Safety Check-up

January is an excellent time for a safety check-up. The holidays are over, the family and guests are back wherever they came from, and it is just you and your home (finally!). Ask yourself a simple question: What do I do if ...

Do you enjoy walking or biking in the community in the evening or early morning hours? If yes, do you wear reflective clothing, carry a flashlight for signaling oncoming traffic, or have proper red/white lights on your bicycle? If you enjoy walking in the community in the cooler weather, I am the first to admit that sometimes I forget to take precautions. Note to self: practice what I preach!

If you were to have a kitchen fire, do you have a fire extinguisher handy, and could you use it? If your unit had a water leak, would you know what to do or who

Annual Association & Board Meetings

The annual Master Association meetingwasheldonWednesday,Dec.4,2024,in Live Oak Hall. The purpose of the meeting was to familiarize residents of all member associations with the purpose and operational areas of the Master Association and to adopt an annual operating budget. Approximately 30 people were in attendance.

The annual meeting of Weybourne Landing was held on Friday, Dec. 6, 2024, at Circle Square Cultural Center. There were approximately 200 residents in attendance, and this meeting also had some residents attend through the webinar. The purpose of the meeting was to present a general update on the community and for the board to adopt an operating budget.

The Indigo East annual meeting was held on Tuesday, Dec. 10, 2024, at Circle Square Cultural Center. There were approximately 120 members in attendance. Some residents also joined the meeting via webinar. The pending Marion County four-lane project on SW 80th Avenue was briefly discussed. The county reports the project will not begin until late 2025. Given my experience with "Marion County time," we expect the project to start to slip to mid-2026. Additionally, information was disseminated on On Top of the World roadways that will be under construction shortly to provide residents alternative means of travel while SW 80th Avenue is under construction, namely SW 90th Terrace Road extension that will meet up with SW 63rd Street and then cross over from Stone Creek into Calesa Township and up and out at SW 38th Avenue.

The proposed operating budget for 2025 and the updates to the schedule of fees were presented to the board and membership, and the board approved the operating budget and the schedule of fees with one update clarifying that the Gateway of Services pass is for up to two members.

Is It Legal?



me and said he'd put his niece's name on his bank account as a joint owner. He did it so she could access his funds in an emergency, if he had one. The niece promptly removed the funds for her use and refused to return them. The niece claims her name was put on the account as a gift to her, and she had the right to take the funds if she wanted to do it. This is not the usual type of scam you see in this column. It is, nevertheless, in my humble opinion, a scam.

What can be done to get the funds back? First, the niece's name should be removed from the account, assuming there's any amount left in it. Better yet, close the account.

Second, the sheriff's office should be notified. They may not do anything because they may feel this is strictly a civil matter, but a report should be made. Next, it would be good to contact Adult Protective Services. Just Google "Adult Protective Services" and include the county. If the niece is named in a durable power of attorney, that document should be revoked, and the bank should be informed.

Next, a demand letter should be sent, but it would be wise to have an attorney send that type of letter. After that, a decision must be made whether to file a lawsuit against the niece. It's possible that the suit could be brought to small claims court if the amount is \$8,000 or less, not including filing fees. If it's more, then an attorney would almost certainly be

Also, you might want to revisit the persons named as beneficiaries of your will or trust.

Look, folks, I believe it is always necessary to define exactly why you have added someone's name to an account as an owner with you. It should be in writing, and the account owner should sign it. The person added to the account should also sign it. (And yeah, I know that no one will do that.) But the best way to protect yourself is not to add anyone to your accounts as an owner with you. Just set up a beneficiary designation in the form of a payable-on-death statement on the account that is involved. That also avoids probate. And have a well-drafted, durable power of attorney, in which you name a very trusted relative, possibly a friend, or your attorney if he or she handles that kind of work and responsibility.

If you wish to enroll in a Medicare Advantage plan, there are several good companies that offer them. If you decide you wish to enroll in one, before you do it, please check not only the benefits, súch as cashback and dental, but check on nursing home coverages and drug coverage for any drugs you need. And don't forget to check out-of-network

SCAM ALERT #2: Both my wife and I

Q. I am retired and live in Florida. My husband is five years younger than I, and he is still working and living in (a northeastern state.). Can I have a homestead exemption here, and my husband have a separate homestead exemption where he still lives?

A. Many years ago, there was an opinion from the then-serving Florida Attorney General Charlie Crist that a married couple could maintain both a Florida homestead exemption and a separate homestead in another state if it could be fully verified that there really were two separate residences, rather than just one residence. You should check with the homestead exemption office in your county of residence, and your husband should check with the exemption office in the county where he resides.

Note: It is very risky to do this without having absolute verification that there are, in fact, two separate residences.

Q. I would like to marry a lady friend. She told me that she was divorced a few years ago, but she still wears a wedding ring. I've never been married. Is there any reason why I cannot marry her?

A. I don't know. Why don't you ask





was held on Thursday, Dec. 10, 2024, at Circle Square Cultural Center. Approximately 400 members well attended this meeting. Some residents also joined the meeting via webinar. The meeting was an opportunity to discuss community updates. An update on the extension of SW 80th Street and the construction of SW 92nd Avenue was also presented, as well as other roadway updates. The proposed operating budget for 2025 was presented to the membership. The board adopted both the budget for 2025 and the schedule of fees.

