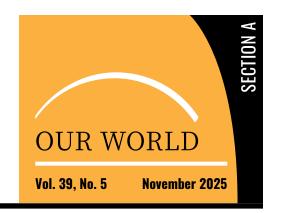

Association Meetings

Matters of general interest to your community, an update on recreation and meeting facilities, a review of the projected budgets for the coming year, and any legislative changes affecting your community will be among the topics discussed at each annual meeting.

Construction Updates

THE SUMMIT: Progress continues at Longleaf Ridge as this 20,000-squarefoot amenity nears completion. Exterior work is wrapping up, while interior finishes are now underway. Both pools are actively under construction, including what will be On Top of the World's firstever resistance pool. The grand opening is tentatively scheduled for January

AZURA FITNESS CENTER: Construction is now going vertical at this state-of-the-art facility that will feature top-of-the-line fitness equipment and a 5,000-squarefoot pool. The project is estimated to be completed by Summer 2026.

RECREATION CENTER: Planned major renovations to the front of the main building are in the works. The plans are currently in review for permitting, and we are optimistic about starting the project before the end of the year. The work will be completed in phases and will also include landscaping improvements. Once permitted, we hope to display elevation plans in the work area.

NEW WOOD SHOP: Design work is ongoing for this new facility. Due to the specialized nature of this building, we have collaborated with experts and with the club leadership to ensure it will be a toptier amenity for the community. One key feature is an upgraded dust-collection system, carefully designed in coordination with club members to meet the space's specific needs. The facility will be a 7,200-square-foot amenity building that will also serve as a home for additional activities such as table tennis, ballet, and more.

SHUFFLEBOARD COURTS: The new surfaces are complete and look fantastic. These new courts will provide better control of discs and improved play. Let the games begin!

SAND VOLLEYBALL COURT: Construction of the new sand volleyball court is underway. Currently, we are working on the excavation and drainage phase. We'll be installing an all-new adjustable netting system and boundary markers. Projected completion is approximately 60 days, weather permitting.

CANDLER HILLS GOLF CLUB: The golf course renovation is nearing completion, and a grand re-opening has been scheduled for Monday, Nov. 10. We look forward to welcoming back our members and residents. Until then, the Golf Shop will continue to have reduced hours but will still be open Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

IRONS 9 PITCH & PUTT: We finally received the permits for the construction of the Irons 9 Pitch & Putt located at the roundabout at SW 80th Street and SW

Celebrate Veterans Day Together

On Top of the World invites local communities to join us on Tuesday, Nov. 11, to commemorate Veterans Day. Originally known as Armistice Day, it was a celebration held each year to mark the armistice that ended World War I hostilities, which took effect on the "eleventh hour, of the eleventh day of the eleventh month" of 1918. Now known as Veterans Day in the United States, we come together as a nation to honor those who served. We hope you will join us on this special occasion.

Hosted by Veterans Club President Charles Calhoun and On Top of the World's Recreation Department Fitness Director Leslee Stephens, commemorations begin at 7:45 a.m. with a Flag Honors Ceremony at Veterans Park Memorial followed by an 8:30 a.m. honor walk. Non-resident guests are asked to park their cars by 7 a.m. at the Recreation Center parking lot (9030 SW 99th Street Road, Ocala, Florida 34481), allowing ample time to ride the shuttle service to the event. Residents may park their golf carts on the park's grassy surrounds by 7:45 a.m. or park them at the Recreation Center and use the shuttle bus.

Flag honors will be presented by the Marion County Memorial Honor Guard (a volunteer wartime veterans authorized to wear original military dress uni-

The honor walk (0.75 mile) kicks off at 8:30 a.m., heading to the Recreation Center. Participants may create an 8-inch-by-10-inch storyboard of their beloved veteran to be displayed as they trek to the Recreation Center (an event flyer available in the Recreation Center Lobby provides an interactive storyboard template).

After the honor walk, the Fun With Golf Carts Club will host a patriotic Veterans Day golf cart parade. Residents are invited to decorate their golf carts and join the parade staging in front of the dog park adjacent to the Veterans Park. A reception will be held to greet everyone as they arrive, offering refreshments, support, and guidance on how to participate in other ongoing activities.

Storyboards are to be displayed in the Recreation Center Ballroom during the event and later archived on the Marion County Virtual Veterans Legacy Memorial website.

At 8:45 a.m., On Top of the World's Fitness Department invites everyone to

show solidarity with our active-duty soldiers, sailors, airmen, coast guardsmen, and space guardians by participating in a 22-count push-up challenge. Awards for fastest individual to complete 22 push-ups, most push-ups beyond 22, and most senior competitor to complete the challenge will be given out.

At 11 a.m. in the Recreation Center Ballroom, join us for presentations by a keynote speaker, Poms Dance & Cheer Squad, Dancing Divas, and Presentation of the Colors by our local West Port High School Junior ROTC cadets. We look forward to seeing everyone at these exciting and memorable Veterans Day events.

Is It Legal?

I would like to take a moment to discuss "over-55" communities and condominium and homeowner associations, regardless of their location within the United States.

First, the concept of an "over-55" community originates from the federal Housing for Older Persons Act of 1995 (HOPA). Before Congress passed HOPA, condominium and homeowner associations could exclude occupancy of their units to persons below a certain age, usually to prevent minors or other folks, perhaps too young, or pregnant, from residing in the community. There are different types of housing for older persons, but I will only discuss "over-55" communities.

Essentially, in this type of community, HOPA requires that, to maintain the over-55 status, at least 80% of the units must be occupied by at least one person aged 55 years or older. Notice that I've emphasized "occupied," not own. If the over-55 status is lost, then federal law prohibits discrimination in housing based on age, race, sex, etc. Therefore, maintaining that status is crucial for associations that cater to older individuals who prefer to live in an adult environment.

What does this all mean for folks who live in, and who occupy a dwelling in, On Top of the World? Example: A 60-year-old person occupies a unit with his/her 50-year-old spouse. This complies with HOPA. Suppose the 60-year-old passes on. Can a 50-year-old individual remain in occupancy with all the privileges afforded to anyone in occupancy? Yes. Why? Remember that 20% part? Well, at On Top of the World that 20% is available for persons who survive the one who is 55 or older.

