just about everything in a garage will usually go into trash — or to special pickup.

On Top of the World management and residents take pride in practicing good husbandry, and it's up to every indi-vidual in our community to participate. Remember the general rule of thumb when thinking – recycle or trash – if it's a bottle, can, paper or cardboard, opt for the recycling bin.

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#### Is It Legal?

**SCAM ALERT #1:** The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) is warning about something called an "offer in compromise." This occurs when folks receive emails, texts, and, frequently, see TV advertisements, or hear radio ads, etc., where a taxpayer is led to believe a debt to the IRS can be settled for pennies on the dollar. The IRS calls these "OIC mills." There are technical requirements for meeting an offer of settlement and the IRS sees many instances where a taxpayer does not meet the needed requirement for settlement. To check to see if you qualify for an offer of settlement, visit www. irs.gov and search for the "IRS Offer in Compromise Pre-Qualifier Tool."

Look folks, if you see an advertise-

ment that such and such can settle your debt to the IRS, or to any company, for pennies, it's probably a scam.

**SCAM ALERT #2:** Most of us want to be charitable if we can afford it. We all hate to see veterans, children or animals suffering, as they are frequently portrayed in the TV, radio, or social media ads. Me too. But we live in different times than when we were young. We must question every request for money. So, if there's a charity that interests you, before you donate, try Googling the charity and what I often do is Google the charity and add the word "scam" after its name. We must be vigilant.

SCAM ALERT #3: Perhaps the single worst scam is the "romance scam." A widow or widower finds a friend on social media. The friend is kind, very sympathetic and says he/she has problems that are very similar to the widow/ widower. A friendship is developed over time – not a lot of time, though. Soon, the friend suggests going to a separate or private email or private social media page where they can discuss their needs in private conversations. Then, in one way or another and for one reason or another, the friend needs money. And money is sent because the widow or widower has come to need that friendship. The friend, of course, is a scammer, and a particularly slimy one at that.

I once had a client tell me that she knew she was being scammed but she had someone to talk to and she needed to keep that friendship for that reason. Folks who have never gone through that kind of loneliness can't fully understand it.

How do we combat this? If we know someone that is in that kind of scam, perhaps we can talk to him or her or warn the children or relatives? Beyond that, I guess I don't know.

**Q.** What is more important – will, trust or durable power of attorney?

A. I cannot answer this question because I don't have any facts to help me provide an answer.

This raises a good point: In order for an attorney, accountant, tax advisor, or financial planner to give someone advice on how to plan his/her/their estate, the person giving the advice needs facts, facts, and more facts. Your job, then, is to provide those facts. You should think about the assets you have and are they in your name alone, or yours with a spouse or child. You need to think what you want to happen at some time in the future, such as an incapacity or passing.

Note: It's quite interesting that you've added a durable power of attorney to your list. That's good. That's wise. My answer, a durable power of attorney is a critical document because if someone becomes incapacitated, he or she will have a document in place that can help.

**Q.** A lady friend of mine is a widow. I am widowed as well. She has been stepping out" with a married man and I feel this is wrong. I tried warning her, but she wouldn't listen. I am thinking I should ask some of her friends to speak to her and, I should inform her children, but I worry about any bad legal consequences. So, I am asking you for your advice.

**A.** "Judge not, that ye be not judged" – Matthew 7.1. Abraham Lincoln quoted this in his second inaugural speech, which many, including me, consider to be the best speech ever by an American president. Maybe, it's the best speech by anyone.

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



Adding amenities is always welcomed by residents, but it is important to remember that the added operational costs of amenities is paid for by residents through their monthly community service fees. Ideally, the timing of additional amenities paces with the addition of new homes to keep monthly fees in line.

#### **Commercial Construction**

As mentioned last month, The Town Square will be closed for the month of January due to construction to repair the pavement (the area will be fenced off). The work is expected to be completed in February 2024. All businesses on The Town Square will operate as usual. There will be designated walking areas to help you get to your destination.

During construction, dancing and live entertainment will be suspended for the month, but the Farmers Market will continue every Thursday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. but move to a temporary location in the northeast parking lot of The Ranch Fitness Center & Spa. Maps will be available at CircleSquareCommons. com or facebook.com/csctownsquare.

