**SCAM ALERT #1:** A client of mine told me that he'd got an email informing him that his email account had been hacked and the hacker got hold of all his contact lists and controlled his entire computer, or something like that. The hacker said he had special software that gets around anti-virus systems. The hacker said he/ she caught my client visiting "certain sites" and had a video of him and if he didn't pay some \$1,900 bitcoins to a bitcoin account, the video(s) would be sent to all my client's contacts. There was a comment that he was not to pass this on to anyone.

Folks, this is a common scam and it's particularly dangerous because it doesn't matter whether someone has or hasn't visited various sites. The purpose is to frighten you. Do not be frightened. Block the email domain.

**SCAM ALERT #2:** The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) wishes to remind all of us that scams against seniors are growing and growing. We must always be on the alert. My tip to you is to make up your mind that you just won't download anything from anyone on social media (Facebook, X, Instagram, etc.). For that matter, make up your mind that if family members want you to read an article, or see a photo, they must send it within the email so that you won't have to download or open it.

**Q.** Am I correct that in your lecture on "Estate and Probate Administration," you said that I could not leave my home-

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#### stead to friend?

A. I did not say that. To be specific, what I said was that a married person who owned a homestead in his or her name, alone, and was survived by his or her spouse, that married person can either leave a life estate to his or her spouse or leave the entire property to the spouse. An exception is if there were a signed, valid homestead waiver. The devise of homestead is a very complex area of Florida law. If a couple are married, but title to a Florida homestead is only in the name of one spouse rather than in both, Florida law limits how the homestead owner can pass that homestead to heirs through a will or a trust.

**Q.** I am a single woman who has been separated from my husband for many, many years. I live (in Florida), and he lives elsewhere. I have read your column and been to your lectures and love them all. However, I can live wherever I want and with whomever I choose. And I don't know why I can't.

A. If I'm reading you correctly, you are not a single woman. You are a married woman. Being separated, no matter how many years it is, does not make you single. It makes you married. You have a husband. Yes, you can live where you want and with whom you want. However, since you live in Florida, and since vou are married, this state's laws have a significant impact on your ownership of Florida property and in your ability to sell it or leave it to someone on your passing. Maybe you should discuss this with a lawyer.

**Q.** Are you as skeptical as you sometimes seem to be?

A. Yeah.



We now have a team collecting for these charities at our monthly meeting. I ask all to bring something to our meeting so that we can continue to support these worthy endeavors.

to my second point. Fire in the upland habitats is necessary to healthy succession of native plant communities and animal habitat. Much of the local plant ecology revolves around periodic fires. Seeds need the fire to break down the seed coat to germinate. Intrusive and competitive species are also reduced allowing for less competition with more established native plants.

On Top of the World did not conduct controlled burns in February. Pre-burn precautions include the annual plowing of wide fire breaks to minimize accidental spreading, as well as significant heavy equipment to contain the burn area. Florida Forest Service conducted significant controlled burns at the Greenway property, Withlacoochee, and Goethe State Forests in February. We believe that the massive smoke in the area on Wednesday, Feb. 28, drifted in from the fires in Texas. Fortunately, the event was of a very short duration.

#### Travel Season

If you are willing to venture out for a journey, the summer travel season is right around the corner. We know many residents take extended trips around the country. Experience teaches that added steps need to be taken before going on that extended trip to avoid possible disasters in your home when you are gone. Below is a short list of things to do:

Leave your contact number with at least two trusted neighbors or friends.

- Update the Association with emergency contact information.
- Have the interior of the home checked at least once a week by a trusted neighbor, friend, or arrange for an inspection service.
- Check in regularly with the trusted neighbor or friend while away.
- Arrange for a regular irrigation check if you are going away for an extended term.

Turn down the heat setting on your hot water heater to conserve

energy.

- Make sure the air conditioner is properly serviced by a professional before departing. This includes a drain line flush. Air filters require monthly attention and can be changed by the owner.
- Leave the thermostat set at between 78 to 80 degrees Fahrenheit, this helps regulate humidity in the home and prevent the occurrence of mold or mildew.
- Make sure you homeowner's insurance policy is current and covers both damage from wind, wa-

Just like I said, the first quarter of this year was in a hurry to leave and now it is April! Well, at least spring is here and so are my allergies! What did I find out about April? You are going to love this – April is named for the Greek goddess of love, Aphrodite. Also, April comes from the Latin verb "aperio," which means "to open" or bloom because plants really begin to grow now.