Now, what about someone who inherits a dwelling at On Top of the World? Can the child who inherits the property move in and occupy it? The child must be over 14 (I believe), but aside from that, yes, the beneficiary can occupy. Why? Same reason.

At On Top of the World, that 20% figure is kept available for just these purposes. Ownership? Well, remember what I said about occupancy? It's occupancy that matters, not ownership. Therefore, people under 55 can own property regardless of whether they also occupy it.

Okay, so what about the person over 55 who lives with their 10-year-old grandchild? If the over-55 passes on, can the 10-year-old continue to occupy? Thank heavens it hasn't happened at On Top of the World, but if it did, the answer

would be no. Some age restrictions can be legally maintained. It might be 14 or

younger, but I am not sure on that one. Can someone "get away" with violating the over-55 rules? I suppose so. There are many other types of examples, but I've just outlined the basics.

Q. How do you see artificial intelligence (AI) affecting the practice of law?

A. Neat question. Thanks. I'm sure it will impact how lawyers utilize information gathered from their clients to draft documents. Good lawyers will use it as a tool to assist with drafting. Lazy lawyers will use it to draft forms they can then use for any document into which the form can be made to fit, regardless of the nuances and complexity of a client's problem.

Additionally, the various bar associations around the country will need to educate their attorney-members on valid and professional methods for utilizing AI to benefit their clients. The Florida Bar Association is already doing that with seminars designed to help lawyers adapt to the changing landscape of the legal profession.

As for clients, if they haven't already, they will soon adopt AI as a method of educating themselves on the legal issues that concern them. That means lawyers will meet with clients who've already educated themselves on their legal concerns. Clients are going to have smart questions for their lawyer.

Personally, I love that. The more my clients know about the issue they are facing, the wiser they are about what needs to be done to accomplish their goals. That's great for good lawyers who care about their clients. The lazy ones will simply have to set aside their printed forms and listen to what the clients have to say. Nothing better than looking and listening, if you ask me.

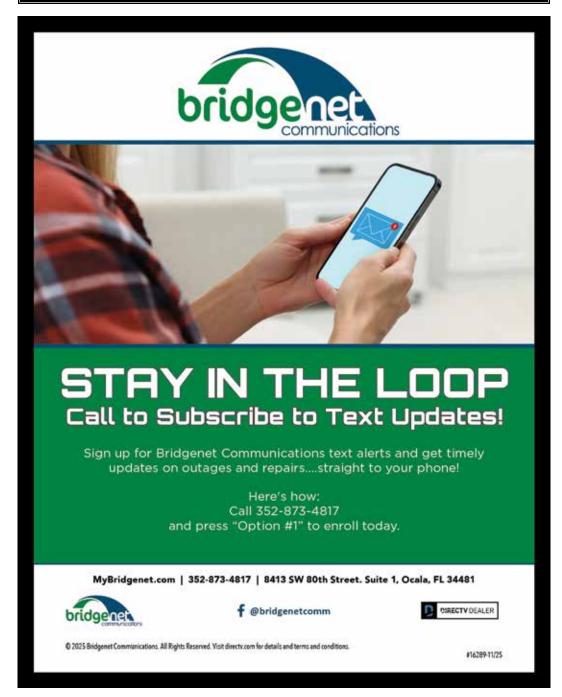
Bottom line on AI and the practice of law: Some good. Some bad. Some we'll-have-to-wait-and-see. I suspect I will have more AI questions, and I'll print some if I can.

92nd Court Road. Crews have begun installing the underground components of the sewer and stormwater facilities, as well as an extension of the reclaimed water system used to irrigate the golf course. Construction of the golf course itself, along with a small golf shop, will begin shortly thereafter. This will be a Master Association amenity open to all residents. Permits in hand, our development team has commenced underground activities at the site.

CIRCLE SQUARE CULTURAL CENTER: The LED sign is live! This is a great way to learn about scheduled events. Landscaping will follow shortly.

SW 92ND COURT GATEHOUSE: A new, automated gatehouse will be erected along SW 92nd Court Road to replace the temporary gate at SW 80th Street. Construction is expected to begin in early 2026.

There may be periodic lane closures while this work is completed.

BAY LAUREL CENTER COMMUNITY DE-

VELOPMENT DISTRICT: We are pleased to announce the completion of the construction of the District's new customer service office, located at 5575 SW 67th Avenue Road, Calesa Township, Ocala, Florida 34474. Accordingly, the previous customer service office has been officially closed, and all team members have been relocated to the new facility. Their team is fully prepared to assist you at this new location and looks forward to continuing to serve your needs Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Roadway Improvements

SW 90TH TERRACE: The Weybourne Landing multi-modal path extension is complete from the gate to SW 80th Street.

Work is ongoing on the extension of SW 90th Terrace from SW 79th Street Road to SW 63rd Street Road. The contractor's goal is to complete this road-

way before major construction of SW 80th Avenue begins, providing an alternate northbound route. Construction of this road is scheduled for completion in late December.

SW 92ND COURT ROAD: All utilities and the initial phase of roadway work have been completed. Landscaping of the corridor is currently underway, and we expect the roadway to be approved and open by late November. This will take a great deal of construction traffic off of SW 90th Street.

SOUTHWEST 80TH AVENUE: Sources at the Marion County Engineering Department assure residents in and around SW 80th Avenue that construction is slated to begin in late 2025. The survey work and civil engineering field work seem to be moving into high gear. The completion time span is approximately two years from the start. Unfortunately, there are no current updates on this highly traveled corridor.

MELODY PRESERVE: This new housing development north of Indigo East has officially begun. This project is located on the northeast corner of SW 80th Street and SW 80th Avenue.

On Top of the World worked closely with a team of biologists and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission to ensure every gopher tortoise was handled in full compliance with regulations. After a lengthy tortoise relocation process, preliminary clearing of the eastern half of the property has begun. The goal is to preserve as many heritage oaks as possible.