For the January shows at Circle Square Cultural Center, please utilize the rear parking lot as normal. In addition, deputies from the Marion County Sheriff's Office will be onsite to direct concert traffic. Maps will be available at CSCulturalCenter.com, or facebook. com/circlesquareculturalcenter.

The Recreation Center pool will be closed for use beginning Wednesday, Jan. 3, to refinish the pool, including the equipment and a new screen wall. Work is projected to be complete by March

The Landing and The Lodge at Candler Hills pools will be closed for about two weeks to do some required maintenance. This will occur after the Recreation Center pool project has been completed in March.

The Summit in Longleaf Ridge is in permitting. We anticipate having the permit in early January. We are currently working on budgets and contracting out this project. We are still on track to

start this in February. Completion date is estimated to be around the middle of

The Candler Hills Community Center is going to get a renovation this year. We are going to update the flooring, cabinets, and bathrooms. This project is projected to begin in April and will take approximately two months to complete.

The Balfour amenity planned for Candler Hills is still in rough concept design. We hope to be able to share more details on this project soon.

We are also working on conceptual plans for a new guard gate off SW 80th Street to replace the temporary construction gate house. This project is projected to start and finish in 2024.

#### **Construction Sites**

On Top of the World is a growing community with new neighbors moving in every day. Throughout these new neighborhoods, there are houses under varying stages of construction. We have a strong desire to protect On Top of the World residents and visitors from the potential hazards that can be found on a construction site. That is why we ask that all unauthorized persons avoid entering a construction site. An example of an authorized person would only be employees of the builder directed to enter the construction site, or employees of the contractors who are directed to construct the house.

As you drive around the community, you may notice "No Trespassing" signs posted at construction sites for new houses. These signs are in place in accordance with Florida Statute 810.09 (2) (d) 2. This statute states that the no trespassing signs say: "This area is a designated construction site, and anyone who trespasses on this property commits a felony." Florida Statute 812.014 (2)(C) 10, further states, "It is grand theft of the third degree and a felony of the third degree" if property of any value is stolen from a construction site.

The Florida statute is very strict for a reason. Trespassing can lead to injuries that are otherwise avoidable. Additionally, losses from job site theft impact everyone including the contractors and consumers due to delays in construction, increased prices, and higher insurance premiums.

Over the past few years, we have seen an increase in job site trespassing and theft that has impacted all stakeholders. This trespass notice not only covers the home site, but everything on it including the construction dumpsters. The Marion County Sheriff's Office takes all crimes very seriously, including construction site trespassing and theft, because they are concerned about your quality of life.

We encourage you to notify the Marion County Sheriff's Office or Resident Services if you see something suspicious going on in or around a construction homesite.

#### **Winter Weather & Shrubbery**

As December has been cooler than normal so goes January which can be a tricky month when it comes to the weather. We may have wonderfully warm days, cold nights, and an occasional hard frost. Do not remove seemingly damaged plants prematurely. Plants affected by the cold may surprise you with their recovery. Withhold pruning back until mid-April. There may be several more periods of cold and possible frost before mid-April. Pruning at this point will spur plant growth that is vulnerable to the cold. Rather, wait until mid-April to consider any pruning of owner added plantings. Central Florida generally experiences one cold snap with light frost between March 15 and Easter so be forewarned.

Lawns and shrubbery will continue to grow, albeit very slowly, when the ground temperature warms above 65 degrees. That said, watering requirements are significantly less during the cooler months.

#### **Personal Home & Contents Insurance**

Fire events or water damage are cautionary reminders for each resident to check in with your insurance agent and make sure the insurance coverage on your unit and contents is adequate. If you feel "lucky" and go without insurance, or believe you can self-insure any loss, please reconsider. The cost of repair or reconstruction, as well as loss of use (being displaced pending restoration), may well exceed the purchase price of your home many times over. It is the obligation of every owner to insure the contents of their dwelling, including loss of use coverage. Loss of use coverage will cover expenses for living and lodging should you become displaced. Displacement after a fire may be between six and 18 months!

This is a good point to segue into the limits of coverage that individual dwelling owners may wish to have. Contents coverage may vary greatly depending on what you own. As a basic point though, you need adequate limits to cover furnishings, personal items, floor coverings, appliances, and cabinetry. All carriers write an HO6 rider that provides for loss assessment coverage in the event of a special assessment from the Association to cover unforeseen shortfalls or losses.