The On Top of the World (Central) Owners Association annual meeting was held on Tuesday, Dec. 17, 2024, at Circle Square Cultural Center. This was an election year for the board of directors. This Association is nearly built out, and it is a perfect time to completely transition the board to consist of owner-members. Congratulations to your resident members, Paul Brunner, Nancy Grabowski, Jane Belz, Patricia Day, and Usha Vargas, who were elected to serve your community as board members for the next two years.

Most amenities come to be based on the demand for their use within any community. Residents always welcome adding amenities, but it is important to remember that residents pay for the added operational costs of amenities through their monthly community service fees. Ideally, the timing of additional amenities paces with adding new homes to keep monthly fees in line.

Amenities & Construction Updates

LONGLEAF RIDGE: At The Summit, you can now see the size of the building with the exterior walls being erected. We will be close to the block walls' final stages and close to starting the steel erection of the roof. This will be a 20,000-squarefoot amenity with a 6,000-square-foot ballroom, card room, a large main pool, and a resistance pool. The estimated completion of this project is in the fall.

AZURA FITNESS CENTER IN CANDLER

HILLS: Going forward, we will refer to this project as Azura Fitness. This will be an 8,000-square-foot amenity with a large pool. We expect to receive the building permit by the time of this column and should be close to breaking ground on this project. We expect this new amenity to be completed before the end of the year.

RECREATION CENTER: A shade structure will be added over the pickleball courts. A permit is necessary for the 16' x 14' shade structure, which should be installed in early 2025. This will benefit players in two ways: to shade them from the heat and provide efficient lighting, allowing players to extend their playtime later in the evenings if they choose.

Also under consideration is an update to the front landscape and the exterior of the main building.

VETERANS PARK: Approval was given to add an 84' x 10' pavilion over the shooting lane at the archery range. We are applying for this permit with the hopes of having this completed in the spring.

BAY LAUREL CENTER CDD WATER PLANT #1: A new building will be constructed near this location to give more space for our growing Wood Shop. This building will

be located where the gardens are currently located. We have identified a new location for the current SW 99th Street gardens, and we plan to offer a few more garden plots so that others may utilize their green thumbs. Stay tuned to future columns for updates.

ARBOR FITNESS CENTER: The new aquatic life flooring around the indoor pool is complete. The outdoor pool resurfacing project will begin Monday, Jan. 20. The pool will re-open Monday, Feb. 17.

THE ARBORS BOCCE COURTS: The bocce courts were completely remodeled and updated. Improvements included new laser-leveled elevated court surfaces, Trex railing systems around all courts, durable new bocce turf, and paver brick walkways around all courts.

THE LODGE AT CANDLER HILLS: New LVT flooring has been installed in the ballroom, and a new gas grill has been installed near the pool house.

MULTI-MODAL PATH (WEST OF SW 90TH **TERRACE):** Updates on this project will be provided in future columns; stay tuned.

WEST OF WEYBOURNE LANDING: We are nearing completion of the design for the new nine-hole "pitch and putt" course, which will be called The Irons and will be open to all residents and Master Association members. It will be located near the intersection of SW 80th Street and SW 92nd Court Road. As this is still in design development, we do not have a firm start date.

CANDLER HILLS GOLF COURSE: This course will see drainage improvements and a partial rebuild.

CANDLER HILLS COMMUNITY CENTER: This amenity will see landscape enhancements in the coming year.

GATE CHANGES: Envera Virtual Gate Guard Automation Systems is coming to On Top of the World, Candler Hills, and Weybourne Landing gate entries. Please look for more information on upcoming Envera workshops where residents can learn how to access their My Envera account and obtain new RFID stickers. There is no plan to revise the gated entry to Indigo East.

The target date for this transition will be mid-February 2025. As management formed this transition plan, we served notice to the current vendor, Allied. Surprisingly, they provided notice to terminate their contract on Dec. 26, 2024.

A gatehouse will be erected along SW 92nd Court Road that will replace the temporary gate at SW 80th Street. This will be an automated entry point as well.

ROADWAY CONSTRUCTION: Roadway construction will take place on SW 92nd Court Road (south) from SW 94th near the mini-storage adjacent to Longleaf Ridge and proceed northerly to the entrance of Ashford/Balfour. This project will disrupt the construction entrance traffic. To mitigate that, construction traffic will use SW 90th Street until the paving is completed in approximately 90 days. We have asked the Marion County Sheriff's Office to increase traffic enforcement during this period. Once completed, construction traffic will be redirected to using SW 80th Street.

Roadway construction is planned at SW 90th Terrace Road extension north to SW 63rd Street (entry to Stone Creek). This will provide a SW 80th Avenue bypass during the construction of that roadway.

Roadway construction will take place at SW 52nd Street Road extension easterly toward SW 60th Avenue. The goal is to provide an alternative access point in Calesa to avoid SW 38th Street during the four-laning project in 2026-27.

On Top of the World is a growing community with new neighbors moving in daily. Throughout these new neighborhoods, there are homes in varying stages of construction. We have a strong desire to protect On Top of the World residents and visitors from the potential hazards that can be found on an active construction site. We ask all unauthorized persons to avoid entering any construction site. An example of an authorized person would only be employees of the builder directed to enter the construction site or employees of the contractors who are directed to construct the house.