This community is designed for connection and activity. With 233 new homesites, this neighborhood won't be just a place to live; it will be a place to thrive - complete with a covered pavilion for pickleball and other uses, a dedicated dog park, and a tranquil walking trail for daily strolls. As part of the new Melody Preserve community, a significant upgrade is coming to the area's roads. Residents can finally say goodbye to the awkward four-way stop at SW 77th Court and SW 80th Street, as we'll realign the intersection to improve traffic flow. We're pleased to share that construction is on schedule to be finished by the third quarter of 2026. During this phase, we ask for your patience and extra caution when navigating the area, as you may notice increased traffic.

Safety First



Yes, your safety is at stake with your diet. Okay, I am not going to sit here and tell you what you should eat. You have been eating for a while now, so we figure you have a good idea of what goes into your mouth. What I will attempt to do is provide you with information that can help you understand what to eat to nourish your body and give you the energy to keep you going strong.

Diet

For example, I will use a bear's diet as an example. Bears instinctively know what they need. If you watch a bear eat, they will show you a thing or two about eating healthy. They have mastered the fruits and vegetables available, which are not only good for you but also high in energy

Bears like to eat many of the foods you eat. Fruit, nuts, honey, plants, fish, and other meats, if the opportunity present-

ed itself, but most of their foods come from plants. Why? Plants obtain their energy from the sun, which is converted into energy through photosynthesis.

What do you and the bear have in common? You both are part of the food chain. Food chains provide the energy you need to function. Humans do have a food chain, but we don't always adhere to it. The bear would stick with the healthy foods it is instinctively drawn to eat. Believe it or not, you are not on the bear's menu. 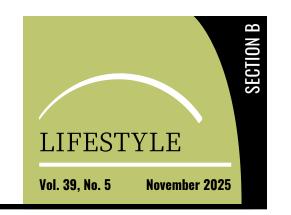

Where does an astronaut dock his the United States, Canada, Japan, and Europe. More than 280 astronauts from various countries have been stationed there. The International Space Station orbits the Earth 16 times a day at an av-

erage speed of 17,500 miles per hour. Its trajectory passes over more than 90% of the Earth's population.

The free Spot the Station app, available only on mobile devices, is the official NASA app that helps users track the station and receive notifications for viewing the station as it passes overhead. The International Space Station is visible because it reflects sunlight, and

the best times to view it are at dawn and dusk.

We have the Leonid meteor shower to look forward to in November. The Leonids are associated with Comet 55P/ Tempel-Tuttle, and are active Thursday, Nov. 6, through Sunday, Nov. 30, with the peak on Monday, Nov. 17. The peak should be good viewing because of a crescent moon. Look southeast to see the shower radiating from the Leo constellation. Early morning, before sunrise, is the best time to view.

At our club meeting in October, Larry Isenberg gave a light-hearted Sun Segment presentation by playing the Beatles' song "Here Comes the Sun" on a ukulele He also pointed out how many ukulele. He also pointed out how many words have "sun" in them, including sunlight, sunbelt, sunrise, sunset, sunburn, and sunflower.

Cammie Fairburn shared photos from her recent trip to the Grand Canyon, where the night sky is very dark. Seeing so many stars and the Milky Way was amazing, as was the private telescope viewing at the Lowell Observatory.

Doug George introduced us to The Sky Live app, which displays the current positions of the planets in our solar system in three dimensions, the current moon phase, the positions of other planetary moons, and current comet, asteroid, and meteor shower activity. This app is available for free for both computers and mobile devices.

Regular meetings of the Moonstruck Astronomy Club are on the first Thursday of every month from 11:15 a.m. to 12:45 p.m. in the Hobby Building Event Room. All residents with a valid resident ID or Gateway of Services pass can join the club, and new members are welcome! Club dues are only \$20 per year, and they include a subscription to the quarterly Reflector Magazine.

Little State, Big Friends

The Rhode Island Group met for for woolen textiles. lunch at Stone Creek Grille following the summer months of travel. As always, it relocate to Woonsocket, in part because was enjoyable to catch up, share experiences, and savor a delicious meal.

Rhode Island, and its system of mills and villages spread through the Blackstone River Valley to Woonsocket, a city with a unique cultural heritage.

Woonsocket attracted French-Canadians known as Quebecois. They came from rural areas in Canada, leaving an agrarian economy for an industrial one, drawn by job opportunities in the textile industry. As the population in Quebec increased in the 1800s, the division of farms among families led to lower yields and lower profits, making job opportunities in industrial areas more attractive.

Some 900,000 people from Quebec resettled in New England between 1840 and 1900. In the late 1880s, Belgian and French wool and worsted manufacturers had developed a superior technique

They were convinced by Aram Pothier, then mayor, to the workforce spoke a compatible language and shared a culture. Pothier him-The birthplace of the First American self was born in Quebec and, after movndustrial Revolution was Pawtucket, ing to Woonsocket, became involved in business and politics, serving as mayor and later as Rhode Island's governor.

The mill owners encouraged workers to relocate from Canada and the immigrants brought their culture with them. There were French language newspapers, movies, and radio stations, and most conversations were conducted in French. Woonsocket also drew immigrants from Belgium and France.

The Great Depression of 1929 hit Woonsocket hard, particularly the textile industry, leading to widespread unemployment. While the need for goods during World War II spurred manufacturing in Woonsocket, with some recovery post-war, the city never fully recovered. The textile industry further declined due to competition from entities with lower labor costs and the problem of aging mill structures that had hazardous materials.

A fascinating place to visit in Woonsocket is the Museum of Work and Culture. Located in Market Square on Main Street in a restored former mill, you will learn the story of immigrants through exhibits, a recreation of a mill work floor, interactive and immersive exhibits, and much more.

And after touring around, you might want to venture a slight distance from Woonsocket to neighboring Harrisville to Wrights Farm for the famous familystyle all-you-can-eat dinner, with endless chicken, pasta in its signature marinara sauce, salad, and fries.

A fun fact about Woonsocket is that it is home to the corporate headquarters of a pharmacy chain you undoubtedly know - CVS!