Interesting days in April are April Fools' Day on April 1; National Peanut Butter and Jelly Day on April 2; National Beer Day on April 7; International Moment of Laughter Day on April 14; Titanic Remembrance Day and Tax Day are both on April 15.

#### Reminders

Please ensure that contractors working on your home modification(s) pick up all associated debris during and at completion. They must haul it away and not place it in community dumpsters.

#### Safety

If you are driving on our streets and golf cart paths, for your safety and the safety of others, please adhere to all traffic signs. Failing to stop, improper or no use of turn signals and speeding can only end badly.

#### **Spring Zoysia Maintenance**

For owner-maintained homes, give your Zoysia a low cut for the first mow of the spring. Keep it mowed between one to two inches for the remainder of spring. Fertilize your lawn using a slowrelease fertilizer applying no more than one pound of nitrogen per 1,000 feet; two and a half pounds of potassium. Don't overwater. In the spring growing season, Zoysia needs about half an inch of water per week from natural rainfall or irrigation. In the active growing season, Zoysia needs about one inch of water per week from natural rainfall or irrigation.

Apply a broad-spectrum insecticide to prevent spring insects from appearing or to control any current spring insects like chinch bugs or white grubs. Apply a systemic fungicide at a preventive rate to keep disease from taking hold of your lawn. If you see circular patches of brown or dead grass, do not apply fertilizer until you've applied a systemic fungicide at a curative rate and your grass has recovered. For the health and safety of your lawn, please consult with a landscape professional before applying chemicals.

#### Watering Restrictions

Please don't forget that watering restrictions changed with daylight saving time. You may now water twice per week. Please visit ontopoftheworldinfo.com/watering-restrictions for your scheduled days.

Resident Services is closed daily between noon and 1 p.m. The time begins when the last resident assisted before closing vacates the building as soon after noon as possible.

You may wish to complete your maintenance request online versus stopping by the office. Visit OTOWInfo.com > Maintenance Request and enter your request. Be sure to scroll down to enter the service you are requesting and click submit. Please note that this method may not be the best in order to report the full details of your request due to a limit in characters allowed, however, you may also call, email or come into the Resident Services office. In addition, this is also a good time in which to use the AppFolio portal to submit a service request. In this way, you will be able to track the progress of your request.

When you closed on your home, you became eligible to obtain up to two resident ID card(s). These ID cards expire every five years after date of issuance for records update. Non-owner resident ID cards expire every year. Every third or fourth resident residing in a household is required to pay an annual guest fee. The first decal is free to owners. The second decal is \$15. Any additional gate decals issued per household are \$75 each. Tenants may obtain a free monthly gate pass or purchase a \$75 vehicle decal.

The Moonstruck Astronomy Club held their monthly meeting on Thursday, March 14. The meeting started with Larry Isenberg presenting the club's financial report and informing members that the club roster is currently at 77



did a presentation on how to build a Sun Funnel to safely view solar eclipses. He also shared photos of past solar eclipses he viewed over the years.

Larry informed members that the Moonstruck Astronomy Club invites residents to join the club in viewing the upcoming solar eclipse at the R/C flying field. Residents in Ocala will not be able to witness a total eclipse but will view the Sun being eclipsed to a maximum of 61%. The eclipse will occur on Monday, April 8, starting at 1:45 p.m., reaching maximum at 3:02 p.m. and ending at 4:17 p.m., a total duration of two hours, 32 minutes. The club will have over a half dozen telescopes set up to safely view the event. The club will have solar glasses to pass out to members for safe viewing.

Larry reminded everyone that you should never view a solar eclipse without the proper protection.

Club members are reminded to watch for emails announcing more evening observation sessions in the coming weeks and months. Sessions will be announced on any day that weather conditions allow for an open sky and club members are willing to set up their telescopes to share observations. Members are welcome to arrive and stay if they wish throughout the evenings. All sessions are held adjacent to the R/C flying field.

Regular meetings of the Moonstruck Astronomy Club are on the second Thursday of every month from 1:30 to 3 p.m. in the Hobby Building Event Room. All residents and Gateway of Services pass holders can join the club, and new members are welcome! 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

Gone are the days when a set of encyclopedias in our home gave us a valued resource of information, but they were only as up to date as the last set purchased. Today we don't even go to the library, just onto the internet. With over a billion websites, how do we know which are reliable sources?