In the On Top of the World (Central) Owners Association, buildings are insured under a master policy in the name of the Association. The deductible is \$10,000 for any casualty event per occurrence including wind/hail related damage. Named storm events carry a separate deductible of three percent of the total value at the time of loss, at each location involved in the loss, subject to a minimum (community wide) deductible of \$250,000 for any one occurrence. With respect to flood (rising water), earthquake, and flood resulting from a named storm, all loss, damage, and/or expense arising out of any one occurrence shall be adjusted as one loss, and from an amount of each such adjusted loss there is a five percent of location total insured value subject to a \$250,000 deductible per occurrence.

Residents of Candler Hills, Indigo East, and Weybourne Landing may be seeing higher homeowner insurance rates again this year. This is a state-wide phenomenon driven largely by insurance fraud. The latest flavor of which is storm related roof damage.

The scam works like this: A homeowner is contacted by an insurance adjuster offering a "free" roof replacement. They are then offered an "authorization form" to sign. That form is an assignment of rights letter to the roofer, who then pursues a claim together with an attorney. Once the replacement work is completed, the law firm sues the homeowner's insurance company for inflated costs of the work. This has become such a widespread practice, that the cost is being returned to homeowners in the form of higher premiums.

This problem was not addressed in the last legislative session, as it was an election year, and the legislators were busy off campaigning. As a result, the markets for homeowner insurance have worsened with the insolvency of several insurers and the catastrophic losses from Hurricane Ian. I'm not optimistic they will get much right. I predict they will just kick the proverbial insurance can down the road, yet again.

Besides casualty insurance, other steps to protecting your home are testing your smoke detector regularly and having an operable BC fire extinguisher at easy reach. Read the extinguisher operating instructions when you first purchase the unit and at least twice a year thereafter is also recommended. In this recent event, a homeowner having and using an operable fire extinguisher may have greatly limited the damage.

#### Safety Tips

For those of you who use dryer sheets, now is a good time to scrub your lint vent with a brush and hot soapy water. Some dryer sheets emit a waxy substance that adheres to the mesh lining of the lint trap screen. If you run hot water over your lint vent and the water does not pass through the mesh, then it is a good idea to clean your lint vent. Consider using wool or plastic dryer balls instead of the dryer sheets.

#### **Conservation Tip**

Depending on the type irrigation system, shaving two minutes off each irrigation run time yields 24 to 36 gallons per zone per run time which can save 103 to 155 gallons per month per zone for once per week watering and 206 to 310 gallons per month for twice per week watering. Monthly water savings for seven zones may cost in a range of \$1.20 to \$15.95 for once per week watering and \$1.80 to \$23.93 for twice per week watering depending on the rate tier.

Please remember to turn your irrigation controllers back to one day per week during Eastern Standard Time (first Sunday in November until the second Sunday in March) as required by the St. Johns and Southwest Florida Water Management District to aid in water conservation.

the roadside, will be picked up by Parkway on the regular scheduled debris day. Please remember that starting on Tuesday, Jan. 2, curbside recycling will move to Thursday pick up along with household wastes, eliminating the separate Tuesday pickup for recycling.

#### **Holiday Lighting**

Please remove all lights, and decorations by Monday, Jan. 15. Christmas trees may be placed on the curb in front of your home for pick-up on your neighborhood's regularly scheduled yard debris pick-up day. All tinsel must be removed from the trees.

#### **Modification Requests**

This is the beginning of a new year, and you may have plans to renovate or update your home. Occasionally, we receive complaints about vendors and make note of them. If warranted, those vendors would be pulled from our list, either temporarily to cure the complaint or permanently.

When you visit Resident Services to apply for a modification request, we verify that the vendor you have selected has provided proof of insurance, and, if required, a license to do business in the State of Florida. The vendor certificate of liability is kept on file until expiration. On Top of the World does not check backgrounds or vet other information regarding any vendor, nor do we recommend any vendor. We urge you to review any complaints from other residents about the vendor you are selecting. We recommend residents obtain at least two bids from vendors. "Too good to be true," often is.