World Traveler

Monemvasia, Greece, is a small town on a small island located on the southeast coast of the Peloponnese, about 100 miles southwest of Athens (as the crow flies; assuming a crow can fly that far). The island is linked to the mainland by a short causeway about 400 yards in length. The island is about 330 feet above sea level and is about 0.2 miles wide and 0.6 miles long.

Founded in the sixth century, Monemvasia was home to a powerful medieval fortress that became one of the most important commercial centers in the Eastern Mediterranean. It was sometimes called "The Gibraltar of the East." The seaward side of the island rises slowly from the water surface for a few hundred yards until it reaches a sudden, sheer rock wall.

This wall features a narrow cleft, with steps built to allow access from the sea to the top of the plateau. This geologic phenomenon forced the town to be divided into two distinct parts, the Upper Town and the Lower Town. The Lower Town, adjacent to the sea, then built a high wall around itself, stretching from the sheer rock wall on one side, down to the sea, and around to the sheer rock wall on the other side of the town.

This was done to protect the townspeople from pirates or other enemy raids. The wall they built had only a single opening in it to provide access from the sea into the Lower Town. The Greek word for "single entrance" is, wait for it, Monemvasia!

The original fortress was built on the plateau but was abandoned in the late 17th century. So, the Upper Town is mostly ruins today. The Lower Town, however, features well-preserved Byzantine, Venetian, and Ottoman architecture, cobblestone streets, many historic churches, and panoramic views of the Aegean Sea. A few people still live in Monemvasia, although the ancient castle town's permanent winter population is fewer than 20 people. Nevertheless, many houses in the Lower Town are rented as accommodations for tourists or as weekend retreats for wealthy Athenians

Cars are not allowed in the town because, frankly, there is no way to get a car into the town. Consequently, the

only way a visitor can get around is by walking. Walking is not a burden; however, as the town is so small, you can walk from one end to the other in only a few minutes.

The beauty of Monemvasia lies in its historical churches and other well-preserved buildings. You can see how history changed the town —from its Byzantine origins in the 6th century through

Venetian and Ottoman rule to the Greeks finally capturing the island in 1821.

You can also hike the region's footpaths that lead to secluded beaches, chapels, and scenic viewpoints. There are several beaches within reach where you can soak up some rays or swim in the cool waters. Finally, you can enjoy the food and sip some local Malvasia wines – always a pleasure.

Digital Photography

These days, your most powerful camera is likely the one you already have in your pocket. Whether you use a smartphone or a digital camera, capturing and sharing life's precious moments has never been simpler. Here's a straightforward guide to taking, editing, and sharing your photos with confidence.

Taking the Shot

First, focus on your subject and your light. The golden rule? Have the sun or a bright light behind you, not your subject. This prevents squinting and dark, hard-to-see faces.

For smartphones, the key is stability. Hold your phone with both hands and gently rest your elbows on your chest or a steady surface to avoid blurry pictures.

Tap the screen on your subject's face to ensure the camera focuses correctly. Don't forget to clean your lens with a soft cloth - it makes a world of differ-

If starting a new email, using these letters or numbers might get confusing, like: 1lI! 0oOQ gq ft hb ij uvy HN hn - -= S\$2, especially if your handwriting is bad, you might save it incorrectly. Take a screenshot or grab the password as text and place it securely somewhere.

Check with your email provider, and sign up to get backup codes now as a security measure, before you are locked out or disabled on one device, and need one of these backup codes to get back in. You might be given ten sets of random numbers, which you need to save securely. Be sure these backup codes are accessible to all your devices, and in your cloud storage too. As each of these eight or ten-digit backup codes can be used only once, mark the code with today's date when it has been used. Yes, you can get more when all those are used.

When you forget your email password, you might see "Forgot Password" as a choice to reset it right then. This will take you to a page where you have to prove that you are you. Hence, have you previously set up your cell phone and a different recovery email for security reasons? It works for this reason, too. So don't wait, secure your email account

On Wednesday, Nov. 5, the Birding Group will travel to Sweetwater Wetlands in Gainesville.

This city recharge park is a 125-acre habitat consisting of wetlands and ponds, created to improve water quality in the Floridan Aquifer and Paynes Prairie. In the park, there are 3.5 miles of crushed-gravel trails, as well as concrete sidewalks, wooden boardwalks, and wildlife-viewing platforms, all handicap accessible.

This park is a thriving ecosystem with a wide variety of plant, animal, and insect species. It's a great place to view birds such as red-winged blackbirds, kites, hawks, limpkins, herons, ducks, grackles, coots, and gallinules. When walking through the park, visitors usually see plenty of alligators and are sometimes treated to an up-close view of the wild Florida cracker horses, which sometimes munch on the grass while

blocking the trail. It is important to stay a safe distance from these animals.

Our lunch restaurant will be Ford's Garage.

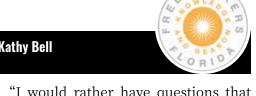

If there's one thing that freethinkers like to do, it is to question! Our members demonstrate intellectual curiosity about contemporary and controversial topics, which, when combined with reasoned decision-making, lead to a deeper understanding of our world and our place

For example, on Sunday, Oct. 5, Jennifer Hunt Murty, the owner/publisher of the Ocala Gazette, discussed the importance of local news in our community. She focused on some of the investigative reporting that she and her staff have done regarding conflicts of interest and lack of adherence to policies in Marion County government agencies. When Jennifer asked questions, she did not receive complete answers, so she diligently pursued other avenues of inquiry. She stated that freedom of the press allows news organizations to act as watchdogs over government accountability, ensuring transparency and enabling citizens to access information as enshrined in the Florida Sunshine Laws. She spent over an hour answering our questions after her presentation.

On Sunday, Oct. 19, Freethinker Glenn Cohen, Professor Emeritus at Troy University, spoke about "Evolution and Social Darwinism." This presentation contrasted Darwin's theory with social Darwinism, a social and political ideology not endorsed by Darwin. It suggests that societies can justify inequality, imperialism, or lack of aid to the poor because "survival of the fitteet" allows the cause "survival of the fittest" allows the human race to evolve. Social Darwinism has experienced a recent resurgence, and understanding the differences between its various theories is crucial. A lively question and answer followed.

