The last six months have been trying on everyone's nerves. The lockdown, gradual reopening of facilities, the reversal of the gradual reopening, have followed the ebb and flow of the pandemic locally. Many residents continued on voluntary isolation because of concerns for their health or the health of a loved one.

The reality is that this pandemic may be the "new normal" that we must all try and live with, figuring out how to cope with reduced social interactions, including altering social spacing, as well as masking, are making many of us (myself included) more than a little nutty trying to figure out what is "safe" and manageable.

To the extent that dealing with COVID-19 accommodations can safely be done, the Associations and the Management Company are operating recreational amenities and adhering to distancing and disinfection guidelines. Dealing with short-staffing has been a challenge to maintain operations. We get it: employees must tend to their children and aging parents first. For the most part, residents have been very understanding and helpful.

Resident Services continues to experience much higher than normal flow of traffic, both walk-in, over the phone, and internet. This is resulting in delays and is slowing response time as they work through the service backlog. To limit exposure to staff and, by extension, to residents, the office is open to a limited number of residents at any given time. The office will be closing mid-day for one-half hour while a specialized disinfection using high-strength UVA lighting is underway. This process requires all workers to leave the workspace while disinfection takes place.

Kindness and compassion are the greatest of attributes any person can give to another. The understanding and patience of all residents in this time are really appreciated. However, this has not always been the case. To put it bluntly, some people have been outright rude to frontline staff members. Staff is here to assist residents resolve concerns and to answer questions. No staff member is required to endure verbal abuse or threats of any kind. Each team member has authority to deny service in such circumstances, as they arise.

This same principal goes for use of the amenities in each of the communities. Residents using the facilities are subject to a screening procedure designed to minimize the chance of exposure to the CO-VID-19 virus. Anyone failing to cooperate in the screening or failing to mask or distance, will be asked to comply with these simple procedures or exit the facility. Your Association reserves the right to use all legal means to enforce these procedures for the benefit of all residents and staff.

As this beautiful, wet summer is winding down, the ramp-up for the fall and winter is moving into full gear. September seemed to get here very fast. From the property management perspective, the push is to catch up the last of any raindelayed work in the community and getting lawns and landscaping ready for what little winter we enjoy around here.

Are You **Hurricane-Ready?**

Don't answer so quick. Sure, if simple steps for financial preparedchecklists we all see every year at this time, and you're ready to go with a cache of water, food, a med kit, a battery-operated radio, etc. To be fully prepared, however, it's not quite that simple. The standard checklist takes care of your physical safety, while this article discusses how to safeguard your finances.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) offers a special kit with all the information you need to guide your family through the recovery process. This Emergency Financial First Aid Kit (EF-FAK) will be vitally important if you are ever impacted by a natural disaster or emergency.

The EFFAK guides you through

you're the cautious and organized ness. It helps you assess, compile type, you've studied the hurricane and then safeguard all your important financial documents, contacts, insurance policies and cash resources.

The FEMA financial kit also has an excellent reference section, listing helpful organizations and resources, along with tools to assist your financial well-being. It also advises you of common scams, and how to protect yourself against disaster-related fraud.

Even though I served in a former life as the chief financial officer and president of a NASDAO company, I nevertheless found my own financial preparedness for emergencies a bit lacking. Sure, I have water and flashlights ready, but if anything serious happens it would

be far more difficult for me to deal with the financial fallout than if I had prepared with FEMA's financial

I'm sure I'm not the only one in our community who is not as "fully prepared" as I thought I was. I encourage residents to check out the EFFAK resources and information on the FEMA site. The direct link is quite lengthy, but if you just search on your Internet browser for "FEMA EFFAK" it will take you there. On that page choose the very last underlined document at bottom.

You can also visit the link in the adjacent graphic for more information from FEMA on hurricane preparation. At this very moment we are smack in the middle of hurricane season, and if you think more preparation is a good idea, I encourage you to do it now. If you wait until next week, or even tomorrow, the notion and impetus will likely evaporate as the dawn mist. Be a good girl scout or boy scout; hope for the best, but plan for the worst.

Is It Legal?

SCAM ALERT #1: The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) reports that the top fraud complaints are "imposter" calls. These are phone calls from someone saying they are from the Social Security Administration (SSA) or from some other government agency, such as the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). Usually, these days, it's a robocall at first and then you are told to press #1 or whatever for more information.

Bottom line is the same: the caller wants to trick you into pressing #1 so they can hook you up with a human scammer. They claim there is something wrong with your social security account or there's fraud or suspected fraud and then, they want personal information.

Most of us already know this but it's well to go over it again. The SSA does not:

- 1. Call unless in return of a call you made.
 - . Call to tell you that your account has been suspended.

- 3. Offer you a benefit in exchange for you providing any information, including, of course, personal/private information.
- 4. Call to demand immediate
- payment of any money.

 5. Require a specific method of payment such as a credit card, iTunes card, debit card, gift card, wire transfers, etc.

Folks, most of you already know about all of this and you know just to hang up the phone. But some folks are not as aware of scams and frauds as you might be. So, please check on your neighbors and friends. Chat about these frauds; it helps you stay aware and helps acquaint you with folks who may not be as savvy as you.

scam alert #2: I've been getting a bunch of calls where my caller ID says, "potential scam" or "out of area." Sometimes, I am tempted to answer just to see what the scammer has to say. But I don't answer, and neither should you. More often than not, if you did answer, you'd get no answer back. That's because they are hoping you will call back and more than likely you will get hit with various scammer phone charges. We must resist

the desire to answer these kinds of calls. We must.

Q. My father needs Medicaid. He will need to go into a nursing home fairly soon because my mother can no longer take care of him at home. Mom was told about a Medicaid-compliant annuity that can be used to protect assets (for my mother) while at the same time allowing dad to obtain Medicaid benefits, when he has to go into the nursing

A. John Beck is an attorney in our law office, who handles Medicaid matters. He also has a master's degree in taxation. So, I ran this issue by him. John's first comment was that it was very difficult for him to comment on information about a Medicaid-compliant annuity, when he was not there when you received this information. Further, John didn't know precisely what information was given to whomever discussed that kind of annuity with

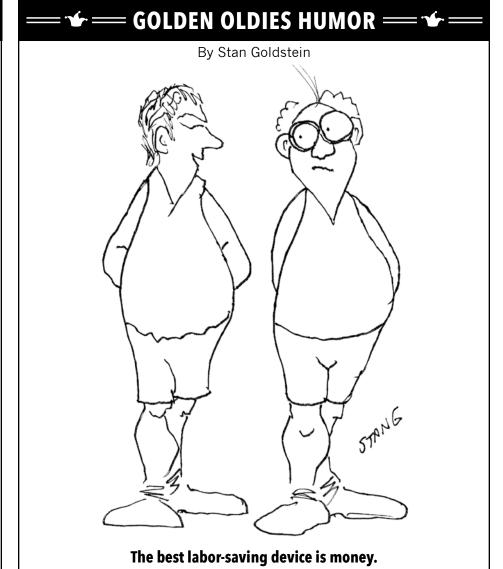
John had a couple of comments, though. First, John hopes that whoever gave you information about that kind annuity was an attorney familiar with Medicaid. Second, John said that, as a general statement and not one to be relied upon for anyone's specific issues, a Medicaid-compliant annuity can have benefits to enable a Medicaid applicant to receive Medicaid benefits. However, these kinds of annuities need to be very carefully reviewed

and must always be designed to meet applicable Medicaid eligibility laws. Those eligibility laws change frequently as legislative bodies seek to control spending, thus making it harder and harder to obtain Medicaid benefits, even for those who need them and should have them.

Q. My 18-year-old granddaughter wants to come and stay with me until she can go back to school. She said she would bring her boyfriend, but I don't have to worry because they will bring masks. I would like your thoughts.

A. I don't think I want to give you my thoughts on this. Oh, okay. Masks are good. Where and when they wear them are separate matters, don't you think? Suggestion - tell her not to come. The virus is too serious a matter.

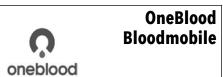

Park and north to SW 63rd Street. This involves permitting by Marion County. A late October permit release and mobilization for work to begin is anticipated. The permit application for a traffic signal at SW 63rd Street was submitted to Marion County in late July. No approval date can be anticipated at this time for that work.