Resident Services is closed daily between noon and 1 p.m. The time begins when the last resident assisted before closing vacates the building as soon after noon as possible.

Please note that Resident Services will be closed Monday, Jan. 1.

You may wish to complete your maintenance request online versus stopping by the office. Visit OTOWInfo.com > Maintenance Request and enter your request. Be sure to scroll down to enter the service you are requesting and click submit. Please note that this method may not be the best in order to report the full details of your request due to a limit in characters allowed, however, you may also call, email or come into the Resident Services office.


When you closed on your home, you became eligible to obtain up to two resident ID card(s). These ID cards expire every five years after date of issuance for records update. Non-owner resident ID cards expire every three years. Every third or fourth resident residing in a household is required to pay an annual guest fee. The first decal is free to owners. The second decal is \$15. Any additional gate decals issued per household are \$75 each. Tenants may obtain a free monthly gate pass or purchase a \$75 vehicle decal.

#### **After Hours Non-Medical Emergencies**

On Top of the World (Central) Owners Association members, please notify Resident Services first before contacting an outside contractor for repairs such as roots in water lines, sewer backups, sprinklers damaged by mowers, etc. If it is after normal business hours and you experience some manner of a non-medical emergency, we ask that you please call 352-236-OTOW (6869) for assistance. Even though Resident Services is closed, the number is answered 24 hours a day and you will be able to speak with an after-hours representative, who, based on the reason for the call, will provide direction or dispatch an after-hours per-

#### **Community Patrol**

Around the turn of 2000, when the Community Patrol was started at On Top of the World, SR 200 was a two-lane road, and the Super Walmart was a field and a dream. The Community Patrol started as a joint idea between Kenneth D. Colen and the Marion County Sheriff's Office (MCSO). It originally was a combination of the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) and the Citizen Observation Patrol (COPS), which is now a separate group. There were about 35 members who not only drove around the community, but were trained for first aid, fire, and other emergencies.

This month, we introduce you to Jim Miller, one of the founding fathers of the Community Patrol team. Jim tells us when the Community Patrol started, there were four-hour shifts during which volunteers could drive every road in the Americana Village and Friendship neighborhoods multiple times and knew virtually every resident. The guard houses then were gates, members had two-way radios to keep in touch, and at

first, the only entrance and exit was on SW 99th Street Road.

One of the early tasks when patrolling was to make sure the gates were operating properly. Due to a realignment of MCSO, CERT fell under Emergency Management and the Community Patrol and COPS stayed with MCSO. We now patrol in retired police cars, use cell phones and two-way radios, and have monthly training at our meetings.

The Community Patrol's main mission today is being visible to our community and acting as additional eyes and ears for MCSO. In November 2023, 41 volunteers patrolled throughout the community for 191 hours. We drive not only around On Top of the World's neighborhoods, but the adjacent shopping centers (Steeplechase Plaza to Lowe's) to observe and ensure a public awareness that the areas are being monitored. Lieutenant Robbins from the MCSO has often stated that the visibility of the Community Patrol has a significant effect in reducing crime.



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
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#### 'Tails' of Gratitude

All are welcome to join in the fun. If you do not sing, we can never have enough clappers.



#### **Birders' Beat**

Just in case you are curious about how and when our birding group began, I'd like to provide a brief history. In February 1998, Roberta Campbell advertised and organized the first meeting of the Bird Watchers Club. Eighteen people showed up for that initial meeting which was held at the Recreation Center. The group decided to meet at the same location each month.

At the first regular meeting in March, Kay Chandler agreed to write the Birders' Beat column and other duties were divided up among the participants. At subsequent meetings the name of the group was changed to The Unique Birders and the first field trip was taken to the Lake Eaton Trail in the Ocala National Forest. Greg and Chris Guidas were also among the very active leaders during those first years as they led early morning and evening golf cart expeditions around the golf courses and settling pond on SW 90th Street. Educational meetings were held to learn about bird feeders and to improve the birding knowledge and skills of the attendees. Guest speakers presented on various topics of interest to the group.

Fortunately, we have a history of all the meetings and excursions taken by the group over the years. Sometimes they took boat rides and they often traveled quite long distances on their outings including Tampa and Orlando destinations. So, this group has been active for over 25 years. Pretty impressive.