The Freethinkers Florida book club met in October to discuss "Catch-22" by Joseph Heller, exploring the absurdities and bureaucracy that the main character, Captain Yossarian, must contend with during World War II.

On Sunday, Nov. 2, Freethinkers Florida will host Roberta Cincotti, the Marian County Continuum of Caro Managar

on County Continuum of Care Manager. Roberta will discuss the scope of home-lessness in our community, as well as prevention, outreach, emergency shelters, and rehousing efforts. Roberta was formerly the executive director of the Atlantic County, New Jersey, Agency on Aging, where she expanded services for older adults and vulnerable populations. In her position in Marion County, she works to support collaborative efforts that assist individuals and families who are experiencing homelessness. She is committed to blending compassion with structure to create lasting, positive impacts for our community.

Bacon Onion Tomato Pie

1 deep-dish pie crust

6-8 slices thick-cut bacon, cooked & crumbled

1 large yellow onion, thinly sliced 2-3 medium tomatoes, sliced and drained

1-1/2 cups shredded cheddar cheese

½ cup mayonnaise

½ cup sour cream

Salt & pepper to taste Preheat oven to 375°F.

Cook the bacon until crispy, then set it aside. Sauté onions until golden in the same pan. Prepare your favorite pie crust or use a purchased one. Then, layer onions, tomatoes, and bacon in the pie crust.

Next, in a separate bowl, mix the cheese, mayonnaise, and sour cream; spread this mixture on top of the bacon/tomato/onions.

Bake 30-35 mins or until golden and bubbly. Cool slightly before slicing.

Florida Senior Games began in 1992 with local competitions and a state-appointed task force. They served as a state championship, with many qualifying events held locally throughout Florida. The task force consolidated state games, standardizing a clear path to the state championship. The first Florida Senior Games state championships were held in Bradenton in 1992, with Gainesville's own senior games in 2002, continuing to serve as qualifiers for the Florida Senior Games.

This year's members did not disappoint and upheld the winning tradition! Table tennis categories were men's singles, men's doubles, mixed doubles, women's singles, and women's doubles. Participants competed in one, two, or three categories based on age group. Club members returned not only with gold, but also silver and bronze!

Congratulations! Golf Tip of the Month

How many of you swing out of your shoes, fall backward, and watch the ball sail to the right and out of bounds? If this sounds like your golf swing, then balance is the key to improvement.

Here are a few tips to maintain proper balance throughout your swing.

Widen your stance. By widening your stance, you give yourself a larger base, which helps you return the clubface to a square position at impact.

Do not over-swing. If you tend to try to swing as hard as you can each time, then more than likely you will lose your balance. A good, balanced swing looks graceful and effortless.

Maintain a good finish. Try to hold your finish after every swing. I like to teach my students to hold the finish long enough for someone to snap a photo. Holding your finish longer will improve your balance and ball striking.

Ahoy, and welcome, sailor!

If you stroll through Ocala's Tuscawilla Park around noon on Sunday, you may notice a fleet of sleek white sails gliding gracefully across the west pond. Look again – those "swans" on the water are actually radio-controlled model sailboats, crewed by local skippers who love the thrill of wind, water, and friendly competition.

About a dozen active sailors regularly race one-meter R/C sailboats, supported by a few R/C tugboats. On many days, other local enthusiasts join in and it's not unusual to see 10 or more boats on the pond at once. The group now totals about 25 members, with no dues, no officers, and no by-laws - just the shared joy of sailing together.

The races circle four permanent

buoys, maintained by Bernie and Gene, who are often the first to arrive and the first to greet new visitors. The fleet includes Solings, Sea Winds, DF95 Dragons (our largest class), Focus, and other designs. There are no separate classes or complicated rules - just one start and simple, informal racing. On a good day, the sailors complete up to 15 short races, totaling about 90 minutes of fun and friendly rivalry.

Between races, the skippers relax beneath the palm trees, chatting about wind shifts, sail trim, and life in general. The setting couldn't be better: two ponds, fountains, walkways, and shaded benches make Tuscawilla Park a beautiful place for families and spectators, too.

Join us every Sunday at noon and bring a chair - and if you don't yet have a boat, someone will likely hand you a transmitter and invite you to take the

field. Come out and meet one of our pilots who flies drones or helicopters, and ask for some help. The help is free and just might help the potential pilot's new drone fly again.

Fly good and land better.



This month's good news is that we had a really successful Club Fair in September. Circle Square Cultural Center is a great venue for clubs and visitors alike, offering plenty of space for parking and walking between tables. This time, we featured models made from high-density foam. This method of manufacturing the airframes reduces the building time to a minimum, enabling the new pilot to be ready for flight lessons in hours rather than months, unlike building a kit.

The size and complexity of these models can be amazing. As are the details molded into the foam and the color schemes. The simplest foam models make great, inexpensive trainers that most of our members have flown solo. We also showed several helicopters and a first-person view (FPV) model. The sky is the limit ... so to speak.

What is FPV? In simple terms, there is a camera in the cockpit that transmits to the pilot's headset so the wearer "sees" what a pilot would see from the cockpit. Takeoff and landing are performed from the cockpit. The view is extremely realistic and can induce airsickness until the pilot becomes accustomed to it. Any pilot attempting this form of flying must have a spotter to relay any issues that may arise due to the lack of visual contact with the model. There seems to be no end to the fun R/C pilots can have.

On a less happy note, the club had to cancel the Fall Fun Fly-In in October due to weather forecasts predicting strong winds and rain. For a while, it looked like the Ocala "bubble" would spare us, but by mid-morning, the wind was 10 mph on its way to 14 mph, and the rain started shortly thereafter. But one great result of our planning was the number of volunteers who showed up to mow and set up the field the day before. What a great bunch of flyers in our club. We were ready to go, but the weather just did not cooperate.