Start your browser search with specific keywords that will get you closest to your goal. Sometimes the top websites found might have "report ad" next to them, as they paid to be first, although still popular and often valid.

Look at the domain extensions: only the government can use .gov and only colleges/universities can use .edu. Anyone in a country can use a country domain found at the end of the https:// line as in .ca Canada, .ru Russia, and .us United States, for example.

A credible source would be unbiased, with other evidence documented served for a guest genealogist to review a specific area of interest. All residents can join. and additional sources. Some things to check – published within the last few years, respected authors, academic or government database referrals, bibliography, no broken links, no grammar and punctuation errors, updated information, including contact information of the author.

Some websites jump out with pages that don't load properly, unorganized structure, large, sponsored ads that might show bias, or requests to sign up immediately. Although going to Wikipedia is often a first thought, it can be edited by anyone, so it is generally not considered a reliable educational source, but often the footnotes lead you to more credible information.

If you think something was plagiarized, there are tools available to check, by copying the wording and pasting it into the checker. A well-built website might have accessibility for disabled users to use such as text-to-speech/Braille, enlargeable text, highlighted links with contrasting colors to be more visible, large clickable buttons, and other helpful features.

Lots of information can be obtained on the About Us or Contact page of a website. Check if the author published their content in other credible news or publication sites and check the publication dates for a current time frame. Any links to a 404 or Not Found page will give you a clue that the website itself has not been updated.

We keep the meeting fun and offer suggestions and possible solutions to help our members.



The restaurant was located on Potter Pond in Matunuck. In addition to eating at the restaurant, you can book a tour of the oyster beds and learn more about aquaculture and fisheries on a local and global scale. Their raw bar had a variety of cherrystones, littleneck clams and of course the locally grown oysters often accompanied by herbs and vegetables grown in their organic vegetable farm. They also featured traditional seafood dishes.

Visitors to Rhode Island will find an array of wonderful food opportunities and fresh seafood stands out as particularly delectable. We always enjoy a lunch of "chowda" and clam cakes, along with a lobster roll brimming with large pieces of lobster from the claws and tail. 

#### **Eco Gardeners**

Who are the Eco Gardeners? We are the gardeners located at the intersection of SW 99th Street Road and SW 98th Street. We were formerly known as the 99th Street Gardeners, however, we changed our name to coincide with our goals to enlighten, assist and inform people who are looking for alternatives to vegetables grown in industrial settings.

Eco Gardeners share ideas on alternatives to synthetic herbicides and pesticides, utilize best practices on cultivating heirloom vegetables, as well as our garden experiences, be they good or bad. We also participate in seed sharing programs, garden walks, and talks with On Top of the World's Master Gardeners, speakers from UF/IFAS Marion County Extension, and guest organic gardeners.

In February, Jeremy Rhoden the urban and residential horticulture agent and master gardener volunteer coor-dinator for UF/IFAS Extension Marion County was the guest speaker. Jeremy emphasized the importance of pH, the measurement of acidity or alkaline in

soil, and how it affects the growth and fruit production to increase or decrease the ability of the plant to absorb vital micro nutrients.

Eco Gardeners are encouraged to use water conservation measures such as drip, low flow, and micro sprayers. Synthetic pesticides and herbicides are discouraged. Members share experiences and techniques using alternative including organic controls. To combat nema-todes, a persistent parasite that attacks plant roots and ultimately kills the plant, we can use neem oil a product grown in Florida derived from the neem tree. Marigolds and beneficial nematodes are also utilized. Marigolds deter nematodes when planted near vegetables susceptible to them and attract pollinators.

Early or late tomato blight is a disease caused by fungus-like organism that spreads rapidly through the foliage and fruit of tomatoes in warm, wet weather causing collapse and decay. Natural remedies some gardeners employ are compost extracts, compost teas, hydrogen peroxide, baking soda or Bacillus thuringiensis (Bt), a unique bacterium that can also be used to control insects. Bt is safe for humans and is the most widely used environmentally compat-

ible biopesticide worldwide. Powdery mildew is another problem Florida gardeners must contend with. It attacks the leaves of plants including, squash, artichoke, beans, beets, carrot, cucumber, eggplant, lettuce, mel-ons, parsnips, peas, peppers, tomatoes, and turnips. The acetic acid present in vinegar will change the fungus pH, killing the disease effectively.