As you drive around the community, you may notice "No Trespassing" signs posted at construction sites, which are in place in accordance with Florida Statute 810.09 (2)(d) 2. This statute states that the "No Trespassing" signs say: "This area is a designated construction site, and anyone who trespasses on this property commits a felony." Florida Statute 812.014 (2)(C) 10 further states that "It is grand theft of the third degree and a felony of the third degree" if property of any value is stolen from a construction site.

The Florida Statute is very strict for a reason. Trespassing can lead to injuries that are otherwise avoidable. Additionally, losses from job site theft impact everyone, including contractors and consumers, due to construction delays, increased prices, and higher insurance premiums.

Over the past few years, we have seen an increase in job site trespassing and theft, impacting all stakeholders. This trespass notice covers the home site and everything on it, including the construction dumpsters. The Marion County Sheriff's Office takes all crimes very seriously, including construction site trespassing and theft, because they are concerned about your quality of life.

We encourage you to notify the Marion County Sheriff's Office or Resident Services if you see something suspicious in or around a construction homesite.

On Top of the World is working with the Marion County Sheriff's Office to add a new substation on SW 90th Street across from the Marion County Fire Rescue Friendship Station 21. If approved, this will benefit our communities by offering better service and response times due to its proximity.

Personal Insurance on Your Home & Contents

Fire events or water damage are cautionary reminders for each resident to check in with your insurance agent and ensure adequate insurance coverage on your unit and contents. If you feel "lucky" and go without insurance or believe you can self-insure any loss, please reconsider. The cost of repair or reconstruction, as well as loss of use (being displaced pending restoration), may exceed your home's purchase price many times over. It is the obligation of every owner to insure the contents of their dwelling, including loss of use coverage. Loss of use coverage will cover expenses for living and lodging should you become displaced. Displacement after a fire may be between six and 18 months!

This is a good point to segue into the limits of coverage that individual dwelling owners may wish to have. Contents coverage may vary greatly depending on what you own. As a basic point, you need adequate limits to cover furnishings, personal items, floor coverings, appliances, and cabinetry. All carriers write an HO6 rider that provides for loss assessment coverage in the event of a special assessment from the Association to cover unforeseen shortfalls or losses.

In the On Top of the World Owners Association, buildings are insured under a master policy in the name of the Association. The deductible is \$10,000 for any casualty event per occurrence, including wind/hail-related damage. Named storm events carry a separate deductible of 3% of the total value at the time of loss at each location involved, subject to a minimum (community-wide) deductible

of \$250,000 for any one occurrence.
Concerning flood (rising water),
earthquake, and flood resulting from a named storm, all loss, damage, and/or expense arising out of any one occurrence shall be adjusted as one loss, and from an amount of each such adjusted loss, there is a 5% of location total insured value subject to a \$250,000 deductible per occurrence.

Safety First

Seasonal change, drop in temperature, cold weather, or whatever the title of "it's flat-out cold outside" means, we need to acclimate our bodies to accommodate our need to stay healthy due to these conditions.

Please allow me to share some tips with you on how to adjust your body temperatures when nature turns down the heat and turns up the cold. This may help prevent catching a cold or flu.

First, adjust your thermostat down a few degrees, but just a few. Understand that anything that causes you to shiver, will cause your body to acclimate to the cold, but you don't want your shiver to be drastic. Too much of a temperature change can cause an over-reaction. The idea is to help your body adjust to colder weather

Another tip is to watch out for drafts, usually underneath doors and around the windows. Grab an old rag and pinch it around the bottom of your door to prevent the flow of cold air from getting through. Here is something else you can do to block the cold air from entering.

Tape around the edges of your windows

that you think are drafty, and move that chair away from the window. Speaking of windows, they do get cold. If you have curtains, close them at night to reflect the cold back and away from you, and re-open them in the morning when the sun is out.

Here is a tip that you have probably heard before. Close rooms that you are not using to preserve the heat in the room you are occupying. What you want is a space of heat in your room that you don't have to share with the rest of the

Now, here is an old trick passed down through generations. If you have a throw rug, put it down. Tiled floors and uninsulated floorboards can make you feel cold when you are walking on them. Setting a rug down can trap that heat between your feet and the rug. The truth is when temperatures start dropping, it takes approximately two to three weeks for your body to adjust. It will be a little uncomfortable for a while, so go outside more often. Spending a minimum of two hours a day outside can also help you to adjust. Here in Ocala, we may not have the temperatures that overtake places like Terre Haute, Indiana, or Minot, North Dakota, but because we are used to a hotter climate, it may take you a while to adjust to 29 degrees. Be prepared, adjust your body to the cold gracefully, and stay healthy.



Shout out to Bruce Twiss and Terry Strey, two of our ham operators, who devised a clever method to anchor an antenna and power their ham radios when traditional power sources are unavailable. They saw the need for a portable and reliable power source coupled with a stable antenna setup. The two designed a lightweight antenna mast that can be easily transported and set up just about anywhere. The mast is anchored using the car's front tire to provide a stable and secure antenna base. The ham radio can be powered by a rechargeable battery, the car's battery, a cigarette lighter

The duo tested their setup at our last CERT meeting. They had clear communication, giving us peace of mind that we would have reliable, portable communication in any area of On Top of the

socket, or connecting the radio to a 110-

volt power when available.