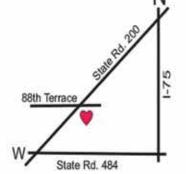
Our last column discussed the various regulations that affect flying R/C models. Since that column was written, new Florida drone laws have kicked in. In a nutshell, flying over critical infrastructure is a third-degree felony, and a slew of other infractions, including peeping on neighbors and dropping contraband, can also get a drone flyer in trouble. One prudent law might be that citizens do not have the right to shoot down a drone hovering over their backyards.

Tennis Club



The earliest form of tennis originated in France during the 12th century, played by monks as a handball game called Jeu de Paume ("game of the palm"). Players initially hit a ball with their hands; gradually, gloves, paddle-like implements, and eventually strung rackets were introduced. By the 16th century, tennis was a favorite pastime of European nobility, including King Henry VIII, who had an indoor court built at Hampton

Court Palace in the 1530s. The modern game of lawn tennis began in late 19th-century England. This was made possible by the invention of vulcanized rubber, which enabled a ball to bounce consistently on grass, and by the rise of leisure sports among the Victorian middle class.

The World News

In 1873, British army officer Major Walter Clopton Wingfield patented a version of the game called Sphairistikè, though the name didn't stick. The All-England Croquet Club held the first Wimbledon Championship in 1877, making it the world's oldest tennis tournament. That year also marked the standardization of rules, including rectangular courts and scoring systems that closely resemble those used today.

Over the next few decades, the other three major tournaments were established: the U.S. National Championships (1881), the French Championships (1891), and the Australian Open (1905). These four events eventually became known as the Grand Slam tournaments - the most prestigious in the sport.

Until the late 1960s, tennis was divided between amateurs and professionals, with the latter excluded from major tournaments. This changed with the advent of the Open Era in 1968, allowing all players to compete together. This shift opened the door to lucrative sponsorships, dramatically raised the sport's popularity, and led to the rise of global stars. Tennis was included in the first modern Olympics in 1896 but was removed after 1924 due to disputes; it was reinstated as a full medal sport in 1988.

Today, tennis continues to evolve, influenced by technologies such as electronic line-calling (Hawk-Eye), advanced rackets, and video review. Modern players are stronger, faster, and more tactically sophisticated than ever. The last two decades saw the rise of the men's "big three" – Roger Federer, Rafael Nadal, and Novak Djokovic – and women's champions like Serena and Venus Williams.

From its humble monastic roots to packed stadiums and billion-dollar tournaments, tennis blends tradition and innovation, athleticism and artistry, continuing to inspire new generations.

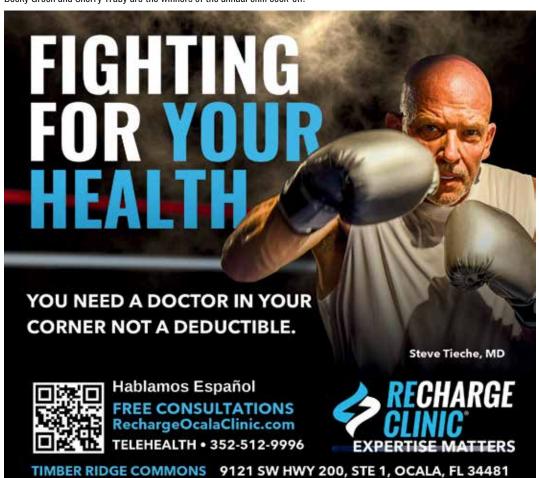

Diabetes Awareness Month

Each November, communities across the nation recognize Diabetes Awareness Month, a time to focus on prevention and the power of healthy living. Diabetes affects more than 38 million Americans, but there's good news: research shows that regular exercise and simple lifestyle changes can dramatically lower the risk of developing Type 2 diabetes and help those already living with it take control of their health.

Exercise is one of the most effective natural "medicines" for diabetes. When you move your body, your muscles draw glucose from the bloodstream and use it for energy. This process improves the body's ability to respond to insulin, the hormone that helps control blood sugar. Studies show that even one session of moderate physical activity, such as brisk walking or swimming, can improve insulin sensitivity for up to two days afterward. Over time, regular exercise helps stabilize blood sugar, lower A1C levels, and improve overall energy.

Health experts recommend aiming for about 150 minutes of moderate activity each week. That's just 30 minutes a day, five days a week. It doesn't need to happen all at once; even three 10-minute walks after meals can help keep blood sugar steady. Adding strength training a few times a week is especially beneficial, since building lean muscle helps the body burn more glucose, even at rest.

One of the most encouraging findings in diabetes research came from a long-term national study that showed adults who began exercising regularly and made modest diet changes were able to reduce their risk of developing Type 2 diabetes by nearly 60%. For adults over 60, that number jumped to more than 70%, a powerful reminder that it's never too late to start moving.

The benefits go far beyond blood sugar. Exercise improves heart health, strengthens bones, enhances flexibility, boosts immunity, and lifts mood. It's also one of the most effective ways to manage stress, a key factor since high stress levels can lead to spikes in blood glucose. Activities like yoga, Pilates, and meditation not only help the body stay strong but also calm the mind and promote balance from the inside out.

If you're new to exercise, start with something you enjoy. Take a daily walk, try a water aerobics or group fitness class, or use light resistance bands at home. The key is consistency, not perfection. Even small steps add up over time. Always consult with your health-

Beyond the Gates

With so many wonderful amenities inside On Top of the World, it's easy to forget that adventure also lies just beyond our gates. For me, nothing compares to a day spent on the Gulf waters, rod in hand and salt air in my face. From Homosassa to Cedar Key, the opportunities for saltwater fishing are endless.

I've always preferred inshore fishing for speckled trout, redfish, and snook. Just a few miles farther out, you'll find grouper, red snapper, and countless other varieties waiting to test your line.