A trend in organic controls of pests and diseases is a resurgence of forgotten treatments that have given way to the convenience promoted by compa-nies offering manufactured synthetic products. Today organic gardeners may employ old school remedies like baking soda, vinegar, oils, hydrogen peroxide or milk to prevent, control and fortify plant growth.

#### **Raspberry Mousse Brownies**

Use your favorite brownie recipe, even one from a mix, and then follow the directions below.

1 cup semisweet chocolate chips

 $\frac{3}{4}$  cup whipping cream

3 tablespoons red raspberry jelly or jam

1 cup cream cheese frosting, canned or home-made

1-1/2 teaspoons whipping cream

Fresh raspberries, if desired

Heat oven to 350°F (325°F for dark or nonstick pan). Grease bottom only of 8-inch or 9-inch square pan with cooking spray or shortening. (For easier cut-ting, line pan with foil, then grease foil on bottom only of pan.) Make brownies as directed. Cool completely, about 1-1/2 hours.

Reserve two tablespoons chocolate chips for drizzle. In medium microwavable bowl, place remaining chocolate chips, 3/4 cup whipping cream and 3 tablespoons raspberry jelly/jam. Microwave uncovered on high 2 to 3 minutes, stirring once every minute, until chocolate is melted. Stir until mixture is smooth (there may still be a little undissolved jelly). Refrigerate about 30 minutes or until slightly thickened.

Add frosting to chocolate mixture. Beat with electric mixer on high speed one to two minutes or until well blended and fluffy. Spread over cooled brownies, smoothing top.

In small microwavable bowl, microwave reserved two tablespoons chocolate chips and 1-1/2 teaspoons whipping cream uncovered on high 30 to 45 seconds, stirring once, until mixture can be stirred smooth. Stir in a few additional drops of whipping cream to thin chocolate, if necessary. Drizzle over frosting mixture. Refrigerate 1 to 2 hours or until set.

Cut into nine squares; cut each square diagonally in half to make triangles. Garnish with raspberries.

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## **Kyudo: The Path of the** Bow

As a 16th generation, avid fly-fishing Marylander, with a master's degree in education and a background in riding and training horses, Brenda Foster, be-ing hooked on the hook, moved from Maryland to Central Pennsylvania because of its abundance of tempting flyfishing locales.

But then it was time to move on. Considering her background with horses and our proximity to nature and the coast, she explored eight retirement communities from Tampa to Orlando, eventually settling here in 2021 to On Top of the World. Interacting with people within the same age range and being

blown away by all the activities available here sealed the deal as she now is active in tennis, table tennis, POP tennis, teaching fly fishing, a meditation group, and as a 30-year student of it, teaches tai chi here. Phew! My keyboard struggles to keep up with her path.


Brenda explained that tai chi is a martial art, one that professes an "inward journey" and transforming one's ways of thinking. The absence of thought, re-ally, allowing the body to simply move "without thinking about it ... just doing it." Her tai chi instructor once said to her that the best time in life to learn the art is before seven, and after 70 years of

age because tai chi is not about muscle strength.

While practicing Zen in Pennsylvania and having admired Japanese and Chinese philosophy and arts for most of her adult life, her teacher made her aware of kyudo. She attended kyudo lessons in Eustis, Florida, loved it, and hired a teacher in Ocala for private lessons. So now, one might ask, okay, what is kyudo?

Kyudo is one of Japan's oldest and most honored martial arts, being the traditional Japanese martial art of archery. The basic parallels between kyudo and tai chi are almost identical, both demanding inner strength, spirit, and controlled enthusiasm. Kyudo demands that internal self-connect which is expressed through the bow and projected onto the arrow.

'Take everything that you' ve learned and forget about it. Transfer your inner spirit to the bow, string, arrow, and project the release of the arrow to the target." Brenda explained that "the mastery of



So, how popular is kyudo in the United States? Well, under 200 devotees practice this martial art form domesti-cally, with only one "7th dan" (out of the highest 10) teacher. A "dan" is a title of expertise, complete with levels consis-tent with theorem tent with those of martial arts.