Community ham radio operators can assist us from home by tuning into Simplex frequency 146.565. When deployed during a disaster event, we need neighborhood reports on building damage, blocked roads, medical emergencies, and other vital information. Please consider becoming a member of CERT. Volunteers gain skills to help themselves, their family, and their closest neighbors in a disaster. CERT training is a comprehensive program developed by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to educate and train community members in basic disaster response skills. Members undergo training at the Marion County Sheriff's Office. When professional responders are overwhelmed or delayed, CERT members can step in to provide immediate assistance.

We meet on the second Tuesday of each month from 9 to 11 a.m. in the Arbor Conference Center Event Room. Our next meeting is Tuesday, Jan. 14. As this column is being written, 2024 is ending, and it was quite a year. On Top of the World continued to grow in terms of residents and amenities. In Ocala, and as a community, we weathered two storms gracefully. Through it all, your Community Patrol continued to support the Marion County Sheriff's Office (MCSO) safety programs by keeping an extra set of eyes on our neighborhoods and looking for ways to better serve you.

At the close of November 2024, there were 49 members in the Community Patrol. As an example of how we keep busy, in November alone, there were 55 separate patrols conducted by 47 volunteer drivers and observers for a total of 284 hours. We visited our neighborhoods 820 separate times, covering 1,292 miles. For comparison, during the first 11 months of 2024, there were 572 patrol shifts visiting the various neighborhoods 8,302 times. We're on track to beat those numbers in 2025! And because we're volunteers of the MCSO, there is no charge to On Top of The World for our services.

The Community Patrol anticipates some minor changes in 2025. MCSO will provide volunteers in all their programs with new uniform shirts, and there will be additional training to ensure volunteers know how to handle different types of situations we may encounter.

2025 will also represent 20 years of the Community Patrol's service to the residents of On Top of The World. We are fortunate to have several members who will be celebrating their 20-year anniversaries with the club.

As always, if you're interested in the Community Patrol or curious about what we do and why we do it, we encourage you to attend one of our monthly meetings. We meet at 3 p.m. on the fourth Monday of every month in the Hobby Building Event Room. Come to a meeting and learn what we do to make our community safer - and consider becoming a volunteer.



Traveling to New Zealand

Discover the significance of Waitangi Treaty Grounds, New Zealand! My husband and I took a day trip to Waitangi Island in New Zealand, and it was a journey through history as we explored the site of the signing of the Waitangi Treaty between the British government and the Maori, the indigenous people of New Zealand, on Feb. 6, 1840. The treaty grounds are distinguished by a flagstaff with three official flags since 1834: The Te-Kara flag of the United Tribes of New Zealand, the Union flag (1840-1902), and the flag of New Zealand (1902-present).

We had the opportunity to visit Te Whare Runanga, an intricately carved meeting house embodying a traditional design that opened on Feb. 6, 1940. The


carvings within Te Whare Runanga reflect the stories and styles of various iwi tribes from across Aotearoa. Additionally, we witnessed the impressive Ngatokimatawhaorua, the world's largest ceremonial waka taua, sheltered under Te Korowai o Maikuku near Hobson's Beach. This ceremonial canoe is used for special occasions and holidays.

We had a remarkable experience visiting the Te Rau Aroha Museum, which honors the legacy of Maori soldiers who fought in various wars since 1840 – the New Zealand Wars, Boer War, and World War I and II. The museum upholds the values of Article 3 of the Treaty of Waitangi and showcases the significant sacrifices made by these soldiers. With the aid of cuttingedge technology, the museum offers an immersive and captivating experience divided into three galleries.

At Te Kongahu Museum of Waitangi, we were immersed in a comprehensive depiction of Waitangi's history and the founding documents of Aotearoa, New Zealand, showcased through the artful combination of stories and taonga. The museum prompts visitors to consider the Treaty's contemporary implications through quotes and images that express the thoughts of New Zealanders from diverse backgrounds, creating a truly en-

riching experience.

We concluded our journey with a captivating cultural performance at Te Whare Runanga, which showcased traditional Maori music and dance for 30 minutes. Their vibrant performance left us enthralled, and we even took photos with the performers afterwards. We highly recommend visiting Waitangi, New Zealand, to experience the unique blend of European and Oceanic cultures that define the nation and its citizens' vibrant way of life.

Understanding Wi-Fi

Wi-Fi has become a staple in our daily lives, providing wireless internet connectivity for everything from smartphones to smart home devices. The two most common frequencies used for Wi-Fi are 2.4GHz and 5GHz. Both have their advantages and limitations, and understanding these differences can help you make the best choice for your internet needs.

WHAT IS WI-FI FREQUENCY? Wi-Fi signals travel through the air in the form of radio waves, and these waves operate at different frequencies. The two most common frequencies for Wi-Fi networks are 2.4GHz and 5GHz, with each offering distinct characteristics that impact performance.

2.4GHZ WI-FI: THE STANDARD OPTION: The 2.4GHz frequency has been around the longest and is widely supported by almost all Wi-Fi devices. It operates over a broader range, which means it can cover a larger area compared to 5GHz. This makes 2.4GHz ideal for larger spaces, where the Wi-Fi signal needs to travel through walls and other obstructions.

However, the 2.4GHz band is often crowded with interference because it's shared by many other household devices, such as cordless phones, microwaves, and baby monitors. This congestion can slow down your connection speeds, especially in densely populated areas or homes with many electronic devices

Despite this, 2.4GHz Wi-Fi is generally more reliable in terms of range, making it a good choice for devices that don't require high-speed connections, such as smart thermostats, printers, or older devices that may not support 5GHz.