The Homosassa River and Crystal River are two of my favorite launching points. Both are spring-fed and lined with beautiful homes near their heads, but as you head toward the Gulf, the scenery transforms into lush mangroves and quiet islands. Along the way, you may spot manatees, alligators, and an impressive array of wildlife before you reach the flats. Boat ramps here can be crowded – especially on weekends – so a little patience is required. Still, the fishing and the ride downriver make it

Cedar Key offers a different experience. There's no leisurely ride down a spring-fed river – you can be fishing within ten minutes of launching your boat. And when you return, quaint lo-

cal restaurants stand ready to serve you, some even willing to cook your fresh catch. The ramps here are usually less busy than Homosassa or Crystal River, making Cedar Key my go-to spot.

As a light tackle enthusiast, I prefer artificial lures. Nothing gets the heart racing like a big redfish or snook exploding on a topwater plug. Even a missed strike adds to the thrill. One of my favorite techniques is to edge the boat close to the mangroves, cast tight to the shoreline, and let the plug rest before "walking the dog" back in a zig-zag pattern. The anticipation builds when you see a swirl beneath the surface, then suddenly – swoosh – a massive fish rockets out of the water with your lure in its mouth. This isn't bass fishing. These fighters will test every bit of your skill.

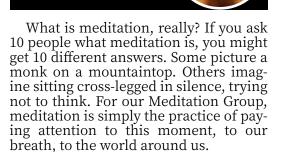
For those new to saltwater fishing or without access to a boat, hiring a local guide is a fantastic option. The best guides have years of experience, provide all the tackle and bait, and even clean your catch at day's end. More importantly, they know the waters and the fish, saving you from wasting time hunting.

If you're looking for adventure outside of On Top of the World, consider a trip to Florida's Gulf Coast. From the rivers to the open waters, it's an experience you won't soon forget.

Halloween is a holiday celebrated each year on Oct. 31. The tradition originated over 2,000 years ago with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain. Their new year started on Nov. 1. This day marked the end of summer, the harvest, and the beginning of the dark, cold win-

By 43 AD, the Roman Empire had conquered the Celtic territory. They incorporated two Roman festivals into the celebration of Samhain. The first was Feralia. The second was to honor Pomona, the Roman goddess of fruit and trees. This might explain the tradition of bobbing for apples on Halloween.

In the eighth century, Pope Gregory III designated Nov. 1 as All Saints Day, a time to honor all the saints and martyrs. In 1,000 AD, the church made Nov. 2 All Souls' Day. Soon, All Saints Day incorporated some of the traditions of Samhain. The evening before was known as All Hallows Eve and later renamed Hal-

During colonial times in America, the celebration of Halloween was severely restricted due to rigid Protestant beliefs. As other European ethnic groups meshed, a distinctly American version of Halloween began to emerge.

Over time, Halloween evolved into a day of activities like trick-or-treating, carving jack-o-lanterns, festive gatherings, donning costumes, and eating treats. Today, Americans spend an estimated \$6 billion annually on Halloween, making it the country's second-largest commercial holiday after Christmas.

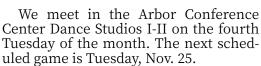

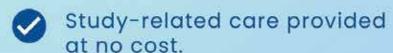

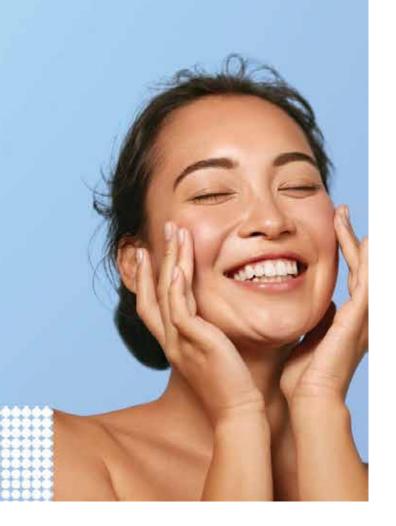

Shutterbugs Photography

Shutterbugs members are always learning. Recently, we enjoyed learning about the "exposure triangle." The exposure triangle is a foundational concept in photography that explains how three key camera settings – aperture, shutter speed, and ISO – work together to control an image's exposure. Adjusting one side of the triangle affects the others, and mastering this relationship gives you full creative control over your photos

Aperture is the size of the lens opening through which light enters the camera, measured in f-stops (e.g., f/1.8, f/5.6, f/16). A wider aperture (lower f-stop) lets in more light; a narrower aperture (higher f-stop) lets in less. Wider apertures create a shallow depth of field (blurry background), while narrower apertures increase depth of field (more of the scene in focus).

Shutter speed is the amount of time the camera's sensor is exposed to light and is measured in seconds or fractions of a second (e.g., 1/1000, 1/60, 2"). Longer shutter speeds let in more light; shorter ones let in less. Fast shutter speeds freeze action; slow speeds create

motion blur (great for waterfalls or light

trails).

ISÓ refers to the camera sensor's sensitivity to light and is measured in ISO values (e.g., 100, 400, 1600). Digital cameras may allow super-high speeds in the thousands. A higher ISO makes the sensor more sensitive, useful in low light, and some say it may introduce noise or grain to the image, but for practical purposes, the effect may be negligible.

Each setting affects exposure and image characteristics. For example, shooting in low light? You might widen the aperture, slow the shutter speed, or raise the ISO. If you want a crisp landscape? Use a narrow aperture, slower shutter speed (with a tripod), and low ISO.

Changing one setting often requires adjusting the others to maintain proper exposure. That's the essence of the triangle – balance. With practice, you'll become adept at mastering the capabilities of your digital camera.

View from the Library

"Alert in Full Sail" is a memoir by Richard H. Dana. On Aug. 14, 1834, Richard Dana withdrew from Harvard University. He became a common seaman on board the sailing brig "Pilgrim" bound from Boston, Massachusetts, around the Cape of Good Hope to San Diego, California, and beyond.

Dana kept a personal notebook and log of the entire two-year journey, returning to Boston Sept. 18, 1836, on the brig "Alert." He remained forever after a defender of the common seaman, often defending them in court with little or no compensation.

There was an extremely dangerous passage through the Cape of Good Hope in 1834, with 3,000 ships sunk amid terrible weather, ice flows, storms, and other dangers. Dana witnessed the loss of a seaman. He witnessed the unfair flogging of two fellow seamen by an out-of-control captain. He experienced the incessant labor, on call all the time, through freezing weather, in the best of times, four hours on and four hours off for each watch until no one could sleep longer than four hours, even if they tried.