Brenda and fellow kyudo and tai chi classmate, Shizuka Campagna (who also teaches Japanese cooking and language at Master the Possibilities), take kyudo lessons at The Arbors, and practice the formal process of shooting with their instructor at the archery range at the Veterans Park. Both being a "shodan" which is similar to the first-degree black belt level in martial arts, they are focused on earning and achieving the next level of their path.

In November 2023, Brenda planned a trip to Japan with friends from New York where she met with a 7th dan teacher who lives in Nagoya, Japan who has a goal of introducing kyudo to the world. Having attended the group's class-

room and range sessions, I will say that I was amazed over the structured ritual of letting an arrow loose to find its target. There is a formal presentation phase, followed by a formal shooting phase that takes about five minutes to shoot just two arrows. The process is mesmerizing. Meditative. Pure and pristine. Focused and balanced. The same, each and every time. And this perspective comes from a guy who loves to watch Dick Butkus videos. Trust me, kyudo is all that Brenda described. She pointed out that "On Top of the World is fortunate to have an excellent Archery Club that has embraced kyudo and encouraged my practice."

Oh, by the way ... it took Brenda 14 months of pursuit until her arrow finally followed - the path of the bow - to meet its target.

Kyudo is listed in the Master the Possibilities catalog on Wednesdays, April 17 through May 8.



#### **R/C Car Club**

A question often asked by new drivers, "What will this hobby cost me?" The focus is always the cost of a vehicle but there are other costs to consider as well, battery, battery charger, tires, parts, and tools. A good budget to anticipate is \$500 to get started, this includes the vehicle and other costs.

Vehicles can be broken down into three different types: trucks, buggies, and cars. The R/C Car Club only races 1/10 scale vehicles so all costs are for this size. Trucks can range in cost from \$250 to \$500. Buggies from \$200 to \$550. Cars come in a wide range of types and prices. Road type cars cost from \$200 to \$300; touring cars from \$300 to over \$1,000; and pan cars from \$500 to \$700.

R/C vehicles are sold in different lev-els of assembly. Ready to run (RTR) vehicles, as the name indicates, are ready to run out of the box. They will include all the components and parts needed to operate less the battery. RTR vehicles also will include a radio transmitter. Many of the higher end vehicles will be sold as kits. Kit means that assembly is required and not all the components are included in the box. Typically, you will need to purchase separately the motor, tires, body, and servo. The entry level cost of these components is about \$250 and can reach as high as \$700, depending on what quality of component you desire. Kits do not include the radio transmitter which on average cost \$180. However, once you have purchased the transmitter you can add your total fleet

to the one device.

There are many different manufacturers of R/C vehicles. In the R/C Car Club the Traxxas Bandit and the Team Associates RC10 series are the most popular buggies. Other manufacturers are, from the low end in cost to the expen-sive, Tamiya, Yokomo, Kyosho, Serpent, Losi and Xray. Popular manufacturers of trucks are Team Associates, Traxxas, Losi and Arma. The Traxxas 4-Tec 2.0 is a popular road car and has its own racing class in the club. Touring cars have the widest range in cost with the Serpent S411 available for \$300 RTR and at the high end the Xray X4 starting at \$720 for a kit. Most of the R/C Car Club members who race Pan cars run the CRC Gen-x with a kit price of \$250. Other pan car manufacturers are Serpent, Xray and Roche.



operations are the driving force behind this status. Weekly, the team will be seen changing target faces, repairing targets and target stands and maintaining the range grounds. To build and repair the targets they have equipment designed to cut and replace the wood, install the filling material, and press the targets to the correct size and shape.

Two or three times a month, when there is a scheduled shoot, the team uses a series of dollies to move targets to the correct distances for the shoot. Additionally, the team maintains the onsite archery shop with equipment designed to fabricate arrows and align, calibrate, and test recurve and compound bows.

When there are high winds in the forecast the team is also responsible for securing the range and that consists of moving all the targets into the archery shop. That is no small feat! Many thanks again to the 12 team members who provide this outstanding service so that our members have a safe, clean, and professional archery range.