5GHZ WI-FI: THE SPEEDIER OPTION: On the other hand, the 5GHz band offers faster speeds and better performance for activities that require high data rates, like streaming HD videos, online gaming, or large file transfers. This higher frequency allows for less interference and less congestion compared to 2.4GHz, as it's less commonly used by non-Wi-Fi devices

The downside of 5GHz is its range. Since higher frequencies are less capable of penetrating walls and other obstacles, the 5GHz signal has a shorter range. If you are using a Wi-Fi router in a large house or office, you might notice the 5GHz signal weakens as you move further away from the router. This can be mitigated by placing the router in a central location or using range extend-

WHICH SHOULD YOU USE? The choice between 2.4GHz and 5GHz largely depends on your needs:

- Use 2.4GHz if you need broader coverage and have fewer devices or if your devices are further away from the router.
- Use 5GHz if you want faster speeds

or downloading large files and if you are close to the router.

Many modern routers offer dual-band functionality, allowing them to broadcast both 2.4GHz and 5GHz signals simultaneously. This means devices can automatically connect to the band that best suits their needs.

Every Saturday at 9 a.m., the Ocala Tech Club meets for an hour through our weekly online Zoom meetings. We discuss Windows and Apple issues regarding software and hardware. Our OcalaTechClub.org website will give lots of great information about our group.

One long over-due task is to review our little gadgets that transfer data between devices, those older USB or memory sticks, also called thumb or flash drives. Check your desk drawers, boxes, even the back of the TV. Invented in Singapore in 2000 with up to 64MB capacity, the USB flash drive became a portable storage choice.

If you were handed a free stick during a company's promotion years ago, it won't be of the highest quality. Flash storage gets corrupted as the electrical charge fades during years of not being used. When constantly using this flash storage, the chips will stop functioning after so many cycles of their data blocks being erased and rewritten, but the average personal use should be fine. Take care not to wet, drop, bend, store in high heat areas like your car or near magnets, and don't pull it out of the computer or tablet without first formally using the Eject function. Editing files directly on the drive uses up write cycles faster, so do your work on the computer, then just store the file on the flash drive.

Never use a stick that you don't know where it originally came from, since

ences can help you optimize your Wi-Fi network. For broad coverage, 2.4GHz is a solid choice, while 5GHz is better for speed and performance in closer proximity to the router.

Both 2.4GHz and 5GHz have their pros

and cons, and understanding the differ-

it might be a "curiosity killed the cat" hackers' scheme of infecting malware into your computer. Another good reason to have already installed a quality antivirus program.

Your new year's mission is to gather all your old USB sticks, copy any still pertinent data onto your computer, wipe the data, and reformat the stick. Trashing might lead to others recovering your deleted files. Purchasing high-quality solid-state flash memory now will cost a bit more (but your data is worth it), up to 2TB capacity, more reliable, made with high-end controllers, error correction, and the durable NAND flash will last longer.

Buy from reputable companies, but use them for temporary data storage, transferring information between devices. The best data storage would still be your computer or tablet's hard drive, which should also be backed up to an external hard drive, and don't forget cloud storage too. Be aware that all types of storage formats, even CDs and DVDs fail at some point, hence backup regularly. It is best to have your most precious files in two or three different places that are

Starting a garden in Florida presents many challenges; it can be a fulfilling and exciting experience. When starting a garden, consideration must include several factors: our warm climate, sandy soil, and pests. You must plant accordingly to achieve a bountiful garden that can bring joy and beauty.

First, consider Florida's climate; the soil may be different than what you had encountered before coming to Florida. It is unique with heat and humidity most of the year, though an occasional cold snap can be devastating to your garden. Plants that you grew in other parts of the country may not thrive well in Florida, though some are perfectly suited to Florida's warm, wet climate, including tomatoes, peppers, collard green, peanuts, and watermelons. Florida's climate and soil will help you pick the correct plants, and when choosing, it is important to consider sunlight, soil, watering, the growing zone, and dealing with pests and insects.

When choosing plants, it is important to consider where they are grown. Strive to buy plants that are started locally as they have been acclimated to our region, increasing your odds of success. Soil tests are available through the Marion County Extension Office to determine how much and what kind of fertilizer and soil amendments your plants need to increase your odds of success.

Attention needs to be paid to watering, fertilizing, and maintaining your plants to keep them healthy. Our climate is hot and humid, which makes it necessary to water them deeply and evenly in the morning or late evening when evaporation is at a minimum. Overwatering causes root rot; therefore, it's important to measure the soil moisture level using an inexpensive meter that has multiple functions for light, pH, moisture, and

Over-fertilizing can cause more damage to the plant and the environment when runoff enters a body of water. Vigilant monitoring of weeds and pests that are common in our environment is necessary to control aphids, white flies, spider mites, potato beetles, and nematodes, which are a few of these threats that can quickly damage your plants. There are many organic controls available, including insecticidal soaps, neem oil, and beneficial insects, which can

naturally control pest populations.
Fungal diseases are another problem to deal with in our hot and humid climate. When combating them, it's important to provide air circulation by pruning the bottom leaves of your plants regularly and spacing them out appropriately for ventilation to prevent the fungus from spreading by raindrops splashing on contaminated soil to the bottom leaves. Organic fungicides on the market, including neem oil and biological controls, are sometimes effective. Always read the labels carefully. Improper

application can cause damage. Pictures taken of insects on the plant, the damage they have done, or sickly plants may be identified in the Google lens app. Contact the Marion County Extension office for instructions on how to send your pictures to the master gardeners for help. That number is 352-671-8400. Good luck and enjoy your garden.