Longleaf Ridge is going full bore on construction of new homes in Phase I. This neighborhood offers a limited number of Estate Series homes fronting on The Links Golf Course. Premier and Carriage Series homes are also available in this gracious, maintenance included neighborhood.

The newest neighborhood in Candler Hills is Kestrel. Sales of these premium Estate Series homes has been strong. Site development work will bring us a total of 131 estate lots in Kestrel when completed.

Indigo East is down to a final five homes, nearing completion. Meanwhile, sales continue at a brisk pace in Weybourne Landing. Weybourne Landing Phase 1A saw a completion of 199 lots in June. The next 173 lots making up Weybourne Landing Phase 1B, are targeting August for site construction commencement.

Home sales across all communities are moving along at a very good pace. Interestingly, over one-third of sales have been move-in ready homes. Demand remains strong, despite the many challenges this nation is facing.

Recycling Update

It's worth reminding all residents that plastic bags do not recycle. If you bring your aluminum and metal cans and newspapers to the recycling containers or in the curbside containers in plastic garbage bags, empty the contents into the recycling bins and dispose of the bags in the household garbage. A resident asked that we place a convenient container near recycling to place the plastic bags and we are in process of testing this suggestion.

Hurricane Season

The recent National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) update on the 2020 hurricane season was concerning to say the least. 25 potential Atlantic storms must be taken seriously. It has the Management Company reevaluating their resources for

storm preparedness and recovery to ensure they are ready for the challenge serial storms may pose. Generally, the Management Company is able to persevere in its ground's maintenance responsibilities, despite the month of July and August posing challenges with rain. It seems that every time the mowing crews got caught up, a long cycle of showers pushed them behind. I congratulate our crews for working so hard to keep up under the grueling temperatures and rainy days. Granted we need the rain to replenish the groundwater, but it does come with a price.

As we move deeper into storm season, focus may be shifting to storm preparations. The Management Company is positioned to move fast, on sometimes less than 24-hour notice, to secure buildings and equipment from possible wind and rain damage, as well as making sure everyone is clear on their poststorm responsibilities for recovery and clean-up.

Naturally, these types of products will not be approved by the Association. Check with Resident Services for details. Finally, don't forget to update your homeowner insurance to ensure any additions to the original structure are included in your policy.

We are looking forward to cooler weather as we officially move in to fall Saturday, Sept. 22. We also observe Labor Day Monday, Sept. 7.

Then, the question becomes, what is the new normal?

Resident Services is now open with the following restrictions:

- Will be closed on Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 7.
- Closed from noon to 12:30 p.m. daily for sanitizing.
- Lobby is limited to six residents at a time.
- Social distancing of six feet and masks are required. Office hours are 8 a.m. to 4

p.m., Monday through Friday. Residents needing to utilize Resident Services at Friendship Commons may continue to contact the office by phone, (352) 236-OTOW (6869), or email at otowservice@ otowfl.com in lieu of visiting. We are experiencing higher than normal volumes and appreciate your

patience. Be assured, your call or email will be returned as soon as possible. Florida Governor DeSantis issued

Executive Order 20-192 on Thursday, Aug. 6, which rescinds EO 20-80 and EO 20-82. Persons traveling in from the Tri-State Area (New York, New Jersey and Connecticut) no longer need to quarantine for 14 days. EO 139 "Phase 2: Safe. Smart. Step-by-Step. Plan for Florida's Recovery" remains in effect. As a reminder, key portions of the order include individual responsibility of social distancing, avoiding crowds and gatherings, and taking measures to limit the risk of exposure to COVID-19.

Safety protocols remain in place

and are posted at each facility:

- All opened amenities and facilities have capacity limitations which are posted at each location and which allow for proper distancing.
- Masks are required in all indoor locations and standard operating hours will be implemented. Masks are recommended at outside facilities, but not required.
- At this time, no non-resident guests are allowed. (Must be Gateway of Services mem-
- All residents must be responsible for their own personal safety and for compliance with the safety protocols for each location. Residents should bring their own hand sanitizer and wipes in the event that provided sanitizer is out.
- Do not utilize the facility/ amenity if, within the past 14 days, you have had CO-VID-19 symptoms, have been in contact with or exposed to a person having COVID-19, have been asked to self-monitor at home, have been on a cruise or traveled to any U.S. city or foreign country on the CDC's affected areas of widespread/sustained community transmission.

We encourage all residents to continue to take all precautions and follow safety protocols posted at each facility and those recommended by the CDC and local health department. Cases are still increasing in Marion County and by following the safety protocols, we keep each other safe.

Power Outages

Please keep in mind that when we have power outages it is a good idea to check your irrigation clock to make sure that it is still on the correct setting. Many times a power surge or outage may cause the clock to revert to its original settings. If the settings are not checked, you may be watering too much or not enough.

Private Contractors

There are always questions and concerns regarding debris and trash left in the community by private contractors. So, I thought I would offer some clarification. Storm Preparedness – Key Points

- Designate a "post-disaster contact" who is a relative or friend who lives outside of the danger zone. Make sure each family member has been given this person's address and phone number and agrees to contact him or her following the hurricane.
- following the hurricane.

 Keep on hand at least one week's supply of bottled water and nonperishable food items. You should also have available a manual can/bottle opener, flashlight and battery-operated radio or television (with an extra set of batteries for each). Make sure these items are readily accessible, so that you can quickly pack and evacuate.
- Maintain an up-to-date inventory of everything in your home. Taking photos and/or making videotapes of these items may help support the value you place on them. Also, consider storing valuable items at a secure location away from the house.
- Remove furniture from porches or patio and secure hoses and lawn ornaments so that these objects do not become dangerous or lethal projectiles during a storm.
- Stock up on items you may need to protect your home or to prevent it from being further damaged after the storm has passed. These items may include, but are not limited to tarps or plastic, hammers, nails and plywood.
- Make sure your family is trained on how to turn off damaged utilities.

- At least once per year, review your insurance coverage to make sure it is adequate and up to date.
- Don't forget about your pet. Some evacuation centers do not allow pets. Making arrangements before a storm reduces the anxiety for both you and your pet.

When a hurricane threatens, immediately take these steps:

- · Refill prescriptions and critical supplies such as oxygen.
- Make sure your car has a full tank of gas as power outages may force gas stations to remain closed for several days following a hurricane.
- Store important documents and other valuable items in waterproof bags.
- Bring inside any loose items that can be found around the home. Firmly tie down loose items that cannot be brought indoors.
- Protect or shutter windows.
 (Please refer to your association's rules on when to do so.)
- Have enough cash on hand to last at least a full week. Banks and ATMs may be closed for several days following the storm.

During a hurricane:

- Stay tuned to a battery-operated radio or television for weather bulletins and important information.
- Follow the orders of local authorities.
- Stay indoors in an interior room without windows; even inland locations may still be at risk. If conditions worsen,

- take shelter in a closet or bathroom and use mattresses to protect yourself.
- Don't assume the hurricane is over when the wind subsides. The calm may be the eye of the storm, and the worse part may still be on the way.

If the electricity goes out:

- Use a flashlight not a candle or match. You do not want to take the risk of igniting gas from a broken line.
- Open your refrigerator only when absolutely necessary. This will help keep food fresh for as long as possible.
- After the hurricane has passed:
 Don't venture outside until local authorities have issued an "all-clear."
- Continue to check the radio or TV for post hurricane updates.
- If you have evacuated, don't return until authorities reopen your area. Remember, you may need proof of residency to return.
- Use a flashlight to look at damage. Allow only those people who have been trained, to turn off damaged utilities (e.g. gas) and disconnect damaged appliances.
- · Beware of downed power lines and other debris.
- Wear sturdy shoes and clothing to protect yourself. People are oftentimes hurt more frequently after the hurricane than during it.
- Use only bottled water. Unless otherwise advised, assume tap water is contaminated and sewer lines are out of order.
- If electrical power was lost during the hurricane, be extremely careful before consuming food taken from your

- refrigerator. When in doubt, throw it out.
- Use the phone only for emergencies. Resident Services maintains an outdoor facility to charge your cell phones. Capacity is limited so be prepared to share the area and facility.
- Conserve water! Do not wash driveways of debris. If the power is out and you still have water pressure, it is only because the water plant is running on auxiliary power and with a limited supply of fuel

Proper insurance coverage can help reduce the financial burden you may suffer as a result of a hurricane. Here are some additional tips that will make the claims process easier for you and your claims adjuster:

- Don't alter the condition of the damaged property. Take whatever steps are necessary to protect your property from further damage.
- Contact your insurance agent as soon as possible. Provide your agent or insurance carrier all information pertaining to your claim.
- Make a list of damaged or destroyed property. Your adjuster will be able to work more quickly if he or she has a written list to work from. Photos of damaged property may also be useful.
- Keep records and receipts for all expenses you incur. Supplies purchased to protect damaged property, or the costs incurred while staying at a hotel while your home is being repaired, may be recoverable.
- Try to be patient. Once you report your claim, your claims adjuster will respond as quickly as possible. Delays may be likely, as hurricanes often uproot signs and deposit debris on highways, severely impeding traffic.