Can you name the various bow types? Most of us remember movies featuring Robin Hood with his long bow and if you watch the Olympics, you will see the recurve bow used. Our members use these bows and many also use a compound bow. In addition to these bow types, hunters may use a cross bow. Something new for our club is a different version of the longbow used in kyudo, the Japanese martial art of archery, a form of training the body and mind. Several of our members have been practicing kyudo and they alternate their sessions between one of the studios at the Arbor Conference Center where they practice entering the room (part one, called "taihai") or at the range (part two, called "has-setsu") when they stand and get ready to shoot. If you are interested in what kyudo is all about, check out the class that is being held at Master the Possibilities in April called "Kyudo – The Way of the Bow. Next month we will catch up with the results of various off-site shoots that several of our members have competed in over the winter season. Many medals have been brought home to Ocala! 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

bers have been asking:

**Q.** What happens if the player in the act of service misses the ball completely, or it falls directly onto the floor?

**A.** A missed serve is called a "fault" if

the server swings and misses the ball. The server may stop the serve by catching the ball and starting over. A player loses a point if he/she fails to make a good serve (e.g. Throwing the ball in the air and failing to hit the ball or failing to hit it onto the opponent's side of the table) or allows the ball to bounce twice on the server's side of the table. If the ball touches the net and lands in, it remains in play and a repeat serve is allowed. There is no limit to the number of net (let) serves.

For a legal serve in table tennis, you must throw the ball into the air at least six inches. You can't just hit the ball straight out of you hand which is common for beginners when first starting to play.

**Q.** Which side to use on the paddle?

**A.** While this isn't always true, in most cases the red side allows the ping pong ball to go faster. The black side is usually known to put a better spin on the ball. Since generally the red is faster and spins a bit less, professionals tend to use





# **A Hobby That Reaches Back in Time**

There are hobbies and there are hobbies. Resident Chuck Brittingham's hobby takes him back to post World War II listening to the sounds coming from a "wire recorder." This was before tape, and well before the ability to record on an iPhone.

Wire recorder hobbyist Chuck Brittingham grew up in a small Ohio town where his dad ran a radio, and later, television repair shop. It was a natural magnet for a young boy who, after complet-ing his homework, would spend time at the store, tinkering and learning. "It was a good time for me," Chuck says, "I learned a lot about electronics, and just as important, what it took to stay fo-

He and Pat settled in On Top of the World in 2002. It was shortly after this that he learned of a relative who had "inherited" several reels of magnetic wire that Chuck's father had recorded while Chuck was overseas. But the missing ingredient for hearing what his dad had recorded, was a "wire recorder." Chuck searched the internet and found a 1947 recorder. He purchased it sight unseen, and when it arrived, he realized that all his experience at his father's work bench would be needed to get the recorder operative. #### Model Railroaders

OTOW MODEL RR CLUB

In the early days of the railroads, one of the major obstacles that had to be overcome was communicating with and controlling the trains. The railroads only constructed one track between cities. So how can multiple trains going in the same direction be controlled on the same track? Even more critically, how can one prevent two trains being on the same track going in opposite directions?


The first step in the solution was to create another track called a siding or passing track, long enough to hold an entire train along-side the main line. Control (switch) towers were built near the sidings and were in communication with each other via telegraph lines using Morse Code.

The semaphore signal was patented in the early 1840s by Joseph Stevens. The semaphore consisted of a pole with a colored "arm" that could pivot to different angles. The base of the arm had two (or three) colored lenses with an oil/gas lamp for illumination. The movement of the arm was accomplished by a lever system from the switch tower to the semaphore. If the arm was horizontal (red/stop), the train must stop and await further instructions. If diagonal (yellow/approach caution), the speed must be reduced to the extent that the train could be stopped prior to a collision. If the arm was vertical (green/clear), the indication was full speed ahead.

On the siding, or passing track, there was another semaphore positioned where the entire train could stop and was clear of the main. This train must wait until the semaphore displayed the diagonal (yellow) "approach caution" signal.

The evolution of the semaphore saw the modifications to the arm in size, end structure and number of arms. The oil/ gas lamps were replaced with colored light bulbs powered by electricity. The movement of the arm was converted to hydraulic or pneumatic power.

In North America mechanical signals are almost gone from the main lines. The semaphore system has been replaced by direct radio signals to the cab of the engine and GPS devices, which now provide the most precise positioning.