Birders' Beat

On Friday, Jan. 31, the birders will visit Lake Apopka and take the North Shore Wildlife Drive located at 2850 Lust Road, Apopka, Florida. This drive will be limited to five vehicles and will be led by Maxfield Weakley, vice president of the Marion County Audubon Society.

The route is 11 miles long, takes about two hours to complete, and is only open for vehicular traffic on Fridays, Saturdays, Sundays, and federal holidays. Lake Apopka is the fourth largest lake in Florida and is fed by rainwater, storm run-off, and a natural spring. It's considered to be one of the top three birding sites in the entire state of Florida. The other two are Everglades National Park and Merritt Island National Wildlife Ref-

The North Shore area used to be made up of muck farms, which are defined as drained wetlands used for agricultural purposes, most often for growing vegetables or flowers. The restoration of the farmlands to functioning wetlands has created a haven for wildlife and a popular destination for birders, hikers, bik-

ers, and nature lovers. The drive meanders along the eastern side of the property. The speed limit is 10 miles per hour, and stopping is limited to designated pull-offs along the route. During the winter months, the bird population soars to over 150 species, including egrets, herons, warblers, and flycatchers. In the 2014 Christmas Bird Count, Lake Apopka North Shore had the highest number of bird species recorded for all inland (versus coastal) sites. The marshes also provide a habitat for alligators, bobcats, otters, bears, raccoons, and coyotes.

If you would like to join the birders for this trip to Lake Apopka on Friday, Jan. 31, please contact Margitta Claterbos at mclaterbos@gmail.com. We will meet at 6:45 a.m. in the parking lot of Friendship Center just outside the SW 99th Street gate for On Top of the World and depart at 7 a.m. The wildlife drive is located about 90 minutes from On Top of the World and has no water available on the trail.

Special group outings are also being planned for people who want to partici-



pate in shorter bird walks, usually on paved surfaces. Norm Lantz will be leading the first such walk at Sholom Park on Monday, Jan. 6 at 9 a.m. Please contact him at normbirder91@gmail.com if you are interested or have questions.

Norm will also be conducting an informational meeting about the shorter bird walks at Master the Possibilities. The class is called "Birding for Very Senior Citizens" (Course #EPW156) and will be held on Friday, Jan. 24, at 1 p.m. The cost will be \$5 for members and \$10 for the general public. The National World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C., was dedicated in the spring of 2004. It is located at the east end of the Reflecting Pool between the Lincoln Memorial and Washington Monument. It honors the 16 million individuals who served in the armed forces of the United States during World War II.

The design for the memorial was submitted by Friedrich St. Florian, an Austrian-born architect, who joined the Rhode Island School of Design faculty in 1963.

The memorial was primarily funded by private contributions in a campaign led by the late Senator Bob Dole, a World War II veteran decorated with the Bronze Star and Purple Heart, and Frederick Smith, the former chair of FedEx.

On the north side is an arch depicting the victory over the Axis powers in Europe, and on the south side, a triumphal arch for the victory in the Pacific. Twelve bronze bas-reliefs highlight the travails of the war on the home front and the battles waged on land, air, and sea. There are images of troops landing on beaches in the South Pacific and Normandy, along with images of farmers and factory workers. In the center of the memorial are statements from Presidents Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry S Truman, author Walter Lord, and commanding officers of the United States military.

On the west side are 4,048 gold stars above a reflecting pool. A granite marker cites: "Here We Mark the Price of Freedom."

There are 56 columns surrounding the field of gold stars. They represent the 48 states and eight territories, including Alaska, Hawaii, and the Philippines. Wreaths decorate each column in the form of wheat (representing agriculture) and oak (representing the strength of industry). A heavy rope goes between the columns, a symbol of unity.

Walter Lord's inscribed words read: "They had no right to win. Yet they did ... even against the greatest of odds, there is something in the human spirit, a magic blend of skill, faith, and valor that can lift men from certain defeat to incredible victory."

It's regrettable that so many of those who fought in World War II were not able to see this memorial. It is a quite moving and poignant reminder of the heroic sacrifices of so many.



Today, we are going to spend a bit of time in the Cornwall area of southwestern England; specifically in a small town called Land's End. This little village of about 6,800 people, is the most westerly point of the English mainland. If you fly to London and rent a car to get there, as I did, be careful because you will have a right-hand steering wheel in your car

and you have to drive on the left side of

the road! Believe me, that takes getting

used to for a person who grew up driving

The history and heritage of Cornwall and Land's End focuses on ships and the sea, and the hazards they have always faced. Vicious Atlantic storms often blast this rocky shoreline and have wrecked many a ship, both in fact and in fiction. It is a very rugged area, with a spectacular coastline featuring granite cliffs plunging as much as 200 feet

straight down into the sea. The fit among us might enjoy a walk along the Cornish Coastal Footpath, a

dramatic 500-mile hiking trail located along the coast, offering fabulous photo-worthy views. In addition, the sand beaches, rock pools, salt marshes, and dunes are prolific breeding grounds for birds, so birdwatching in the region is popular with many tourists. For the less active visitors, you can enjoy relaxing with the friendly locals at a pub

for lunch and/or dinner interspersed or sightseeing on comfortable short hikes at various places around the area.