Summer heat continues here in Central Florida. Stay hydrated especially during participation in summer outdoor activities when temperatures and humidity can reach critical levels.

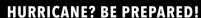

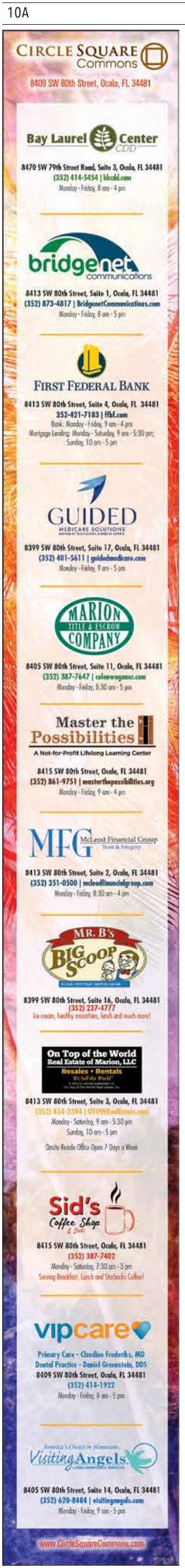

Understanding irrigation runtimes, precipitation rates, Solar Sync/Virtual Solar Sync, matched precipitation and evapotranspiration are crucial to irrigation management and turf grass health. Many times, when investigating grass-related service tickets, we come across one of these areas and

often see this as the genesis of turf

grass problems.

Let's begin with how long to run the irrigation and how it relates to precipitation rate. Knowing how the runtime and precipitation rate interact is essential in how your irrigation system is set up. How many minutes should you irrigate? The University of Florida, Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (UF/IFAS) recommends half to three-quarter inches per application. Knowing the type of irrigation head you have and nozzle are indicative in how long to irrigate.

For instance, homes constructed

since 2009 use the MP (match precipitation) rotator. This means each head has an identical precipitation rate to the other nozzle patterns; they all produce a precipitation rate of .43 inches per hour. So now, if you know the precipitation rate you can determine how long you need to irrigate to water between half to three-quarter inches. This is why we set the irrigation systems at 90 minutes applying .63" at each cycle

I have seen many controllers set to water for 20 minutes with MP Rotators; at that rate you are applying .14" of water. Needless to say, this is not enough but it also leads me to my next point of evapotranspiration.

Evapotranspiration (Et) is an algorithm combining the water evaporated from the ground and water transpired through the leaves. Typical Et values during the summer months is around .10 to .14 inches per day. Going back to my previous paragraph, if you irrigate 20 minutes twice a week you are always operating in a deficit and the plant can never recover, leading to drought stress, weeds and insect pests. For instance, I irrigate today and apply .14 inches at 20 minutes, the next cycle on a twice per week system is two to three days later. Given that known constant and an Et value of .12 inches, I have lost .24 inches of water in two days but will only be putting back .14 inches at 20 minutes. In the end, the plant cannot keep up and the soil becomes hydrophobic or repels the water and you see drying, dormancy and often dead grass.

If you couple the runtime with the Solar Sync or Virtual Solar Sync this also may cause more problems if not using the correct runtime. The Solar Sync or Virtual Solar Sync take site specific Et values and solar radiation to create a runtime adjustment. If you are at the correct runtime to apply half to three-

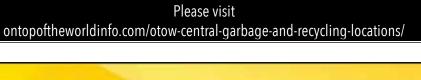
quarter inches, these will offer a savings to keep you from over watering; but if you are not watering correctly, these devices or settings may cause even further problems.

On another note, I had the experience of a lifetime a few Saturdays ago. You know the old saying, "Never judge someone until you have walked a mile in their shoes?" Well, I walked a few miles or saw the miles while moving with the Parkway staff in one of our neighborhoods. These Parkway employees are consistent, loyal and unwavering in their determination trying their hardest to keep our community clean and presentable. But even in the face of this determination we face a host of external challenges. One of the challenges I noticed while in the field operating a mower was an obstacle course of trees that were not maintained; also bird baths, grill covers, hoses and other items that we need residents to tend to.

Items such as trees that are properly lifted and maintained allow mowers to be operated underneath reducing ground workers "weed whacking." Trees also pose safety hazards. We get employees who try to do their best and get poked in the eye or run into a spider web while in the process of mowing and get bitten leading to delays and production loss. Owners in On Top of the World Central are responsible for owner installed plantings and it is the resident's responsibility to install and maintain these plantings in a manner that allows for proper maintenance.

As I read from the community standards "Any homesite, which has been altered from its natural state, shall be landscaped according to plans approved by the ARB. Any owner-installed landscape is the owner's responsibility to maintain. All shrubs, trees, grass and plantings of every kind shall be kept well maintained, properly cultivated and free of trash and other unsightly material."

We thank you for your cooperation and helping us to maintain the

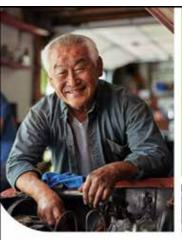

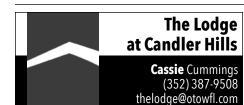

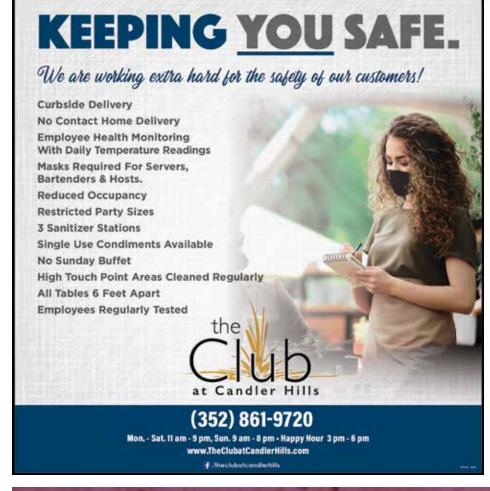

Mission: Space

The World Traveler. Note that world, so I decided to write about with space and space travel for my entire life; and that's a lot of years!

This monthly column is called when I recently learned that three spacecrafts are being launched to it doesn't specify any particular Mars this July/August. How does this affect me? I heard someone ask this question. If you have been following the news, you will know that Elon Musk's SpaceX company is on a roll. This private company has successfully launched, and recovered, multiple spacecrafts in the past year. Now, here's the part that could affect you. SpaceX is planning to sell passenger space on some missions in the not-too-distant future. It would be expensive, but, wow, what an adventure! SpaceX also has developed a huge rocket called "Starship" that the power necessary to take payloads to Mars and beyond.

Did you know that the U.S. and its partners are hoping to return to the Moon by the mid-2020s and to Mars by 2030! There is even one (optimistic) Dutch company (Mars One) that plans to start colonizing Mars starting in 2023! Think about that! They actively are seeking volunteers to join their program for a permanent move to Mars. Are you ready?

The core question, however, is why go to Mars? The scientific reasons for going are humankind's never-ending search for life, understanding the surface and the planet's evolution, and learning lessons for future human exploration of space. Mars is the logical target because it is close by, and potentially habitable. I say "potentially habitable" because there are some seritreme cold.

America's "Perseverance" will be working on the oxygen issue with a device called MOXIE (Mars Oxygen In-Situ Resource Utilization Experiment). It takes carbon dioxide from the Mars atmosphere (95% of the atmosphere) and converts it into oxygen and carbon monoxide. If MOXIE works as planned, truly long-range thinkers believe it may even be possible to "terraform" Mars - that is totally change the composition of the atmosphere to make it similar to that of Earth. Scientists also believe they have identified some is designed specifically to provide deposits of frozen water on the surface and some potentially liquid water stored at depth. The world's famous polar caps primarily are "dry ice," frozen carbon dioxide, but, apparently, they do contain some amount of frozen water. For the cold, an average temperature of -81 degrees Fahrenheit, take a warm jacket and a "space" heater!