Back to today. The members of The Birding Group will journey to Paynes Prairie Preserve State Park in Micanopy on Thursday, Jan. 18. The park entrance is located at 100 Savannah Boulevard off of Highway 441. There is a \$6 per vehicle entrance fee if you don't have a state park pass.

Paynes Prairie is unique in many ways. There are very few places in Florida where you get to see herds of bison and wild horses running free on the prairie. Approximately 300 different bird species have been seen here, along with deer, alligators, and numerous smaller animals. We will be hoping to see the wintering sandhill

They say that opposites attract. In some instances, that's great, for others, it could be a difficult situation. How about if one person has hearing issues, and the other can hear a pin drop. Technology might offer a worthwhile solution for both people.

If one of your favorite pastimes together is watching TV, perhaps consider the wireless Bluetooth® scenario. When each person has their own headphones, they can adjust a comfortable volume setting. A different option might be to set up a Bluetooth® transmitter and splitter to send TV audio to wireless headphones, and for the other person, connect the transmitter to the wireless speaker so that they can hear the TV without headphones, and easily hear the phone whenever it rings.

Search the internet for "best wire-less headphones 2024" to get an idea of current prices and features like noise cancellation, battery life, comfort, clear sound for audiophiles, microphone, and taking phone calls. You might choose between over-ear headphones or earbuds.

Some people use the noise-canceling feature on airplane flights too!

In your TV streaming video (or audio) device's manual or app, research pairing headphones or earbuds by Bluetooth® and follow the steps. Some older TVs might need you to hook up an adapter or transmitter, or your choice might be to connect a 3.5mm standard headphone jack or RCA audio jack and plug this long wire to the back of your TV. If you sit far from the set, remember that newer TVs all feature wireless connections, and Bluetooth® might save you from tripping over or getting tangled in the long wire, or pulling out the cable

and breaking the set. These are things to consider in case you need to upgrade your TV and other devices.

If streaming on your computer, the majority support either wired or wireless headphones or headsets, just look for the 3.5 jack with a little headphone icon showing where to plug them in. Many people listen to podcasts and watch videos on their tablet, smartphone, or computer which offers Bluetooth® and it is only a matter of pairing the headphones or earbuds to your device.

So, enjoy the show together, but perhaps you still need separate snacks!





How about stepping out of your cooking comfort zone to try something new for 2024? Here are two suggestions, one for a tasty side dish, the other a new take on an old reliable.

#### Farro Pilaf

1 small onion, chopped 2 tablespoons butter 1 teaspoon kosher salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper 1 cup farro (available in supermarkets) 1/4 cup golden raisins 2 cups water 1/2 cup salted pistachios Chopped parsley

Sauté onion in butter until translucent. Season with salt and pepper. Stir in farro and raisins, add water and bring to a simmer. Cover and reduce heat to medium low. Cook until all water is absorbed, about 30 minutes. Stir, top with pistachios and parsley. Serve at room temperature.

#### **Brown Sugar Salmon**

12-pound whole salmon, skin on 3 tablespoons butter, melted 2 cloves garlic, minced 1 tablespoons brown sugar 1 teaspoon Italian seasoning

1 teaspoon paprika

1 teaspoon garlic powder 3/4 teaspoon salt

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees. Place salmon, skin side down, on a baking sheet. Combine garlic and butter. Brush half on salmon. Combine sugar, sea-

sonings, and salt in a small bowl. Sprinkle on salmon, drizzle with remaining garlic butter. Bake for 15 to 20 minutes. Allow to rest before serving.



called Sammarinese. San Marino derives its name from Saint Marinus, a stonemason who built a church on Monte Titano (elevation of 2,457 feet) in AD 301 and founded what is now the city and state of San Marino. The borders of the country were enlarged for the last time in 1463, when four adjacent

country in the world. It has a population of 33,600 in a land area of 23.5 square miles. The people of San Marino are

communities were accepted. Over the centuries, several high-ranking members of the Catholic Church tried to take over San Marino, but the various Popes at the time intervened thus allowing the country to maintain its independence. During the Italian unification process in the 18th century, San Marino served as a refuge for many people who were being persecuted be-

cause of their support for unification. The country remained neutral for both World Wars and, again, served as a refuge for thousands of civilians during World War II.