There are many technical terms associated with rigging and its deployment, which might confuse the reader. The book includes diagrams and pictures for the curious, but its core is human relationships and experiences, not sailing specifics.

California in the 1830s was a remote part of Mexico with virtually no port facilities, a minimal population, and very few Americans. The chief business was hides, which required long, and sometimes uncompensated hours of punishing labor processing hides, carrying the boats into the water, hauling the hides on their heads without wetting them, and later piling them up in primitive storage buildings until 40,000 of them were collected.

What was interesting to the modern reader was the emptiness of small towns like San Diego, Los Angeles, and, at the northern end, San Francisco. For example, San Francisco had one building made of wood from storage boxes and nothing else except a remote deteriorating presidio and a distant monastery.

When Dana visited San Francisco just 24 years later, San Francisco had a population of 100,000. When his son visited in 1879, San Francisco's population was 400,000. Some towns, like San Diego, did not grow much during that period and remained primarily agricultural.

I found this book to be absolutely fascinating, both as history and as a human story. It was a seminal book in its time, giving the average reader a real and direct look at the exhausting life of a seaman, which resulted in many legal and other changes concerning men of the sea. It is written in a concise, direct way that brings the reader in. Try it for yourself and check it out at our library.

ArtisticCrafts.org will give you a glimpse of our exceptionally talented crafters and artisans. The group started back in the early 1990s, and the show has grown to over 50 tables on Tuesdays. Over 100 crafters are online, offering unique, custom designs. All resident crafters are welcome to sell virtually on our website and inquire about a table at our Tuesday show.

This month, we're featuring Mitchell Baylis, whose artistic mission is to challenge viewers to see beyond the surface and embrace the fluidity of experience. Born in Brooklyn, New York, he attended various art schools, including the Metropolitan Museum of Art and Peter Max Studios, before attending the University of Wisconsin School of Psychology. His art has been displayed in New York City, San Francisco, Miami, Honolulu, London, Seville, and Bangkok.

As an ink artist who transcends traditional representation, Mitch uses patterns and distortions to create a deeply engaging, emotionally resonant experience. His work invites viewers to confront their own perceptions and explore the complexities of human emotions. The combination of his art and psychology studies makes his work unique.

One of his artwork endeavors features a man and a woman titled "Fruit of the Poisonous Tree." It depicts a couple symbolizing a modern Adam and Eve, serving as a "psychological mirror" that explores the interplay of contrasting emotions, such as fear and joy, anxiety and calm. Shapes are intentionally distorted and interwoven, creating dynamic and shifting forms. As you see a mouth, a nose, and an eye, you begin to witness not a face but a shimmering mosaic of emotional parts, all incongruous yet harmonic. Similar to human behavior, you see the artistic expression of what lies beneath the surface.

Shapes are easily discernible yet distorted and interwoven into amalgams

that shift form at every distance and angle from which they are viewed. When focusing on the details, then stepping back to view the entire work, your eyes adjust, and so does your own complicated nature. Like in life, the common changes with time and view, always reforming into something new to be discovered.

Both Mitch and his wife, Suzie, are currently retired and often participate in area arts and crafts shows. Stop by Mitch's table any Tuesday, or view his listing on the Canvas page of our website, to get an up-close view and appreciation of his intricate art.

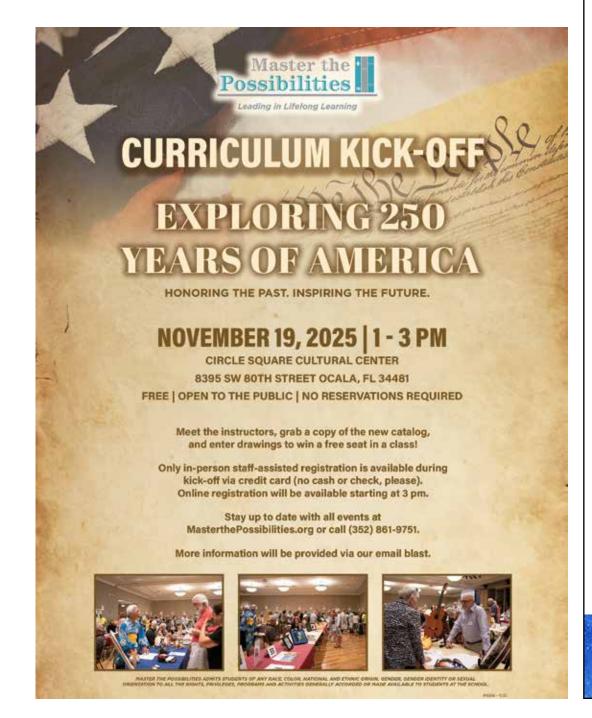

While looking at a crochet pattern in the hope of starting a new project, the thought crossed my mind regarding how are the standards for patterns for knitting and crocheting determined? Is there an organization that serves as a resource for crafters on their "yarn" journey? Further research revealed that such an organization exists – the Craft Yarn Council (CYC).

Located in Carrollton, Texas, this group is the yarn industry's one-stop resource and represents the leading yarn companies, accessory manufacturers, magazines, book publishers, and consultants. People of all ages – more than 50 million – know how to knit, crochet, and craft with yarn because it's fun, relaxing, and you can make great things.

If you want to learn to knit or crochet, CYC has information to help you get started. At craftyarncouncil.com you will find everything you need. There's an explanation of the differences between knitting and crocheting, illustrations, and instructions for making the basic stitches, FAQs, a list of helpful resources, and tips for reading project patterns.

If you want to teach others to knit or crochet, you can become a CYC-certified instructor. If you are a designer or are interested in becoming one, visit the Yarn Standards pages. There are helpful sizing charts and pattern symbols, along with industry guidelines for designers. All enthusiasts will also find references in Yarn Standards on pattern abbreviations, needle and hook sizing, and yarn weight standards helpful.