One of the towns in the area is unique in that the primary downtown parking area is the rocky bottom of the bay during low tide. The town never has to worry about people parking there too long because when the tide comes back in,

the bay will refill with water!

There are many places to stay in the area, ranging from hotels to bed and breakfasts. My family stayed with friends in their home, where they had five apartments for rent. The owner was a hydrologist that I worked with a bit in Saudi Arabia. Their house is called "Skisdon" which is an old manor house that was first mentioned in print in 1350. It is a beautiful place that is solidly built. The interior walls were about five feet thick at the base and two feet thick at the ceiling, and the outside doors were made with 6"x6" oak timbers! Now that is a house built to last!

The grounds were lovely, and my family really enjoyed walking around. I must tell you, however, that we went there in late July and nearly froze to death! We certainly did not expect such cold weather and had to buy heavy Guernsey sweaters to keep warm. Even chilly, however, we had a wonderful time.

There is much to be said for vacationing in the country rather than in the big cities. Although there usually are things of interest there, a big city is a big city is a big city. To really begin to get the flavor of a country, you need to get to the smaller towns and villages and mingle with the local people. There really is nothing else quite like it.

Happy New Year! On Top of the World line dancers hope that you had a wonderful holiday season. 2025 is here, and many use this calendar change to determine new plans and goals for the coming year. A common new year choice is improving our health through exercise.

The act of dancing improves general health. The Bethesda Health Group published an article titled "12 Health Benefits of Dancing for Seniors" in June 2023. The Bethesda Health Group wrote that low-impact cardio dancing produces some of the same heart and pulmonary benefits that happen during formal cardio exercise classes. While dancers follow the line dance steps, they also build muscle and enhance endurance. The enhancement of our physical endurance makes day-to-day activities easier. Along with muscle strength, movement increases bone mass. Adequate bone

mass is important as we are better protected should we fall. When line dancing, quick movements are, at times, necessary to stay with the dance steps and tempo of the music. Our ability to move quickly and accurately builds agility. Stronger muscles and agility may improve the dancer's balance. Dance is a method we can use to become stronger, more flexible, and confident.

Line dancing requires memorization of the dance steps. Memorization improves our cognitive function. Dancing several times a week in a group leads to opportunities for social interaction, another benefit. Friendships with those who share our interests will boost our confidence and broaden our skills. Line dancing and other forms of dance enrich

R/C Car Club

Every Thursday at 10 a.m. the legends racing team meets at the R/C car track to race, work on cars and just have some old-fashioned fun. The legend cars are replicate sedans and coupes from the 1930s and 1940s.

The reason for the development of legend cars was to create inexpensive racing for beginners and experienced racers alike. The kit, with body, can be purchased from RJ Speed for about \$150. The electronics (motor, esc, battery and servo) are purchased separately.

From previous columns you may remember that kits are cars that require assembly. When you receive a kit, you will have a chassis, body requiring painting and several bags of parts with instructions. The assembly for a legend car is easier than the more expensive vehicles because legends are a more basic design requiring less parts. Plus, you do not have to be an engineer to understand how a legend car works. The whole concept of legend cars is simpler, less expensive and more fun.

The R/C Car Club also has a large group of slot car drivers. Digital coded slot cars are the new era of racing. Remember back as kids when there were slot car track venues with huge tracks, eight, 10 or 12 analog lanes. Your own lane, your own car and your own controller and literally a side-by-side race to the finish. Now, fast forward to today where the oval or figure eight analog track is replaced by a two-lane road course 150 feet long with up to six cars per race.

How can that work? Instead of the

old-style tracks with dedicated lanes for each car, all cars use the same lanes. Each driver has a digital remote controller that is coded to their car. The drivers can make their cars change lanes at designated spots on the track. This allows drivers to pass each other. In addition, each driver also has a dashboard to keep track of the "electronic" fuel they use. When low on fuel the driver can change

lanes and drive into a pit area to fill up. Slot cars are very affordable, about \$60 per car. The track and controllers are provided by the R/C Car Club. For more information, contact Brian Allard at 603 252-7766.

A Year of Massive Giving

Happy New Year! Looking back on 2024, it has been a year of growth. The Sewing Bees set a massive goal: to distribute 1,000 quilts to disadvantaged local children. We are proud and excited to announce that we reached our goal and donated 1,003 handmade quilts lovingly made by all our members. We would also like to thank residents for their generous donations.

As we close the books for 2024, we made and distributed 1,003 quilts, 438 totes, 80 stuffed animals, 266 pillow friends, 100 teen pillows, 59 regular pillows, 148 baby blankets, 452 pieces of children's clothing, 514 burp pads, 140 stuffed Christmas stockings, and 39 books.

November and December were tic months. We stuffed 140 Christmas stockings and delivered them to Marion County Children's Alliance, Children & Youth Homeless (Marion County School Division), Reddick Pre-K class, and Joy Lutheran teenage girl's residence.

We delivered 60 quilts to Children & Youth Homeless. Fifty Christmas quilts

had previously been delivered to Marion County Children's Alliance. We added Picking Up the Pieces, run

by Michell Pepins, which works with the Marion County Fire Rescue homeless division. They received 42 stockings for their children's Christmas party. These children are homeless, in foster care, or in a home.