Politically, San Marino is a parliamentary representative democratic republic based on the Statutes of 1600, the earliest written governing documents still in effect. Uniquely, San Marino's constitution dictates that its democratically

elected legislature must elect two heads of state every six months. Known as the Captains Regent, the two heads of state serve concurrently and with equal powers. Think about that a minute.

San Marino is one of the wealthiest countries in the world. Their economy is based mainly on finance, industry, services, retail, and tourism. About two million tourists a year provide over 22% of the GDP. Although not a member of the European Union, San Marino uses the Euro as their currency.

San Marino's military forces are among the smallest in the world and mostly devoted to functions such as ceremonial duties, patrolling borders, and guarding government buildings. One of their military branches is a Crossbow Corps, a group of 80 volunteers who provide demonstrations of their skill

at various functions. They also have a Company of Uniformed Militia. In former times, all families with two or more adult male members were required to enroll half of them into this company. Historically, the unit was the basic fighting force of the armed forces of San Marino, but it is largely ceremonial today. Nevertheless, the Company is a matter of civic pride, and many Sammarinese belong to the force.

Football (soccer) is the most popular sport in San Marino, but it is a game for them, and not a big deal professional activity. Their National Team, composed of part-timers, such as local plumbers and farmers, has won only one game in the last 25 years. Nevertheless, they are out there competing and enjoying every minute. What a bunch of great people!

Did you get a new paddle for the holidays? Having the right paddle thickness and rubber can aid in your play. Here are some suggestions for choosing rubber for your paddle.

#### **Rubber Types**

Smooth: Most players use this type with a layer of sponge underneath. It provides the most spin and used by 85% of tournament players.

Short Pips or Pimpled: The rubber has a bumpy surface and usually a layer of sponge underneath. Used by players who do not have a great deal of spin and provides more control if you have difficulty playing against spin.

Long Pips: Extra-long pips reverse the spin of the opponent. It is difficult to play offensively with long pips, so most players use it on one side only.

Anti-Topspin: Rubber has a smooth surface and does not generate much spin/speed. It neutralizes the opponent's spin. Most players use anti-block with it and a different rubber on the other

Speed versus Spin: Offensive players using topspin, loop and smash prefer rubber with a highspeed rating. Defensive players using underspin, chop, push, and block prefer slower rubber. The faster the rubber, the harder it is to control and more affected by the opponents' spin.

Sponge Thickness: Affects speed of the rubber. The thicker the sponge the more speed and more spin. The thinner the sponge the more control. Thicker sponge adds more weight to the paddle and gives a more cushioned feel. Thinner sponge is lighter and gives a woodier feel. Offensive players prefer thicker sponge while defensive players prefer

none or a thinner sponge. Sponge Hardness: Affects spin, speed, control and feeling. A soft sponge offers most control and feeling and suits beginners and intermediate players. Medium sponge suits players with an allaround game who appreciate touch/control but also like to place powerful strokes. Harder sponge brings the most power and speed and is favored by aggressive, wellpracticed, higher-level players who need additional power when playing back from the table.

Ratings: Rubbers are assigned ratings for speed, spin, and control on a scale of 10 to 99. The higher the rating the higher the attributes.

Happy new year! This is the perfect time to set an intention for making your wellbeing a priority. Unfortunately, New Year's resolutions often carry a reputation for failure due to lofty, unrealistic goals. Instead of trying to revamp your lifestyle with weight loss as the primary objective, consider a broader, holistic approach to wellness. The fixed mindset believe that their capabilities and abilities are pre-determined. They believe that they have a limited amount of intelligence, athletic talent, etc. A person either can hit a tennis ball with topspin and move correctly and efficiently on a tennis court or he/

A person with a fixed mindset avoids challenges, gives up easily when faced with obstacles, views efforts as a waste of time, ignores feedback, blames others for their failures and sees failure as permanent and defining.

On the flip side is the growth mindset in which a person believes that ability can be developed. A person with a

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

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



I saw a poster recently that said, "It's not about being better than someone else, it's about being better than you were the day before." 2023 was a great year for the club and our members with many accomplishments by individuals honing their skills at the range or at offsite competitive events.