We always hear broadcasters talk about "windows" when they are discussing impending space launches. What is that? You have to remember that the Earth is always moving and the target for the launch rocket also is constantly moving. Therefore, for the most fuel- and time-efficient launch, you have to aim for where the target will be, not where it is at the time of launch extraordinarily complex mathematics. For Mars, there is a one-month launch window available every 26 months, which explains why there ous problems to overcome; little were three launches this summer.

You knew the auto greats Henry Ford and Walter Chrysler were Michiganders. But did you know the state was also home to Thomas Edison who grew up in Port Huron and aviator, Charles Lindberg who was born in Detroit?

Michigan also has a dark side in the history books. It was home to the Purple Gang, Detroit's most notorious mob that monopolized the flow of alcohol in 1916 when the state prohibited liquor sales,

three years before national prohibition. This prompted bootleggers to smuggle booze from Canada to Detroit.

In northern Michigan, on property once owned by the founder of General Motors, William Durant, a group of Detroit mafia families built one of the largest ranches in the state which was frequently visited by union boss, Jimmy Hoffa.

This year marked the end of private ownership of the Ambassador Bridge, a gateway to Canada via Detroit to Windsor. It had been owned by billionaire trucking mogul Matty Maroun since 1979. During his lifetime, he managed to block construction of a second bridge to Canada called the Gordie Howe Bridge which is now under construction.

Rhode Island Group

We're hoping it won't be too long before we can get back to lunches with our Rhode Island Group where we can reminisce and share favorite memories.

This is the first summer we have not returned to Rhode Island. We are very much missing the wonderful food opportunities, especially chowder and clam cakes, lobster rolls, Italian cuisine on The Hill and more, as well as visiting the many scenic spots.

One of our favorite places to visit in Rhode Island is Newport, particularly Cliff Walk. Strolling along Cliff Walk you'll see the natural beauty of the rugged Atlantic, along with the spectacular architecture of the mansions from Newport's Gilded Age. These homes were the "summer cottages" of the late 19th century tycoons such as the Vanderbilts, and Astors. Interestingly, quite a few of the mansions had a Vanderbilt connection.

It was said members of the family would build their home to outdo the home of another family member. For example, Ochre Court was built by the Goelets in 1892. Mary Goelet's youngest sister, Grace, had married Cornelius Vanderbilt III ("Neily"). To outshine Ochre Court, Cornelius Vanderbilt II constructed The Breakers in 1893, and William K. Vanderbilt, an uncle of Neily had Marble House constructed. These are all striking mansions designed by Richard Morris Hunt with spectacular grounds. You can get a

glimpse of these "cottages" as you traverse Cliff Walk.

Cliff Walk is 3.5 miles long, with about two thirds being easy walking. The southern part of the walk however is a rough trail over the natural, rugged rocky shoreline. Over the last 150 years, some of the estate owners objected to access rights along and to the shore. However, access was protected by "Fisherman's Rights" under the Colonial Charter of King Charles II along with a passage in the Rhode Island Constitution granting the public "rights of fishery and the privileges of the shore to which they have heretofore been entitled". This provided the public a right of way over private property.

The truly intrepid can walk the 3.5 miles and either retrace their steps back to their starting point or return by streets that are along the front of the various mansions, though the return that way would be longer. However, by coming back along the street you will see other mansions across the street. While these don't have frontage on the Atlantic, they are no less impressive, an example being Belcourt Castle, designed by Richard Morris Hunt after the Louis XIII hunting lodge at Versailles. Another alternative is to walk a portion of the Cliff Walk by entering and leaving through one of five designated right of way access points.

Cliff Walk is definitely a "must see" if you visit Rhode Island.

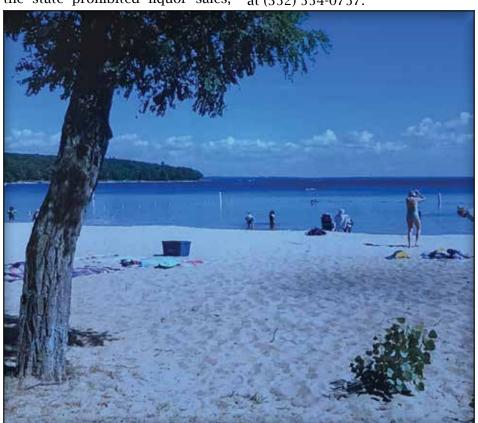

Genealogy Society

On Monday, July 20, Michael John Neill, a professional genealogist, gave a very informative educational presentation on "Immigrant Research Strategies" via Zoom.

Michael stated that even if you don't have many vital records from the 1700s and 1800s, any record could have a clue. Check church records of your ancestor's children and grandchildren. These records could have the birthplace of your ancestor on their descendant's birth or death records.

Also, check the ethnic newspapers, such as German, Italian or Irish newspapers, and also religious newspapers in the area in which they lived. They may have information on your ancestor.

Location is the key to finding information. In what village or county could they have lived? Where would the records be located? Remember, city, county and state lines changed over time. In Europe, even the country boundaries changed after the many wars in the 1700s, 1800s and after World War I and World War II. If they lived in a very rural area, they may have given the name of a nearby large town.

Do you have the correct surname? Did your ancestor Anglicize their name after coming to this country? Did they truncate their name so it could be better understood, or did they change it completely?

Was the place in which they lived also the place of their birth, or had the parents moved decades before they immigrated?

Immigrants normally immigrated to areas where friends or relatives, or other people of their nationality or religion settled. To find information on ancestors in the early 1800s, check for the names of friends, relations or neighbors as witnesses on early documents on land records.

Check census records for the same surname with similar spelling or ethnicity. Check tax lists for personal and real property. When your ancestor passed, were there quit claim deeds of the property, which might list living relatives of the deceased? Are there estate settlements of the immigrant's descendants who died without descendants?

If they became a citizen of the U.S., check the Declarations of Intention for Naturalization which could be done right after arriving in the U.S. Also, if they traveled on business, check their Passport application. It can give vital information. Search familysearch.org/search/collection/2185145 for passports from 1795 to 1925.

If available, check passenger lists of ships coming in about the time your ancestor came to the U.S. Also, if they homesteaded, the application may provide naturalization information.

All of the following meetings take place at 10 a.m. via Zoom. Members will be notified by email from our club President, Ron Niebo, on how to access the meeting.

On Monday, Sept. 14, we will hold an open genealogy discussion by the membership on genealogy issues or discoveries they have learned.

On Monday, Sept. 21, there will be an educational presentation.

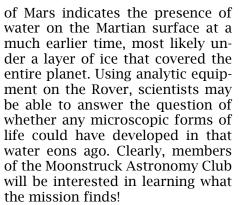


The Moonstruck Astronomy Club held its monthly meeting using Zoom Thursday, Aug. 13. Club President Jim Di Paolo discussed

the "2020 Perseverance Rover Mission to Mars," which is of special interest due to NASA's launch of the mission Thursday, July 30, from Cape Canaveral.

The Rover is scheduled to set down on the Martian surface next February. It is engineered to move about and investigate, among other things, possible forms of microscopic life on the Red Planet. Recent research on the surface

The telescope will be added to the club's "telescope lending library" for members to borrow and use on their own to search the heavens.

As always, observing sessions will be announced to members via email in the afternoon of any day that weather conditions

Sessions begin after dark and last into the evening, depending on the conditions and on the prospect of seeing specific targets as they cross the night sky. Other instructions and precautions will be provided in emails announcing each session.

Excitement about astronomy continues to build here with the reestablishment of evening observing sessions and recent rocket launches at Cape Canaveral. Regular club meetings are on the second Thursday of every month from 1:30 to 3 p.m. For now, they will remain online.