We also added Interfaith Emergency Services, which distributed 56 of our quilts to families for their Christmas gathering. Currently, 12 children live on-

site, and those quilts were given to the children on Christmas morning.

Finally, we added Pay It Forward Outreach, which distributed 33 quilts to

homeless and low-income families. On Thursday, Dec. 12, 2024, we brought baked goodies to Shephard's Lighthouse and Saving Mercy, as well as 30 quilts and 100 burping cloths. These two agencies provide refuge to girls at risk of sex trafficking, homelessness, and pregnancy.



Billy Collins is the most popular contemporary poet in America today. The Poetry Club gives him a high five for snowbirding between Southampton, New York, and Winter Park, Florida. He has published 18 books of poetry, of which two anthologies called Poetry 180 are his poems designed to spark poetry interest in high school audiences.

From 2001 to 2003, Collins was the American Poet Laureate. As part of his Poet Laureate duties, in 2002, Collins was asked to write a poem and read it before a joint session of Congress to com-

memorate the first anniversary of the September 11 World Trade Center Twin Towers fall. His poem "The Names" is a compelling piece of literature. To access the poem, visit pbs.org/newshour/show/poet-billy-collins-reflects-on-9-11-victims-in-the-names.

Among his other achievements, Collins has done two TED Talks, hosted PBS TV, Garrison Keillor's "The Writers Almanac," an NPR daily broadcast for years, taught poetry workshops, and educated college students about poetry.

The techniques Collins applies in his craft draw the reader in. He uses metaphors, acutely brilliant imagery, and personification, including anthropomorphism (think Gary Larson's The Far Side.) His imagination has a broad sweep with touches of humor, reminding us that poetry does not need to be

stuffy or elitist. His writings are light, sometimes lyrical, and often witty. The Poetry Club encourages anyone to check out Collin's poetry.

The following is one of Collin's shortest poems. It is a good example of his satirical yet comical look at one of life's touchest situations

toughest situations. **Divorce**

By Billy Collins

Once two spoons in bed Now tined forks Across a granite table And the knives they've hired

In a 2013 interview by Jeffrey Brown of PBS, Collins said that we all can be serious enough to sit in a classroom to learn, but not all of us can be funny. He said he strives to find the funny in everyday events, which can lead to the profound.

An interesting poetry perspective mentioned by Collins during that interview is that Robert Frost was the first to visit colleges to introduce poetry to students. He admires Frost's attempts to keep poetry alive by acquainting our youth to this art form. And we of the Poetry Club agree. 

ArtisticCrafts.org will give you a glimpse of our very talented crafters and artisans. The group started in the early 1990s, and the show has grown from seven crafters to over 50 on Tuesday, with over 90 online for their visual presence. This month, we're featuring Jan Roth, a designer, creator, and producer of all types of crafts from textile products. Her interests began as a little girl, learning from the observation and teachings of her mother. In high school, she took home economics classes, which included some sewing experience, using machines, and learning hand stitches.

During this time, she also began making some of her own clothes, which was back when patterns could be purchased for 50 cents!

Jan's formal training and experience related to her hobbies include seminars and classes at local fabric stores, as well as taking a class to learn the lost art of tatting, which is a process of knotting special thread to form items that have a lace appearance. Her current creations start with ideas from many sources, including fabric stores, online, books, magazines, and, yes, looking at items made by other crafters while attending craft shows.

To keep inspired and continue to make products, she often reflects upon the influence of her mother and grandmother, as well as constant encouragement from her husband, including the many folks who have purchased her items.

There are different types of textile materials she uses, including fabric, thread, wool yarn, crochet cotton, and the standard tools of the trade. She hand-quilts all her quilted items. For many years now, both the sewing and embroidery machines have been tools

utilized for machine-sewn items and have served her well. She sells many diversified products, like quilts, hot pads, tatted doilies, oven mitts, bowl cozies, aprons, embroidered towels, and placemats. She welcomes special requests from customers.

Originally from Lansdale, Pennsylvania, she retired in 2016 after having worked for the same gentleman for 40 years at three different companies as an executive assistant. After retiring, they first moved to South Carolina for a few years, then just arrived here in 2023. While in Pennsylvania, her husband convinced her to try selling products at local craft show venues, including churches, schools, and public facilities. She was immediately hooked, as the folks who became customers also became friends! They continued with the craft shows in South Carolina, and now, in Florida, Jan is looking for additional statewide venues that might work for her products.

"The Rent Collector" by Cameron Wright begins with a sad description of life for a small family living in a garbage dump in Cambodia. Sang Ly, her husband and sickly infant son live in Stung Meanchey, Cambodia's largest municipal waste dump. They sleep and eat in shacks close to mountains of waste. They daily scavenge through garbage looking for recyclable treasures to sell so they can feed and house the family. They face ruthless gangs, health issues and social injustice. These facts alone make you wonder why you would choose to suffer through reading such a sad tale. However, once you turn the pages, the answer becomes clear. The story is uplifting, emotional and full of hope for the future. The characters become part of your family, and you feel

bright futures. The named character, Sopeap, the actual rent collector, appears at first to be an alcoholic, embittered old woman. She ruthlessly demands her rent from the poor families living in cardboard boxes around the dump. She is feared and disliked by her tenants. A special find in the dump, a book, changes everything for Sang Ly and her family. The rent collector teaches Sang Ly to read, and the two women become close during the process. 