"And Then There Were None" is one of many books written by Agatha Christie during her lifetime (1890-1976). Besides full-length novels, she wrote short stories, plays and poetry. This novel was written in 1939 and is considered a "closed circle" type of murder mystery. Miss Christie herself described it as the most difficult of her books to write. Her famous characters, Hercule Poirot and Miss Jane Marple, do not appear in this mystery. Rather it is populated by 10 major characters and a few minor ones who appear only briefly.

minor ones who appear only briefly. The story begins by telling us how each of eight passengers being taken to Indian Island received their invitations to attend what they believed would be a fashionable party. They didn't know each other nor the host. They were greeted by a couple, a butler and his wife, the cook, making 10 people now on the island. Their host had not yet made an appearance.

After a pleasant dinner, a recording

began that recounted for every guest their own unique transgression against society for which they had never been held legally accountable. Of course, they each in turn protested their innocence to the others, giving their version of what had happened and why. Then the first of the 10 is murdered in a manner like the nursery rhyme "Ten Little Indians." This rhyme had been framed and hung in each guest's room. There were also 10 small Indian figurines displayed in the middle of the dining table. It was then noticed that there were only nine left; just as in the rhyme. Who had taken it?

As the rest of the evening and the next days progress, one by one a guest is murdered and, in the manner, corresponding to their progression in the rhyme and an Indian disappearing off the table each time. Who was doing this and who was next?

Of course, they could not trust one another but the murderer had to be one of them. They could find no one else on the island. Eventually, there were none. There is an answer as to how and why the murders were carried out at the end of the book. I found the book to be a fast read because, of course, one wants to know who's next.



Katie spent most of her adult life in Peoria, Illinois, where she worked as a board certified anatomic and clinical pathologist. In December 2018, she retired after 28 years of practice. With her husband, she moved to On Top of the World in 2019.

As told by Katie, "My mom taught me to sew. I was inspired to make my own clothes, so I could have pants and sleeves that were long enough. For many years, I was too busy to sew until I discovered quilting. I took one class and was "hooked." I prefer Pfaff machines, due to the integrated dual feed system that acts like a walking foot. I have two Pfaff machines (one of which does embroidery) and an old Brother machine that only does straight stitch, but it is a workhorse. My sewing room also houses an American professional quilting system longarm, allowing me to quilt my own quilts.

I love to make time consuming complicated quilts that push my ability. My favorite quilting technique is paper piecing, because of the precision it affords. But most of all, I love the feel of quality fabric, the colors, and watching the quilt top become more stunning as it comes together.

My favorite thing about Sunshine Quilters Guild is the members. We all share our passion for quilting, the knowledge we have gained, and have a fun time doing so. I love how experienced quilters eagerly help those just starting their quilting journey."



The weekly Artistic Crafts & Gifts Tuesday craft show at the Recreation Center Ballroom is from 9 a.m. to noon through May.

Our website ArtisticCrafts.org will give you a glimpse of our very talented crafters and artisans. The group started back in the early 1990s, and the show has grown from seven crafters to over 50 on Tuesday, with even more online for their visual presence. All resident crafters are welcome to sell virtually on our website and inquire about a table at our Tuesday show.

This month we feature Terri Bushnell from New York, who as a child, was a member of the craft of the month club. She was surrounded by talented grandmothers who taught her sewing, knitting, crocheting, and needlepoint. Later, she expanded to ceramics and excelled at painting. At 16, she would analyze items she saw at craft shows and make them herself. With her father's \$500 encouragement, she set off to a local warehouse for dried floral and silk flower wreath supplies. Using her mother's sewing machine, she also made very popular bunnies with dresses, wall hangings, ornaments, and floral arrangements, as sales supported her crafting habit and financial freedom.

While at her job at West Point, she was asked to make the largest yellow ribbon, which was placed at the front entrance of the hospital to show their support for the service members who were deployed during Desert Storm. After meeting her future husband through Army friends, she found a quilting shop and bought her first quilt sewing machine and an embroidery machine, starting another avenue of her artisan life making flags and tailored clothing. Then in their move to a Korean base, she taught quilting classes and took classes in Korean papercraft and calligraphy, and even got to travel to China, Australia, and Japan. After his Army retirement, they spent seven years in Abu Dhabi and continued touring around the world until landing in Florida. Living in all those exotic places allowed her to pick up different fabrics, craft items, local art, and experience the world from a fabulous perspective of meeting all types of creative people.

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