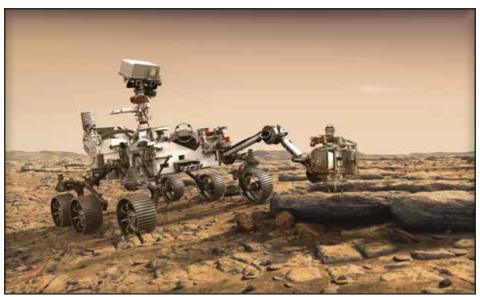

Native Plant Group

Current restrictions are putting quite a strain on our ability to find a plant that fits our criteria for "Where in the World Grows This Tree?" We don't get around much these days, as you well know, not even to the drug store to get pictures made. We're using pictures of plants we already have photos of, so you may remember them.

The plants we feature here need to be growing in On Top of the World, be a native in this area of Florida and have a picture recognizable where it is growing now. We're running out of choices; but we believe this one has what it takes.

Today this tree is a bit taller and fuller than in this photo, but the clues are still there.

If you located the red cedar in last month's "puzzle" you'll have absolutely no problem finding this beauty. Probably the best way to describe her is her height, bark and leaves. (No, she's not a strange dog – ha ha.)

As trees go, she's about medium height, up to about 20 to 30 feet in good soil, which is essentially well drained sand. (Clue #1)

The bark is pale gray broken into uniform interlacing vertical furrows. You'll need to get up close and personal to see them.

The leaves, though, are the most distinguishable aspect of this wonder. They are dark, shiny, and narrow (less than an inch wide in the center) and about two and a half inches long. But contrary to most other members of her species they tell on themselves. (Clue #2)

If you get close and hold a leaf in your fingers, flip the edge back and forth holding it up to your ear, it makes a kind of clunking sound. The scientific name for these edges is revolute, meaning in English rolled under. If you use a magnifying glass, you'll see what we mean.

Well, that's about it except for where it's growing in our community. In fact, it is only about 100 feet from the red cedar featured last month.

Oh, by the way, you may find it an enjoyable and instructive activity to actually name this species by her common and or botanical

When you find her give us a call at (352) 861-4560. You might be the winner!

Call this same number if you would like to be involved in helping our Native Plant Group members continue to maintain our projects (at a safe distance apart and wearing masks).

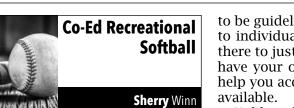
Open bocce is a good opportunity to practice or learn the game. Anyone who shows up can play. Teams are determined by the luck of the draw. This is your chance to

It's time for my annual reminder about cue care. Your cue might look shiny or colorful, but it's important to remember that it is basically still a sliver of a tree. That tree, just like we are, is made up of over 50% water. Even though your cue isn't sprouting leaves anymore, it still retains plenty of moisture, and it can dry out and warp from excessive heat.

I'm sure you wouldn't like being stored in your car where temperatures can reach 170°, and I can assure you your cue doesn't either. Even during the winter months, large changes in temperature from day to night can harm your shaft.

Always keep your cue inside, and, unless it's in a hard case, be sure to keep it vertical. Leaning it against a wall won't deform it in a day, but it might over time. If it's in a soft case, be sure it's in a place where it won't get banged around.

Cleaning your cue is a bit of an art, with many different methods, but there are simple techniques that can get you ninety percent of the way there without special billiard products. It's most important to keep your shaft clean, as whenever you feel a little friction while stroking you are definitely decreasing your accuracy.

You don't have to clean your shaft every time you play, but you should after several sessions. Any

trace of blue chalk (an abrasive) is both harmful to the shaft and your game. To clean your shaft at home, screw the butt on first. (If your mind has wandered, I am only talking about your pool cue here!)

Fold a paper towel into four layers, wet it (not too much), and put some white powder kitchen cleanser on it. Starting at the ferrule, and avoiding the tip as much as possible, clean the entire shaft firmly. Wipe away any excess cleanser with another damp paper towel. If there is any blue remaining at all, repeat. Your ferrule should be perfectly white; if not, or if you cannot get your shaft down to its pure wood color, it is time for a professional cleaning.

Wipe dry thoroughly, and if you have a leather burnisher it really helps to rub the shaft vigorously (until warm) to seal the pores. These are the essential steps. You can also use liquid shaft conditioners or cue wax to make it silky smooth. (Plain car wax paste works as well.) Never, never use any sandpaper or any liquid chemical cleaner unless specifically sold as a cue product.

Don't forget the butt as well. Does it feel sticky and grimy? Well, it is. It's very good practice to wipe down your cue with a room towelette before putting it back in your case (which keeps the inside of your case from becoming grimy as well).

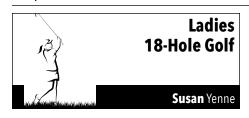

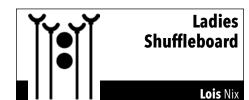
- Scramble: Everyone tees off.
 Best ball is selected for everyone's second hit. Pattern continues until ball is holed.
 One team score.
- Shamble: Everyone tees off. Best ball is selected for everyone's second hit. Everyone plays their own ball after that to have individual scores.
- Stableford: Points are given for each player's net score on each hole. Bogie, one point; par, two points; birdie, three points; eagle, four points; double eagle, five points.
- Ying & Yang: On all even holes, the two best net balls will be added. On all odd holes, the two worst net balls will be added.
- · Criss Cross: Take the best net score from one or 10, two or 11, etc., for a nine-hole score.
- No More Crying: After playing, the four worst holes in relation to par will be dropped.
- · O.N.E.S.: Net scores on holes that begin with the letters O, N, E and S: one, nine, eight, 11, 18, six, seven, 16, 17 for nine-hole score.

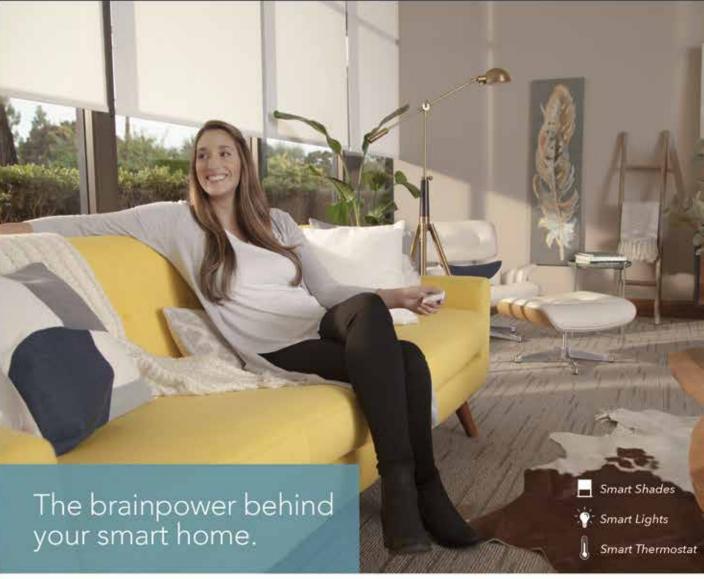

You simply soak the towel with water, wring out the excess and hold the towel at both ends and pull hands apart snapping the towel three to five times to activate the coolness. They are quite refreshing while playing a round of golf in these 90-plus degree days.

Are you having trouble around the greens in the thicker grass? Have you ever tried to use a hybrid to chip with? Your set up is like you are doing a chip shot where the ball is played back in your stance and choke down on the grip. Your stroke is an extension of your putting stroke and allow your arms to swing the club back and through without using your wrists. By using the hybrid, it will impact the ball, even when it is nestled down in the heavy grass, and pop it out of the lie a lot easier than trying to use an iron.

Keep in mind there are two ways to improve your golf skills. First, the slow way, which you try to figure it out on your own and hit numerous golf balls. Second, the fast way, you have an instructor look at your technique and coach you with a plan for improvement.

There are also two ways to score better and take your skills to the golf course. The slow way, which you try and figure it out on your own while hitting numerous shots that are not solid, straight or with the proper trajectory for the club you are using, thus causing frustration. Whereas the fast way you get an instructor to look at your approach and what you are thinking and then set up a plan for improvement so that your game is not stuck in a rut.

The fast way is not really a fast road or a shortcut, it is a process

to put a plan in place and work on improving your skills and eventually scoring better. It requires time and effort to practice correctly and make the necessary positive changes with your swing. Once you apply the changes, the results and your confidence in producing a more reliable shot to your target will most definitely show improvement with your scores.

For the last couple of months, we have occupied your down time with golf tips, and some great ways to beat the heat. This month's column will focus on club maintenance and its importance. Golf clubs today are more than just a financial investment, they are an investment in your game. With most sets of irons starting around \$900 or more, it's important to make sure we take care of them.

Ideally you should be cleaning your club after every shot to help with consistent performance. Dirt on your club face can negatively affect performance. The grooves on the club face add spin to the shot,

so be sure your clubs have clean grooves. Dirt on the face can also transfer to the ball, affecting the distance and accuracy of your shot.

Along with keeping the face of the clubs clean it's just as important to also keep your grips clean too. A good practice to get into is cleaning your grips once a month, all you need is warm soapy water and a rag. Start by dipping the rag into the water and wring it out, then give the grip a good scrub all the way around to remove any dirt and oil from the grip. Use a dry towel to gently pat the grip down and set aside and let it air dry. This should give your grips that new tacky feeling and should help with the grip slipping in your hands.

Now if your grips are passed the point of just needing a cleaning and are showing signs of wear and tear (example discoloring or disintegrating), then it is time for some new ones. According to Golf News, "The general rule of thumb is a golfer should replace their grips every six months or so if they are playing three to four times a week and exposing the grips to the heat and humidity." With that being said, we offer a wide variety of grips at the Golf Shop with a fast turnaround time so you don't have to give up a day of play. All of our grip prices

Attention all golf members: Please be sure to read the Golf Membership Handbook to stay abreast of all the rules and regulations of your golfing membership. We would like to put an emphasis on the Membership Medical Suspension Request Procedure. As stated in the membership handbook, "Should a current annual golf member of one of the On Top of the World golf courses become incapacitated during that year, there are several conditions that must be met before receiving consideration to obtain credit for this time period towards the following year's membership fees:

1. Within two weeks of sustain-

ing an accident or a medical condition, the member must submit paperwork describing the condition which prohibits golf activity to the Director of Golf.

- 2. The severity of the accident or medical condition must prohibit play for a minimum period of 150 days.
- B. A physician's statement must be submitted stating the nature of the accident or medical condition including when treatment began and when the patient was released.
- I. The Director of Golf will notify the member if the condition warrants a credit of membership fees towards next year's membership dues.
- No golf or driving range use may be played during the time of membership suspension.
- 6. The Director of Golf must be notified before the member returns to any golf participation.

All requests for credit will be reviewed by the golf department and must be approved by this department before any credit for the following year will be issued. No refunds will be issued for a membership suspension, except in the

event of death for a current golf member. If there is a couple membership, the remaining member will receive a credit towards the following year's membership fees."

Just like knowing the USGA rules, it can pay to know the policies and procedures in your Golf Membership Handbook. Don't miss out on the credit you deserve.

Eating healthy before, during and after your round may not only benefit your health but also your handicap.

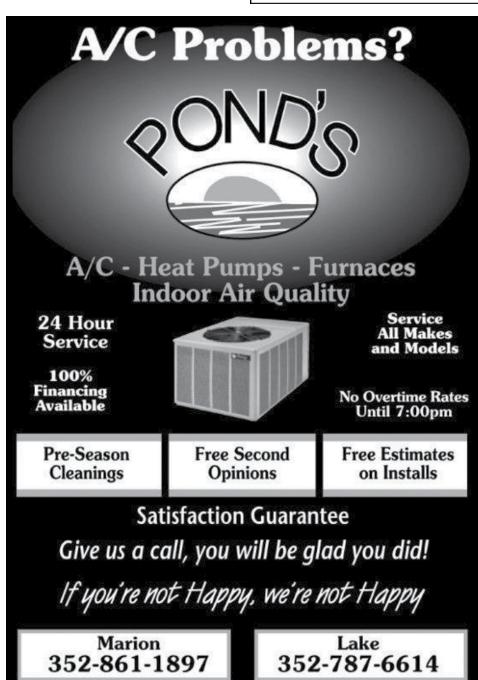

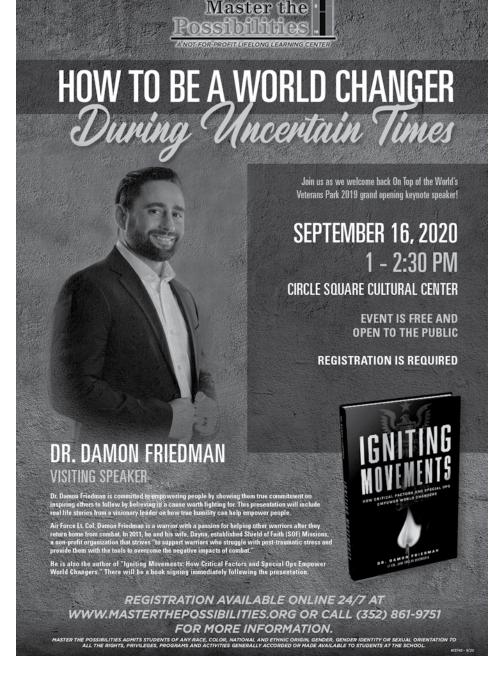

The slot races are held every Tuesday from 1 to 3 p.m. These little slot cars are fast, and they can complete a 15 lap race in four minutes. The track consists of S curves, straight-aways, and even a fueling station. Each driver has a handheld controller used to control speed, change lanes, and also refuel with the press of a button. It is entertaining and often hilarious watching or piloting these cars, and yes, there is Officer Michael's police car flashing his blue lights as he rides the bumper of a competitor.

Retired Sheriff Michael is a joyful bubbling personality, and sometimes he shares recollections of his dedicated retired police officer career. Michael and his wife lived in New York City before moving to a peaceful life in beautiful On Top of the World. He received an associate's degree in law enforcement and spent 13 years as a sheriff in Upstate New York, another 10 years with the New York City Police Department, and then as an accident investigator on New York highways.

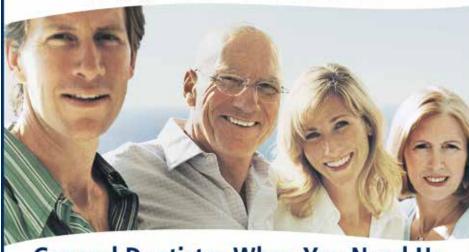
line as well as some older models being brought out for the first time in a long while, sometimes with new owners. Variety is indeed the spice of life.

Is it September already? Wow! At this time of the year, the US Open should be taking place in New York, and, if you have the Tennis channel, I would encourage you to watch as much as you possibly can. You can learn a lot from watching professional players from around the world. Even though some of the top seeded players opted not to participate, there are still plenty of good ones playing.

Tennis

On another subject, I am requesting from all of you to close the gates when you leave the courts. A gust of wind can take the gates off their hinges and damage the gate as well as the surface of the courts. So please, let's try to maintain all of the courts in perfect condition. Thank you all!

Over the years I have written about so many aspects of the sport of tennis, all in an effort to help you improve your game. This time, Í would like to touch on a subject that not many players think about it carefully, even though it can make a big difference in the way they play each point.

Reading the Ball

There are different things you can read from the second the ball leaves your opponent's racquet; an important one is the speed. The rhythm method of ball control states there is a rhythm to the speed of the ball. Balls hit at a medium to slow speed are three count shots - bounce, rise, peak; plant, shift, stroke; 1,2,3. Players have time for a full swing. Balls that are hit very fast or bounce at the feet are two count shots - bounce, hit; shift, block; 1,2. Most players try to cram a faster swing - into less

time on two count shots.

A player should be able to recognize that these shots require a step and block (little or no backswing or follow through). Players must know when they can perform a three count shot and when they must hit a two count shot. Many players believe their woes can be solved by learning a new mechanical secret. In many cases the problem is rhythmical, not mechanical. Learning to read the ball sooner and more accurately will allow for a better contact point that will solve most problems. At a minimum, it will allow a player the ability to groove an efficient stroke. Being a creative player, creating a different contact point on every shot will lead to frustration.

Contact Point of the Opponent

It is worthwhile to see and understand the contact point of the opponent. First, there is an "ideal" contact point for each shot - the place where the most force and control can be generated. Recognizing the contact point of the opponent will enable you to tell the "potential" and the "limitations" for the shot selection of your opponent, so you can give very low or very high balls where it is difficult to generate a lot of power or control.

The stroke work and grip of the opponent. Remember, you are building toward the ability to see multiple variables on the other side of the net. This is accomplished in other activities as well. For example, someone driving a car is able to see what is in front, on both sides and behind them. See the road condition, understand a safe speed and be able to depress the gas pedal or brake with the correct amount of effort. Like drivers, tennis players can be trained to accurately recognize ingredients that go into shot selection.

In scoring the game of pickleball here at On Top of the World, we utilize two kinds of scoring. One is called rally scoring and is not recognized by the USA Pickleball Association (USAPA). With rally scoring basically every single time someone misses a shot, even during a serve, the other team gets a point. Any fault means a point for the other team.

With the scoring used by the USAPA and the International Federation of Pickleball, things are different. This is what I call regular scoring. I guess it could be referred to as recognized scoring since this is what the rest of the world uses. Only the serving team can score points. Same in singles play. Only the person serving can score points. In doubles, both players on a team will serve before a side out is declared and the serve switches over to the opposing team. It must be noted that at the very start of a game the beginning side only gets one person serving. After that both sides utilize both players to serve. So, the starting server is actually designated as "server two" for scoring purposes at the beginning of a

I think the confusion for many beginners in using regular scoring is that they don't understand

what is happening when the score is called out. I will endeavor here to eliminate confusion. At the start of each side out, service begins in the right or even serving area. When the team's score is an even number the team's starting server's correct position is at the right/even serving area. When the team's score is an odd number the starting server's correct position is at the left/odd court. After each side out, service begins with the player correctly positioned on the right/even side of the court according to the team's score. This player is referred to as "server one" and the partner is "server two."

Server one will serve, alternating service sides after each point is won, until a rally is lost or the server's team commits a fault. Then it is time for the other person on that team to begin serving and switching sides every time a point is won. Before each serve the score is called out and this is where the confusion starts. In my own case, my brain is so far gone just remembering the score is a major accomplishment.

In calling out the score, here is a good rule to remember: think me, you and who. Me is my team's score. You is the opposing team's score, and who designates who is serving on that team. Server one or two. So, if you were to hear the person serving the ball say "five, one, two." What that means is his team has five points, the opposing team has one point, and he is the second server. I hope that helps some of our newer players.

Hello Autumn! Goodbye 'Fall'!

A welcome, seasonal change beckons as autumn draws near. This year the first day of fall will be Tuesday, Sept. 22. The National Council on Aging (NOCA) cleverly uses the start of fall to bring attention and awareness to "fall" risk reduction.

NOCA sponsors National Falls Prevention Awareness Week annually, which coincides with the start of fall. At the core of this initiative is a very important message; falls are not a normal part of the aging process, and they can be prevented. Falls are due primarily to a set of risk factors, which can be managed, and in many cases reversed. Everyone has the opportunity to reduce his or her fall risk through lifestyle modifications. Here are five things you can do to reduce your risk of falling:

1. Keep moving. Staying active is without a doubt essential to optimal aging and staying falls free. Regular physical activity preserves muscle, strength and power. This provides you with the ability to maintain good posture, gait function and the ability to react quickly to environmental changes. On Top of the World resident, Margaret Dobbins, a regular participant in fitness classes noted,

"Exercise has absolutely supported my ability to travel and keep up with my grand-children. On a trip to Italy last year, we had to venture down cobblestone streets and manage steep, narrow staircases. If it was not for my exercise, I would not have trusted my ability to keep up with the grandchildren and more importantly not to have fallen!"

- 2. Get Support. Talk with your health care provider and enlist the help of family, friends and qualified professionals. Share your history and any fear you have with falling. Guidance from your health care provider along with the right exercise program can be life changing. Resident Sumi Bridges remarked on how her doctor attributed her health resolve to exercise. "I am a two-time cancer survivor and my doctor told me that my ability to recover so well was due to being fit and physically active. In addition to overcoming cancer, I had a bad fall. I tripped on an uneven surface. I had a serious injury to my back and many of my peers thought that my Dance Aerobics days were over, but I proved them wrong! Once again I was able to come back from this setback because of my exercise!"
- 3. Review medications. Medication side effects and drug interactions can increase your fall risk. Keep a comprehen-

sive list of all the medications you take and ensure that your doctor and pharmacist are aware of these. One of the greatest gifts that exercise provides is the ability to reduce the need for medication. In many instances, regular physical activity coupled with a healthy diet can reduce need for blood sugar and blood pressure medications. Exercise is medicine!

4. Get your vision checked. Strength is a critical factor for balance, so is sensory acuity. The visual system, the auditory system and the somatosensory system (detects sensations, primarily derived from sensors in your skin) play an important role in providing the brain with

"sensory input," information that helps govern balance. Unfortunately, all of these systems typically fall victim to decline with age. Vision is your brain's "go to" for spatial awareness and therefore it is very important to light up your living space and keep eyeglass prescriptions current!

5. Manage environmental fall risk factors. Most falls occur in the home. The upside here is that we can control our personal space by eliminating slip and trip hazards. Keep your home clutter free, install handrails where needed, wear supportive shoes and make sure you have adequate lighting especially at night.

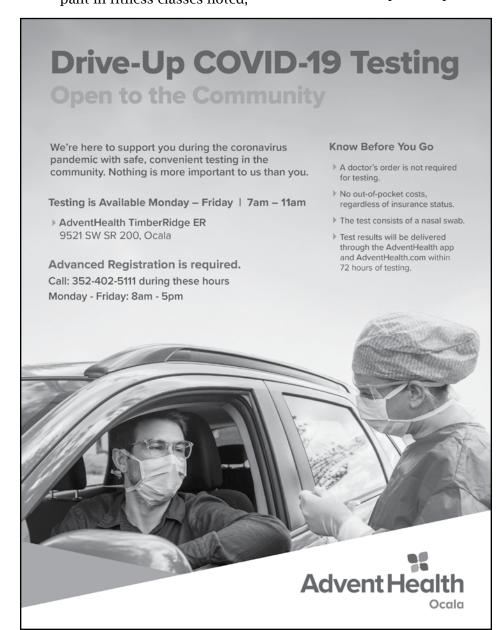

John won that one handily, not only

bringing in his plane at the lowest level but landing it upside down as

With the children grown and happily settled, John and Florentina's decision to relocate to On Top of the World became a no brainer. On Top of the World is only one of two active adult communities in the country that has its own flying field. It also has homes with three car garages, a feature that easily transferred into a very large workshop for John's planes. To make the move, John had to sell many of his treasured planes, and only one made the cut, and that only due to the fact that it fit into the SUV.

Soon after they moved into Stonebridge, John noticed that his next-door neighbor's garage door was open. He walked over and looked inside, and he could scarcely believe what he saw. There, on the garage floor, were six airplanes. Upon closer scrutiny, he was further astounded. One of them was an exact replica of his very special P51 Mustang, which he had just parted with.

Adding to the difficulty, the controls are in reverse right and left, making the landing of the aircraft particularly precarious. There are many crashes, as the planes can slide off the runway, and most recently, that is what happened to the aforementioned "Marie." It is, fortunately, in the restorative hands of its devoted owner and will soon be up, up and away once again, in all its glory.

There are many fascinating aspects to this exciting art - the fact that there are three ways to fuel the motors, gasoline, alcohol and electricity and all are controlled through radio transmission. There are many types of planes, and John is particularly taken with the flying wing models that do not have any tails. All the functions are performed by the wing.

An open invitation is extended to all to visit the field, which is located behind the new storage area beyond The Arbors. Once there you can experience the delight and expertise of the flying club members as they perform their intricate maneuvers in the sky and if you are lucky, you might come at a time when John is flying "Marie."

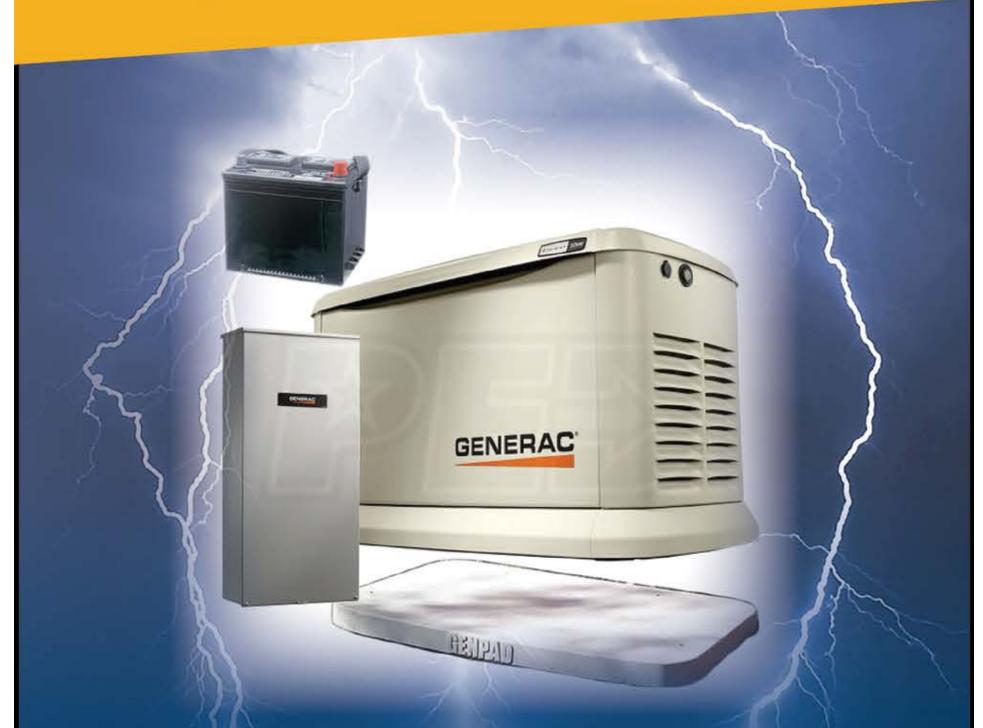

Artists give form to the immaterial. This includes the hidden or universal truths, spiritual and personal feel-

You can look at the images pictured and learn a little about each of these artists by studying their work. What are they trying to say to you? What do they feel deeply about? Sometimes the colors in the work will give you clues, as well as the style of their work, their brush work, and the energy in the piece.

Recent Happy Hooker columns have focused on various aspects and fun facts of knitting, crocheting, and embroidery. This month's topic on crochet hooks continues our series focus on the tools.

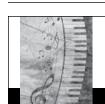
Crochet hooks started with people fashioning their own, usually of wood, bone or metal. In Ireland, exquisite Irish laces were worked with hooks made from stiff wire inserted into a piece of wood or cork. In the early 1920s sets of interchangeable hooks became popular. Each set consisted of a single handle, perhaps of bone or amber, with an assortment of short steel hooks generally ranging in sizes from 1 to 14. The crocheter simply selected the size hook needed for the project and screwed it into the tip of the handle.

In America, the Boye Needle Co. produced the first complete line of American-made steel crochet hooks in 1917. Each hook sold for a nickel. Aluminum hooks appeared in 1923, and hooks for hairpin crochet were introduced in 1935. World War II forced the government to order the cessation of nickel plating for crochet hooks in 1942, and Boye began a special

black plating process known as "hoto" black process, or hot oxide black process, in order to prevent corrosion of the hooks. Nickel plating was not reinstated until the latter part of May 1945.

Today's crochet hooks are made from many different materials including abalone, glass, bamboo and exotic woods such as rosewood and ebony and feature a wide variety of styles and embellishments. 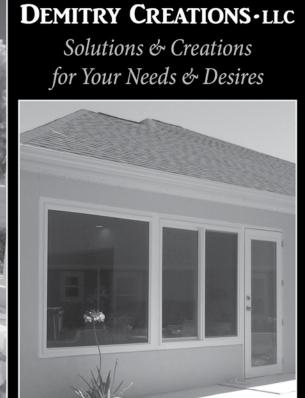

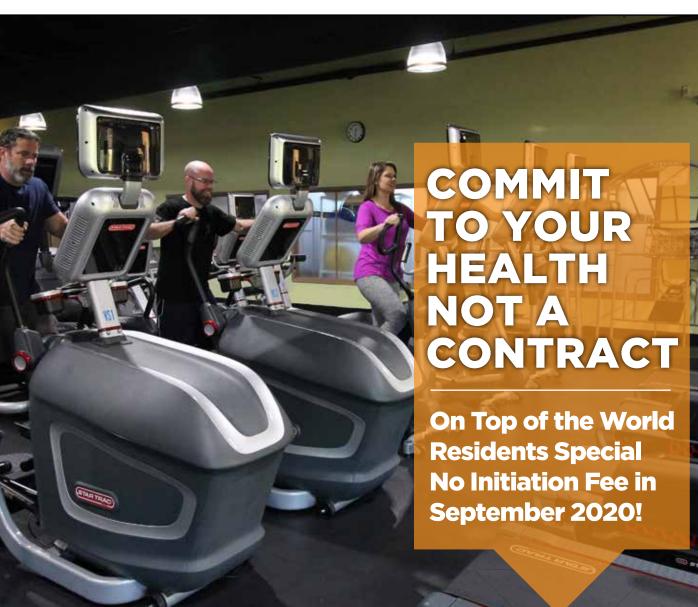

A great sense of accomplish-

The previous train room, a rather small space, has been vacated the new one in the Hobby Building is growing gangbusters. The new room is four times the size of the previous one and is host to not only a greatly expanded HO layout, but also an O gauge (Lionel) and G gauge layout.

The amount of progress is beyond the expectations of most members. Whether this is due to recent "social distancing" or due to the enthusiasm of a dedicated core group of model railroaders is hard to say - probably both.

Al Lohr is among that core group. What do flight test engineering and model railroad construction have in common? Answer: Al Lohr. Al transitioned from a 30-year career with Sikorsky Aircraft as a flight test engineer to his new "career" of model railroading. There is little doubt that a career with a company that was among the first to develop multi-engine "landplanes" as they were called, amphibious craft, and ultimately the leader in helicopter design and manufacture (UH-60 Blackhawk) brings some creative skills with it.

A random visit to the new train room will reveal two or three guys exercising their creative skills and hard work, with Al often among them. He moved from Connecticut to On Top of the World in 2008 and was one of the earliest members of the club. "I enjoy it - it's a good group of people," Al acknowledged. Moving and rebuilding the model town and laying a lot of track was accomplished in large part to the generous efforts of Al.

Now that the two main HO lines are completed around the room, the next phase will be adding spur lines to serve industries that will soon mushroom around the layout. Ongoing scenic improvements are headed by Joe Liminowski, with a great deal of assistance from Bernie Bossert, Bill Rostiser and Larry Luke.

While the new layout is not yet open to visitors, there is a large viewing window along the walkway along the left side of the Hobby Building. The town is located in front of the window. You will often see several club members doing a variety of model building jobs, from electrical wiring, to installing miniature lighting, to laying railroad sidings, to erecting houses and industries.

Camera Mode: Landscape

Here's another opportunity to move your camera dial off "auto" mode.

We've been talking about the icon-labeled scene modes on your camera dial. Even some smartphones have them. Use them to improve the quality of your shot. They can also be used by more advanced photographers with limited time to adjust their camera.

Most cameras will display a mountain shaped icon that represents landscape mode for you to select.

This mode has been optimized to create a well-focused image from the foreground all the way into the distance. It does this by automatically using a small f stop. It will also pick the lowest ISO possible to give you a sharp image. It works especially well if your scene is well lit. Some cameras will also boost the reds and greens, since that's what landscapes usually are.

Because your photo is probably well out of the range of your flash, most cameras will not allow it to use the flash.

While Phyllis didn't use landscape mode for her photo, a landscape like this would have been a good one to try.

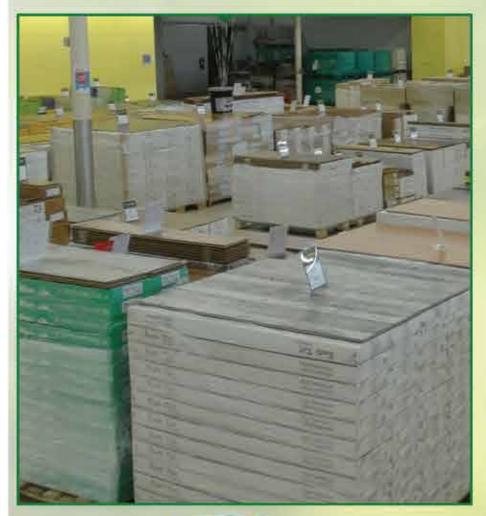
